This chapter explains the outline of EDIUS and function and screen structure of each product.

EDIUS

EDIUS X Pro

EDIUS X Pro is nonlinear video editing software that provides high-speed real time editing and smooth operability and enables handling of data in various camera formats by their native data. Even the newest formats supporting 4K, 60p/50p, and 10-bit such as XAVC or AVC-Ultra can be handled in the native formats without conversion, and you can make use of them for wide range of usage such as broadcasting, movies, commercial films, documentaries, promotion videos, and personal production. This software provides wide variety of functions required for high quality video editing, such as multi-format mixed editing, multicam editing, proxy editing, composition, effects, titles, source management, and Blu-ray/DVD authoring, to enable video finishing that realizes free expression of the editors' creativity.

Grass Valley HQX Codec

With EDIUS, you can import 4K and 60p videos in their native formats and edit them by frame units. However, editing operations of such large video data put heavy load on the PC, which may prevent not only smooth editing operations but even normal playback operations, depending on the PC specifications. In such cases, convert the data into an intermediate codec to be suitable for editing and to improve work efficiency.

Grass Valley HQX Codec is an intermediate codec that enables the maximum editing performance of EDIUS. It supports 8K/60p/10-bit at the maximum, and any source can be converted into this codec with the master format retained. Since this codec can be used on both Windows and Macintosh, and supports alpha, it can be utilized for flexible editing in color grading and composition.

The potentiality of the Grass Valley HQX Codec is not limited to editing operations, but it can intermediate between any workflow.

While conversion into intermediate codec generally deteriorates the video image quality and is avoided in many cases where quality is important, the Grass Valley HQX Codec can reduce the deterioration to the minimum level and keeps good quality of the master image. Due to its 4:2:2 color space, VBR that maintains the balance of the quality for the data size even after the compression rate has been changed to fit the frame images, and its durability for deterioration even after repetitive conversion, it maintains the quality that is high enough for live events and broadcasting.

Note

- Since the Grass Valley HQX Codec uses VBR where the bitrates varies according to the image and thus the data size may increase depending on the video to be converted, use hard disk drive that is high-speed and with large disk space to a maximum possible.

Screen Configuration

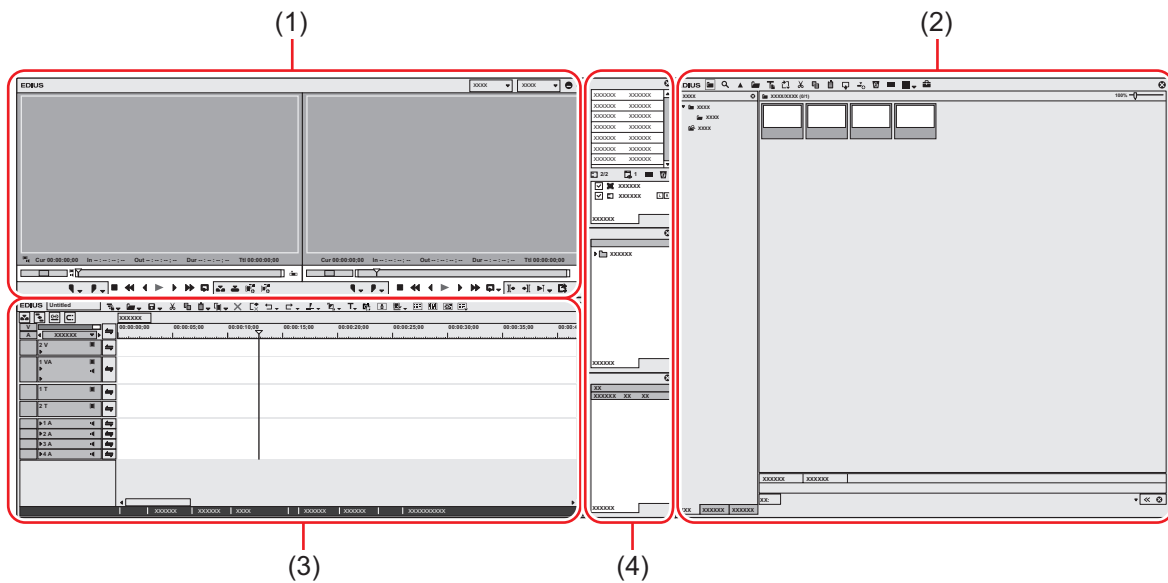
This section explains the overall EDIUS screen configuration as well as each window and palette.

EDIUS Screen Configuration

Various windows are displayed when using EDIUS, and basically you use 8 windows for editing video. You can easily edit video in dual monitor, as each window can be placed without overlapping with each other.

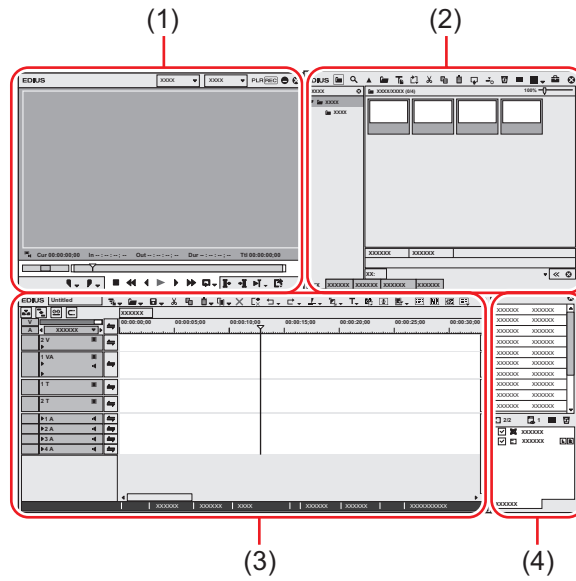
Each window can be resized by dragging its side line or the corner edge. As the windows snap to each other, you can place windows aligned by side line or corner edge. The window layout can also be saved.

Layout in Dual Monitor



(1)	Preview window	This window is used to check video. Player appears on the left, and Recorder on the right.
(2)	Bin window/source browser window/[Job] palette	Bin window and source browser window can be switched by clicking the tabs. Bin window This window is used to manage clips imported to EDIUS. Source browser window This window is used to check source files in external devices such as AVCHD video cameras or professional-use video cameras to which file-based video or audio are recorded. [Job] palette This palette displays the screen of GV Job Monitor.
(3)	Timeline window	This window is used to place the clips on the track or apply effects.
(4)	Palette window	There are 3 types of palettes: [Information] palette, [Effect] palette, and [Marker] palette.

Layout in Single Monitor



(1)	Preview window
(2)	Bin window/[Effect] palette/[Marker] palette/source browser window/[Job] palette
(3)	Timeline window

- When multiple windows are placed in alignment, all the snapped windows can be resized at one time by resizing one of them. Resize operation with [Shift] on the keyboard held down resizes only the selected window. However, this function may be unable depending on the setting of Windows.

Preview Window

You can switch the preview window between the single mode and dual mode.

Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Single Mode] or [Dual Mode] to switch the preview window display between single mode and dual mode.

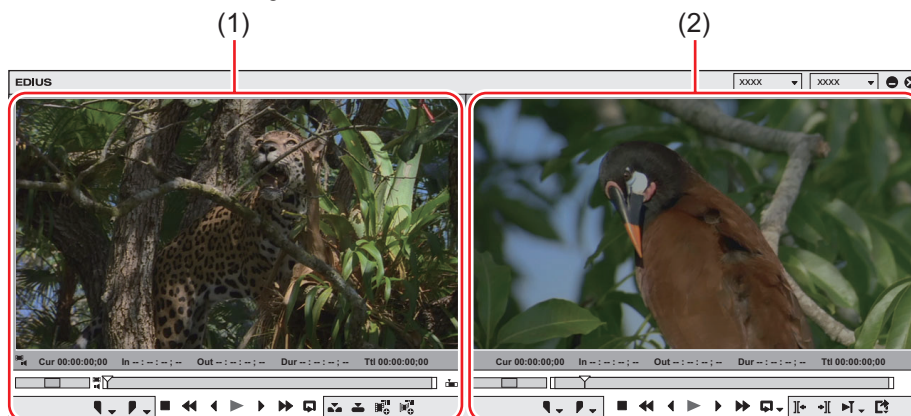

Player appears on the left, and Recorder on the right in the dual mode.

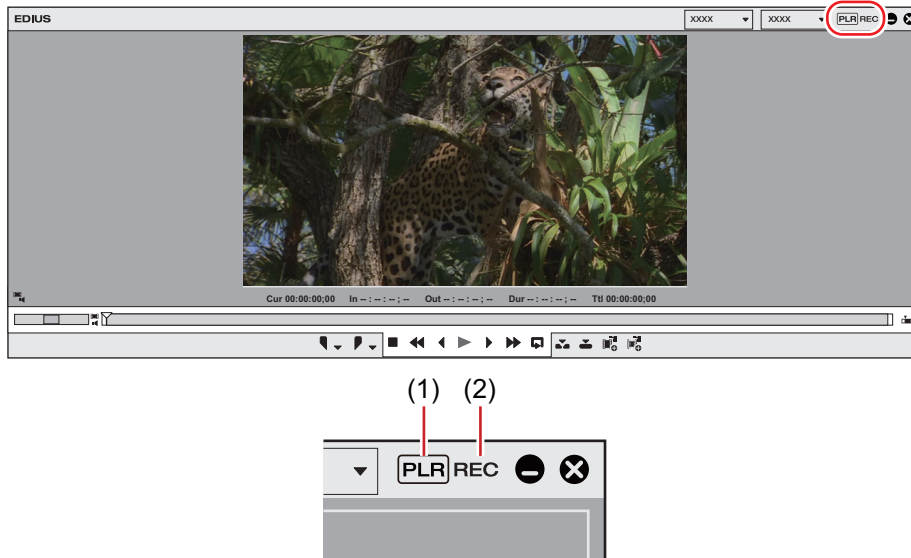

(1)	Player	This window is used to check clips. You can view clips in the bin window and sources being captured, and set In and Out points on this window.
(2)	Recorder	This window is used to check the timeline. You can view video on which effects are applied and composite video in real time.

Single Mode

Display either one of the Player or Recorder on the preview window and use them by switching the display.



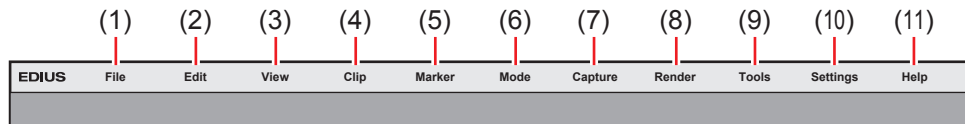
(1)	[Change to Player]	Display the Player.
(2)	[Change to Recorder]	Display the Recorder.

Menu Bar

You can execute most of the operations from the menu bar. Click and select an item.



(1)	[File]	Use it to create or save projects, manage projects or clips, output edited video, and exit EDIUS.
(2)	[Edit]	Use it to add cut points, delete clips, and execute editing functions such as undoing, redoing, etc.
(3)	[View]	Use it for display settings such as show/hide of windows, palettes, and functions, managing window layouts, switching dual/single modes, and full screen previewing.
(4)	[Clip]	Use it for clip operations such as creating new clips, linking or hiding clips, starting up layouter, configuring [Time Effect] settings, etc.
(5)	[Marker]	Use it for settings of markers such as adding/deleting markers or importing/exporting marker lists.
(6)	[Mode]	Use it to set editing mode such as trim mode and multicam mode.
(7)	[Capture]	Use it to start up the [Capture] dialog box or [Voice Over] dialog box, to select devices, etc.
(8)	[Render]	Use it to render the clip being edited in various methods.
(9)	[Tools]	Use it to start up tools such as Disc Burner, Mync, GV Job Monitor, etc.
(10)	[Settings]	Use it to open setting menus such as [System Settings] where you can set project presets and hardware device presets, [On Screen Display] where you can set timecode display, [User Settings] where you can set [Keyboard Shortcut], etc.
(11)	[Help]	Use it to display online FAQ or perform user registration.

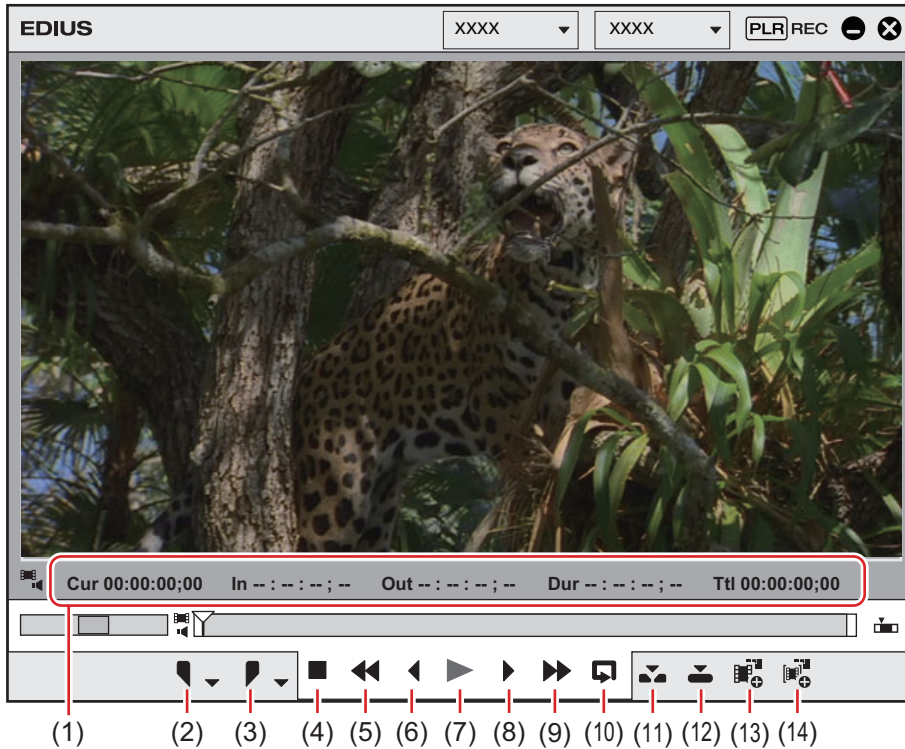


- Click [Help] on the menu bar, and click [User Registration] to perform user registration after installation.

- Click [Help] on the menu bar, and click [Serial number registration] to register the serial number. After registering the serial number, restart EDIUS to enable the functions.
- Perform the following to display the online manual:

Player

This window is used to play back or edit a source clip.



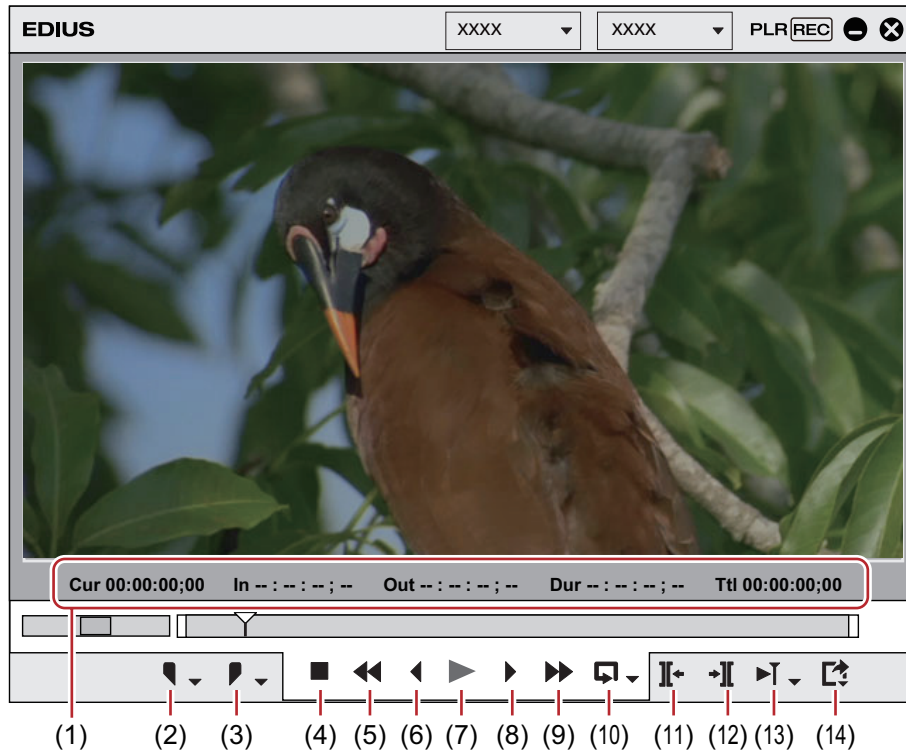
(1)	Timecode area	Display the playback position, In point, Out point, duration and the total length of the source data. If the setting is defined incorrectly, such as the setting that Out point is set before In point, the timecode turns red. The value can be changed by clicking the timecode. Copy and paste are also available by right-clicking the timecode.
(2)	[Set In Point]	Set the In (start) point of the source. [I]
(3)	[Set Out Point]	Set the Out (end) point of the source. [O]
(4)	[Stop]	Stop playback. [K], [Shift] + [↓]
(5)	[Review]	Fast rewind playback. Each click switches the playback speed in the reverse direction between 4 times and 12 times. [J]
(6)	[Previous Frame]	Each click rewinds one frame at a time in the reverse direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the normal speed in the reverse direction. In the case of deck operation, frame reverse is performed. [←]
(7)	[Play]	Play back the source in the forward direction. Clicking this during playback pauses playback. Clicking it again resumes playback. [Enter], [Space]
(8)	[Next Frame]	Each click forwards one frame at a time in the forward direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the normal speed in the forward direction. In the case of deck operation, frame advance is performed. [→]
(9)	[Fast Forward]	Fast forward playback. Each click switches the playback speed in the forward direction between 4 times and 12 times. [L]
(10)	[Loop]	Repeatedly play back between In and Out points. [Ctrl] + [Space]

(11)	[Insert to Timeline]	Insert and place a clip at the position of the timeline cursor. [I] “Insert/Overwrite Mode” (▶ page 230)
(12)	[Overwrite to Timeline]	Overwrite and place a clip at the position of the timeline cursor. [O] “Insert/Overwrite Mode” (▶ page 230)
(13)	[Add Clip on Player to Bin]	Register the clip displayed on the Player to the bin. [Shift] + [Ctrl] + [B]
(14)	[Add Subclip to Bin]	Copy the range between In and Out points set on a clip as a subclip and register it to the bin. A subclip refers to the same source as that of the original clip (master clip).

Recorder

This window is used to play back the timeline or edit a clip.

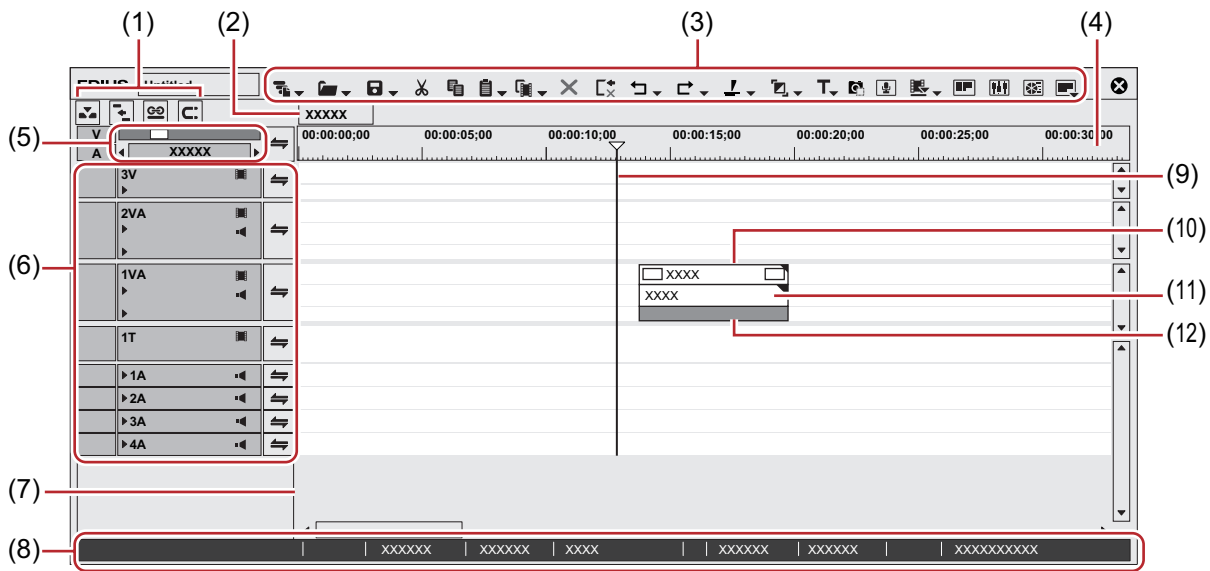


(1)	Timecode area	Display the current playback position, In point, Out point, duration, and the total length of the source data in timecode. If the setting is defined incorrectly, such as the setting that Out point is set before In point, the timecode turns red. The value can be changed by clicking the timecode. Copy and paste are also available by right-clicking the timecode.
(2)	[Set In]	Set the In point to any position on the timeline. [I]
(3)	[Set Out]	Set the Out point to any position on the timeline. [O]
(4)	[Stop]	Stop playing back the timeline. [K], [Shift] + [↓]
(5)	[Review]	Rewind the timeline. Each click switches the playback speed in the reverse direction between 4 times and 12 times. [J]
(6)	[Previous Frame]	Each click rewinds the timeline one frame at a time in the reverse direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the normal speed in the reverse direction. [←]
(7)	[Play]	Play back the timeline in the forward direction. Clicking this during playback pauses playback. Clicking it again resumes playback. [Enter], [Space]
(8)	[Next Frame]	Each click advances the timeline one frame at a time in the forward direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the normal speed in the forward direction. [→]

(9)	[Fast Forward]	Fast forward the timeline. Each click switches the playback speed in the forward direction between 4 times and 12 times. [L]
(10)	[Loop]	Repeat playback between In and Out points of the timeline. Loop playback of the entire timeline can also be performed. [Ctrl] + [Space]
(11)	[Previous Edit Point]	Move the timeline cursor to the edit point (e.g. the border of clip, In and Out points of the timeline) at the left side of the timeline cursor position. [A], [Ctrl] + [←]
(12)	[Next Edit Point]	Move the timeline cursor to the edit point at the right side of the timeline cursor position. [S], [Ctrl] + [→]
(13)	[Play the Current Area]	Play back the area before and after the timeline cursor.
(14)	[Export]	Display output (export) related menus.

Timeline Window

This window is used to place the clips on the track or apply effects.
Clips are placed from left to right of the timeline in time series.

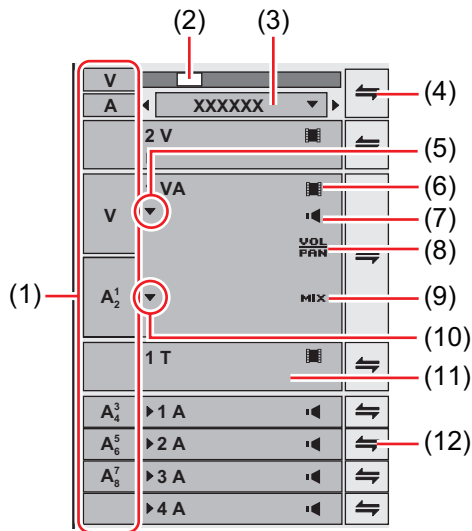


(1)	Mode bar	These buttons are used to switch the editing modes. The button types and sort order can be customized. “Switching the Editing Mode” (▶ page 230) “Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)
(2)	Sequence tab	Tab for using clips on the timeline as a set
(3)	Operation buttons	These buttons are used for editing operations. The button types and sort order can be customized. “Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)
(4)	Time scale	Indicate the scale for the time on the timeline.
(5)	Time scale settings	Change the display unit for time scale. “Time Scale Settings” (▶ page 227)
(6)	Track header	Configure various settings including muting and locking each tracks, mapping channels, synchronizing channels. It can be used to add and delete tracks. “Track Header” (▶ page 222)
(7)	Timeline	Place clips in this area. It can also be used to add and delete tracks. “Placing Clips” (▶ page 235) “Track Operations” (▶ page 225)
(8)	Status bar	Display the number of imported files when a project is opened/number of all files, the number of offline clips, clip playback status, editing mode, and background job status, etc. Move the cursor over the mode bar or timeline operation buttons to display the button names on lower left. Double-click the GV Job Monitor icon to display GV Job Monitor ([Job] palette). The icon color turns to purple while a file is being exported or a batch export rendering job is being processed. “GV Job Monitor Icon Indication” (▶ page 344)

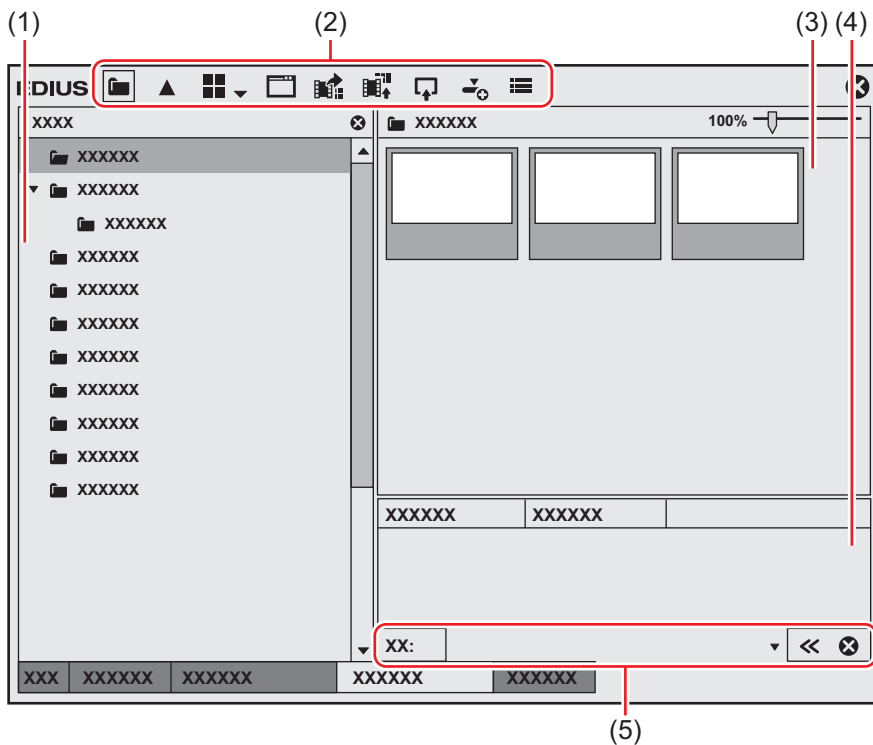


Source Browser Window

This window is used to check source files in external devices such as AVCHD video cameras or professional-use video cameras to which file-based video or audio are recorded.

You can switch the show/hide setting for the folder view. You can switch the display method such as thumbnail, detailed information, and other information for the clip view.

Display of the list, transfer to the bin, and search for the sources in external devices are available.



(1)	Folder view	Display devices and drives connected to the PC in a tree. When the media is inserted into the device or drive, the media name is displayed in the tree. Click the media name to display the stored files in the clip view. Palette Window

There are 4 types of palettes: [Information] palette, [Effect] palette, [Marker] palette, and [Job] palette.



- Follow the step below to show/hide all the palettes at one time.
 - Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Palette] → [Show All] ([Hide All]).
 - Displaying all: [H]
- You can combine all the palettes into one palette. The palettes can be combined to the bin window or the source browser window.

- Every double-click on the title bar of a palette expands and contracts the palette vertically.

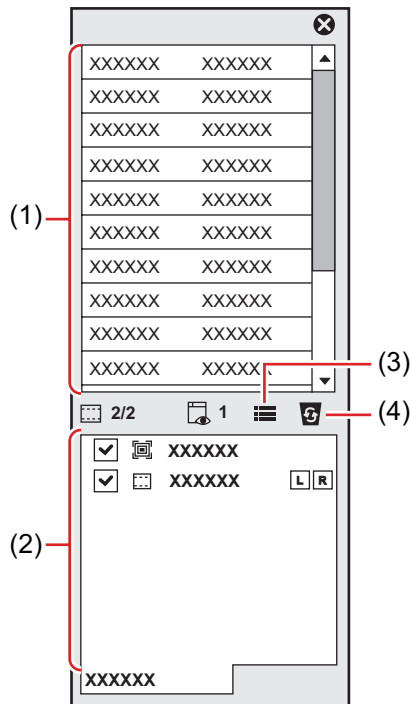

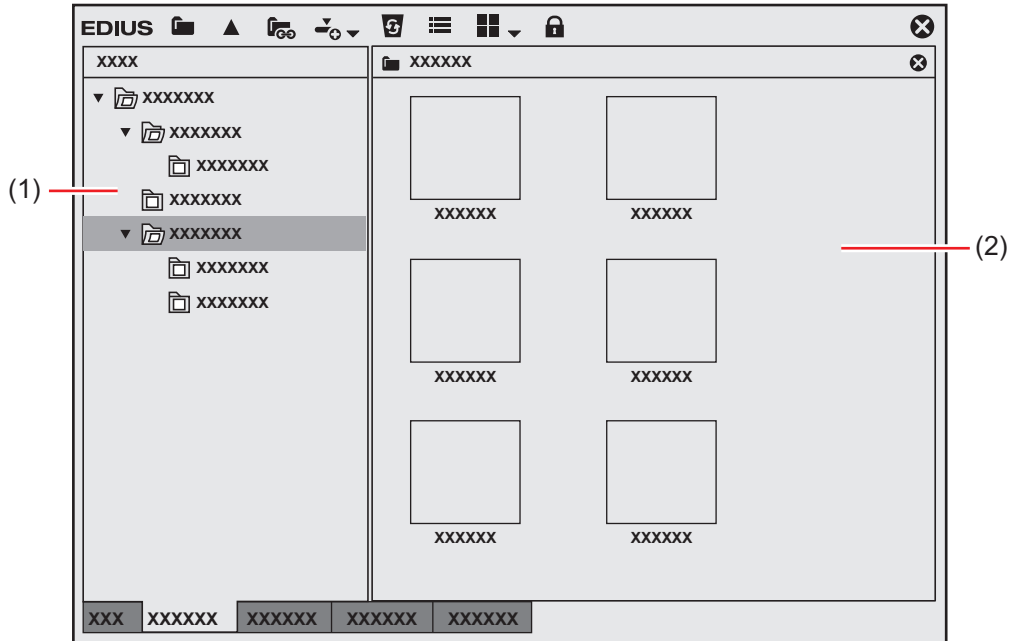

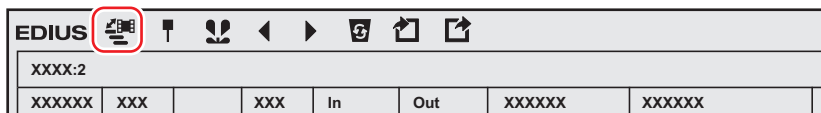

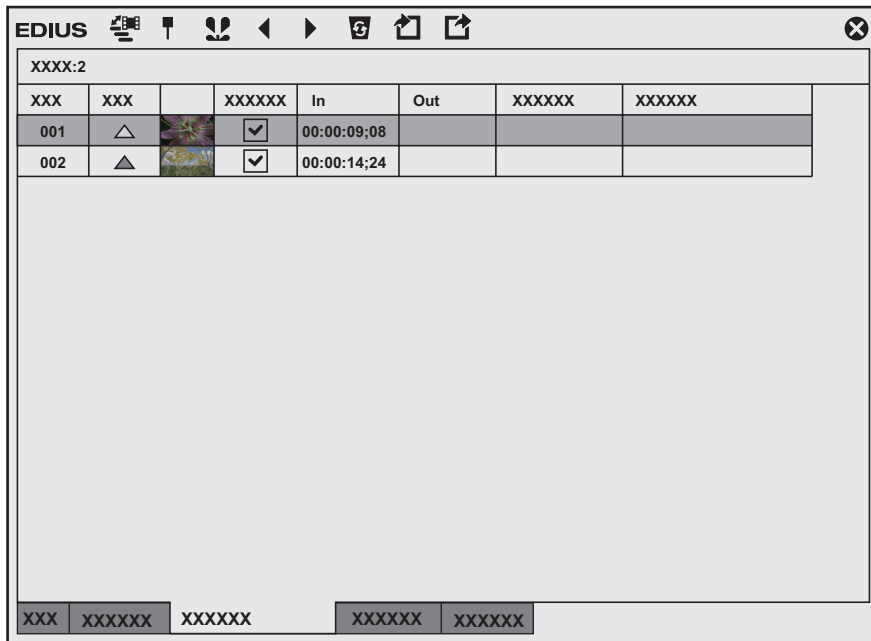

Entry of Values

Entering Values Using Keyboard and Mouse

This section explains the setting operation for the values in each settings dialog box.

Direct Input of Value

You can directly enter values with [0] to [9] on the keyboard.

1) Select the input field and enter the value on the keyboard.

- You can enter the value in the HHMMSSFF format (H = hour; M = minute; S = second; and F = frame). For example, enter "43S21F" or "4321" in only numerics for 43 seconds and 21 frames. Enter "10M" or "100000" for 10 minutes. If entering "3H2M1S0F", the value will be "03:02:01:00".

2) Press [Enter] on the keyboard.

Offset Input

You can enter variation values in the input field.

1) Select the input field and enter the variation value from the current set value.

2) Press [Enter] on the keyboard.

- Enter "-" before the value to decrease the set value.
- Enter "+" before the value to increase the set value.



- Offset input is only available for entering the timecode.

Setting with Arrow Keys

You can enter values with keys on the keyboard.

1) Select the input field and change the value with arrow keys on the keyboard (↑, ↓, ←, →).

2) Press [Enter] on the keyboard.

Entering with Mouse Wheel

The set values can be changed with the mouse wheel. The mouse wheel is in the center of the mouse.

1) Move the mouse cursor near the input field.

- The shape of the mouse cursor changes.

2) Click the value and rotate the mouse wheel.

Alternative

- Hold the right button of the mouse in the settings input field, and drag the mouse upward to increase the value. The value continues to increase while the mouse is dragged. The value increases accordingly, when the mouse is moved away from the initial drag position.
- In the same way, hold the right button of the mouse and drag downward to decrease the value.
- Hold the left button of the mouse and drag upward to increase the value by the movement of the mouse. In the same way, drag downward to reduce the value. In this case, the value does not change unless you move the mouse.

Chapter 2

Installation

This chapter explains installation/uninstallation of EDIUS, registration of eID, etc.

Installation/Activation

Note

- If you use EDIUS Workgroup or EDIUS Pro version 8 or later, Mync (Mync Standard) will be installed automatically at the installation of EDIUS.
- To use a Grass Valley product such as EDIUS or Mync, the PC to which they are to be installed must be connected to the Internet. Note that you may not be able to operate them in an environment where Internet connection is not available.
- Confirm that the PC to be used satisfies the conditions of the operating environment for the product.

- This section explains how to install on Windows 10.

Before Installation

Activation of the serial number and eID is required at the startup of a Grass Valley product such as EDIUS or Mync. At the first startup after installation, the activation screens for the serial number and eID will be displayed. The software starts up after successful activation.

Note

- Activation of eID is optional when you use EDIUS Workgroup.
- Before starting installation, close all other applications including resident software.
- Installation requires the account authorized for the administrator (such as PC administrator).
- Applications to be installed and setup files necessary for installation may differ depending on model.
- Make a backup of the customized settings such as keyboard shortcuts and then uninstall EDIUS before installing the latest version.
- If antivirus software (security software) is running, you may need to stop the software operation.

Creating eID

Create eID.

■ What is eID?

eID is an online ID function to link the license of Grass Valley products in possession to the user. The license will be more secure and the uniqueness of the license will be established by linking the serial number and eID at the time of first activation of the serial number.

Also, the information of the serial number in possession can be browsed or products can be downloaded on the membership website “eID Web” that can be logged in with eID.

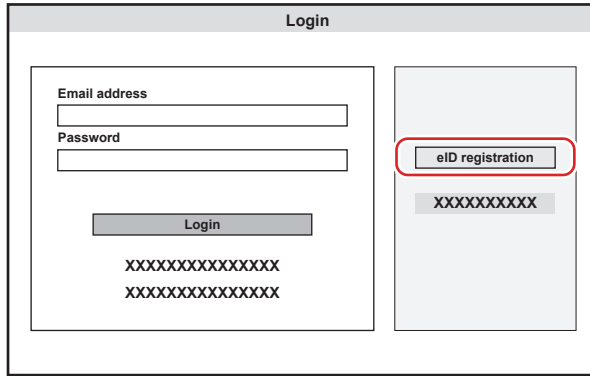

The sent data is used for the purposes of improving the quality, reliability, and performance of the software.
- When installation does not succeed, please check with the website of the manufacturer of the antivirus software (security software) in your system or our website for the latest updates.

1) Uninstall the older version of EDIUS.

- You can install EDIUS X to a PC on which EDIUS 9 has already been installed, which makes two versions of EDIUS available on the same PC.

Activating EDIUS

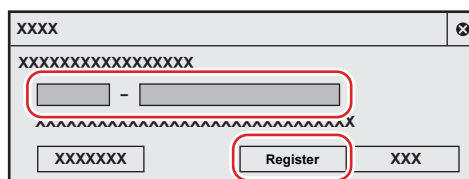

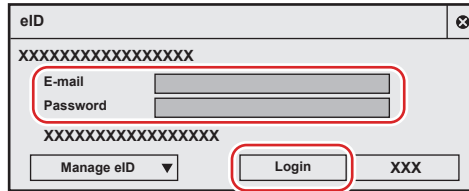

Profile list	Manage the window layouts, user settings, etc., by profile to be used by switching. “Editing Environment Management” (▶ page 128)
[New Project]	When you start EDIUS for the first time, click this button to start up the [Create Project Presets] wizard. After you create a new project preset, a new project file can be created. “Creating New Project Presets at Initial Start-up” (▶ page 59) When project presets have been registered, clicking this button displays the [Project Settings] (Simple Settings) dialog box, and a new project file can be created. “Creating a New Project (Simple Settings)” (▶ page 60)
[Open Project]	Click this button to display the [Open] dialog box to open an existing project file.
[Recent Project]	Displays the recently worked project files from the latest one. Double-click the file to open the project file. Every click switches the sorting order to be ascending or descending. Right-click the item name and click the items you want to display or hide. To delete the project history, select and right-click the file and click [Clear history] or [Clear All History]. No project name is displayed if no project file is saved.
[Open]	Open the project file.
[Close]	Exit EDIUS.

Initial Start-up

When you start up EDIUS for the first time after installation, register the serial number, specify a folder where the project files you use for editing are saved, and set up other items.

1) Perform steps 1) to 4) in “Activating EDIUS”.

- When activation completes, the [Folder Settings] dialog box appears.

2) Click [Browse] to specify the folder where the project files are to be saved, and click [OK].

- Set the destination to save the project files. The next time and later you create projects, they are saved in the specified folder.



- It is recommended that the project file saving destination is specified outside the drive where OS or system is installed.

3) Click [OK].

- The [Start Project] dialog box appears.

- At the first start-up, create project presets (project formats) subsequently. Proceed to “Creating New Project Presets at Initial Start-up”.

Creating a Project

Creating a New Project

This section explains how to create a new project when or after EDIUS starts.

Use a preset to create a new project. There are two types of presets, project preset and project template.

Project Preset

A project preset is a preset of project settings.

Set the project format according to the format of the output destination. At initial start-up, register a project preset by the [Project Preset] wizard.

“Creating New Project Presets at Initial Start-up” (▶ page 59)

Project presets are registered in advance, depending on the application. If this happens, select a project preset according to the format for the export destination.

Project Template

A project template is a preset that saves all information of another project as a template, which includes project settings, sources (video, audio, still image, and title files), effects, sequences, bin, etc.

A project template can be created by editing a project to be reused and saving it as a template.

“Saving as Project Template” (▶ page 76)

Note

- Sources can be reused only when they are saved in the project folder.
 If the sources are saved outside the project folder, they will become offline clips when the project template is to be edited on a different PC from the one the project template was created.

Creating New Project Presets at Initial Start-up

When you first start up EDIUS after installation, you need to register a project preset. Configure the settings of a project preset to create and register it.

Set the project format according to the format of sources to be used and the final export format.

1) Click [New Project] in the [Start Project] dialog box.

- The [Create Project Presets] wizard will start up.

2) Check more than one item for each of [Size], [Frame Rate], [Bit], and [Audio Channels], and then click [Next].

- Configure the video size, frame rate, video quantization, and audio channel for the project format to create with EDIUS. Multiple check boxes can be selected for each item.
- Checking [Set Over Scan Size to 0%.] will set [Overscan Size] of the project preset to [0%].



- Set a video quantization bitrate to 10-bit to edit with 10-bit precision retained. However, it may result in 8-bit precision depending on the effects you use.

3) Check the content.

- A list of formats corresponding to the setting configured in step 2) is displayed.
 A preset of the checked formats will be created. Uncheck the formats you do not use.



- You can click [Back] to redo the settings.

4) Click [Completed].

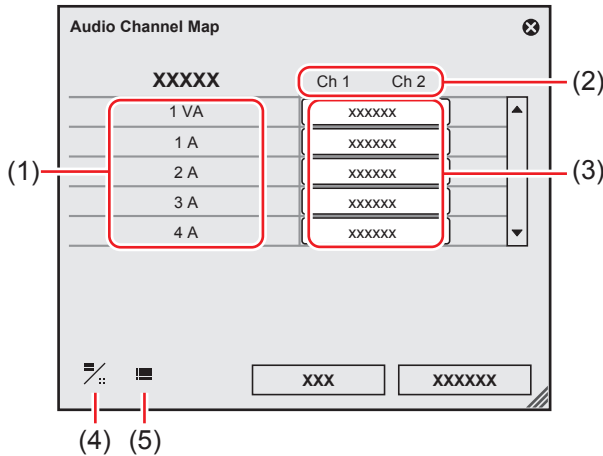

The formats that can be exported with 10-bit are Grass Valley HQX AVI, AVC-Intra, and uncompressed (v210) AVI, and MP4.

- A preset of the checked formats will be created, uncheck the formats you do not use.



- You can click [Back] to redo the settings.

6) Click [Done].

- The newly created preset is displayed as an icon in [Presets List].

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Save As].
- Saving a project in another name: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [S]**

Saving as Project Template

A project template is saved as an ezp file.

1) Edit a project.

2) Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Save As Template].

- Click the [Save Project] list button on the timeline, and click [Save As Template].

3) Set each item, and click [OK].

[Save As Template] Dialog Box

[Template Folder]	Set the destination to save a project template. To change the save destination, click [...], and specify a folder.
[Template Name]	To change the name, click the input field to enter a project template name.

- By default, the save destination of project templates is set to the “Project Templates” folder on the same level as the project folder.

Auto Save/Backup

If the auto save function is enabled, an auto save file is created at a specified interval. A backup file is created when a project file is saved if the backup function is configured. This file is used as a backup when the project file is corrupted or the system failed during the editing operation. To configure auto save/backup, use [Application] in [User Settings] → [Project file].

“[Project file]” (▶ page 120)

By default, an auto save/backup file is automatically saved, with a “Project name-Year, Month, Day-Hour, Minute, Second .ezp” file name, in the project folder where the corresponding project file is saved.

- Destination of a backup file → “Project folder”/“Project”/“Backup”

 **Note**

- Copy (transfer) the auto save/back up file to the folder where the project file is originally saved and import the file, to recover the project from the auto save/back up file.
- Auto save/back up files are in the attributes of read-only and cannot be overwritten. Change the attributes of the file from Windows Explorer in advance, or save as the different file.

2) Select a project file to import in the [Open Project] dialog box, and click [Open].

- Click the [Open Project] list button, and select a file from the list of recent files.
- Click [File] on the menu bar, and select a file from [Recent Project] → the recent files.
- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Open Project] to select a project.
- Opening project file after start-up: **[Ctrl] + [O]**



- If you edit a project file using multiple PCs over the network, while one PC can open and edit the project file, other PCs can open the same project file as a read-only file.

Importing Sequence (Sequence Import)

You can import the sequence created in other project.



Note

- You cannot copy files if the project folder is same as the source.
- If the frame rates are different, the merge process fails.
- If you merge projects with different project settings, the original project and video may be changed due to the differences of the frame size, aspect ratio, and overscan size. In addition, the rendered files cannot be copied.

Consolidating Project (Consolidate Project)

- If you select a back up option and if there is any clip that cannot be copied, a confirmation message is displayed to ask if you want to continue the process before consolidation.
 - If you select a cut option and if there is any clip that cannot be copied, a confirmation message is displayed to ask if you want to continue the process before consolidation.

 **Note**

- Even if an option to delete unnecessary files is selected, some files may not be deleted due to the access right to the folder or file. In that case, no message appears. Check the user authorization when logging in.
- If an option to delete unnecessary files is selected, the deleted files cannot be restored after consolidation.
- The name of the copied file is changed.

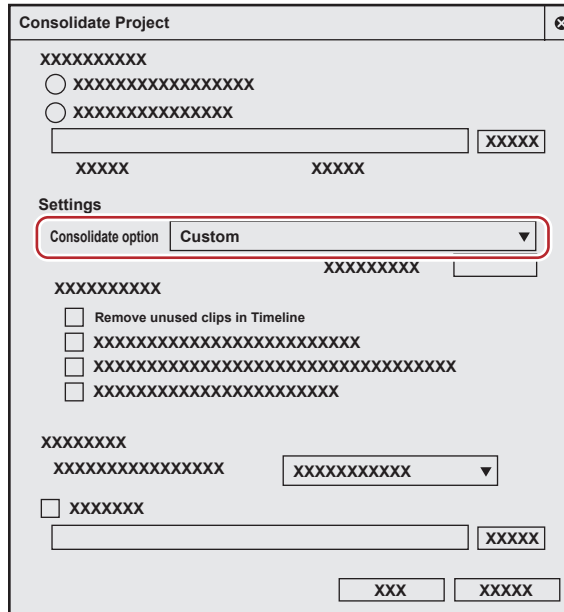

 - All effects (As for the pan and volume settings, source files that reflect their settings will be exported.)
- Transition/cross fade sections will be exported as clips.
- You cannot add an In point side margin to a clip that is positioned at the top of the timeline.
- You cannot specify network drives as export destination. However, you can mount network drives to use as export destination.
- When you select an exporter which does not support the export of the timecode, the file is not exported properly.
- Clips that are grouped, share a same clip name, and reference the same source are exported as a grouped clips.

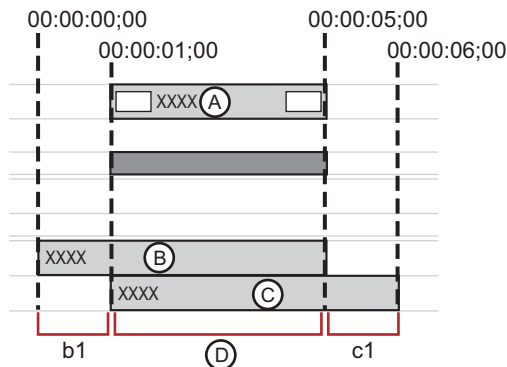

[Handle split clips separately]	Divide the split part of the clip with split to eliminate the split. Note that when the speed of clips is changed, the split part is not fragmented. This item cannot be set if you check [No split information]. “Splitting Clips to Handle Separately” (▶ page 85)
[When in reverse play, reverse player In/Out timecodes]	Display the reverse playback in the direction from the Out point to In point. The reverse playback is normally displayed from the In point to Out point. This item is available when you set CMX type for EDL type.
[When in reverse play, move one frame in the In direction]	Add a frame to the Player In point at reverse playback. Check this item when you cannot correctly import EDL files by third-party products. It prevents the original timecode from slipping off 1 frame forward. Normally, 1 frame is added to Out point of the Player at reverse playback.
[Combine Insert Tracks]	Check this item to overwrite a 1VA (or 1V) track with images of a 2VA (or 2V) track and to export both tracks as a 1VA (or 1V) track together.
[Create Reel List]	Create the list of reel numbers.
[Add Reel No. to clip name in comment]	This item can be changed only when [Mode2] (output format to add comment lines) is selected in [Export Format]. Check this item to add a reel name to the clip name output to the comment lines.
[Master reel number]	Set the master reel number used in BVE9100. The value range is between “0” and “9999”.
[Block number]	Set the block number used in BVE5000 or BVE9100. The value range is between “0” and “999”.
[Adjusted Data Settings]	<p>[Master reel number] When A/A roll (transition among the clips with the same reel number) exists, this reel number is to use the location in the replaced file. When the original clips have the same reel number, decrease the number one by one to avoid the number duplication.</p> <p>[Block number] Set the block number used in BVE5000 or BVE9100. The value range is between “0” and “999”.</p> <p>[Preroll area] Specify the margin added to In/Out points of the clips.</p> <p>[Offset time code] Enter the start timecode (optional).</p> <p>[Regenerate setting] Set the start timecode to the In point of the first clip.</p> <p>[Jam sync setting] Set the In/Out points of the clip to the In/Out points of the timeline.</p>

Splitting Clips to Handle Separately

When clips placed on different tracks are grouped and the clips have a gap within 3 seconds between the clips, they are split when exporting the EDL file.

When the clips have split information, the export result of EDL files differs depending on the settings in the [EDL Exporter Detailed Settings] dialog box. Here explains an example when the clips placed in 3 different tracks are grouped.



■ **If [No split information] is checked:**

The grouping of the clips is released to handle each clip separately. They are fragmented in 3 periods of time (A, B, and C in the figure above).

- 1 Information of A (00:00:01:00 - 00:00:05:00)
- 2 Information of B (00:00:00:00 - 00:00:05:00)
- 3 Information of C (00:00:01:00 - 00:00:06:00)

■ If [No split information] is unchecked:

Gaps between the clips are split. Areas of b1 and c1 in the figure are split, and the information is fragmented into 1 period of time as range D.

- 1 Information of D (00:00:01;00 - 00:00:05;00) (including the split information of b1 and c1)

■ If [Handle split clips separately] is checked:

The gap between tracks is fragmented to eliminate the split. The information is fragmented in 3 periods of time (b1, c1, and D in the figure above).

- 1 Information of b1 (00:00:00;00 - 00:00:01;00)
- 2 Information of c1 (00:00:05;00 - 00:00:06;00)
- 3 Information of D (00:00:01;00 - 00:00:05;00)

Note

- The clips with the speed changed are not split or handled separately, because their grouping becomes released.

Importing AAF Files (AAF Import)

You can import an AAF file to edit with EDIUS.

Note

- If you import an AAF file to EDIUS, the condition below must be met:
 - The AAF file is output by frame unit
 - The source file and the AAF file are separate (an embedded AAF file is not supported)

- 1) Click the [Open Project] list button on the timeline.



- 2) Click [Import Project] → [AAF].

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Import Project] → [AAF].

- 3) Select an AAF file to import in the [Project Importer (AAF)] dialog box, and click [Open].



- Check [New sequence] to create a new sequence and import an AAF file. If this item is unchecked, the AAF file is imported to the blank track of the currently selected sequence. If there is no blank track, a new track will be created.
- For an audio clip with monaural settings, the audio channels are set as below and the clip will be imported as monaural.
 - A1: channel 1
 - A2: channel 2
 - A3: channel 3
 - A4: channel 4
 For an audio clip with monaural setting, the even number tracks on which the clip is placed are sorted to L, the odd number tracks to R.

Importing EDL Files (EDL Import)

You can import an EDL file (Edit Decision List) to perform online edit.

- 1) Click the [Open Project] list button on the timeline.



- 2) Click [Import Project] → [EDL].

 **Alternative**

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Import Project] → [EDL].

3) Select an EDL file to import in the [Project Importer (EDL)] dialog box.

4) Click [Detailed Settings].

- The [EDL Importer Detailed Settings] dialog box appears.
 “[EDL Importer Detailed Settings] Dialog Box” (▶ page 87)



- Check [New sequence] to create a sequence and import an EDL file.


5) Set each item and click [OK].

6) Click [Open].

- The EDL file is imported and the [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box is displayed. Restore the offline clip.
 “Restoring Offline Clips” (▶ page 93)



- For an audio clip with monaural settings, the audio channels are set as below and the clip will be imported as monaural.
 - A1: channel 1
 - A2: channel 2
 - A3: channel 3
 - A4: channel 4
 For an audio clip with monaural setting, the even number tracks on which the clip is placed are sorted to L, the odd number tracks to R.

 **Note**

- Information below cannot be imported from BVE5000/BVE9100.
 - EditMode Filed:ASMBL, ASSY1
 - EditType Filed: other than C, W, and D
 - GPI data line
 - Learn data line
- Information below cannot be imported from CMX340/CMX3600.
 - EditType Filed: other than C, W, and D

[EDL Importer Detailed Settings] Dialog Box

[EDL Type]	Select the EDL type to input.
[Import Format]	This setting is available when you select CMX type in [EDL Type]. Select the calculation method of Out point for the source file with a speed specified. [Mode1] Add (subtract) the value of source duration multiplied by the speed to the timecode at In point, and calculate the timecode at the Out point. Using the timecode at Player In point as reference, add for the + direction or subtract for the – direction. [Mode2] Use the timecode of Player Out point, not calculating Out point when Player In and Out points become the timecodes of source In and Out points.
[Handle black clips as empty clips]	When the reel name is BL/BLK/BLACK, handle the clip as a black clip, and handle the black clip as an empty clip.
[Overwrite clips that are stacked on top of each other in the timeline video track]/[Overwrite audio clips that are stacked on top of each other in the timeline audio track]	If importing a file without checking [New sequence] in the [Open] dialog box, the current clips are overwritten when the clips are stacked on the timeline of the 1VA (1V, 1A) track. If this item is unchecked, the clips are not overwritten, but the clips are placed on 2VA, 3VA (2V, 3V, 2A, 3A) tracks. If there is no 2VA, 3VA (2V, 3V, 2A, 3A) tracks, a new track is created.
[Match channels when the channels in a transition's "from" side and "to" side is different]	If the number of video or audio are determined to be different between the From side and To side, the number information of the video and audio on the To side is copied to the From side for alignment. This setting is available when you select CMX type in [EDL Type].
[Force reel name as clip name]	Uses the reel name as the clip name when importing.
[Export Error Log]	Export a file containing error information if an error occurs at import. [Export File Format] and [Export Type] can be set. If [All] is selected in [Export Type], the imported contents and error location are shown.

Importing Final Cut Pro XML Files (FCP XML Import)

You can import an XML file exported from Final Cut Pro to edit with EDIUS.



- Bin information loading of Final Cut Pro 7 project files is also supported. However, bin information loading is limited to clips and sequence clips. Clips in the “Color bar and tone” folder and “Matte” folder, and “Blackish” clips cannot be loaded.
- In Final Cut Pro 7, clips of “Digital color bar (100/0/100/0)” or “Digital color bar (100/0/75/)” in “Color bar signal details” are replaced with EDIUS color bar clips of [100/x/100/x Color Bar] or [100/x/75/x Color Bar]. Other color bars are replaced with [SMPTE Color Bar] of EDIUS.
- Color bar tone levels for Final Cut Pro 7 are supported.
- If clips with colors specified by “Color Matte” and “Plain” of Final Cut Pro 7 are used, they are replaced with color matte clips of EDIUS. However, alpha of “Color Matte” and “Plain” of Final Cut Pro 7 is not supported.

Note

- For the Final Cut Pro multi-clip, those selected in the multi-clip are placed to the EDIUS timeline.
- The following items cannot be restored in EDIUS.
 - Title (text) clip
 - Transition applied to the clip and a blank
 - All transitions other than dissolve (all transitions are replaced with dissolve)
 - Key frame
 - Video filter

In addition, the same sequence clips may be imported as different sequence clips. The sequence clips are imported as the same sequence clips only if the sequence IDs are included and the internal tags are empty.

- 1) Click the [Open Project] list button in the timeline.



- 2) Click [Import Project] → [FCP XML].

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Import Project] → [FCP XML].

- 3) Select an XML file in the [Project Importer (FCP XML)] dialog box, and click [Open].

- The XML file is imported and the [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box is displayed. Restore the offline clip. “Restoring Offline Clips” (▶ page 93)

Importing P2 PLAYLIST (P2 PLAYLIST Import)

You can import a playlist edited in P2 mobile recorder (AJ-HPM100/AJ-HPM110/AJ-HPM200) to edit with EDIUS.

- 1) Click the [Open Project] list button on the timeline.



- 2) Click [Import Project] → [P2 PLAYLIST].

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Import Project] → [P2 PLAYLIST].

- 3) In the [Project Importer (P2 PLAYLIST)] dialog box, select an XML file in the “EDITLIST” folder, and click [Open].

- The clip will be placed on the timeline.



- If [New Sequence] is checked, a new sequence is created to import an XML file. The start timecode is set with priority for the imported playlist.
If this item is unchecked, the XML is imported to the currently selected sequence. The start timecode is set with priority for the selected sequence.
- If [FileCopy] is checked, the source files are copied to a folder specified by clicking [Browse], and the copied source files are referenced.
If this item is unchecked, the original source will be referenced.
- The audio clips are placed to A track.

Importing XDCAM Files (XDCAM Import)

An edit list created by the XDCAM HD deck or software accompanied to XDCAM can be imported to and edited with EDIUS.

1) Click the [Open Project] list button on the timeline.



2) Click [Import Project] → [XDCAM].

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Import Project] → [XDCAM].

3) Select an SMI file in the [Project Importer (XDCAM)] dialog box, and click [Open].

- For an XDCAM disk, select an SMI file in the “Edit” folder.
- For a PDZ-1 extended clip list, select an SMI file in the “General” folder.
- If a PDZ-1 extended clip list (consists of a single disk) is written back to the disk, select an SMI file in “General” → “ExtClipList” folder.
- For PDW-U1 (SAM format), select an SMI file in “EDTR” → “EDITLIST name” folder.
- For a PDW-U1 (SAM format) extended clip list, select an SMI file in “General” → “ExtClipList” folder.



- Check [New Sequence] to create a sequence and import an SMI file. If this item is unchecked, the SMI is imported to the currently selected sequence. The start timecode is the timecode described in the XML file within the same folder where SMI file is saved.
- If [FileCopy] is checked, the source files are copied to a folder specified by clicking [Browse], and the copied source files are referenced.
If this item is unchecked, the original source will be referenced.
- The audio clips are placed to A track.
- The settings to import an XDCAM file can be changed through [Importer/Exporter] in [System Settings] → [XDCAM].
“XDCAM Importer Settings” (▶ page 111)

Note

- If a paired XML file does not exist in the same folder as the selected SMI file, the file cannot be imported correctly. This XML file contains the start timecode of the timeline and TC mode settings (drop/non drop).

Field Editing a Project

The “field editing function” can be used to ensure that projects move smoothly when, for example, checking out projects edited on a desktop PC and editing them in a limited manner on a laptop PC. When a project that has been checked out by field editing is opened, a message is displayed to prevent duplicate editing of the project.

Checking Out Projects (Check-out)

Collect the project and source clips referenced by the project in a specified folder on a removable USB storage media. Instead of the original source files, proxy files for limited editing also can be checked out.



- From [System Settings] → [Application] → [Proxy], you can set the size of proxy files to be created at the time of checkout. “[Proxy]” (▶ page 104)

1) Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Field Editing] → [Check out].

- The [Check Out] dialog box appears. “[Check Out] Dialog Box” (▶ page 90)

2) Click [Browse], and specify the checkout destination.

3) Set each item and click [OK].

4) Click [Yes].

- When checkout is completed, the project is closed, and the [Start Project] dialog box appears. [Check out] is displayed in [Status] of checked out projects.



- You can check the detailed information of clips transferred by project checkout by the following operation. Right-click a clip on the timeline or in the bin, and click [Properties]. You can confirm the directory of the checkout source file and the clip type (proxy/high-resolution) at checkout by clicking the [Check out] tab.

[Check Out] Dialog Box

[Checked Out]	Click [Browse], and specify the collection point (e.g. removable USB storage media) of the project or source clips. Check [Create folder with project name] to create a folder with the project name in the destination folder. You can enter a comment in the [Comments] field. You can check the amount of free space at the checkout destination and the size of the project data for checking out and field editing at [Drive Space] and [Required Space]. The numerical value of [Required Space] differs according to the [Check Out Source Files] and [Check Out Target] setting.
[Check Out Source Files]	[Proxy] Check this item to collect the proxy at the checkout destination. The checked out project references the proxy. A proxy will be automatically generated if there is not proxy. [HiRes] Check this item to collect the original source files at the checkout destination. When copying only parts currently used on the timeline, set the margin.
[Copy only L clip for stereo clips]	Displayed only in the stereoscopic edit mode. Check this item to collect the L side of the stereoscopic clip at the checkout destination. When both L and R sides is included in a single file, the clips are copied as they are.
[Check Out Target]	Select the clips to be collected at the checkout destination. When [Only timeline (Opened Sequence)] is selected, only the clips currently used on the timeline of the currently open sequence are collected. When [All] is selected, both the clips currently used on the timeline and the clips registered to the bin are collected.

Editing at the Checkout Destination

1) Start up EDIUS, and open the checked out project.

- The checked out project is displayed as [Checked out] at [Status] in the [Start Project] dialog box.

2) Edit and save the project.



- It is recommended to set automatically run partial transfer so that clips added in editing at the checkout destination are automatically transferred to the project folder. Auto-run of partial transfer can be set by [Source] in [User Settings] → [Partial Transfer]. Select [From Removable Media and Hard Drive] in [Target Clip], and check the required 2 items in [Auto Transfer]. To execute auto-run of partial transfer, the clip must be displayed on the Player, the In and Out points must be set, and the clip must be imported to the timeline or bin by button operation.
“Transferring Only Necessary Part” (▶ page 189)
- When only the proxy or source including the proxy has been checked out, the project automatically opens in the proxy mode.
“Switching to the Proxy Mode” (▶ page 331)
- Project settings can be changed also in checked out projects.
- Additional checkouts are not possible at checkout destinations.
- When the proxy mode is canceled on a project from which only the proxy was checked out, a diagonal line is displayed on the clip on the timeline and the clip is displayed as a partial offline clip.

Note

- When only the proxy is checked out for editing, the frame display during trimming and the background during title clip editing appear as a checkered pattern.

Returning Checked Out Projects (Check-in)

1) Start up EDIUS, and open the checkout source project.

- The checkout source project is displayed as [Check out] at [Status] in the [Start Project] dialog box.
- The [Check Out Status] dialog box appears.

2) Click [Check in].

- The [Check In] dialog box appears.
“[Check In] Dialog Box” (▶ page 91)

Alternative

- Open the checkout source project file, and click [Open as read-only] in the [Check Out Status] dialog box. Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Field Editing] → [Check in].

3) Click [OK].

4) Click [Yes].

- The project opens with editing details reflected.




- The checkout source project cannot be renamed even if a project file with a different name has been checked in.
- The proxy that was used at the checkout destination is not copied when it is checked in.

5) Save a project.

[Check In] Dialog Box

[Project file]	Displays the project file to check in. By default, the checkout destination and project name set in the [Check Out] dialog box at the time of checkout are displayed. Any project file can be selected by clicking [Browse].
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[Add/Update file]	Displays any files updated at the checkout source and files added or updated at the checkout destination from checkout onwards in a list. Select from the list how to process additional or updated files. When [Use Original] is selected from the [Processing] list, the files are linked to the source files at the checkout source. When [Copy to Project Folder] is selected, the source files at the checkout source are copied and linked to the project folder at the checkout source. File properties can be confirmed by clicking  .
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Canceling Checkout

You can discard checkout information.

1) Start up EDIUS, and open the checkout source project.

- The checkout source project is displayed as [Check out] at [Status] in the [Start Project] dialog box.
- The [Check Out Status] dialog box appears.

2) Click [Undo check out], and click [Yes].

- The project file opens.

Alternative

- Open the checkout source project file, and click [Open as read-only] in the [Check Out Status] dialog box. Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Field Editing] → [Undo check out] → [Yes].

Note

- When the checkout source project is not saved after checkout is canceled, the file is recognized as the one whose checkout has been canceled.

Restoring Offline Clips

Restoring the Source Link

If a source used in EDIUS is moved/deleted, the link between the source and EDIUS is lost, and the source cannot be referred from the clip. Clip that cannot refer to source will become an offline clip that video and audio are not displayed. The following section describes the method for supporting restoration of an offline clip.

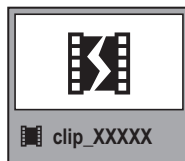
If there are offline clips on the timeline, an icon to indicate the presence of offline clips and the number of the offline clips are displayed on the timeline status bar.



The offline clips on the bin and the timeline are displayed as below, and the video and audio are both muted during the playback.

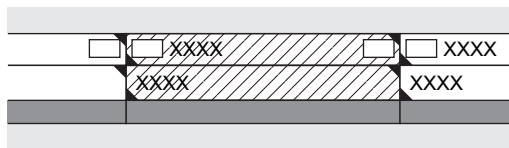

Restoring an Offline Clip

Select a restoration method for the offline clips.

1) Click the [Open Project] list button on the timeline.



2) Click [Restore Offline Clip].

- The [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box appears.
“[Restore and transfer clip] Selected Dialog Box” (▶ page 94)

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Restore Offline Clip].

Note

- Registered clips that are reference AVI files will be marked as offline clips if any part of the source is moved. In such cases, the offline clips cannot be restored.
The reference AVI is a file containing only the audio data entity and destination information, developed by Grass Valley with its own extension within a range of the specification. It is different from regular AVI files.
- Files can be captured or restored only when matching the following conditions:
 - Video information exists.
 - The reel name is set.
 - Source file extensions are *.avi, *.m2t, *.mov, or *.mxf.

[Restore and transfer clip] Selected Dialog Box

[Capture entire clip]	The [Batch Capture] dialog box appears. Capture the entire source. “ Capturing and Restoring ” (▶ page 95)
[Capture only the area used in timeline]	The [Batch Capture] dialog box appears. Capture only the part used in the timeline. If there are multiple offline clips, replace each offline clip with the captured source. “ Capturing and Restoring ” (▶ page 95)
[Find from captured files]	Search the source by reel number (Ubit) and timecode (between In and Out points) in already captured files. “ Searching File by Reel Number to Restore ” (▶ page 96)
[Open the clip restoration dialog]	The [Restore and transfer clip] dialog box appears. Restore the offline clips by reestablishing a link to the disconnected source, by retransfer the source that cannot reference a part of the clip, or by replacing a camera proxy file with a high-resolution source. “ Re-link and Restoration ” (▶ page 94)
[Close]	Click [Close], and click [Yes] to display the operation screen without restoring the offline clip.

Re-link and Restoration

You can search the source from the hard disk drive to re-link.

1) Click [Open the clip restoration dialog] in the [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box.

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box appears.
“**[Restore and Transfer Clips] Dialog Box**” (▶ page 95)

 **Alternative**

- To restore the clips on the timeline, double-click the offline clip icon on the status bar. In this case, only the offline clips on the timeline are displayed in the clip list in the [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box.

2) Select the target range of the clip from the [Range] list.

3) Select a clip (or clips) from [Clip list], and select either [Relink (select file)] or [Relink (select folder)] from the [Restoration Method] list.

4) Select the source from the [Open] dialog box, and click [Open].

- Selecting a file to be re-linked in the [Open] dialog box will show the check result of consistency with the original file.
Checking [link only files that perfectly match] will re-link only files that have exactly the same information as the original files.
- Clips with different frame rates can also be re-linked.
- If [Relink (select folder)] is clicked in step 3), select a folder in the [Browse For Folder] dialog box and click [OK].

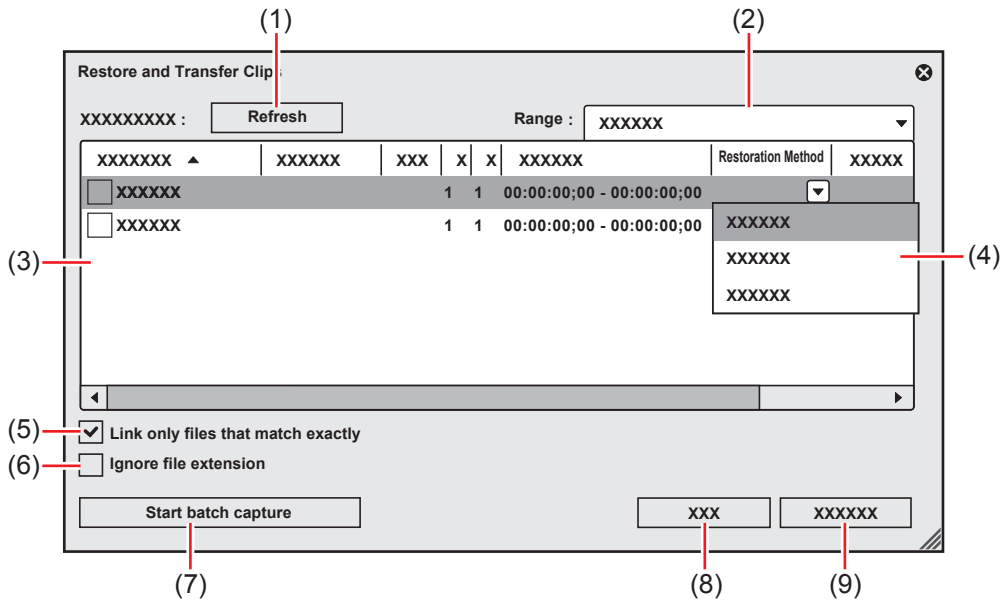
5) Click [OK].

6) Click [Close] in the [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box.

- Double-click a offline clip on the timeline or in the bin window, and perform operations after step 3).

Capturing and Restoring

If the source of the offline clips does not exist in the hard drive, you can restore the clips by recapturing from the original source (recorded tapes).

1) In the [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box, click [Capture entire clip] or [Capture only the area used in timeline].

- The [Batch Capture] dialog box appears.
 “Importing Sources All Together (Batch Capture)” (► page 170)

Alternative

- In the [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box, select either [Capture all] or [Capture only areas used in timeline] from the [Restoration Method] list, and click [OK].

2) Execute the batch capture.

Searching File by Reel Number to Restore

Search the source by reel number (Ubit) and timecode (between In and Out points) in already captured files.

1) Click [Find from captured files] in the [Restore and transfer clip] selected dialog box.

- The [Restore Offline Clip] dialog box appears.
- Search a file in a folder where the project is saved. If you cannot find the file, click [Select Folder] and select a folder where the captured files are stored, and click [OK].

2) Click [Restore All].

- To restore selected files only, select a clip from [Find clip list] and click [Restore].

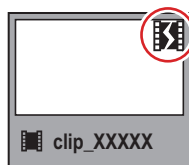
Restoring Clip That Cannot Reference Part of a Clip

The clips will be partial offline clips under the following conditions: when a portion that forms a clip containing a proxy, when the proxy created with EDIUS cannot be referenced, when a portion of the partially transferred clip cannot be referenced, or when either L or R side of the stereoscopic clip that has the stream of both L and R sides in 2 files.

In EDIUS, you can proceed with “Proxy originated editing” in which you use a proxy source when editing, and replace it with a high-resolution source before final exporting. A proxy clip used in this proxy originated editing (a proxy clip with reference information in high-resolution) is a “temporary editing clip”. A temporary editing clip can be easily replaced with a high-resolution clip using the source browser.

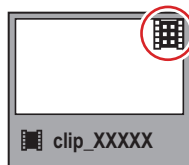

Partial offline clip in the bin



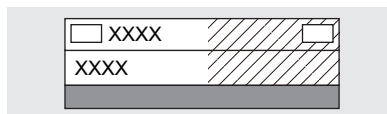

Temporary editing clip in the bin



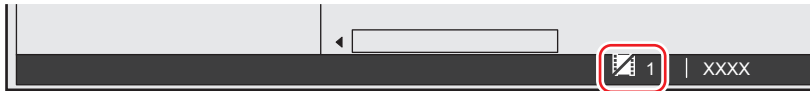
Example:

If there are partial offline clips or temporary editing clips on the timeline, icons and the total number of the offline clips, partial offline clips, and temporary editing clips (or untransferred clips) are displayed on the timeline status bar.

For P2, if a source file that only has a proxy (XML) is imported from the source browser, it will be recognized as an untransferred clip.



Note

- If offline clips, partial offline clips, and temporary editing clips exist on the timeline when you export the project to a file or tape or when consolidating or exporting the project, a message is displayed. Restore the offline clips, partial offline clips, or temporary editing clips. Otherwise, they will be exported as offline clips.

Restoring Partial Offline Clips

Restore the partial offline clips by retransfer the missing source or recreating the proxy. If needed, connect the device where the original source is stored.

If either the L or R side of the stereoscopic clip cannot be referenced, perform the same restoration operations for offline clips.

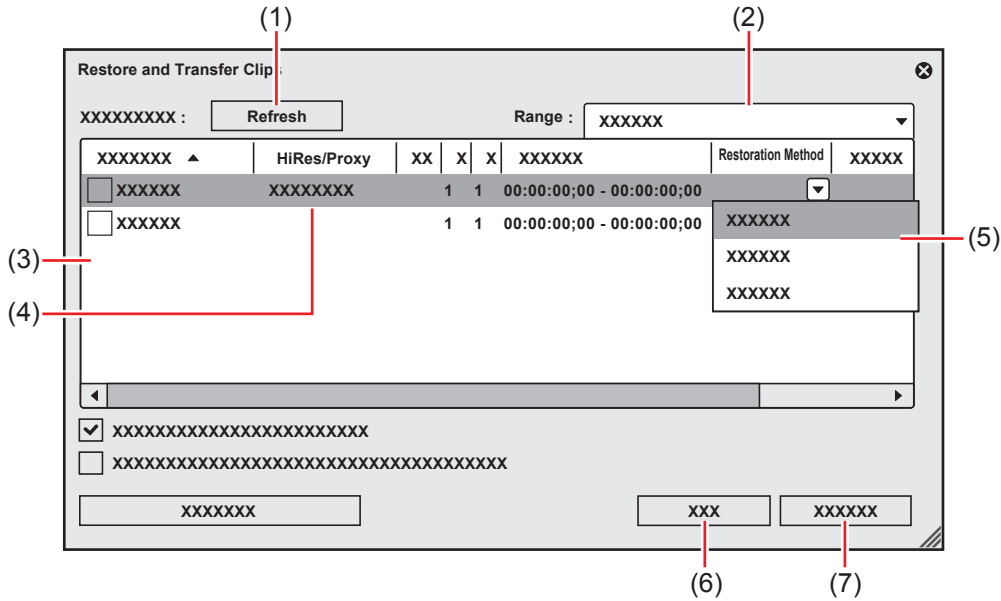

- If [Transfer the Missing Area], [Transfer All], or [Transfer Only Used Area] has been selected as the restoration method, the process is registered to the background job. Until the job is completed, the target clips remain partial offline clips or temporary editing clips.
- If [Create Proxy] has been selected as the restoration method, the proxy creation rendering job is registered to the Render Service. The proxy remains offline until the job is completed.
- If you double-click the icon on the timeline status bar to display the [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box, only the offline clips, partial offline clips, and temporary editing clips or untransferred clips on the timeline are displayed in [Clip list].
- You can use [Capture all] and [Capture only areas used in timeline] only when clips to be restored are capture-enabled formats and reel names are set to clips.

Restoring Temporary Editing Clips

A temporary editing clip can be easily replaced with a high-resolution clip using the source browser.

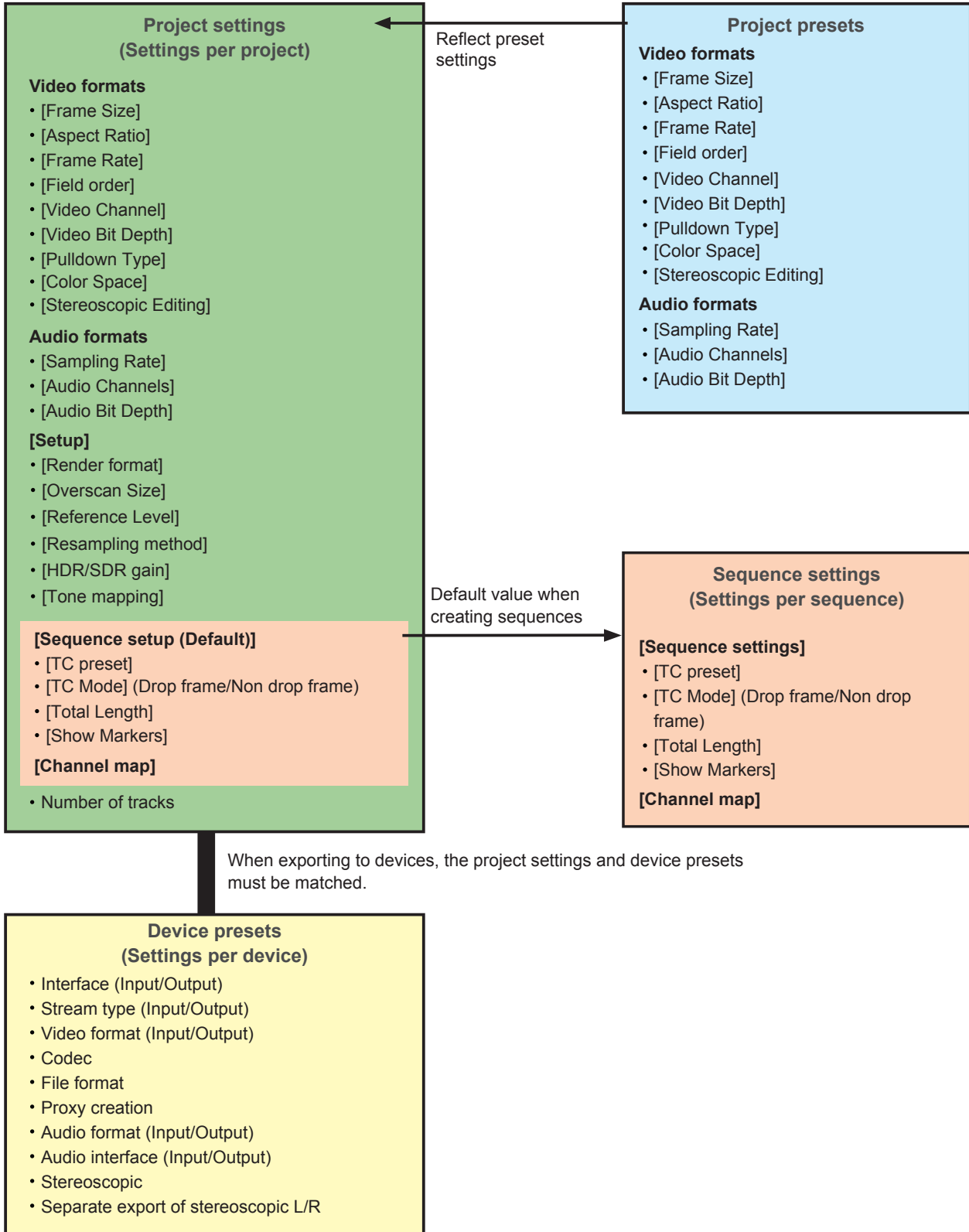

This chapter explains how to change editing operation and screen display settings, register the editing environment, and register external devices used for capturing, as well as other operations.

Relationship between Project Settings/Sequence Settings/Device Preset

[System Settings]

System settings allow you to manage project presets and profiles, set input/output hardware, set input of sources and input/output of project files, and other operations.

If you use the restricted user profile, the system settings cannot be changed.

The settings can be changed even during editing.

[Application]

Set EDIUS operations.

[Color Space]

Set show/hide or sorting order of color space, etc. used on EDIUS.

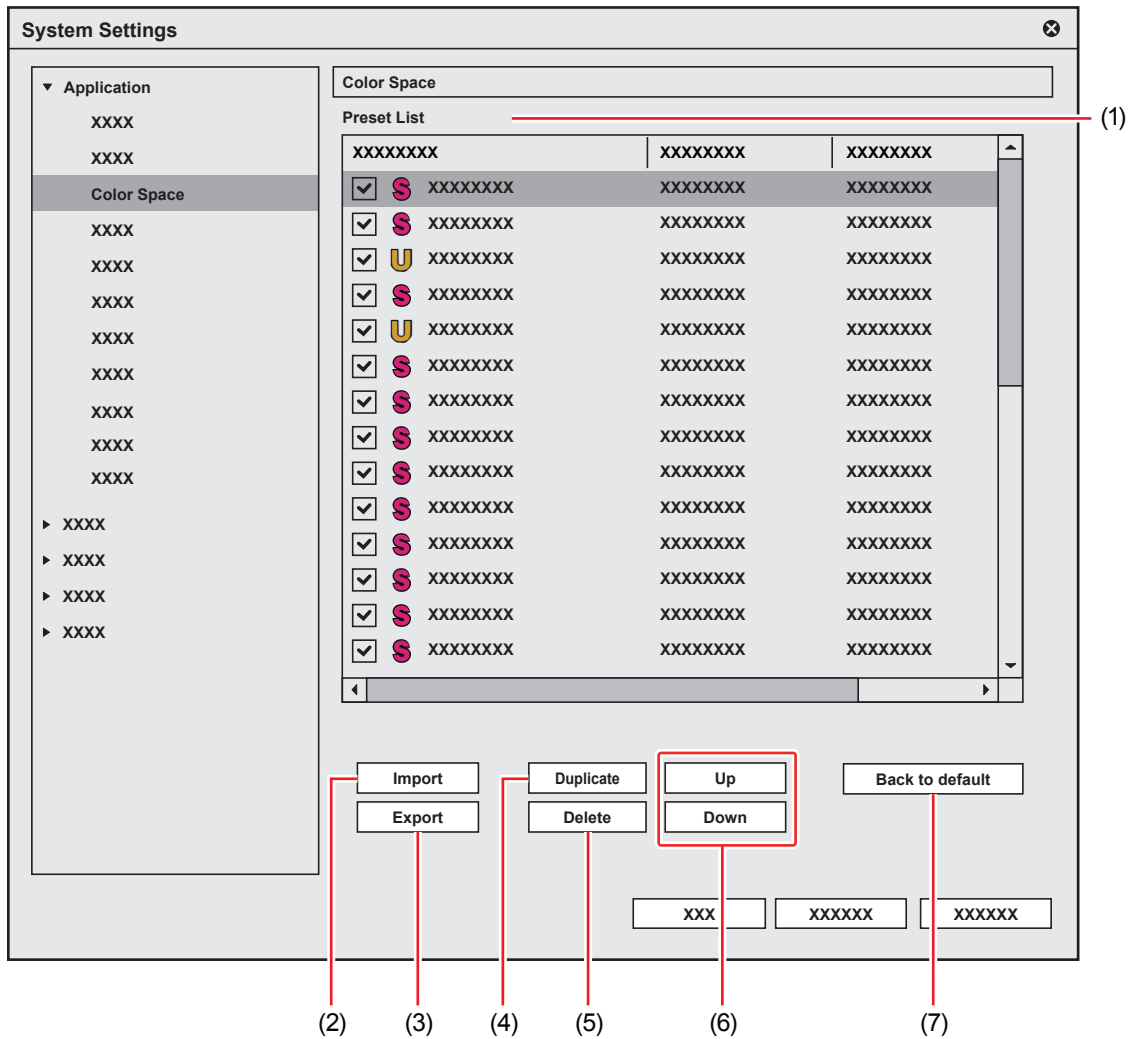

- Proxy file can be created only once. It cannot be re-created with different setting.
- If the setting has been changed while creating the proxy file, the changed setting will be applied at the time, and the creation of the file will be continued.

[Playback]

Set playback operations.



If the unit of time scale display is set to be 5 frames or less, a dotted line indicating the range of the Out point side appears on the right of the timeline cursor.
[Snap Event]	Enable the snap function. Check the event to be used as the snap point. When [Snap to Events Inside the Selected Area] is checked, all edit points of the clip in the selection area are snapped to.
[Default]	Change the default setting for the editing mode when creating a new project file. “Switching Mode when Placing/Moving Clips” (▶ page 230)
[Waveform]	Set the display method for the waveform of the timeline to either [Log (dB)] or [Linear (%)].
[Clip Timecode]	Display the checked timecode on the clip.
[Clip Thumbnail]	Display the thumbnails of In/Out points at the clip edge on the timeline. Select [All] to display thumbnails in succession. To hide thumbnails, uncheck this item. [Alt] + [H]



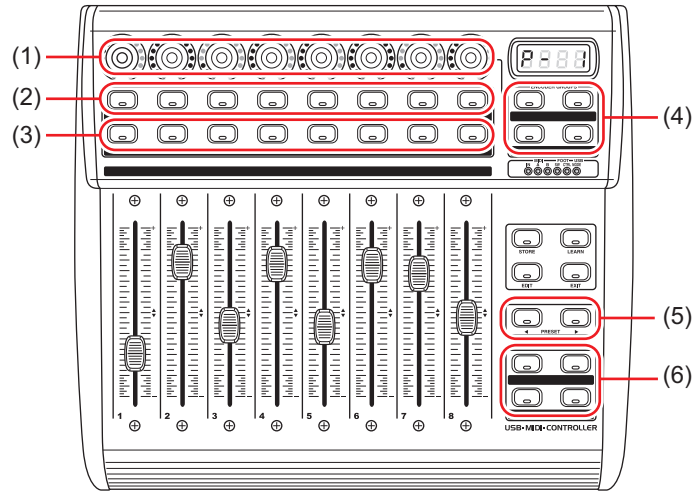

■ Local profile



This is the profile created on each local terminal. The settings of profiles that are changed while they are in use are overwritten.

■ Read-only profile



This is a read-only profile. The settings of profiles that are changed while they are still in use are not overwritten. Also, read-only profiles cannot be renamed, and their icons cannot be changed or deleted.

■ Restricted user profile



This is a restricted user profile. The system settings cannot be changed while the restricted user profile is in use.

■ Shared profile



This is the profile created using the profile management tool. The settings of profiles that are changed while they are in use are overwritten as long as the profile is not changed to read-only. Also, shared profiles cannot be renamed, and their icons cannot be changed or deleted on local terminals.

■ Shared profile in offline state



This is the shared profile in an offline state. This is displayed when a connection cannot be made to the reference server from the local terminal that was using the shared profile.



- When a shared profile is in use, profile settings sometimes cannot be saved to the server if the connection to the reference server is broken off midway or when another terminal is executing save processing on the same shared profile. When the connection to the server is recovered when EDIUS is next started up, if the shared profile with the same name is still in the server, a message will appear to confirm whether the profile settings, which could not be saved in the last session, should be written back to the server at the current session.

You can use video input/output hardware to perform capturing and monitor output. With EDIUS, it is possible to output the video being edited to a monitor in full frame and full resolution in real time, which enables to adjust the color or timing for cut while comfortably previewing the video.

Placement Customization

Changing the Screen Layout

EDIUS standard layout can be customized for better usability. It is possible to change the size of the preview window, or the bin window, or combine the palettes. It is also possible to register the customized layout.

Registering Layouts

Register operation screen layouts after they have been laid out according to your preference or size. Before you start operation, place the window or palette on the layout you want to register.

1) Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Window Layout] → [Save current layout] → [New].

2) Enter a name, and click [OK].

- The current layout will be registered as default. Numbers from [01] to [10] are assigned in order of registration.



- 10 layouts can be saved. To register a new layout when 10 layouts are already registered, select the layout to be overwritten from among the registered layouts in step 2).

Renaming Layouts

You can rename registered layouts.

1) Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Window Layout] → [Change Layout Name] → layout to change the name.

2) Enter a name, and click [OK].

Applying Layouts

Apply a registered layout to change the layout as you like.

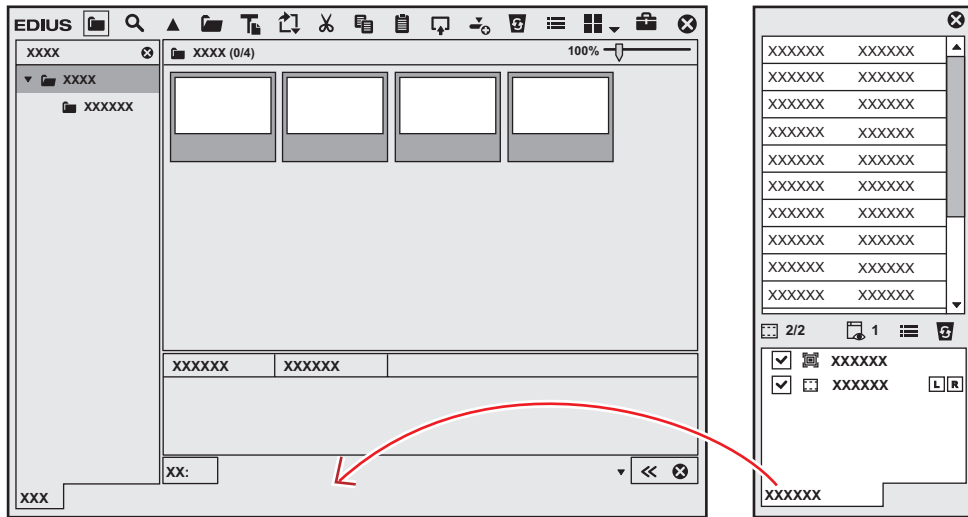

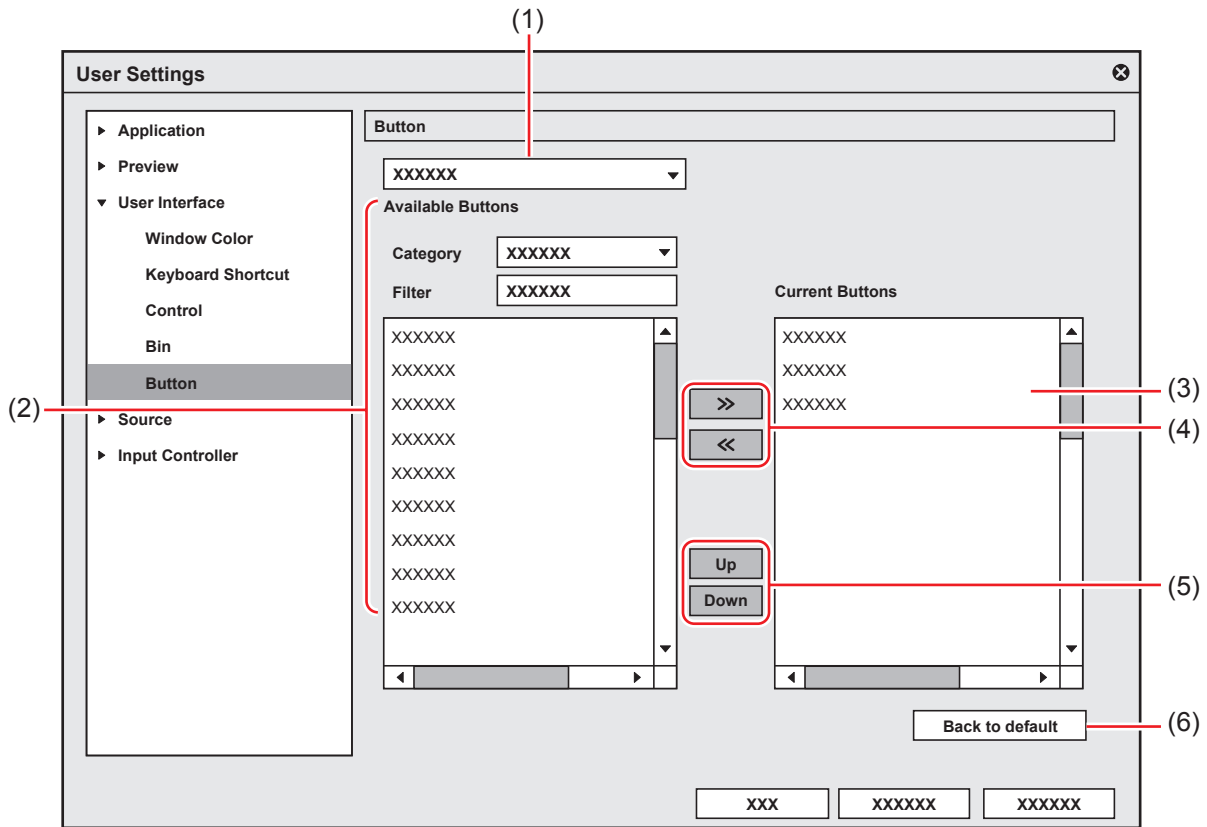

Note

- The occurrence of combing (vertical comb-like stripes) is normal when interlaced images are previewed in full screen view. When previewing on a PC, the same quality as in hardware preview out cannot be assured. Since there is a difference between refresh rate of a PC monitor and the internal frame refresh rate of EDIUS, the same field may be displayed multiple times in the preview window and fields that should be displayed may not be displayed. Also, the same phenomenon may sometimes occur at a non-uniform display frequency depending on the performance of the CPU or GPU.

1) Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Full Screen Preview] → monitor number.

- When [All] is clicked, all monitors that have been set to full screen view at [Preview] in [User Settings] → [Monitor] can be displayed as full screen view.
“[Monitor]” (▶ page 122)

Alternative

- Double-click the preview window.



- Perform the following to cancel full screen view:
 - Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Full Screen Preview] → monitor number.
 - Double-click the monitor set to full screen view.

Rotation Display of Preview Window

The preview window can be displayed rotated by 90 degrees.

1) Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Rotate Preview] → [Right 90 Degrees] or [Left 90 Degrees].



- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Rotate Preview] → [Standard] to return the window to its original state.
- Rotation of the preview can be set to each individual sequence. To maintain rotation of the preview when a project is next opened, set rotation of the preview as desired to each sequence, and then save the project.
- When a new project or sequence is created, the orientation of the preview window will be standard (i.e. rotation off).

Showing/Hiding Preview Window

Switch the show/hide setting for the safe area, center, and zebra preview.

You can change the information display settings from [Preview] in [User Settings] → [Overlay].

1) Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Overlay] → an item to display.

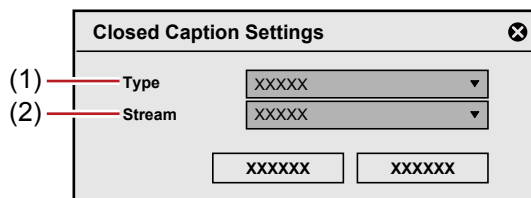

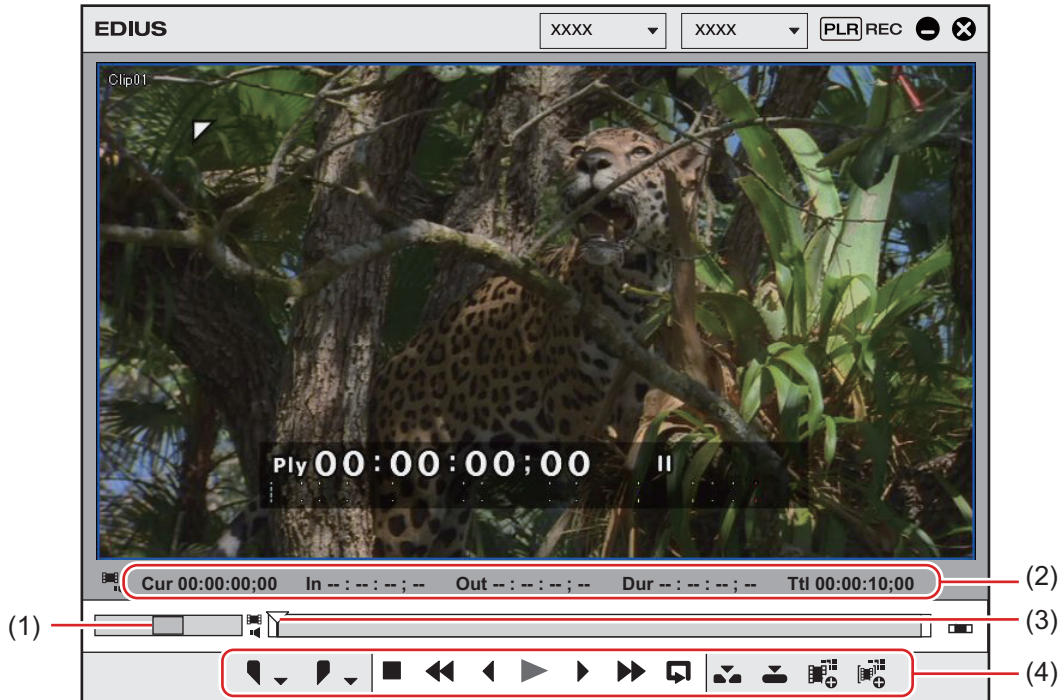

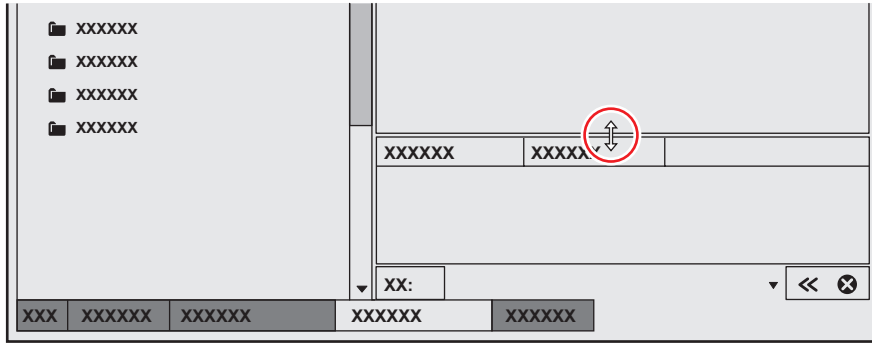

Shortcut Keys

This section explains operation methods using shortcut keys and how to change keyboard shortcut assignments.

About Shortcut Keys

You can perform operations more effectively using combinations of keys on the keyboard (keyboard shortcuts), or combinations of mouse and key operations (mouse shortcuts).

Keyboard Shortcuts

Example:

Playback and stop

Press [Enter] on the keyboard while the preview window or timeline is active. This plays back (or stops) video.

Example:

Deletion of gaps (deletion of spaces between clips)

Click on the clip immediately following the space on the timeline, and press [Backspace] on the keyboard.

Mouse Shortcuts

Example:

Joint move

Drag the clip with the mouse with [Shift] and [Alt] on the keyboard held down.

Example:

Saving projects under different names

With [Shift] on the keyboard held down, click [Save Project] with the mouse.

Changing Keyboard Shortcut Assignments

Change shortcut keys assigned to the keyboard.

1) Click [Settings] on the menu bar, and click [User Settings].

- The [User Settings] dialog box appears.

2) Click the [User Interface] tree, and click [Keyboard Shortcut].

3) Select the [Motion] items to change.

[Category]	Select categories to narrow down the search of shortcut operations.
[Filter]	Enter a keyword to narrow down the shortcut operations.
Operation list	Displays operations searched by narrowing down categories in a list.
[Import]	Import the contents of keyboard shortcut key assignments.
[Export]	Export the contents of keyboard shortcut key assignments.
[Assign]	Displays the keyboard to enable setting of key assignments.
[Not Assign]	Change assigned shortcut key settings to [Not Assign].
[Duplicate]	Copy shortcut keys assigned in [Motion]. [Assign] becomes [Not Assign].
[Delete]	When a shortcut has been duplicated by [Duplicate], one of the shortcuts with the same [Motion] can be deleted.
[Back to default]	Return key assignments to their default settings.

4) Click [Assign].

- The [Key Assign] dialog box appears.
- The [Key Assign] dialog box also appears by double-clicking the [Motion] item.

5) Press the key to assign on the keyboard, and click [Close].

- White keys indicate that they have no shortcuts assigned. If you click a key that has other operations assigned, a dialog box to confirm whether to change the current setting appears.
- The shortcuts you have entered are displayed at the [Assign] item.

6) Set each item and click [OK].

- You can continue to set other items by clicking [Apply].



- Some key combinations sometimes cannot be assigned.
- Customized shortcuts can be exported and imported into other environments installed with EDIUS.
- The extension of exported files is *.eap. Both *.dat and *.eap files can be imported.

Chapter 5

Importing Sources

This chapter explains how to import sources to EDIUS.

There are basically three ways to import sources, and each method differs according to where sources are imported from.

One method is to capture and import sources from DirectShow devices, such as web cameras and external devices stored with tape-based video recordings; others are to import files saved on your PC as sources, and to use the source browser to import sources from external devices stored with file-based video recordings.

Capturing

Points to Be Checked before Capturing Sources

The following explains the checks to perform before capturing sources and precautions when connecting to external devices.

Registering External Devices that Interact with Device Presets

For cameras, decks, and other external devices used for capturing, register their connection information, video format for import and other information as device presets.

“**Registering Device Presets**” (▶ page 133)

Capture Operation Settings

Before setting, connect the external devices to synchronize the input signal. The following cases may occur depending on the characteristics of the input devices and the recording state of the tape:

- Batch capture cannot be performed correctly.
- Unnecessary files are generated by automatic division.
- Unnecessary files are created at start of capture.

Capture settings can be checked and changed by [Application] in [System Settings] → [Capture].

“**[Capture]**” (▶ page 105)

Connecting to External Devices

Before capture, connect your PC to a camera or other external device to import the source from.

Capturing and Importing Sources

This section explains how to capture and import sources from a DirectShow-based web camera, and how to capture analog sources.

Note

- For cameras, decks, and other external devices used for importing sources, it is necessary to register their connection information, video format for import and other information as device presets in advance.
“**Registering Device Presets**” (▶ page 133)

1) Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click [Select Input Device].

- The [Select Input Device] dialog box appears, and the list of device presets registered in system settings is displayed.

2) Select a device preset, and click [OK].

Alternative

- Same operations as steps 1) to 2) are available using the following methods.
 - Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click an input preset to display the device preset.
The device preset needs to be assigned as an input preset in advance.
“**Assigning Device Presets to Input Presets**” (▶ page 146)
 - Click the operation button for the input preset of the Player to display the device preset.
The input preset assigned to an operation button needs to be displayed on the Player in advance.
“**Operation Button Settings**” (▶ page 150)
 - Displaying the device preset assigned to the input preset 1: **[F2]**
 - Displaying the device preset assigned to the input preset 2: **[F3]**
 - Displaying the device preset assigned to the input preset 3: **[F4]**

3) Set the reel name, if necessary.

- To set a reel name, uncheck [UserBit is used as a Reel No.] and enter a reel name. You can also select previously entered reel names from the list.

4) Click [OK].

- The camera can now be operated by the Player operation buttons.
“Playback with Player Operation Buttons” (▶ page 191)



- If you click a timecode in [Cur] on the Player, the [TC Jump] dialog box appears. Enter the timecode in [Destination] and click [Jump] to display the frame of the specified timecode.

Note

- When the source has been captured in MPEG TS format, the information of the preset reel name will not be recorded to the captured source file but to the project file. The information of the reel name set at capture will not be reflected even if that source file is opened in another project file after EDIUS is restarted.

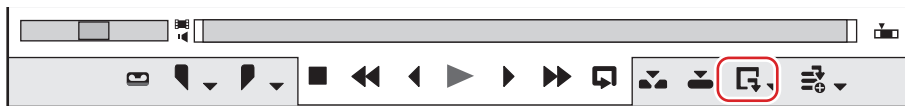
5) Play back the source to capture, and set the In and Out points.

- **“Setting the In and Out Points” (▶ page 193)**
- There are other ways of specifying the range to capture.
“How to Specify the Capture Range” (▶ page 167)



- To capture only the video part, click the [Set In Point] list button on the Player, and click [Set Video In] to set the In point. To set the Out point, click the [Set Out Point] list button on the Player, and click [Set Video Out Point].
- To capture only the audio part, click the [Set In Point] list button on the Player, and click [Set Audio In Point] to set the In point. To set the Out point, click the [Set Out Point] list button on the Player, and click [Set Audio Out Point].

6) Click [Capture] on the Player.



- Capturing starts. The [Capture] dialog box appears, and capturing ends automatically at the Out point.
- To stop the capture midway, click [Stop].
- The clip is registered to the bin.

Alternative

- Press [F9] on the keyboard.
- Click the [Capture] list button on the Player, and click [Video and Audio].
- If you click the [Capture] list button on the Player and select [Video Only] or [Audio Only], only the video part or audio part will be captured.
- Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click [Capture].
- Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click [Video Capture] or [Audio Capture].



- Files can be automatically divided at capture.
“[Capture]” (▶ page 105)
- During capture, you can add a marker with a comment to the source clip.
“Setting Clip Markers at Capture” (▶ page 288)
- The batch capture function is supported only on models that can acquire the timecode. Some models may not support timecodes.
- To change a reel name halfway through the process, for example, when swapping tapes, click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click [Reel No. Settings].
- For EDIUS Workgroup, another EDIUS client on the same network can perform edit while recording by importing the captured data, while a source in AVI or MXF format is being captured.

Note

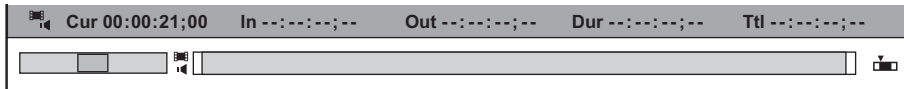
- When the source has been captured in MPEG TS format, the information of the preset clip marker will not be recorded to the captured source file but to the project file. The information of the clip marker set at capture will not be reflected even if that source file is opened in another project file after EDIUS is restarted.

How to Specify the Capture Range

There are six ways as follows to specify the capture range (between In and Out points) in steps 5) to 6). The timecode that is given priority at capture from among the timecodes at [In], [Out] and [Dur] on the Player is underlined.

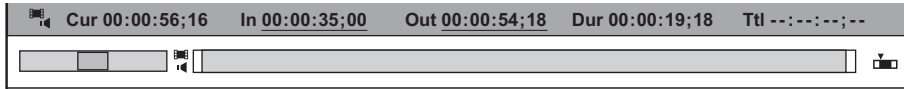
■ **Open end capture**

Capture starts when [Capture] is clicked without specifying the In and Out points, and ends when [Stop] is clicked.

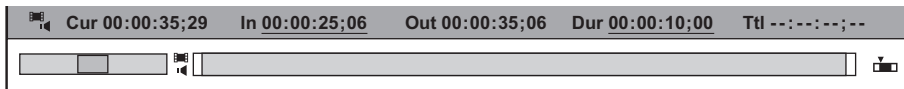

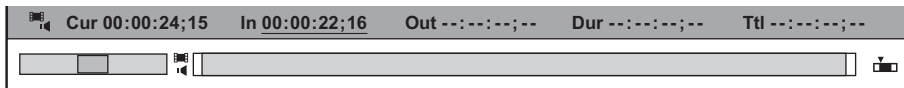

Click the timecode at [Dur] on the Player without specifying the In and Out points, enter the duration, and press [Enter] on the keyboard.
Click [Capture] to start capturing.
* This method is used, for example, to capture a line recording for a specified duration of time.
Timecode display on the Player:



- ☞
- In the case of an In/Out capture or In/Dur capture, the timecode to give priority can be changed to a duration or Out point by clicking the [Out] or [Dur] letter on the Player.
- All timecodes that have been set can be deleted by right-clicking the timecodes at [Dur] and clicking [Clear].

Capture of Stereoscopic Sources (L/R Separate Capture)

Capture stereoscopic sources where the L side and the R side are recorded separately, using the batch capture function.
To capture stereoscopic sources, register compatible device preset in advance. Select [Separate L/R Clips] from the [Stereoscopic] list in the [Input H/W, Format Settings] screen for device presets.

1) Perform steps 1) to 10) in “Importing Sources All Together (Batch Capture)”.

After 9) or 10), the [Individual L/R capture] dialog box appears for each item of the batch capture list.

2) Set a capture method for the R side source.

- “[Individual L/R capture] Dialog Box” (▶ page 169)

3) Click [OK].

- Capturing starts in the order of the L side source and the R side source, and the progress is displayed in [Status] of the [Batch Capture] dialog box. When capturing ends, the stereoscopic clip is registered to the bin.



- If only the audio part in a stereoscopic source is batch captured, the WAV file will be created.

[Individual L/R capture] Dialog Box

[How to capture R clip]	Select whether to capture the R side source from the same tape as the L side source, or to capture from another tape. To capture from the same tape, enter a timecode in [IN Offset].
[File Name]	Set a suffix for file names of the L side and the R side.

■ Capturing stereoscopic sources using STORM 3G

To capture sources in the stereoscopic video format using STORM 3G, select a capture method from the following.

[Dual Stream]	Record the L side and the R side of the input video to a single file with 2 streams maintained.
[L Only]	Capture only L side of the input video.
[R Only]	Capture only R side of the input video.
[Side by Side]	Combine the L side and the R side of the input video so that the left half of the frame is L and the right half is R, and record them as a single file. The recorded file is stored to the bin as a stereoscopic clip.
[Top and Bottom]	Combine the L side and the R side of the input video so that the upper half of the frame is L and the lower half is R, and record them as a single file. The recorded file is stored to the bin as a stereoscopic clip.
[Line Interleave]	Combine the L side and the R side of the input video so that L is placed on the upper side of the scanning line and R is placed on the lower side, and record them as a single file. The recorded file is stored to the bin as a stereoscopic clip.
[L/R 2 file output]	Record the L side and the R side of the input video by 2 streams into 2 files simultaneously. The recorded L and R side files are stored to the bin as stereoscopic clips.
[L/R 2 file output - Capture by turns]	Use the batch capture function to capture the L side and the R side of the input video separately. The recorded L and R side files are stored to the bin as stereoscopic clips. (The [L/R 2 file output - Capture by turns] setting is enabled while batch capturing. When capturing in a normal way, only the L side is captured.)

The capture operation with the settings of [Dual Stream], [L Only], [R Only], [Side by Side], [Top and Bottom], [Line Interleave], and [L/R 2 file output] is the same as the normal capture operation.

The capture operation with the settings of [L/R 2 file output - Capture by turns] is the same as the normal batch capture operation.



- The information of the L side (such as the reel name, user bit, recorded date and time, and timecode) is retained.
- If you make the setting to automatically divide the file when captured, the file is divided according to the video and audio data of the L side when captured in the stereoscopic video format.

Importing from Device Not Possible to Deck Control

Analog sources recorded on video tape, etc. can be imported via Bay or A/D converter. It is also possible to import sources from the Web camera, microphone, etc., which is DirectShow-based.

Note

- When analog sources are imported from an analog device or device connected by the HDMI terminal, the device cannot be controlled from EDIUS.
- For external devices used for importing sources, it is necessary to register their connection information, video format for import and other information as device presets in advance.
“Registering Device Presets” (▶ page 133)

1) Locate the start point of the capture part on the external input device.

- This operation is not required when capturing from a device such as Web camera or microphone.

2) Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click [Select Input Device].

- The [Select Input Device] dialog box appears, and the list of the device presets registered in the system settings is displayed.

3) Select a device preset, and click [OK].

Alternative

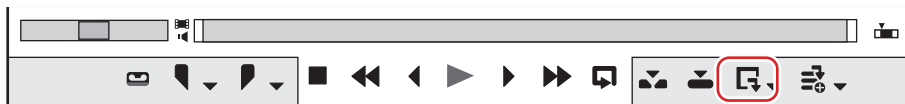
- Same operations as steps 2) to 3) are available using the following methods.
 - Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click an input preset to display the device preset. The device preset needs to be assigned as an input preset in advance. **“Assigning Device Presets to Input Presets” (▶ page 146)**
 - Click the operation button for the input preset of the Player to display the device preset. The input preset assigned to an operation button needs to be displayed on the Player in advance. **“Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)**
 - Displaying the device preset assigned to the input preset 1: **[F2]**

 - Displaying the device preset assigned to the input preset 3: **[F4]**

4) Set the reel name, if necessary.

6) Click [Capture] on the Player.



- Capturing starts.
- Proceed to step 8) when capturing from the device such as Web camera, microphone, etc.

Alternative

- Press [F9] on the keyboard.

7) Play back the external input devices.

8) After finishing capturing of necessary parts, click [Stop] in the [Capture] dialog box.

- When capturing is stopped, the captured clip is registered to the bin.

9) Stop the playback of external input devices.

Note

- The source settings, such as bitrate or frame size, vary depending on your device.

Capturing Sources All Together

Importing Sources All Together (Batch Capture)

The following explains how to determine the directory to capture sources to in advance and import sources all together.

1) Click the [Add to Batch Capture List] list button on the Player.



2) Click [Batch Capture].

- The [Batch Capture] dialog box appears.
 “[Batch Capture] Dialog Box” (▶ page 172)

Alternative

- Click [Capture] on the menu bar, and click [Batch Capture].
- Displaying the [Batch Capture] dialog box: **[F10]**

3) Select the device preset from the list at [Input Settings].

4) Set the reel name, if necessary.

- To set a reel name, uncheck [UserBit is used as a Reel No.] and enter a reel name. You can also select previously entered reel names from the list.

Note

- When the source has been captured in MPEG TS format, the information of the preset reel name will not be recorded to the captured source file but to the project file. The information of the reel name set at capture will not be reflected even if that source file is opened in another project file after EDIUS is restarted.

5) Play back the source to capture, and set the In and Out points.

- When the In point is placed ahead of the Out point on the timeline, the text in that row is displayed in red. This area will not be captured.

- The In point and duration can also be specified as the capture range. After setting the In point, click the [Dur] timecode on the Player to enter the duration and then press [Enter] on the keyboard.

6) Click [Add to Batch Capture List] in the [Batch Capture] dialog box.

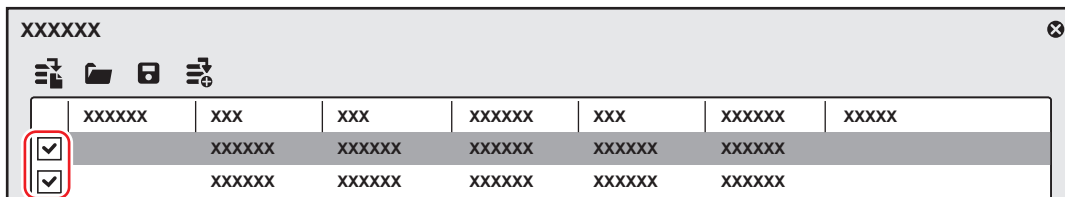

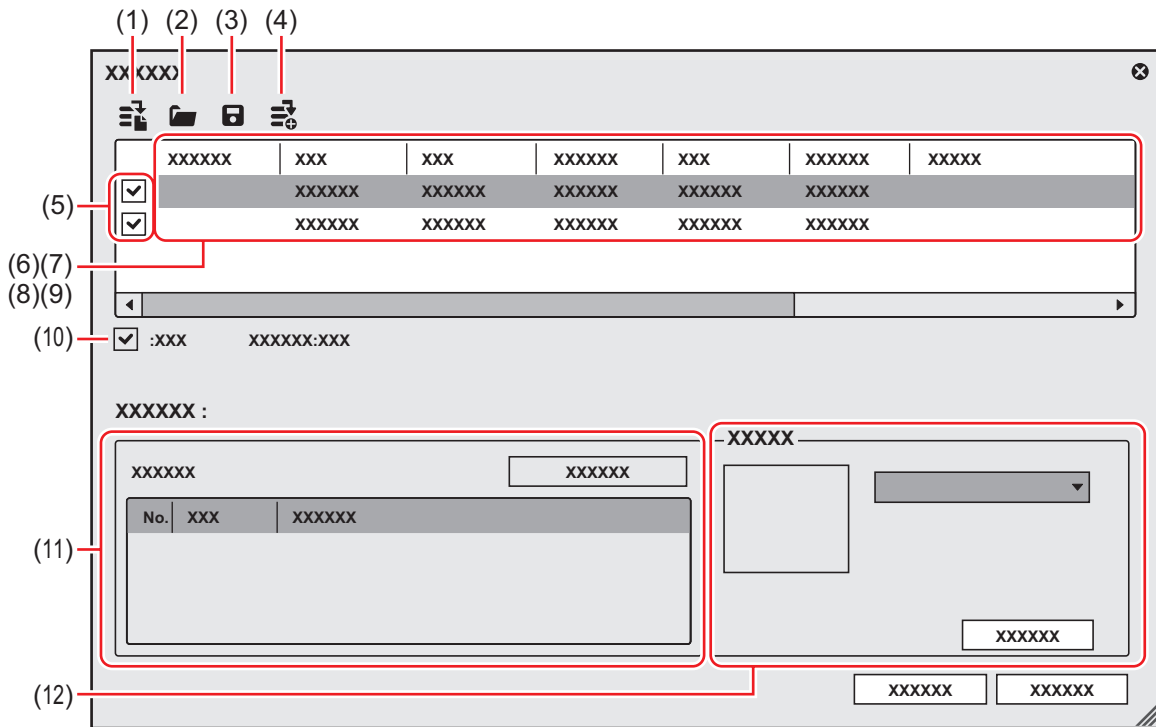
10) Insert a tape in your camera, and select the corresponding reel name from the [Please insert the tape, and select the reel name.] list.

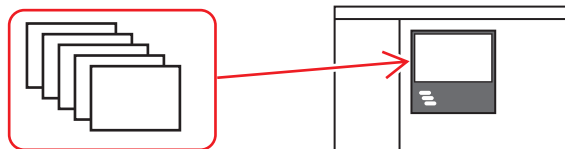

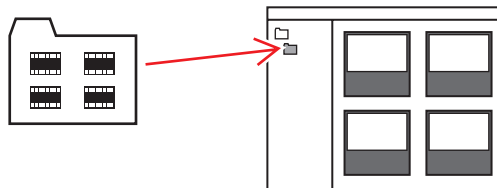

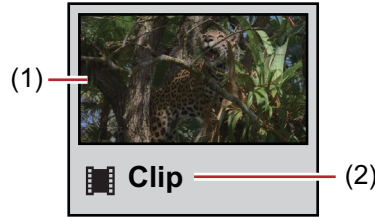

2) Click the drive or reference folder.

- The RED sources are displayed in the clip view.



- Reference folders can be temporarily added in the folder view of the source browser. Right-click [RED] and click [Open Folder].
- When references have been temporarily added in the source browser, they can be deleted by right-clicking a folder and clicking [Delete]. Actual folders are not deleted.
- To update the information of references, right-click [RED] and click [Refresh].

3) Select the clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin] in the source browser.



- Data transfer to the PC will be started in the background at the same time that the clip is registered to the bin.

Alternative

- Right-click the clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin].

Importing Cinema RAW or Cinema RAW Light Sources

You can register Cinema RAW or Cinema RAW Light sources to the bin at the same time that they are transferred to the PC. This section explains the procedure to import a Cinema RAW source. Perform the same procedure to import a Cinema RAW Light source. Connect the Cinema RAW device to the PC, and check that the power is turned on. Cinema RAW sources copied to the hard disk on the PC also can be imported in the same way. Copy sources with the folder structure in the device held intact.

- The drivers provided with the Cinema RAW device must be installed in advance.

1) Click the [Cinema RAW] tree in the folder view of the source browser.

2) Click the drive or reference folder.

- The Cinema RAW sources are displayed in the clip view.

- Reference folders can be temporarily added in the folder view of the source browser. Right-click [Cinema RAW] and click [Open Folder].
- When references have been temporarily added in the source browser, they can be deleted by right-clicking a folder and clicking [Delete]. Actual folders are not deleted.
- To update the information of references, right-click [Cinema RAW] and click [Refresh].

3) Select the clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin] in the source browser.



- Data transfer to the PC will be started in the background at the same time that the clip is registered to the bin.

Alternative

- Right-click the clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin].

Importing Sony RAW Sources

Register Sony RAW sources to the bin at the same time that they are transferred to the PC. Connect the Sony RAW device to the PC, and check that the power is turned on. Sony RAW sources copied to the hard disk on the PC also can be imported in the same way. Copy sources with the folder structure in the device held intact.

Note

- The drivers provided with the Sony RAW device must be installed in advance.

1) Click the [Sony RAW] tree in the folder view of the source browser.

2) Click the drive or reference folder.

- The Sony RAW sources are displayed in the clip view.

- Reference folders can be temporarily added in the folder view of the source browser. Right-click [Sony RAW] and click [Open Folder].
- When references have been temporarily added in the source browser, they can be deleted by right-clicking a folder and clicking [Delete]. Actual folders are not deleted.

- To update the information of references, right-click [Sony RAW] and click [Refresh].

3) Select the clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin] in the source browser.



- Data transfer to the PC will be started in the background at the same time that the clip is registered to the bin.

- Right-click the clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin].



- Partial transfer is available, where In and Out points are set to files on the Sony RAW device and only required parts are transferred to the hard disk.

Connect the XF device to the PC, and check that the power is turned on.

- The drivers provided with the XF device must be installed in advance.

1) Click the [XF] tree in the folder view of the source browser.

2) Click the drive or reference folder.

- The XF sources are displayed in the clip view.



- Reference folders can be temporarily added in the folder view of the source browser. Right-click [XF] and click [Open Folder].
- When references have been temporarily added in the source browser, they can be deleted from the tree display by right-clicking a folder, and clicking [Delete]. Actual folders are not deleted.
- To update the information of references, right-click [XF] and click [Refresh].

3) Select the clip or playlist to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin] in the source browser.



- Data transfer to the PC is started in the background at the same time that the clip or playlist is registered to the bin.

Alternative

- Right-click the clip or playlist to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin].



- Clips that have been recorded across multiple media are registered to the current folder on the bin as a sequence clip.

Importing Stereoscopic Sources

Register file-based stereoscopic sources to the bin at the same time that they are transferred to the PC.

3) Click the drive displayed as [Stereoscopic].

- The stereoscopic sources are displayed in the clip view. The stereoscopic sources are marked with the “S” icon.

You can also start up Mync from the source browser.

- Interaction with Mync is supported only for Mync that comes with EDIUS.

Checking the Progress of Background Jobs

The following explains how to check the progress of processing (background jobs) such as file transfer that is executed in the background and how to pause/restart processing.

The execution progress of background jobs can be checked on the status bar in the timeline window or the clip display.

Status Bar Display in Timeline Window

The status bar displays the number of background jobs and an icon indicating the current state of background jobs.

■ Executing

This is displayed when a background job is executing. The icon is also displayed when EDIUS is executing an automatic process job such as creation of seek information.



■ Standing by/suspended

This is displayed when there are no background jobs and when a background job has been canceled.



■ Paused

This is displayed when a background job is paused.

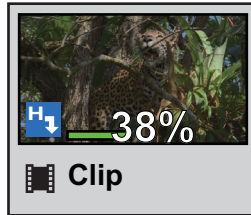


Bin Clip Display

The icon indicating that the background job is executing is displayed, and progress is displayed as a progress bar and a percentage.

Example:

Clips registered in the bin are being transferred to the project folder.



Transfer Status Detailed Display

In the [Background Job] dialog box, detailed transfer status can be checked, and the background jobs can be paused and deleted, for example.

1) Click [Show Background Job] in the source browser.



- The [Background Job] dialog box appears.
 “[Background Job] Dialog Box” (▶ page 188)

Alternative

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Background Job].

Note

- The confirmation message for the background job process will appear if the sequence is imported or consolidated, or the project file is closed, for example, while there is still a background job that has not finished executing.
 Click [Show Unfinished Job Info] to display the [Background Job] dialog box. Click [Quit Unfinished Jobs] to delete all jobs.

[Background Job] Dialog Box

Job list	Displays jobs currently executing and waiting to be executed in a list. To cancel execution of a job, select the job and right-click, and click [Stop] or [Stop All]. To delete a job, select the job and right-click, and click [Delete]. To pause or resume execution of a job, select the job and right-click, and click [Pause] or [Restart].
[Pause Background Jobs During Playback]	Check this item to pause the execution of the job while the Player or timeline is being played back.
[Pause]/[Resume]	Pause or resume execution of all jobs by selecting and clicking the jobs.
[Close]	Close the [Background Job] dialog box. Closing the dialog box will not affect the executing state of the background jobs.

Directly Importing File with Source Browser

The following explains how to register sources on external devices that interact with the source browser directly to the bin or place them on the timeline without transferring them to your PC.

Transferring Only Necessary Part

Only necessary parts can be copied when Grass Valley HQ or DV codec AVI files, for example, are imported to the hard disk on the PC.

Note

- Sources in removable media such as AVCHD video camera or digital camera and XDCAM EX sources cannot be partially copied and imported.

Automatic Partial Transfer at Addition to the Timeline/Registration to the Bin

You can set to automatically copy the data between In and Out points when importing a file on a device to the timeline or the bin after displaying that file on the Player and setting the In and Out points.

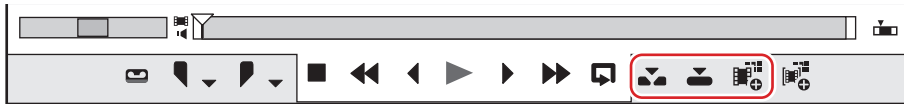

- Sources that are incompatible with partial transfer are not transferred by this operation, and are added directly to the bin/timeline.

- 3) Select [Target Clip], and check the required items in [Auto Transfer].

[Target Clip]	Select the source to be partially transferred. When [Only from Removable Media] is selected, only clips directly referencing files on the device are targeted for partial transfer. When [From Removable Media and Hard Drive] is selected, both clips directly referencing files on the device and clips referencing files on the hard disk are targeted for partial transfer. When [Exclude Project Folder Drive] is unchecked, clips under the project folder are also targeted for partial transfer.
[Auto Transfer]	[When Added to the Timeline from Player] Check this item to execute partial transfer when the clip displayed on the Player has been placed on the timeline. [When Added to the Bin from Player] Checking this item executes partial transfer when the clip displayed on the Player has been added to the bin.
[Margin]	Set the margin to add.

- 4) Click [OK].
- 5) Display the file in the device on the Player, and set the In and Out points.
- 6) Operate the buttons to add the clip to the timeline/bin.



- Partial transfer is executed automatically according to the settings made above.
- Partially transferred files are saved in the “Transferred” folder under the project folder.

Note

- Partial transfer is not executed automatically when a source has been dragged and dropped from the Player onto the timeline or bin.
- When a source in BD is added to the timeline or bin, partial transfer sometimes is automatically executed with chapters taken as the In and Out points even if the In and Out points have not been set on the Player.

Transferring Only Necessary Parts

When clips are directly referencing files in each device, only parts currently in use can be batch-copied to hard disk.

- 1) Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Partial Transfer] → an item.
 - Partial transfer is started in the background, and the transferred file is saved under the project folder.
 - To cancel a partial transfer, select and right-click the job in the [Background Job] dialog box, and click [Stop] or [Stop All].

- Note**
- In the case of sources that are incompatible with partial transfer, a message is displayed so that you can select whether to transfer the entire source.
 - When a clip after partial transfer has become an offline clip, [Transfer the Missing Area] or [Undo transfer] can be selected from the [Restoration Method] list in the [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box.
 - When a clip partially transferred with EDIUS 5 is in use, it can be returned to its original clip.
Right-click the partially transferred clip, and click [Replace Partially Downloaded Clip with Original Clip]. When a clip directly referencing a file on a device has been partially transferred, the link destination is returned to the file on the device from the file after transfer.

Playback with Player Operation Buttons

You can play back or move sources in individual frame units using the operation buttons on the Player.

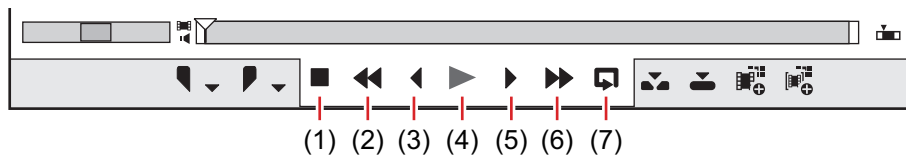

(1)	[Stop]	Stop playback. [K], [Shift] + [I]
(2)	[Review]	Rewind a source. Each click switches the playback speed in the reverse direction between 4 times and 12 times. [J] ^{*1}
(3)	[Previous Frame]	Each click rewinds one frame at a time in the reverse direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the same speed in the reverse direction. In the case of deck operation, rewind is performed one frame at a time. [←]
(4)	[Play]	Play back the source in the forward direction. When this button is clicked during playback, playback pauses. Click again to restart playback. [Enter], [Space]
(5)	[Next Frame]	Each click forwards one frame at a time in the forward direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the same speed in the forward direction. In the case of deck operation, forwarding is performed one frame at a time. [→]
(6)	[Fast Forward]	Fast forward playback. Each click switches the fast forward playback speed between 4 times and 12 times. [L] ^{*2}
(7)	[Loop] ^{*3}	Repeatedly play back between In and Out points. If no In point is set, the source is repeatedly played back from the beginning, or if no Out point is set, the source is repeatedly played back to the end. If In and Out points have been set for audio, the source is played from the first In point to the last Out point, including the In and Out points for video. [Ctrl] + [Space]

*1 Each press of [J] on the keyboard switches the rewind speed in 6 levels between 2 to 32 times. Press [L] to slow down the rewind speed. Press this key with the source paused to play back at the same speed in the reverse direction.

*2 Each press of [L] on the keyboard switches the fast-forward speed in 6 levels between 2 to 32 times. Press [J] to slow down the fast-forward speed. Press it while pausing to play back at the same speed in the forward direction.

*3 Loop playback cannot be set for external sources. [Loop] is replaced with [Pause].

Note

- When using a deck, fast-forward and rewind operations may be limited depending on the deck. Also, [Loop] will function as pause.

Playing Back with Shuttle/Slider

You can play back a source by dragging the shuttle or slider on the Player.

Note

- Sources that have not been captured cannot be played back by the slider.

1) Drag the shuttle/slider.

- A frame at the slider position is displayed on the Player.

Shuttle/Slider



(1)	Shuttle	Drag the shuttle to the left and right to play back in the reverse and forward directions, respectively. Release dragging to return the shuttle to the center and pause playback. The playback speed can be selected in 21 levels both in the forward and reverse directions, from 1/20 to 16 times.
(2)	Slider	Click any position on the position bar to move the slider and display the frame for that position. You can also drag the slider.
(3)	Position bar	Displays the timeline of the source displayed on the Player.
(4)	[Switch Display Range]	Switch the display range on the Player between In and Out points only or the entire source.

Alternative

- Shuttle (fast forward): **[Ctrl] + [L]**
Each press of [Ctrl] + [L] on the keyboard switches the fast-forward speed in 12 levels from 1/16 to 32 times. Press [Ctrl] + [J] on the keyboard to slow down.
- Shuttle (rewind): **[Ctrl] + [J]**
Each press of [Ctrl] + [J] on the keyboard switches the rewind speed in 12 levels from 1/16 to 32 times. Press [Ctrl] + [L] on the keyboard to slow down.

Playing Back with Mouse (Mouse Gesture)

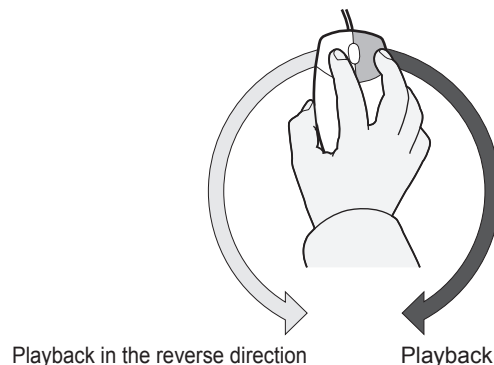
You can play back a source by moving the mouse on the Player.

Note

- Sources displayed in the deck mode cannot be played back with mouse operations.

1) Position the mouse cursor on the Player, and move the mouse as if to draw a circle, with the right mouse button clicked.

- Draw the circle clockwise to playback in the forward direction, and counterclockwise in the reverse direction. The playback speed changes in proportion to the speed of the mouse action.



Alternative

- Place the mouse cursor on the Player, and rotate the mouse wheel.

Displaying Clips on the Player

Display clips registered to the bin or clips displayed in the source browser on the Player.

Note

- Clips displayed in the source browser sometimes cannot be displayed on the Player depending on the external device or state of the clip.

1) Select a clip in the clip view, and click [Show in Player] in the bin or in the source browser.

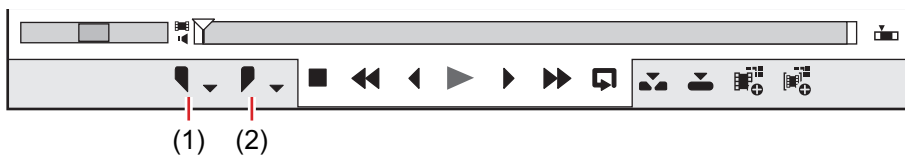

Note

- Operations other than setting and deleting the In and Out points cannot be performed on sources that have not been captured.

Setting the In and Out Points

Specify the In (start) and Out (end) points of the source. If the In and Out parts are specified in advance, only the part between those points can be captured or placed on the timeline.



(1)	Set the In point
(2)	Set the Out point

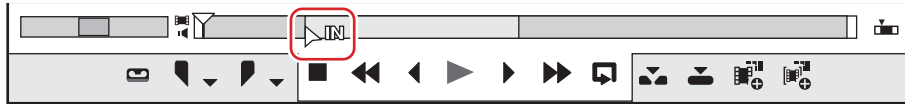
1) Play back the source, and click [Set In Point] on the Player at the frame to set as the In point.

2) Continue to play back the source, and click [Set Out Point] on the Player at the frame to set as the Out point.

Alternative

- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Set In Point] or [Set Out Point].
- Right-click the slider on the Player, and click [Set In Point] or [Set Out Point].
- Click the timecode at [In] or [Out] on the Player, and enter the desired numerical value.
- To set the In and Out points at the clip marker position, right-click the clip marker on the position bar on the Player, and click [Set In Point] or [Set Out Point].
- Setting the In point: [I]
- Setting the Out point: [O]

- In the case of a clip registered to the bin or a clip displayed on the Player from the source browser, the positions of the In and Out points can be changed by dragging the In and Out sliders.



- When the Out point has been set before the In point, the position bar between In and Out points changes color to red and a part of the timecode on the Player is displayed in red.
- The duration can be changed based on the set In and Out points. Click the timecode at [Dur] on the Player, and enter the desired numerical value.
- If the In or Out point of the clip registered to the bin is added, changed or deleted, that operation will be automatically reflected on the clip in the bin. To leave behind the information of a clip before it is edited, register that clip to the bin as a different clip in advance. **“Registering between In and Out Points to the Bin As a Separate Clip (Subclip)”** (▶ page 197)
- From [User Settings] → [Application] → [Timeline], you can set whether the frame displayed in the preview window is to be included in the range of In and Out points. **“[Timeline]”** (▶ page 118)

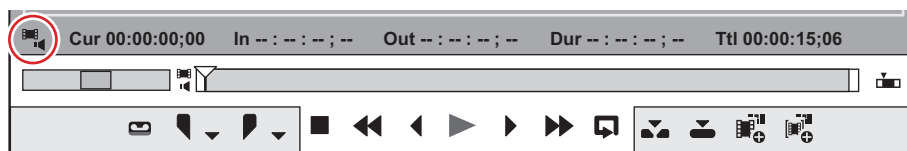
In/Out Point Settings for Video/Audio

Set In and Out points separately for video parts and audio parts of a video clip with audio.

Note

- In and Out points cannot be set separately to video and audio of sources that have not been captured.

1) Click the video/audio mark on the timecode.



- Each click switches the video/audio mark display between on and off. Display the mark of the part you want to set In and Out points.

Example:

To set In and Out points to video



- [Set In Point] ([Set Out Point]) on the Player changes to [Set Video In] ([Set Audio In Point]) or [Set Video Out Point] ([Set Audio Out Point]).
 - : Setting the In point of video (audio)
 - : Setting the Out point of video (audio)

- 2) Play back the clip, and click [Set Video In] ([Set Audio In Point]) on the Player at the frame to set as the In point.



- The position bar is horizontally divided into two levels. The upper level is the video part, and the lower level is the audio part.

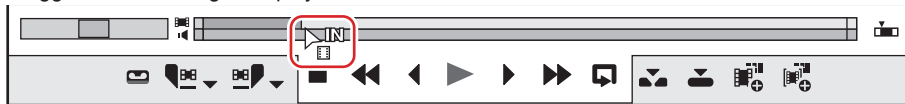
- 3) Continue to play back the source, and click [Set Video Out Point] ([Set Audio Out Point]) on the Player at the frame to set as the Out point.

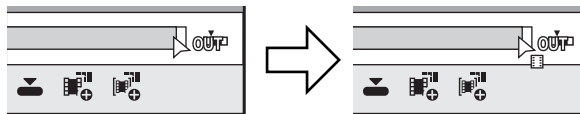
- Click the [Set In Point] ([Set Out Point]) list button on the Player at the frame to set as the In point, and click [Set Video In] ([Set Audio In Point]). Click [Set Video Out Point] ([Set Audio Out Point]) at the frame to set as the Out point.
- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Set Audio In Point] or [Set Audio Out Point].
- Right-click the slider on the Player, and click [Set Video In] ([Set Audio In Point]) or [Set Video Out Point] ([Set Audio Out Point]).
- Setting In/Out points for audio: **[U]/[P]**
- To set the In and Out points for video or audio at the clip marker position, right-click the clip marker on the position bar on the Player, and click [Set Video In] ([Set Audio In Point]) or [Set Video Out Point] ([Set Audio Out Point]).



- The video (audio) In and Out points can be adjusted by dragging the In slider or Out slider of the video (audio) part. If the slider for the video part has been dragged, the following is displayed.



- Place the mouse cursor on the left or right edge of the position bar, and the mouse cursor changes shape. Click at that position while holding down [Ctrl], and the position bar is horizontally divided into 2 levels. If the slider for the video part has been dragged, the following is displayed.



- When In and Out points have been set only for the video part or the audio part, you can place only the video (audio) part on the track.
 - When In and Out points have been set for both video and audio parts, you can place both of the clips on the timeline as a single clip.
 - If the In and Out points of the video/audio of the clip registered to the bin is added, changed or deleted, that operation will be reflected automatically on the clip in the bin. To leave behind the information of a clip before it is edited, register that clip to the bin as a different clip in advance.
- “Registering between In and Out Points to the Bin As a Separate Clip (Subclip)” (▶ page 197)

Note

- When In and Out points have been set in the video (audio) part, information for the audio (video) part will not be recognized.

Playback between In and Out Points (Loop Playback)

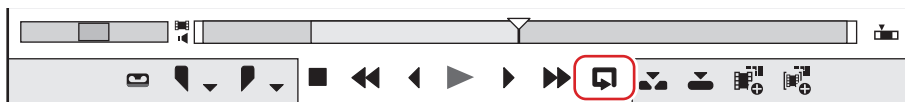
Repeatedly play back between In and Out points of a clip. Playback starts from the current position of the slider.

- Right-click the slider on the Player, and click **[Go to In Point]** (**[Go to Out Point]**). To move to the In (Out) point of the video and audio parts, click **[Go to Video In Point]** (**[Go to Video Out Point]**) or **[Go to Audio In Point]** (**[Go to Audio Out Point]**).
- Moving to In point: **[Q]/[Shift] + [I]**
- Moving to Out point: **[W]/[Shift] + [O]**
- Moving to In point of audio part: **[Shift] + [U]**
- Moving to Out point of audio part: **[Shift] + [P]**

Deleting the In and Out Points

Delete the In (Out) point.

- 1) Click the **[Set In Point]** (**[Set Out Point]**) list button on the Player.



- 2) Click **[Clear In Point]** (**[Clear Out Point]**).

Alternative

- In the case of captured sources displayed in the file mode, move the slider to the In (Out) point, and click **[Set In Point]** (**[Set Out Point]**) with **[Shift]** on the keyboard held down. The same operation can be performed by **[Set Video In]** (**[Set Video Out Point]**) or **[Set Audio In Point]** (**[Set Audio Out Point]**).
- Right-click the slider on the Player, and click **[Clear In Point]** (**[Clear Out Point]**). To delete to the In (Out) point of the video and audio parts, click **[Clear Video In Point]** (**[Clear Video Out Point]**) or **[Clear Audio In Point]** (**[Clear Audio Out Point]**).
- Deleting In point: **[Alt] + [I]**
- Deleting Out point: **[Alt] + [O]**

Registering Clips Displayed on the Player to the Bin

Registering Clips on the Player to the Bin

Register clips displayed on the Player to the bin.

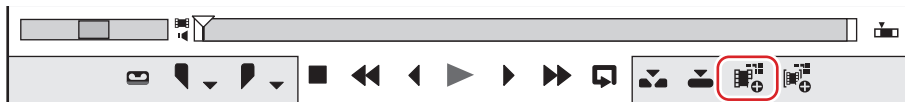
Note

- Sources displayed in the deck mode on the Player cannot be registered directly to the bin.
- When a clip displayed on the Player is registered to the bin from the source browser, the registered clip will directly reference the source on the device. When the source is transferred to the PC at the same time that it is registered to the bin, perform [Add and Transfer to Bin] from the source browser, or partially transfer the source.

1) Display clips on the Player.

- Right-drag and drop the clip on the Player onto the bin, and click [Add clip(s)].
- Adding clips on the Player to the bin: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [B]**

Registering between In and Out Points to the Bin As a Separate Clip (Subclip)

The range between In and Out points set to the clip can be copied as a subclip and registered to the bin. Subclips reference the same source as the original clip (master clip).

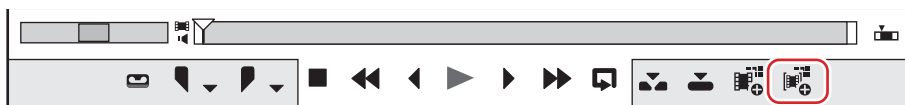
Note

- Subclips cannot be created from the sources displayed in the deck mode.
- Subclips cannot be created from clips to which In and Out points have been set separately for the video part or audio part of a video clip with audio.

1) Display the clip on the Player, and set the In and Out points.

- “Setting the In and Out Points” (▶ page 193)

2) Click [Add Subclip to Bin] on the Player.



- The subclip is created in the name format “original clip name-sub 4-digit sequential number”, and is registered to the bin.

Alternative

- Right-drag and drop the clip on the Player onto the bin, and click [Add subclip(s)].



- The master clip also will be registered to the bin if the subclip has been created with the clip displayed directly on the Player from the source browser without being registered to the bin.
- Set the margins to add when creating subclips by [Source] in [User Settings] → [Automatic Correction].
“[Automatic Correction]” (▶ page 124)
- To release a subclip and return it to the master clip, right-click the subclip registered to the bin, and click [Change to Master Clip].

Chapter 6

Managing Sources

This chapter explains the operations to manage imported sources in the bin.

Bin

Clips are registered to the bin for management.

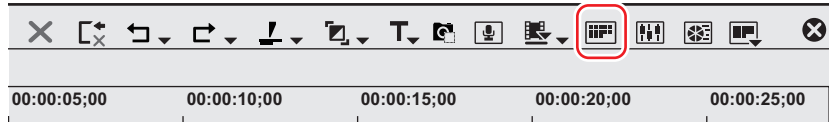
The following explains how the bin window is displayed and the types of clips that can be registered.

Showing/Hiding the Bin Window

Switch the show/hide setting for the bin window.

1) Click [Toggle Bin Window Display] on the timeline.

- Each click of [Toggle Bin Window Display] switches the show/hide setting.



Alternative

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Bin].
- Showing/hiding the bin window: **[B]**



- When the show/hide setting for the bin window is switched, the show/hide setting of the palette tabs and the source browser window combined with the bin window is also switched. To toggle the show/hide setting individually, release the association of the window and the palette.

“Combining Bin Window/Source Browser Window with a Palette” (► page 148)

Types of Registerable Clips

The following shows the clips that can be registered to the bin.

Clips

The following types of clips can be registered to the bin:

- Video clips
- Video subclips
- Still image clips
- Audio clips
- Audio subclips
- Color bar clips
- Color matte clips
- Title clips (clips created with title authoring software)
- Timeline sequence clips
- Sequence clips
- Caption clips
- Rendering clips



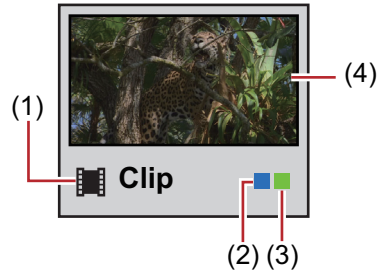
- A caption clip can be placed on the timeline and handled in the same way as other clips.
- A closed caption file with multiple streams will become a single caption clip after being registered to the bin.
- A rendering clip, which appears on the bin in such a case when the clip is being rendered, cannot be placed on the timeline.

Clip Display

This section describes the clip display on the bin.

- In this section, a screen example when the clip view display of the bin is set to [Clip] is used.

(1)	Clip type	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> : Video clip : Video subclip : Still image clip : Audio clip : Audio subclip : Color bar clip, color matte clip : Title clip : Timeline sequence clip : Sequence clip : Caption clip : Rendering clip
(2)	Clips exist under project folder	This is displayed when a source file referenced by a clip is in the project folder.
(3)	Clips exist on timeline	This is displayed when a clip is placed on the timeline.
(4)	Poster frame/thumbnail display	Displays a representative image of clip or thumbnail.

- The poster frame, which is displayed when the clip view is shown as a clip, can be changed by simple mouse operation. Press and hold the mouse wheel button over the thumbnail, and move the mouse left or right. Release the mouse wheel to complete the change to the setting.
- When a title file is already created, click [Add Clip] in the bin to display the [Open] dialog box, and open the file. When no title file is prepared, click [Add Title] in the bin, start up the title authoring software, and create a title file.

Settings of Clips

Joining Multiple Video Clips All Together as a Single Clip

This section explains how to group multiple clips all together and set them as a single sequence clip, and how to ungroup single sequence clips.

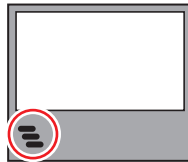
Joining Multiple Clips (Set as Sequence)

Join multiple video clips all together as a single sequence clip.



1) Select and right-click the multiple clips in the bin, and click [Set as Sequence].

- The created clip is registered in the bin as a sequence clip.
- Clips set as a sequence take the name of the first joined clip as its clip name.



- “Registering Consecutive Still Images” (▶ page 177)



- Clips are joined in the sorting order of the bin.
- Clips are joined with the In and Out point settings of the video part held by the original clip intact.

Note

- Conditions for setting as a sequence are as follows:
 - The clip type, image size and aspect ratio of all clips must be matching.
 - For video, the field order and frame rate of all clips must be matching.
 - For audio, the sampling rate, quantization bitrate and number of channels of all clips must be matching.

Canceling a Set Sequence

Cancel joining of a sequence clip.



1) Right-click a sequence clip in the bin, and click [Cancel Sequence].

- After the sequence is canceled, the clip name returns to the one before the clips are joined.



- The In and Out point settings that were held by the clips before they were joined as a sequence are restored.

Creating Color Bar/Color Matte/Title Clip

The following explains how to create color bar clips, color matte clips and title clips.

Color Bar Clips

Create a color bar clip.

1) Click [New Clip] in the bin.



2) Click [Color Bars].

- The [Color Bars] dialog box appears.

3) Make the color bar settings, and click [OK].

Alternative

- Right-click a blank area in the clip view, and click [New Clip] → [Color Bars].
- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Create Clip] → [Color Bars].



- You can change settings from the [Color Bars] dialog box by the following operations:
 - Right-click a color bar clip in the bin, and click [Edit].
 - Double-click a color bar clip in the bin.
- You can also place a color bar clip on the timeline without registering it to the bin.
 - “Placing Special Clips on the Timeline” (▶ page 242)

Color Matte Clips

Create a color matte clip.

1) Click [New Clip] in the bin.

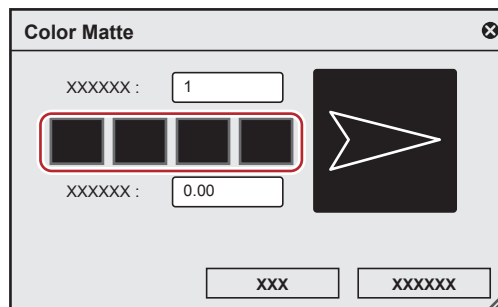


2) Click [Color Matte].

- The [Color Matte] dialog box appears.

3) Click the color palette.

- Set the color palette starting from the left.



- The [Color Select] dialog box appears.
 - “[Color Select] Dialog Box” (▶ page 203)

4) Set the color.

5) Click [OK].

- The screen returns to the [Color Matte] dialog box. To set a gradation, enter a numerical value of 2 or higher at [Colors] in the [Color Matte] dialog box, and repeat steps 3) to 5).

6) Set the direction of the gradation, and click [OK].

- The gradation can be specified by, for example, entering the numerical value in degrees, rotating the mouse wheel or dragging the mouse.

Alternative

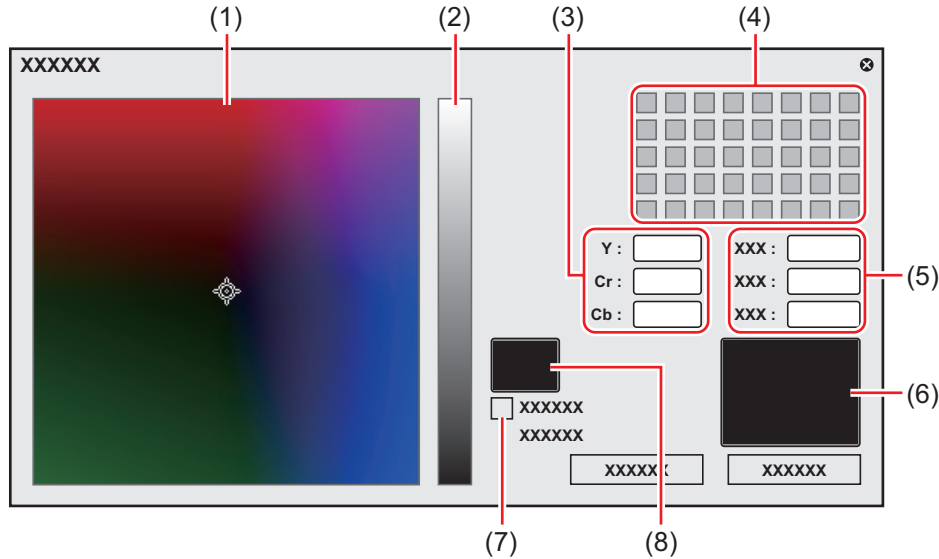
- Right-click a blank area in the clip view, and click [New Clip] → [Color Matte].
- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Create Clip] → [Color Matte].



- You can change settings from the [Color Matte] dialog box by the following operations:
 - Right-click the color matte clip in the bin, and click [Edit].
 - Double-click the color matte clip in the bin.
- You can also place the color matte clip on the timeline without registering it to the bin.

“Placing Special Clips on the Timeline” (▶ page 242)

[Color Select] Dialog Box



(1)	Color spectrum	Drag the cursor to set the color difference (Cr, Cb).
(2)	Luminance slider	Drag the slider to set the luminance (Y).
(3)	YCrCb value input field	Enter a numerical value for brightness and color difference to set the color.
(4)	Color palette	Select a color from the standard color palette.
(5)	RGB value input field	Enter a numerical value for red (R), green (G) and blue (B) to set the color.
(6)	Color picker	Select the color from video displayed on the Player/Recorder. Click the color picker, and click the desired color in the video currently displayed on the Player/Recorder.
(7)	[IRE Warning]	Check this item to display the color spectrum and luminance slider in the limited range of 0 to 100 IRE. The IRE value for the selected color is displayed under this check box.

Title Clips

Create a title clip.



- The existing titler can be changed from [Application] in [User Settings] → [Other].

“[Other]” (▶ page 120)

1) Click [Add Title] in the bin.



- Quick Titler will start up.

2) Create the title clip.

- “Quick Titler” (▶ page 405)

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Create Clip] → [QuickTitler].
- Right-click a blank area in the clip view, and click [Add Title].
- Right-click a blank area in the clip view, and click [New Clip] → [QuickTitler].
- Creating a title clip: **[Ctrl] + [T]**

Creating Stereoscopic Clip

Selecting a File Used in Pair to Set as a Stereoscopic Clip

If either the L side clip (for left eye) or the R side clip (for right eye) is in the bin, select a file used in pair to make a single stereoscopic clip.

1) Select and right-click the clip to set as stereoscopic in the bin, and click [Set as Stereoscopic].

- The [Stereoscopic setting] dialog box appears.
- The following files are automatically searched: files which are placed in the same folder as the clip selected in step 1), have the same extension, and are allowed to be stereoscopic. The search result is displayed in [Select pair files] as a list.



- If a clip that is transferred to a project folder, the folder in which the clip is saved before transfer will be searched.

2) Select a file from the [Select pair files] list.

- Select a file to be used in pair based on the information such as [Similarity].

3) Set each item.

[Select pair files]	Displays the information for the searched files. If files to be used in pair do not exist, click [Browse folder] to change the search folder. Click <input type="checkbox"/> in [Sync] to select the position to synchronize the L side and the R side clips. The setting will be reflected in the [Preview] display. Every click switches the sorting order to be ascending or descending.
[Preview]	Displays the L side clip at the left, and the R side clip at the right. Move the slider or enter the timecode in [Cur] to view video. Click [Monitor preview] to view the stereoscopic video of the current position in the preview window. Click <input type="checkbox"/> to switch the L side and the R side videos.

4) Click [OK].



- After setting as a stereoscopic clip, the clip markers which the L side and the R side clips contain are merged.
- The length of the clip will be determined by the area with the frames on both the L side and the R side clips, after synchronizing the L side and the R side clips.
- The capture margin will be set to the longer one of either the L side or the R side capture margin, after synchronizing the L side and the R side clips.
- The clip length and information other than the capture margin of the L side clip will be carried over.
- The In and Out points information of the L side and the R side clips will be deleted after setting as a stereoscopic clip.

Setting Separate L and R Clips in the Bin as Stereoscopic

If both the L side (for left eye) and the R side (for right eye) clips are in the bin, set them as a single stereoscopic clip.

1) Select and right-click the L side and the R side clip (or clips) to set as a stereoscopic clip in the bin, and click [Set as Stereoscopic].

- The [Stereoscopic setting] dialog box appears.

2) Set each item.

[Stereoscopic clips]	Displays information on the stereoscopic clip. The clip name to be created as a stereoscopic clip is displayed in [Clip Name]. Click <input type="checkbox"/> in [Sync] to select the position to synchronize the L side and the R side clips. It will be reflected in the [Preview] display. When multiple clips of the L and R sides are selected, click [Auto pairing] to automatically sort them so that clips with high degree of similarity are paired.
[Preview]	Displays the L side clip at the left, and the R side clip at the right. Move the slider or enter the timecode in [Cur] to view video. Click [Monitor preview] to view the stereoscopic video of the current position in the preview window. Click <input type="checkbox"/> to switch the L side and the R side video.

3) Click [OK].



- After setting as a stereoscopic clip, the clip markers which the L side and the R side clips contain are merged.
- The length of the clip will be determined by the area with the frames on both the L side and the R side clips, after synchronizing the L side and the R side clips.
- The capture margin will be set to the longer one of either the L side or the R side capture margin, after synchronizing the L side and the R side clips.
- The clip length and information other than the capture margin of the L side clip will be carried over.
- The In and Out points information of the L side and the R side clips will be deleted after setting as a stereoscopic clip.

Canceling Stereoscopic Clips

Cancel a stereoscopic clip to reset to 2 separate clips.

1) Select and right-click stereoscopic clip (or clips) in the bin, and click [Cancel Stereoscopic].



- Clip markers are retained after canceling stereoscopic clips.
- The In and Out points information will be deleted after canceling stereoscopic clips.

Setting Stereoscopic Clips as Sequence/Canceling Sequence

Set multiple stereoscopic clips in the same format as a single sequence clip, or cancel the sequence clips.

The operation procedure is the same as for settings as sequence/canceling sequence.

Creating Subclips from Stereoscopic Clips

The operation procedure is the same as for the regular subclip creation.

“Registering between In and Out Points to the Bin As a Separate Clip (Subclip)” (▶ page 197)

Handling Non-Stereoscopic Clips as Stereoscopic Clips

Non-stereoscopic clips where video is divided by side-by-side or tom-and-bottom, etc. can be handled as stereoscopic clips.

1) Select and right-click a clip in the bin or source browser, and click [Properties].

- The [Clip Properties] dialog box appears.

2) Click the [Stereoscopic] tab.

3) Check [Use as Stereoscopic clip], and select an item from the [Divide setting] list.



- Check [Swap L/R] to switch the L side and the R side video.
- The L side clip is displayed at the left of [Preview], and the R side clip is displayed at the right. Move the slider or enter the timecode in [Cur] to view video.
- Click [Monitor preview] to view the stereoscopic video of the current position in the preview window.

4) Click [OK].

Creating a Clip Containing Caption Data

Merging a Caption Clip

You can merge a caption clip with a video clip in the bin.

- The closed caption file formats supported on EDIUS are as follows.

- *.scc
- *.mcc
- Only video clips can be merged with caption clips.

1) Select a video clip and a caption clip in the bin, right-click on them, and click [Set as clip with captions].

- The video clip and caption clip will be merged, and the caption clip will be hidden in the bin.



- When you register a file to the bin as a clip, you can detect a closed caption file that corresponds to the file and merge it to the clip. “Merging Closed Caption File and Registering” (▶ page 177)

Canceling Merged Caption Clip

You can cancel a caption clip merged with a video clip.

1) Right-click on a video clip which a caption clip has been merged with, and click [Cancel clip with captions].

- The caption clip merged with the clip will be canceled, and the caption clip will appear in the bin.

Using Caption Information of Clip

You can set whether or not the caption information of a clip is to be used.

1) Select a clip and right-click on it in the bin, and click [Properties].

- The [Properties] dialog box appears.

2) Click the [Captions] tab.

3) Check [Use Caption data].

4) Click [OK].



- In [Caption File] on the [Captions] tab, you can confirm the saving destination of the currently referenced closed caption file.

Changing Clip Information and Content

This section explains how to check the information of the clip and change settings.

Correcting Properties

Change the clip frame rate or specify the start timecode in the [Clip Properties] dialog box.

1) Select a clip in the clip view, and click [Properties].



- The [Clip Properties] dialog box appears. “[Clip Properties] Dialog Box” (▶ page 207)

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Properties].
- Correcting properties: [Alt] + [Enter]

2) Correct the settings, and click [OK].



- The properties of multiple clips can be corrected in a single operation depending on the items to correct.
“Correcting Multiple Clip Properties” (▶ page 208)
- The properties of a clip placed on the timeline can be displayed. Right-click on a clip on the timeline, and click [Properties].

[Clip Properties] Dialog Box

The displayed tab varies according to the type of clip.

[File] tab	Check type, data size and other details of files. You can also rename clips, rename reels, enter comments, and change the clip display color.
[Video] tab	Check the start TC (timecode), end TC or image size. You can also change the start TC, poster frame, aspect ratio, color space, color correspondence range, field order, and frame rate. To return the settings to their state at capture, click [Back to Default Settings].
[Stereoscopic] tab	If a clip is not a stereoscopic clip, divide a clip to handle it as a stereoscopic clip. “Handling Non-Stereoscopic Clips as Stereoscopic Clips” (▶ page 205)
[Audio] tab	Check the start and end TCs, or re-acquire wave information (waveform representation of audio). For clips placed on the timeline, you can set playback methods for the clips. The setting items will differ depending on the number of audio channels that the selected clip has.
[Still image] tab	Check the format or image size. You can also change duration, aspect ratio, color space, and color correspondence range.
[Extended] tab	Check the expansion information of a file or clip. The details displayed differ depending on the clip type.
[Captions] tab	Set whether or not the caption information is to be used. If a closed caption file has been merged to the file, the saving destination of the currently referenced file can also be confirmed. “Using Caption Information of Clip” (▶ page 206)



- In [Color Space] in the [Video] tab, color spaces of clips are automatically recognized and displayed.
If the color space of a clip is not recognized automatically, you can change it manually by clicking the list button of [Color Space] in the [Video] tab.

Rename Clip

You can rename clips whose reference source and name are identical to the clip selected in the bin.

- This setting is applied to clips in the bin and on the timeline.

1) Select and right-click on the clip to rename in the bin, and click [Rename Clip].

Alternative

- Select a clip, and click the clip name.
- Renaming after selecting a clip in the bin window: **[F2]**

2) Modify the name, and press [Enter] on the keyboard.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Rename related clips]. Enter a name, select [Clips have same original asset and name same as the selected clip.], and click [OK].

Rename related clips

You can collectively rename clips with the same reference source in the bin or on the timeline.

You can also rename only the clip selected in the bin.

1) Select and right-click on the clip to rename in the bin, and click [Rename related clips].

- The [Rename related clips] dialog box appears.
“[Rename related clips] Dialog Box” (▶ page 208)

2) Modify the name, and click [OK].

[Rename related clips] Dialog Box

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Correcting Multiple Clip Properties

When the clip view of the bin is set to [Detail] or [Icon], you can select multiple clips to rename the clips or change the clip display color as well as other settings at the same time.

The following items can be corrected in a single operation:

- Clip name
- Reel name
- Comment
- Clip display color
- Frame rate
- Aspect ratio
- Field order
- Color correspondence range
- Color space
- Dividing method



- If an item you want to correct is not displayed, set the display item by [User Interface] in [User Settings] → [Bin].
“Bin Detailed Display Item Settings” (▶ page 159)

Note

- If a selected clip contains an invalid setting, a warning message will appear to ask whether to continue changing the settings. If settings are changed as they are, changes will not be reflected in that clip.

Correcting Clip Names/Reel Names/Comments

You can edit the following multiple settings at one time.

- Clip name
- Reel name
- Comment

1) Set the clip view of the bin to [Detail] or [Icon].

- “Clip View Display” (▶ page 158)
- This operation is not necessary when you modify the name of a clip.

2) Select and right-click the multiple clips whose properties are to be changed, and click [Rename Clip].

Alternative

- Select multiple clips whose properties are to be changed, and click .
- Select the multiple clips whose properties are to be changed, and click [F2] on the keyboard.

3) Press [Tab] on the keyboard, and select the items to correct.

4) Enter the new content.

- When a clip name has been modified, branch numbers are added to clips in accordance with the entered clip name, in order from the one with the smallest number.
- When a reel name and comment have been corrected, entered content is reflected on all selected clips.



- When a clip name has been modified, the clips whose reference source and name are identical to the clip selected in the bin will be renamed.
This setting is applied to clips in the bin and on the timeline.

Correcting Clip Display Color, Frame Rate, Aspect Ratio, Color Space, etc.

You can edit the following settings at one time.

- Clip display color
- Frame rate
- Aspect ratio
- Field order
- Color correspondence range
- Color space
- Dividing method

1) Set the clip view of the bin to [Detail] or [Icon].

- “Clip View Display” (▶ page 158)

2) Select the multiple clips whose properties are to be changed.

3) Click , and select an item to correct.



- “*” to the right of item displayed by clicking indicates that the setting is the default setting.
- To return the frame rate, aspect ratio, field order, color space, and dividing method of multiple clips to the default setting of each clip, click and select [Back to default].

Correcting the Settings Dialog Box

Change the settings for color bar, color matte, or title clip in the settings dialog box.

1) Right-click a color bar clip, color matte clip or title clip in the bin, and click [Edit].

- The settings dialog box appears for color bar clips or color matte clips.
“Color Bar Clips” (▶ page 201)
“Color Matte Clips” (▶ page 202)
- In the case of title clips, the title authoring software will start up.
“Quick Titler” (▶ page 405)

Alternative

- Double-click a clip in the bin.
- Select a clip in the bin, and press [Ctrl] + [Enter] on the keyboard.

Converting Files

The clips in the bin can be converted to different formats.

- Clips that can be converted are as follows:
 - Video clips
 - Video subclips
 - Video sequence clips (including still image sequence clips with sequential numbers)
- The following clips cannot be converted:
 - Audio clips
 - Audio subclips
 - Audio sequence clips
 - Still image clips
 - Title clips
 - Color bar clips
 - Color matte clips
 - Timeline sequence clips
 - Caption clip
 - Rendering clips

1) Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [Convert] → [File].

- The [Print to File] dialog box appears.
 “[Print to File] Dialog Box” (▶ page 447)
- Select multiple clips and then click [Convert] → [File(batch)], to convert them into multiple files at a time. The [Print to File] dialog box appears only once.
- [File(batch)] is available only when conversion of the selected multiple clips is possible, and existence of alpha channel and audio data match.

2) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

- When a clip with alpha channel is selected, the exporters to be displayed are limited to those which can output a file with the alpha channel retained.
- When [File(batch)] is selected in step 1), the exporters to be displayed are limited to those which can output clips as a single file.

3) After setting the export details, specify a file name and save destination and click [Save].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service.
- The rendering clip will be registered to the bin. The color and indication of a rendering clip changes according to the rendering process status.
 “Rendering Clip Display” (▶ page 347)
- Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.
 “GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)
- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When [File] is selected in step 1), the [Print to File] dialog box appears as many times as the number of selected clips. Repeat steps 2) to 3).
- When the rendering process has completed, the rendering clip in the bin changes to the clip appropriate to the type.



- If a stereoscopic clip is converted, it will convert to 2 stream AVI (1 file).

MPEG File Media Settings

For MPEG format clips, setting to ensure faster seeking of files can be changed for each clip.

1) Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [MPEG Media Settings].

- The [MPEG Media Settings] dialog box appears.
 “[MPEG Media Settings] Dialog Box” (▶ page 210)

Note

- [MPEG Media Settings] will not be displayed if the target file is not MPEG.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip placed on the timeline, and click [MPEG Media Settings].
- Select a clip placed on the timeline, click [Clip] on the menu bar, and then click [MPEG Media Settings].

2) Set each item and click [OK].



- The above settings can be changed on all MPEG files to be imported to EDIUS.
 “[MPEG]” (▶ page 109)

[MPEG Media Settings] Dialog Box	
[Use Accel. Seek]	Set faster seeking of MPEG files. To speed up seeking, check this item first, and then check the following items if necessary. [Create Seek Information in Background] Collect the time stamp information of MPEG files at idling to speed up the seek. [Save Seek Information to File] Save the seek information as a reusable file.
[A/V Synchronization Using PTS]	Some MPEG files have no valid PTS (time stamp information). Check this item to decode files that have no PTS. Check this item to use the PTS (time stamp information) for synchronization of audio and video.

[Get timecode from GOP header]	Some MPEG files may have timecode information in their header. Check this item to use timecode information.
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H.264 Media Settings

You can set whether to acquire timecode information from Picture Timing SEI by each clip to H.264 codec clips.

1) Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [H.264 Media Settings].

- The [H.264 Media Settings] dialog box appears.

Note

- If the target file is not H.264 codec, [H.264 Media Settings] will not be displayed.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip placed on the timeline, and click [H.264 Media Settings].
- Select a clip placed on the timeline, click [Clip] on the menu bar, and then click [H.264 Media Settings].

2) Set each item and click [OK].

[Get timecode from Picture Timing SEI]	Check this item to acquire the timecode information from Picture Timing SEI.
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- The above settings can be changed on all H.264 files to be imported to EDIUS.
“[AVCHD]” (► page 108)

Setting Color Space of ProRes RAW

For ProRes RAW clips, color space for decoding can be set for each clip.



- When a file is loaded, EDIUS automatically recognizes clip metadata, and applies an appropriate color space. If a color space cannot be determined, [BT.2020/BT.2100 HLG] will be applied.

1) Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [ProRes RAW Settings].

- The [ProRes RAW Settings] dialog box appears.

Note

- [ProRes RAW Settings] will not be displayed if the target file is not ProRes RAW.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip placed on the timeline, and click [ProRes RAW Settings].
- Select a clip placed on the timeline, click [Clip] on the menu bar, and then click [ProRes RAW Settings].

2) Select a color space from the [Color Space] list, and click [OK].

Checking Clip Save Destinations

Display the save destination folder for the clip.

1) Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [Explorer].

- Explorer starts up, and the save destination folder for the clip is displayed.

Opening Files with Software

You can open a file with application software associated to the file, for example, by opening *.psd files in Photoshop.

1) Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [Open].

- Open the file with the application software associated to the file.



- You can open a clip placed on the timeline by the associated application software by the following operation:
 - Right-click a clip placed on the timeline, and click [Open].
 - Click a clip placed on the timeline, and click [Clip] on the menu bar → [Open].
 - Opening clips placed on the timeline: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [P]**

Managing Clips

Operations in the Clip View

This section explains how to manage clips in the clip view, for example, by copying and pasting the selected clip. “Clip View Display” (► page 158)

Selecting Clips

Select a clip in the clip view. The selected clip changes color.

1) Click a clip in the clip view.

- To select multiple clips, drag the mouse to enclose the desired clips.



- Click a clip with [Ctrl] held down on the keyboard to add or release selected clips one at a time. You can select a range of clips in a single operation by clicking the topmost clip of the range with [Shift] on the keyboard held down and then clicking the bottommost clip of the range.
- Right-click any clip and a menu will appear so that you can perform various operations on the clip. This menu appears in the same way when multiple clips are enclosed by dragging with the right mouse button so that operations can be batch-performed on the clips selected in that range.

Copying Clips

Copy clips.

1) Select a clip, and click [Copy] in the bin.



- You can then paste it.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Copy].
- Right-drag and drop the clip onto the copy destination folder, and click [Copy clips].
- Copying clips: [Ctrl] + [C], [Ctrl] + [Insert]

Cutting Clips

Cut clips. Cut clips are deleted from the bin.

1) Select a clip, and click [Cut] in the bin.



- You can then paste it.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Cut].
- Cutting clips: [Ctrl] + [X]/[Shift] + [Delete]

Pasting Clips

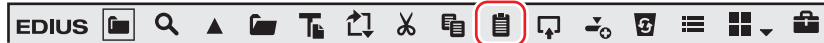
Paste copied or cut clips.

1) Select a clip, and click [Copy] in the bin.

- Clips can also be pasted by clicking [Cut].
- “Copying Clips” (► page 213)
- “Cutting Clips” (► page 213)

2) Click [Paste] in the bin.

- To paste to another folder, select a folder and click [Paste].

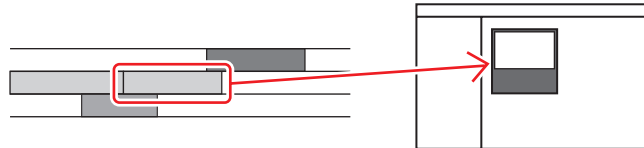


Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Paste].
- Right-click a blank area in the clip view, and click [Paste].
- Pasting a clip: **[Ctrl] + [V]**

Registering from Timeline

Register clips placed on the track to the bin.



1) On the timeline, right-click the clip to register, and click [Add to Bin].

- The clip is added to the bin.
- When video and audio clips have been placed separately on the V and A tracks, respectively, all clips linked to the right-clicked clip are added to the bin as separate clips. To add only the right-clicked clip to the bin, cancel the link and then perform the desired operation on the clip.

“Group/Link Mode” (▶ page 232)

“Handling Only the Video Part or Audio Part of Clips Separately” (▶ page 246)

Alternative

- Drag and drop clips to the bin.
- Right-drag and drop the clip onto the bin, and click [Add clip(s)]. Click [Add subclip(s)] to add the clip to the bin as a subclip.
- Select the clip, click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Add to Bin].
- Double-click a clip to display on the Player, and drag and drop the clip from the Player to the bin.
- Double-click the clip to display on the Player, and click [Add Clip on Player to Bin] on the Player.
- Adding clips on the timeline to the bin: **[Shift] + [B]**

Deregistering Clips

1) Select a clip, and click [Delete] in the bin.



Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Delete].
- Deregistering clips: **[Delete]**

Note

- Once you have deregistered clips, you cannot restore them (cannot undo deregistration).
- Source files are not deleted even by deregistering clips from the bin.

Sorting Clips



“Bin Detailed Display Item Settings” (▶ page 159)

1) Right-click on a blank area in the clip view, and click [Sort].

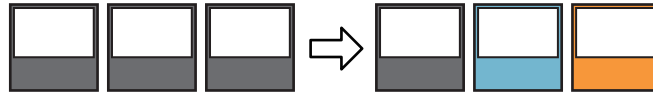
2) Click the item names to sort.

Alternative

- When the detailed clip view is displayed, each click switches between ascending or descending order.

Color-coding Clips

Color-code clips displayed in the bin to classify them.



1) Right-click on a clip, and click [Clip Color].

2) Click the display color.

Alternative

- Click [File] in the [Clip Properties] dialog box. Select the display color from the [Clip color] list. “[Clip Properties] Dialog Box” (► page 207)



- The display colors of multiple clips can be changed in a single operation. “Correcting Multiple Clip Properties” (► page 208)

Transferring to the Project Folder

The following explains how to transfer files referenced by clips in the bin to the project folder.

Note

- The following clips cannot be transferred to the project folder:
 - Non file-based clips such as color bar clips or color matte clips
 - Clips with an importer that does not support file transfer
 - Clips already transferred to the project folder

1) Select and right-click the clip, and click [Transfer to Project Folder].

- You can select multiple clips.
- Data transfer to the project folder is started in the background. “Checking the Progress of Background Jobs” (► page 187)
- The clip in the bin now references the file transferred to the project folder.

Transferring High-resolution Data

You can transfer high-resolution data of clips containing only proxy data to the project folder.

Note

- The high-resolution data of the following clips cannot be transferred:
 - Clips other than video clips
 - Clips already containing high-resolution data

1) Select and right-click a clip, and click [Transfer HiRes].

- You can select multiple clips.
- Data transfer to the project folder is started in the background. “Checking the Progress of Background Jobs” (► page 187)
- The clip in the bin now references the file transferred to the project folder.

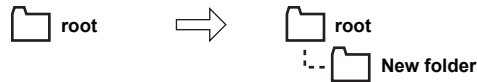
Operations in the Folder View

You can register clips for individual folders to classify them. Folders can be added under the [root] folder in a hierarchical structure. “Showing/Hiding Folder View” (► page 157)



- The [root] folder cannot be moved or copied.
- Folders independent from the [root] folder cannot be created.

Creating a Folder

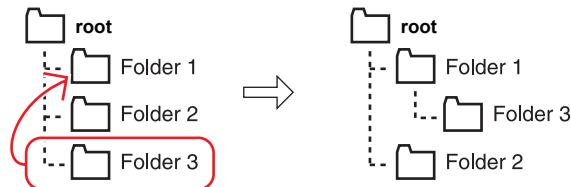


1) Right-click the folder in the folder view, and click [New Folder].

- A new folder is created on the layer under the selected folder.

2) Enter the folder name.

Moving Folders



1) Drag a folder, and drop it onto the destination folder.

Alternative

- Right-drag and drop the folder to move onto the destination folder, and click [Move folder].



- The [root] folder cannot be moved.

Duplicating Folders

Duplicate a folder.

1) Drag the folder in the folder view, and drop it onto the duplicate destination folder with [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down.

- Registered clips are also copied.

Alternative

- Right-drag and drop the folder to duplicate onto the destination folder, and click [Copy folder].



- The [root] folder cannot be copied.

Deleting Folders

Delete a folder.

1) Select the folder to delete in the folder view, and click [Delete] in the bin.



- A dialog box appears to confirm the deletion.

2) Click [Yes].**Alternative**

- Select a folder, press [Delete] on the keyboard, and click [Yes].
- Right-click the folder, and click [Delete] and then [Yes].



- When the [root] folder has been right-clicked and [Delete All] has been clicked, all clips and folders in the [root] folder are deregistered.

Note

- Once you delete a folder, you cannot restore it (cannot undo deletion).
- When a folder is deleted, all clips in that folder and sub folders are also deregistered.

Switching the Display Folder

Switch the folder to be displayed.

1) Click the folder to be displayed in the folder view.

- If the folder view is closed, right-click a blank space of the clip view and click [Go], and click the move destination folder name or [Up one Folder].

Alternative

- Click [Move Up] in the bin to switch the folder.



- Moving to a folder one place up: [Backspace]

Exporting/Importing Bin Information

This section explains how to export and import bin information, and export information registered to the bin to HTML.

Exporting Bins (Export)

Export bin information.

1) Right-click the folder to export in the folder view, and click [Export].

- The [Save As] dialog box appears.

2) Set a file name and export destination, and click [Save].**Note**

- Bin information can be exported as a *.ezb file with the folder structure held intact.
- *.ezb files with the same name at the export destination will be overwritten.

Importing Bins (Import)

Import bin information exported by EDIUS. Bin information can also be imported from other project files.

1) Right-click the folder in the folder view, and click [Import].

- The [Open] dialog box appears.

2) Select a file to import, and click [Open].**Note**

- Bin information cannot be imported from project files with different frame rates.
- Bin information sometimes cannot be imported correctly when it has been imported from a project file with different project settings.

Exporting Registration Information (HTML Export)

Export the information of clips registered to the bin to HTML file.

1) Right-click the folder to output in the folder view, and click [Export Html].

- The [Save As] dialog box appears.

2) Set a file name, export destination and other information, and click [Save].

- Style sheets can also be used.

Searching for Clips Registered to the Bin

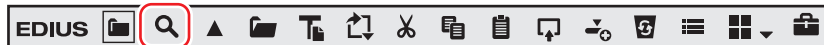
Clips registered to the bin can be searched according to search conditions set by the user. The search results are registered to the folder view as the [Search results] folder and can be browsed.

Searching in the Bin

Search clips registered to the bin. After a search is performed, the [Search results] folder is created.

1) Click the folder to be searched in the folder view.

2) Click [Search] in the bin.



- The [Bin Search] dialog box appears.

Alternative

- Right-click the folder to search in the folder view, and click [Search].
- Searching in the bin: **[Ctrl] + [F]**

3) Select the search conditions at [Category] in [Search by].

- The bin search dialog box changes to a category specific search dialog box.

4) Set the search conditions, and click [Add].

- Multiple search conditions can be added.
- The specified conditions are displayed in [List]. At the same time, clips matching the search conditions are displayed in the [Search results] folder.

5) Click [Close] in the [Search Bin] dialog box.



- You can refine the search for clips in the [Search results] folder by the following operation:
 - Right-click the [Search results] folder, and click [Search In].
 - After selecting the [Search results] folder, perform steps **2)** to **5)** in “Searching in the Bin”.
- To delete a search condition, select it from [List] and click [Remove].
- To change a search condition, right-click the [Search results] folder, and click [Change Search Settings].
- When [Search only current folder] is checked, only the currently selected folder is searched. Folders under the selected folder are excluded from the search.
- By clicking [And] or [Or], you can also select to search for targets that match all additional search conditions or targets that match some of the additional search conditions.
- When selecting [Folder selection] from [Category] in [Search by] to select the folder to search, all clips in the selected folder and folders lower down in its hierarchy are displayed. You can find the desired clip easily by performed a more refined search even if the folder structure is more complicated.

Note

- The [Search results] folder cannot be moved.

Searching by the Simple Search Bar

Search clips in folders by using the simple search bar. After the search ends, only clips that partially match the search text string among the clips in the folder are displayed in the clip view.

1) Click the folder to be searched in the folder view.

2) Press [F3] on the keyboard.

- The simple search bar is displayed.

[Find]	Enter the search text string. You can also select previous search text strings from the list.
[Condition]	Select the search condition from the list.
[Display find condition]	Switch the show/hide setting for the search conditions.
[Close find bar]	Close the simple search bar to display all clips in the folder.

3) Set the search conditions, and press [Enter] on the keyboard.

- Only clips that partially match the search text string among the clips in the folder are displayed in the clip view.



- Text is not case-sensitive when a search is executed by the simple search bar.
- A history of up to 20 of the last entered search text strings is saved to each profile.

Searching Unused Clips

Search clips that have not been used on the timeline.

1) Click the folder to be searched in the folder view.

2) Click [Search].



- The [Bin Search] dialog box appears.

3) Select [Timeline reference] at [Category] in [Search by].

4) Select [Not used], and click [Add].



- To delete the source file of clips not used on the timeline, right-click the clip and click [Delete File]. Source files can be deleted only when located under the project folder.
- To deregister clips not used on the timeline, select the clip and click [Delete].
- A green mark is displayed at the lower right of the clip display if clips are currently used on the timeline. This mark is not displayed for clips not used on the timeline.



Deleting Search Results

Delete [Search results] folders that are no longer required.

1) Select the [Search results] folder, and click [Delete].



- A dialog box appears to confirm the deletion.

2) Click [Yes].

Alternative

- Right-click the [Search results] folder, click [Clear], and then click [Yes].
- Select the [Search results] folder, press [Delete] on the keyboard, and click [Yes].



- The [Search results] folder cannot be restored once they have been deleted.

Note

- When clips in [Search results] are deregistered individually, clips in the [root] folder and clips in folders under that are also deregistered accordingly. You cannot restore them (cannot undo deregistration).

Chapter 7

Editing Operations

This chapter explains edit mode and track settings, and editing on the timeline.

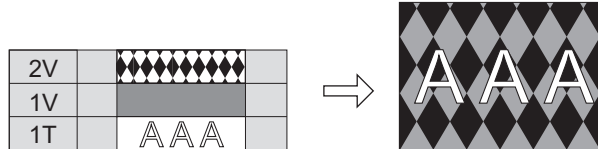
Timeline Settings

Tracks

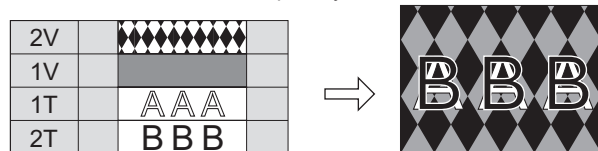
You can add, delete, or move tracks. In addition, tracks can be muted or locked individually. Tracks have several types, and the type of clips that can be placed on each type of track differ. “Track Type” (► page 223)



- The priority in the order of display is determined by the up/down position or type of tracks. On video tracks (V/VA tracks), upper tracks have priority over lower tracks. T tracks have priority over video tracks (V/VA tracks).



If multiple T tracks are placed up and down, lower T tracks have priority.



- Caption clips have priority to other clips in the order of display regardless of the up/down position or type of tracks where they have been placed.
- As to the clips with embedded closed caption data, the priority order for display is determined by the up/down position or type of tracks where they have been placed, in the same way as clips such as video clips. Note that the closed caption of a clip on a lower track may be prioritized in the order of display depending on the layout settings of a clip on an upper track.

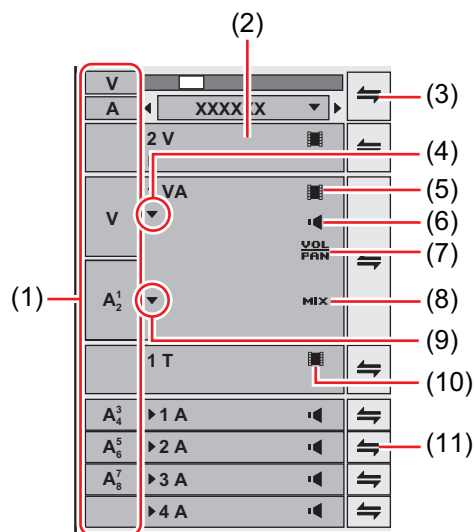
Track Display

The following explains the descriptions of the track header and the types of tracks.

Track Header

You can make settings for each track simply on the track header, for example, to lock the track for preventing placed clips from moving or to set the track to exclusively play back audio.

You can set the following items in the track header.



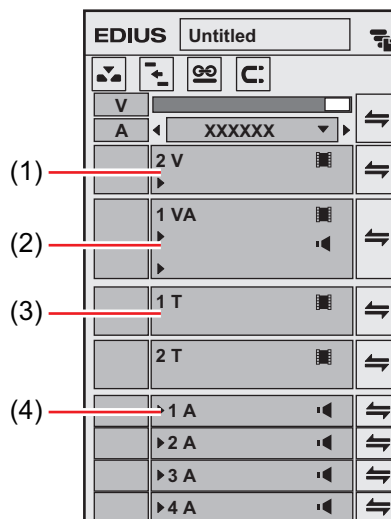
Chapter 7 Editing Operations — Timeline Settings

(1)	Track patch	When a clip is displayed on the Player or a clip is selected in the bin, the channel held by that clip (source channel) is displayed on the track patch. When a clip in the source browser is selected, the source channel is displayed on the track patch according to the channel map in the project settings. Also, the track patch position displays which track the source channel is mapped to when a clip is placed on the timeline by a shortcut key or button. The source channel mapping to each track can be changed. “ Setting Channel Mapping ” (▶ page 235)
(2)	Track panel	Click this to switch the select/deselect setting for the track.
(3)	Batch lock panel	Click this to set sync-lock for all tracks on and off. “ Sync-lock (Synchronization) ” (▶ page 230) Right-click to lock the selected track. “ Locking Tracks ” (▶ page 225)
(4)	Audio expand button	Click this button to display the rubber band for the audio. [Alt] + [S]
(5)	[Video Mute]	When mute is set, the video part of the track is not played back. The video part and mixer area of the clip on a muted track is displayed in gray. [Shift] + [W]
(6)	[Audio Mute]	When mute is set, the audio part of that track is muted. The audio part and volume/pan part of the clip on a muted track is displayed in gray. [Shift] + [S]
(7)	[Volume/Pan]	Switch between the volume adjustment mode and the pan adjustment mode. “ Adjusting the Volume and Pan of a Clip ” (▶ page 431)
(8)	[Mixer]	Switch the transparency adjustment mode on/off. “ Transparency ” (▶ page 386)
(9)	Mixer expand button	Click this button to display the rubber band for the transparency. [Alt] + [W]
(10)	[Title]	Switch the show/hide setting for the title. The title is not played back when it is set as hidden. [Shift] + [W]
(11)	Lock panel	Click this to set sync-lock for a specific track on and off. “ Sync-lock (Synchronization) ” (▶ page 230) Right-click to lock the selected track. “ Locking Tracks ” (▶ page 225)



- Shortcut key operations are enabled on the selected track.

Track Type



(1)	V track	Place video, still image, title, color bar, color matte, and caption clip on this track. Video clips with audio are placed as video clips with the audio part disabled.
(2)	VA track	Place video, audio, still image, title, color bar, color matte, and caption clip on this track.
(3)	T track	Place video, still image, title, color bar, color matte, and caption clip on this track. Display priority is given to clips placed on the T track over V/VA tracks. Video clips with audio are placed as video clips with the audio part disabled.
(4)	A track	Place audio clip. Video clips with audio are placed as audio clips with the video part disabled.

Customizing the Track Display

You can customize track width, height and track name.

Changing the Width of the Track Header

You can change the width of the track header.

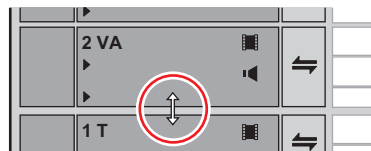
- 1) Move the mouse cursor to the right edge of the track header, and drag when the mouse cursor changes shape.



Changing the Track Height

You can change the height of the track. When the track is set higher, the thumbnails indicating clip frames are displayed larger.

- 1) Move the mouse cursor to the top or bottom edge of the track panel, and drag when the mouse cursor changes shape.



Alternative

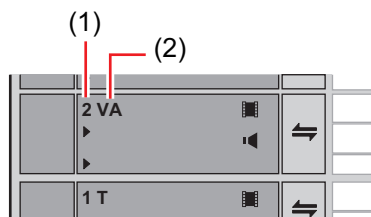
- Right-click the track panel to change, and click [Height] → desired height.



- You can also change the height of multiple tracks in a single operation. Select and right-click multiple track panels, and click [Height (Selected Tracks)] → desired height.
- You can also adjust the height of all tracks in a single operation. Right-click the sequence tab, select [Track Height] and click the desired height. Newly added tracks from now on become the height set by this operation.

Renaming Tracks

You can rename tracks.



(1)	Track number
(2)	Track name

- 1) Right-click the track panel to change, click [Rename] and enter the new name.





- The sort order of the tracks is always displayed as the track number.
- Up to 30 characters can be used in the track name, and tracks with the same name also can be used. Track names that exceed the display range can be checked with the tooltip.
- When a track is copied, the name also is copied.
- The default track names are as follows:
 - Video track: V
 - Video/audio track: VA
 - Audio track: A
 - Title track: T

Track Operations

The following explains how to set and select tracks, and operations for changing numbers and moving tracks.

How to Set Tracks

The following content can be set in the [Project Settings] (Detailed Settings) dialog box.

You can also set the track settings for each sequence in the [Sequence settings] dialog box.

- TC preset
- TC mode
- Total length of timeline
- Number of tracks*
- Audio channel map

* The number of tracks cannot be set in the sequence settings.

To set a track when creating a new project, see “Creating a New Project (Detailed Settings)”, and to change settings when editing a track, see “Changing the Project Setting (Detailed Settings)”.

Selecting Tracks

Select the track to be edited.

1) Click the track panel.

- The selected track changes color.
- When selecting multiple tracks, selected tracks can be added or canceled one track at a time by clicking the track panel with [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down.
- You can select a range of tracks in a single operation by clicking the topmost track panel of the range with [Shift] on the keyboard held down and then clicking the bottommost track panel of the range.
- All tracks can be selected by double-clicking the track panel.

Alternative

- Selecting/deselecting tracks (1 to 8A): [Shift] + [1] - [8]
- Selecting/deselecting tracks (1 to 8VA/V): [Shift] + [Ctrl] + [1] - [8]
- Selecting/deselecting tracks (all audio tracks): [Shift] + [9]
- Selecting/deselecting tracks (all video tracks): [Shift] + [Ctrl] + [9]
- Selecting/deselecting tracks (all tracks): [Shift] + [0], [Shift] + [Ctrl] + [0]

Locking Tracks

When a track is locked, the clip placed on the track can no longer be edited or moved.

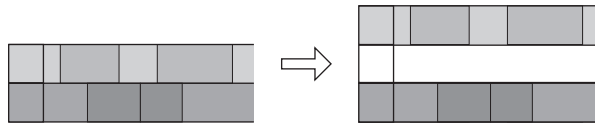
1) Right-click the lock panel, and click [Track Lock].

- “Track Header” (▶ page 222)
- A diagonal line is displayed in locked tracks, and clips can no longer be edited, moved, or deleted. The ripple mode and sync-lock also are disabled.
- To unlock a track, right-click the lock panel, and click [Track Unlock].



- Multiple tracks can also be unlocked in a single operation. To unlock tracks, right-click the batch lock panel, and click [Lock Selected Tracks].

Adding Tracks



1) Right-click the track panel, and click [Add] → an item.

- “Track Header” (▶ page 222)

2) Enter the number of tracks to add.

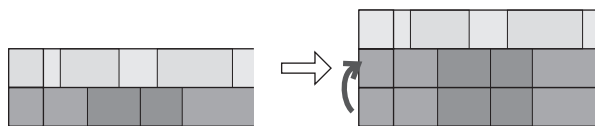
- To add VA tracks/A tracks, click [Channel map] and set the audio output channels of the additional tracks.

3) Click [OK].

Alternative

- Right-click a blank area of the track header, and select the track to add.

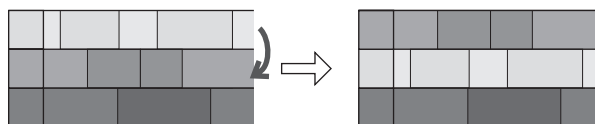
Duplicating Tracks



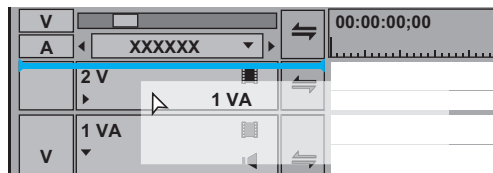
1) Right-click the track panel to duplicate, and click [Duplicate].

- “Track Header” (▶ page 222)
- The track is duplicated on top of the right-clicked track.

Moving Tracks



1) Click a track panel, and drag and drop onto the move destination.



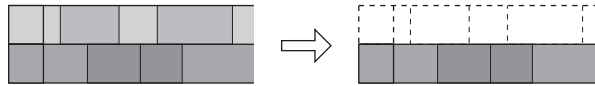

- Right-click the track panel to move, and click [Move] → [Move Front] or [Move Back].



- Tracks can be moved only between tracks of the same kind (video, audio, title track).
- Multiple tracks cannot be selected and moved.

Deleting Tracks



1) Right-click the track panel to delete, and click [Delete].

- “Track Header” (► page 222)
- Tracks on which clips are not placed are deleted at this time.

2) Click [OK].

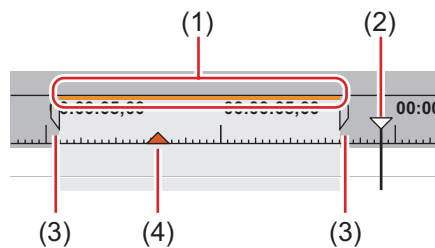


- Multiple tracks can also be deleted in a single operation. Select and right-click the track, and click [Delete (Selected Tracks)].

Timeline Display

Marking the Time Scale

You can mark the time scale with the In and Out points for setting the range to apply operations in and sequence markers to serve as the reference for moving tracks, etc.

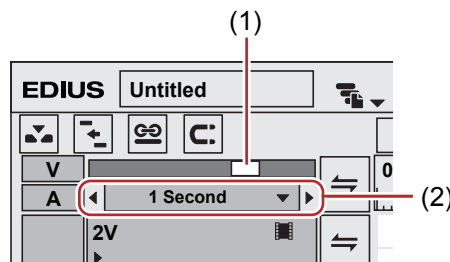


(1)	Rendering options	Display the required level of rendering for playing back the timeline in color by level. “Color Coding of Time Scale” (► page 307)
(2)	Timeline cursor	Move the timeline cursor by dragging to the left or right.
(3)	In/Out points	Indicate the In and Out points of the timeline. The range to apply operations in can be restricted between In and Out points. “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (► page 237)
(4)	Sequence marker	This is the mark to set on the timeline. An orange sequence marker becomes a chapter when exporting to DVD, etc. If you place the mouse cursor on the sequence marker, the timecode or comment on the sequence marker position is displayed (if it is set). “Setting Sequence Markers” (► page 295) “Sequence Marker Types” (► page 297)

Time Scale Settings

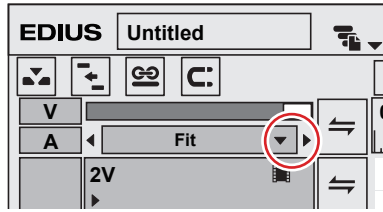
You can change the display unit for the time scale. The time scale can be displayed in the following units:

- Frames, seconds, minutes
- Fit (The display unit is automatically adjusted to fit the display range of the timeline window.)



(1)	Time scale slider
(2)	Time Scale Settings

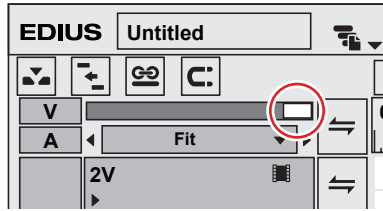
1) Click the list button at the time scale settings, and click the display unit.



- Click [Fit] to adjust the time scale to display all clips on the timeline. Click [Undo] to return to the previously set display unit.

Alternative

- Click the center of the time scale setting to switch the currently set display unit to [Fit].
- Drag the time scale slider. Move the slider to the left to reduce the display unit, or to the right to increase it. The right end is [Fit].



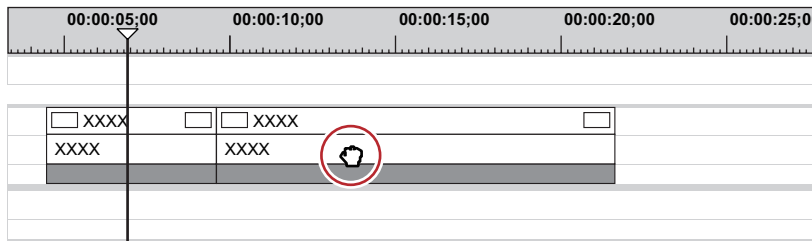
- Click . Click the left end to set a smaller display unit, or click the right end to set a larger display unit.

- If a clip is on the timeline, you can fine-adjust the time scale settings in the range from [1 Frame] to [Fit] by dragging the time scale slider. The scale is indicated as "----" during fine-adjustment.

Moving the Display Range

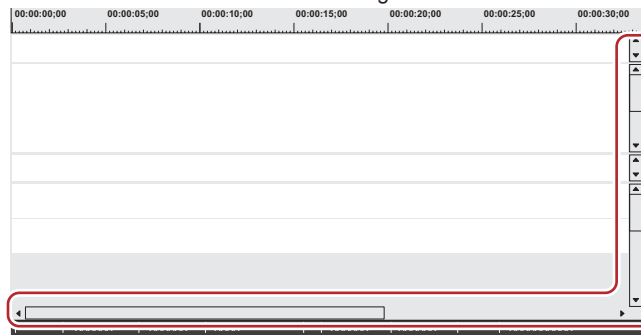
You can move the range currently displayed on the timeline window.

1) Right-drag with [Alt] on the keyboard held down.



Alternative

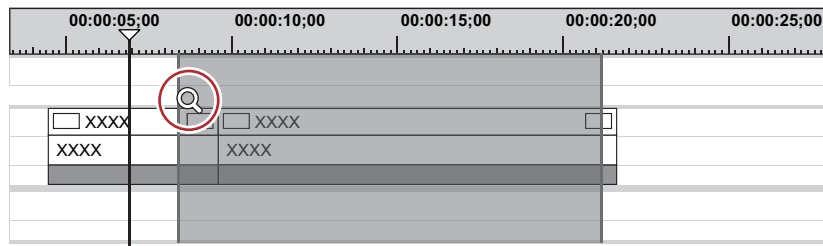
- Move the slider at the bottom of the timeline window or the slider at the right of the track.



Fitting to a Desired Range

You can specify a desired view range on the timeline and fit to this range.

- 1) Right-drag to enclose the range to fit to with [Shift] on the keyboard held down.



Color-coding Clips on the Timeline

You can color-code clips placed on the timeline to categorize them.

- 1) Right-click a clip on the timeline, and click [Properties].

- The [Clip Properties] dialog box appears.

Alternative

- Select a clip, click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Properties].
- Properties: [Alt] + [Enter]

- 2) Click the [File] tab, and select the desired color from the [Clip color] list.

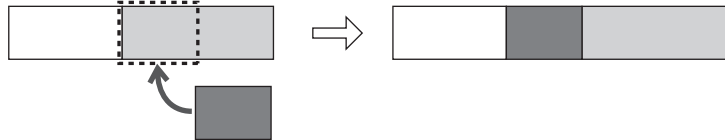
Switching the Editing Mode

Switching Mode when Placing/Moving Clips

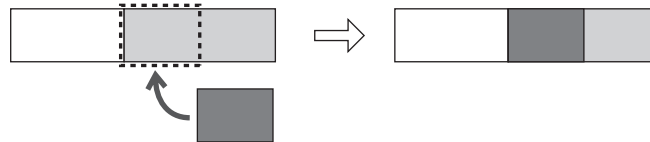
You can switch clip operations when placing clips on the timeline or operations for linking clips on the track by the editing mode.

Insert/Overwrite Mode

In the insert mode, if a clip exists at the position where you place a clip, the new clip moves the existing clip backward and is inserted at the position in between.





In the overwrite mode, if a clip exists at the position where you place a clip, the new clip overwrites part of existing clip overlapped by the new clip.



1) Click [Toggle Insert/Overwrite Mode] on the mode bar.

- Each click switches between the insert mode and the overwrite mode.



- : Insert mode
- : Overwrite mode
- The current mode (insert mode/overwrite mode) is displayed on the status bar of the timeline.

Alternative

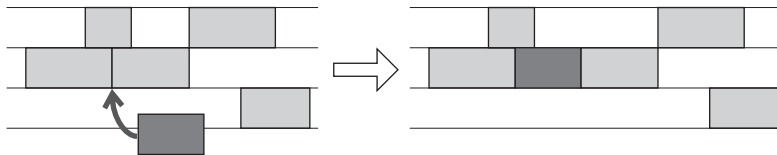
- Switch overwrite/insert mode: **[Insert]**

Sync-lock (Synchronization)

The result of track editing such as insertion or moving a clip affects other tracks, too, when sync-lock is set to a track.

Example:

When sync-lock is set to all three tracks and a clip has been added in the insert mode:



1) Click the lock panel of the track to which sync-lock is set.

- Each click switches between on and off.



- To set sync-lock to all tracks, click the batch lock panel.



Alternative

- Right-click the lock panel of the track to set sync-lock to, and click [Track Sync Lock]. To cancel, click [Track Sync Unlock].
- Select the track to set sync-lock to, right-click the batch track panel, and select [Sync Lock Selected Tracks].

Ripple Mode

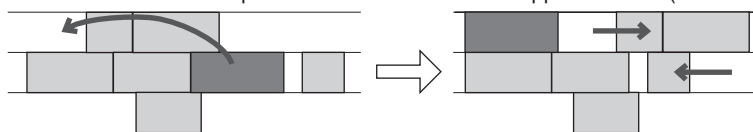
In the ripple mode, when a clip is deleted or trimmed, the subsequent clips move forward to prevent spaces from being formed on the timeline. When inserting a clip, you can move the subsequent clips while holding the space at the insert position.



- All subsequent clips following the clip that is being edited between tracks set with sync-lock are interlocked.

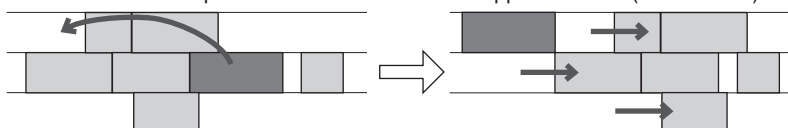
Example:

When sync-lock is disabled on all three tracks and a clip has been inserted with the ripple mode on (insert mode)



Example:

When sync-lock is set on all three tracks and a clip has been inserted with the ripple mode on (insert mode)



1) Click [Set Ripple Mode] on the mode bar.

- Each click switches the mode on and off.



- The current mode (ripple on/ripple off) is displayed on the status bar of the timeline.

Alternative

- Switching ripple mode: **[R]**



- When the ripple mode is on, sequence markers can be linked to the timeline editing. **“Sync-Lock Setting of Sequence Marker”** (▶ page 296)

Group/Link Mode

You can temporarily disable links or grouping of linked or grouped clips.

Note

- The links of VA clips on VA tracks cannot be released by setting the group/link mode to off. By switching the group/link mode, the links of clips placed separately on the V and A tracks are targeted for this operation. When releasing the links of VA clips, release links individually. **“Unlinking Clips”** (▶ page 246)

1) Click [Set Group/Link Mode] on the mode bar.

- Each click switches the mode on and off.



Alternative

- Switching group/link mode: **[Shift] + [L]**

Event Snap Mode

Switch the enable/disable setting of the snap function.



- You can set events to be used as the snap destination by [Application] in [User Settings] → [Timeline]. **“[Timeline]”** (▶ page 118)

1) Click [Snap to Event] on the mode bar.

- Each click switches the mode on and off.



Extend/Fix mode

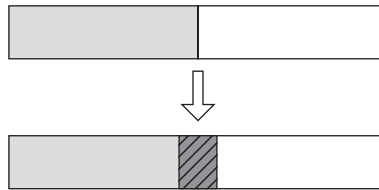
When adding a transition or audio cross fades between clips, set whether to add without changing the length of the whole clip (extend mode) or add without changing the length of individual clips (fix mode).

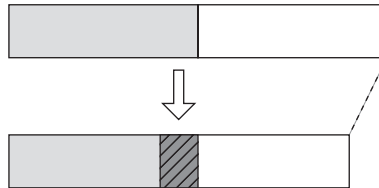
■ **Extend Mode**

Even when adding/deleting a transition or an audio cross fades between clips, the length of the whole clip on the timeline remains unchanged.



■ **Fix mode**

When adding/deleting a transition or an audio cross fades between clips, the length of the whole clip on the timeline shortens (lengthens) by the amount that the transition/audio cross fades was applied.



Setting the Extend/Fix Mode



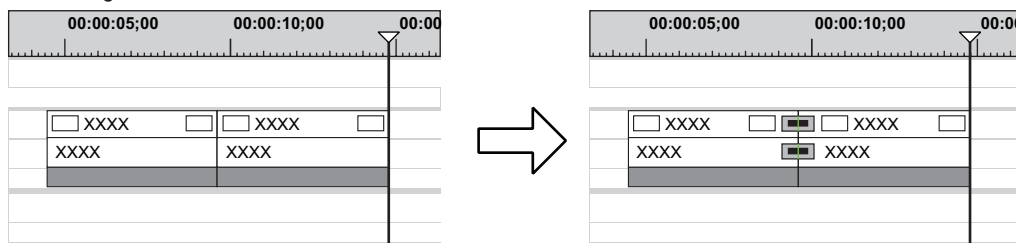
- If you add [Toggle Extend Clips when Applying Transition/Cross Fade] as an operation button in advance to the timeline, you can switch between the extend/fix modes simply by clicking the button. “Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)

Setting Extend Mode

- 1) Click [Settings] on the menu bar, and click [User Settings].
- 2) Click the [Application] tree, and click [Timeline].
- 3) Check [Extend Clips when Applying Transition/Cross Fade].

■ **When transition/audio cross fade is set...**

As In/Out points of left and right clips extend when a transition has been set or its length has been changed, the total length of clips on the timeline remains unchanged.

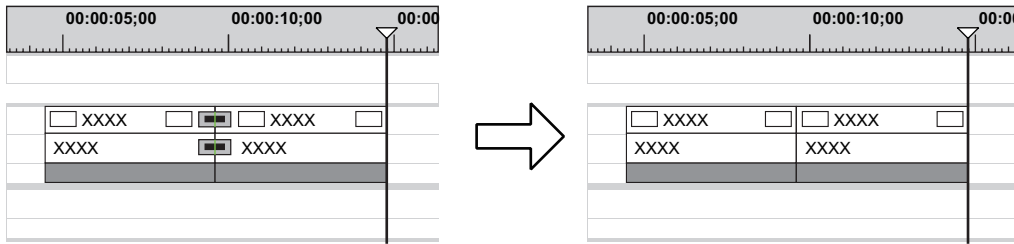


Note

- If a clip does not have a margin, transition/audio cross fades cannot be set (except for mixer area). You can extend the length of transitions by the margin of the clip. “Margin of Clip” (▶ page 378)

■ When transition/audio cross fade is deleted...

Clips contract by the extended amount due to the setting, and the total length of clips on the timeline remains unchanged.



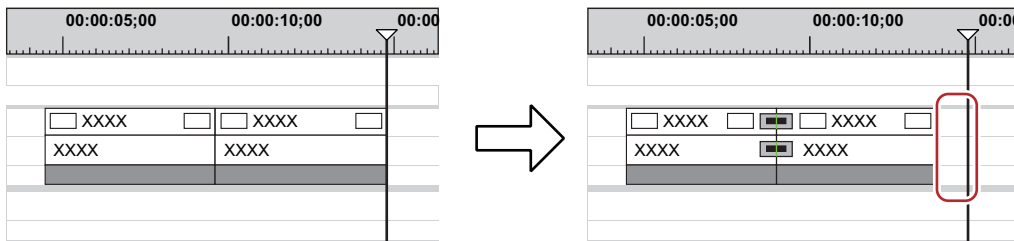
- When one of the clips set with transition is deleted, the transition also is deleted at the same time. The length of the remaining clip changes, extending to the middle of the transition (the length including the extended amount when setting the transition).

Setting Fix Mode

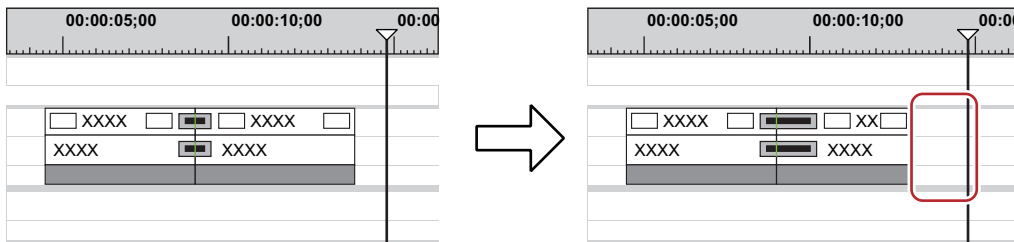
- 1) Click [Settings] on the menu bar, and click [User Settings].
- 2) Click the [Application] tree, and click [Timeline].
- 3) Uncheck [Extend Clips when Applying Transition/Cross Fade].

■ When transition/audio cross fade is set...

Left and right clips overlap with each other by the preset transition amount. The total length of the whole clip on the timeline shortens.

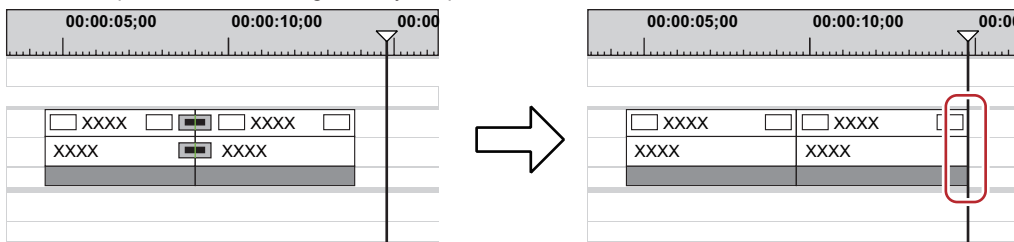


When the length of the transition has been changed, clips move to the left, and the length of the whole clip on the timeline changes according to the transition length.



■ When transition/audio cross fade is deleted...

The length of the whole clip on the timeline lengthens by the preset transition amount.



- To move the clips of other tracks together, turn on sync-lock of the track to move together with the track containing the clip to which transition/audio cross fades has been added.

Placing Clips

Setting Channel Mapping

Set which track the channel containing the source clip (source channel) should be mapped to when placing clips on the timeline. When performing editing operations such as placing clips or pasting them with shortcut keys, the clips are placed on a track according to the channel mapping setting.

Connecting/Disconnecting the Source Channel

Connect or disconnect the channel containing the source clip (source channel). Disconnected channels are not placed on the timeline.

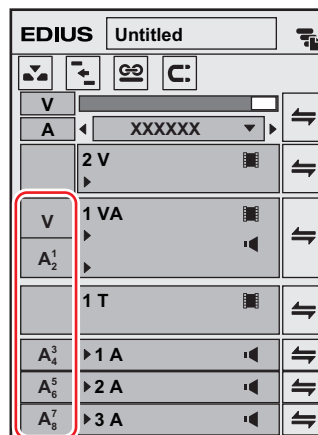
1) Click and select the clip in the bin to be placed on the timeline.

- The source channel is displayed in the track patch.
- When a clip is displayed on the Player, it is displayed on the track patch in the same way.
- When a clip in the source browser is selected, the source channels are displayed on the track patch according to the channel map in the project settings.

Example:

When the selected clip has video and audio 8 channels

The mapping is specified so that video and audio channels 1 and 2 are placed on the 1VA track, audio channels 3 and 4 on the 1A track, audio channels 5 and 6 on the 2A track, and audio channels 7 and 8 on the 3A track.



2) Click on the track patch of the unnecessary source channel to disconnect it.

- Each click connects/disconnects it alternately.



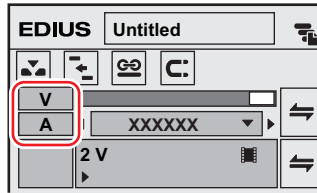
- To change the destination to connect the source channel, drag and drop the track patch of the source channel to be changed to the new destination track patch.
- To place an audio source channel as a monaural channel or stereo channel, right-click on the track patch of the audio and click [Audio Source Channel (Stereo)]. Each click switches between the monaural channel and stereo channel modes.

Alternative

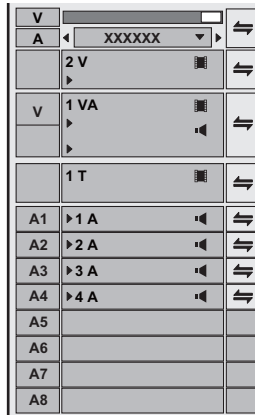
- Right-click the track patch of the source channel, and click [Connect Source Channel (Video) (Toggle)]/[Connect Source Channel (Audio) (Toggle)].
- Connecting/disconnecting video source channel: **[7]**
- Connecting/disconnecting audio source channel: **[8]**



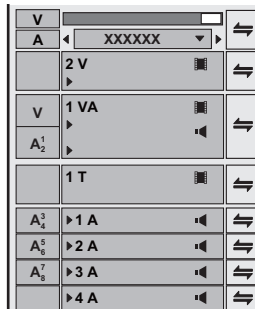
- You can connect/disconnect multiple source channels all together. Click [Connect Source Channel (Video) - Toggle] or [Connect Source Channel (Audio) - Toggle].



- As the default settings, 1st audio channel in each track is assigned to the 1st channel of the export destination, and 2nd audio channel is assigned the 2nd channel of the export destination.

- To place an audio source channel as a monaural channel or stereo channel, right-click on the track patch of the source channel and click [Audio Source Channel (Stereo)]. Each click switches between the monaural channel mode and stereo channel mode. When the monaural channel mode is set:



When the stereo channel mode is set:



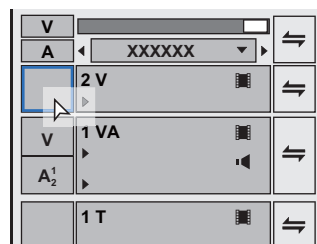
- If you add [Audio Source Channel Mode (Stereo/Monoral)] to the mode bar as an operation button, you can switch the mode simply by clicking the button.

- Clips are played back in the channel mode set in the track patch even when the clips are played back on the Player.

Changing the Connection Destination of Source Channels

1) Select the source clip to be placed.

- The source channel is displayed in the track patch.

2) Drag and drop the track patch of the desired source channel onto the track patch of the connection destination.



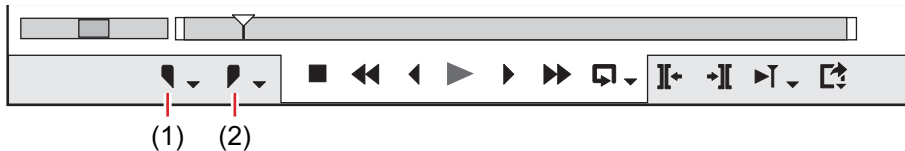


- When the desired source channel has been dragged and dropped onto the track patch to which an audio source channel is connected, the channel is switched.

Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline

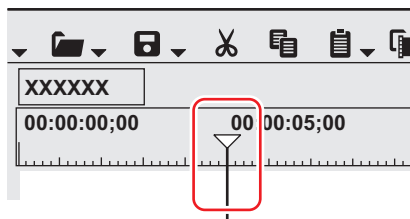
Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline

By setting the In and Out points on the timeline, you can limit the range to apply operations to between In and Out points, or place clips referenced to the In and Out points.



(1)	Set the In point
(2)	Set the Out point

1) Move the timeline cursor to the position to set the In point.



2) Click [Set In] on the Recorder.

3) Move the timeline cursor to the position to set the Out point.

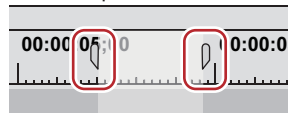
4) Click [Set Out] on the Recorder.

Alternative

- Move the timeline cursor to the position to set the In and Out points, and right-click the time scale. Click [Set In Point] or [Set Out Point].
- Move the timeline cursor to the position to set the In and Out points, and click [Marker] on the menu bar. Click [Set In Point] or [Set Out Point].
- Move the slider on the Recorder to the position to set the In and Out points, and right-click the slider. Click [Set In Point] or [Set Out Point].
- Setting In and Out points on the timeline: **[I]/[O]**



- You can drag the In and Out point slider on the time scale to reposition the In and Out points.



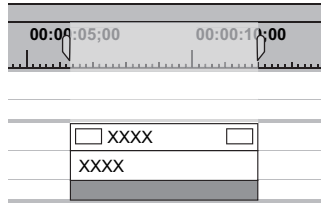
- When the Out point has been set before the In point, the time scale between In and Out points changes color to red and a part of the timecode on the Recorder is displayed in red.
- When duration is entered at [Dur] on the Recorder in the preview window after an In point (or Out point) has been set, the Out point (or In point) is set according to the duration.
- From [User Settings] → [Application] → [Timeline], you can set whether the frame displayed in the preview window is to be included in the range of In and Out points.

Setting In and Out Points to Both Ends of Clips

Set the In and Out points of the timeline to both ends of a selected clip.

1) Select a clip, click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Set In/Out Point to Selected Clip].

- In and Out points are set to both ends of the clip.



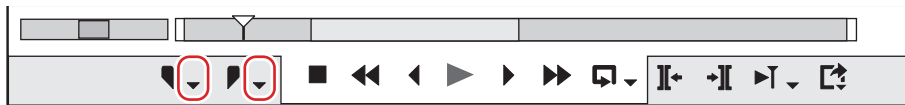
Alternative

- Setting In and Out points to both ends of a selected clip: **[Z]**

Deleting the In and Out Points on the Timeline

You can delete In and Out points on the timeline.

1) Click the [Set In] ([Set Out]) list button on the Recorder.



2) Click [Clear In Point] ([Clear Out Point]).

Alternative

- Right-click the time scale, and click [Clear In Point] ([Clear Out Point]).
- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Clear In Point] ([Clear Out Point]).
- Right-click the slider on the Recorder, and click [Clear In Point] ([Clear Out Point]).
- Deleting In and Out Points on the timeline: **[Alt] + [I]/[Alt] + [O]**



- You can delete In and Out points in a single operation by the following operation:
 - Right-click the time scale, and click [Clear In/Out Point].
 - Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Clear In/Out Point].
 - Deleting In/Out points: **[X]**

Placing Clips

Placing Clips

You can place source clips on the timeline.

Clip operations at placement and placement results are dependent on the editing mode.

2) Move the timeline cursor to the position to place the clip.

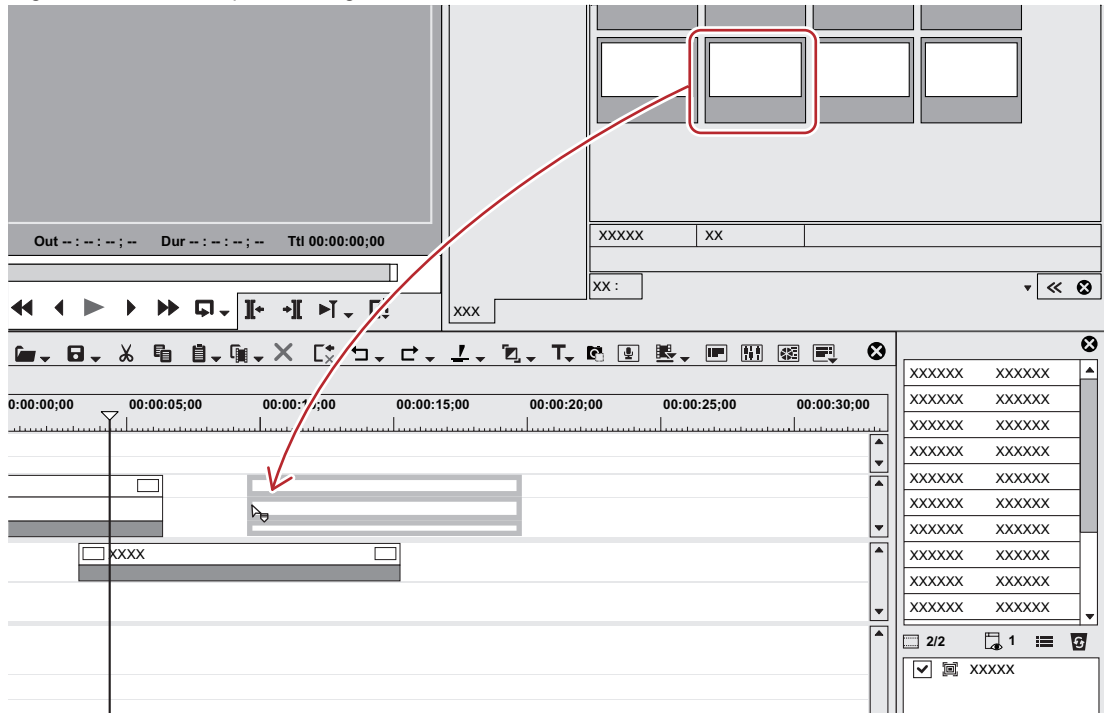
3) Select a clip from the bin, and click [Add to Timeline].

- Drag and drop a clip in the bin onto the timeline. Channels can be mapped to any desired track and clips can be placed according to the drop point regardless of the track patch setting.

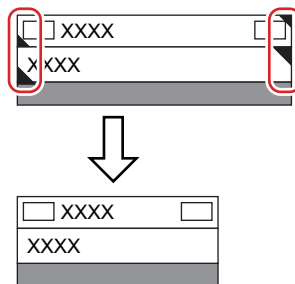


- Right-click a clip in the bin, and click [Add to Timeline].
- Play back a clip on the Player, and drag and drop the clip onto the timeline from the Player. Channels can be mapped to any desired track according to the drop point regardless of source channel mapping.
- Play back a clip on the Player, and click [Insert to Timeline] or [Overwrite to Timeline].
- Placing a clip displayed on the Player on the timeline: **[E]**
- Set the source channel mapping, move the timeline cursor to the clip place point, and drag and drop the clip onto the Recorder.
- Placing clips: **[Shift] + [Enter]**

- You can place sources on the timeline without registering them to the bin. Move the timeline cursor to the clip place point, right-click a track, and click [Add Clip]. Select the source from the [Open] dialog box, and click [Open].

Placed Clips

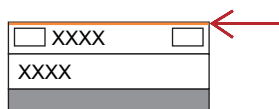
You can confirm that a filter or transition is set from the display of the clip placed on the track. Triangular marks at both ends of the clip mean the start and end of the clip. Triangular marks are displayed when the clip has no margin.



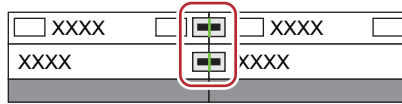
A green line is displayed at the top of the clip when rendering has been performed. An orange line is displayed when filter, time effect, layout, normalize, etc. has been set.

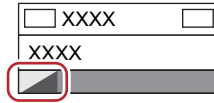

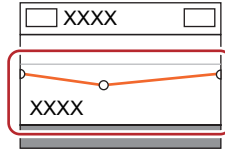
A frame is displayed as follows when a transition or audio cross fades is set between clips.



A triangle is displayed as shown below in the mixer area when a track transition is set at the start point of a clip.



Clicking the audio expand button displays a rubber band and waveform for the volume, and clicking the mixer expand button displays a rubber band for the transparency.

Setting In/Out Points and Placing Clips

You can set In and Out points to clips, and place only the required part on a track.

1) Select a clip from the bin, and click [Show in Player].

3) Set the source channel mapping.

4) Move the timeline cursor to the position to place the clip.

5) Click [Insert to Timeline] on the Player.

- When [Overwrite to Timeline] is clicked, the clip is placed in the overwrite mode.

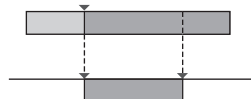

- Divided and placed video and audio clips are set in groups.

Placing Clips between In and Out Points on the Timeline (3 Point Editing)

Place clips between In and Out points on the timeline. Clips are placed by the length between In and Out points on the timeline.



1) Select a clip from the bin, and click [Show in Player].



- The same operations can also be performed in the source browser.
- Check the video on the Player, and set the In and Out points, if necessary.

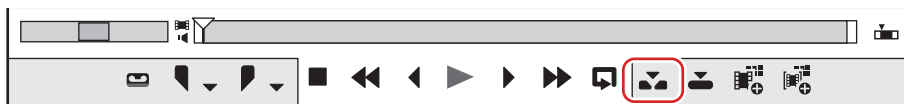
2) Set the source channel mapping.

3) Set the In and Out points to the timeline.

- The clip is placed trimmed to the length between In and Out points on the timeline. When the In point has been set, it is placed referenced to the In point.

- When [Overwrite to Timeline] is clicked, the clip is placed in the overwrite mode.

Placing the In and Out Points of Clips between In and Out Points on the Timeline (4 Point Editing)

Set the In and Out points to the clip, and place it between In and Out points on the timeline. The speed between In and Out points of the clip is adjusted automatically according to the length between In and Out points on the timeline.



1) Select a clip from the bin, and click [Show in Player].



- The same operations can also be performed in the source browser.

2) Set the In and Out points to the clip.

Note

- Even if a margin is not assigned to a source, set the In and Out points to the start and end of the source. The editing mode becomes 3-point editing when In and Out points are not set.

3) Setting the Source Channel Mapping

5) Click [Insert to Timeline] on the Player.



- The In and Out points of a clip are placed between In and Out points on the timeline.
- When [Overwrite to Timeline] is clicked, the clip is placed in the overwrite mode.

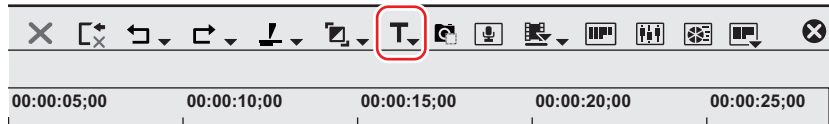
Note

- When the duration between In and Out points on the timeline differs from that between In and Out points of the clip, the playback speed of the clip is adjusted automatically to stay between In and Out points on the timeline, with the range between In and Out points maintained.

Placing Special Clips on the Timeline

You can create color bar clips, color matte clips, and title clips on the timeline.

1) Click [Create Title] on the timeline.



2) Click the clip to create.

- When the In and Out points have not been set on the timeline, the clip is created at the position of the timeline cursor. The duration of the created clip can be set by [Source] in [User Settings] → [Duration].
- When the In and Out points have been set on the timeline, the clip is created between In and Out points. You can set whether to create clips between In and Out points or at the cursor position by [Source] in [User Settings] → [Duration].

- When all source channels have been released (track patch all set to off), color bar clips, color matte clips and title clips cannot be created. Also, title clips cannot be created when the video source channel is released.

Moving Clips

Drag a clip placed on the timeline, and drop it onto the destination. Clips can be moved to any desired position, including different tracks.

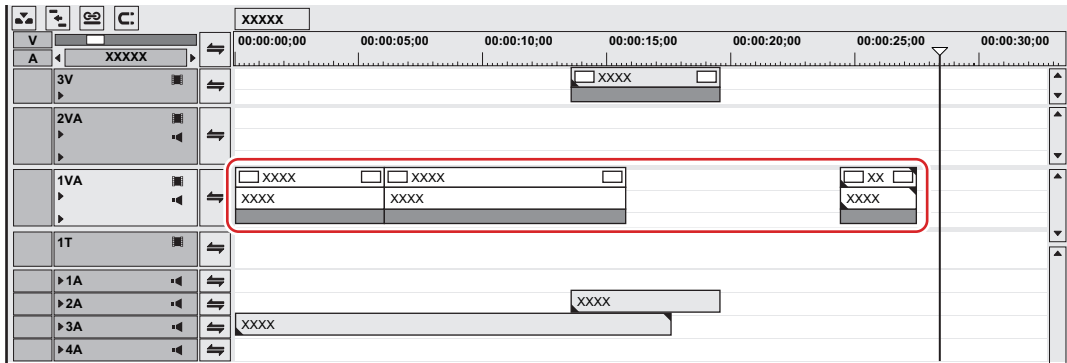
Selecting Multiple Clips

You can select all clips in the same track. You can also select all clips on the timeline.

1) Click the track panel to select the track.

2) Right-click the timeline, and click [Select] → [Selected Tracks].

- All clips on the selected track are selected.



- When [All Tracks] is clicked, all clips on the timeline are selected.

Alternative

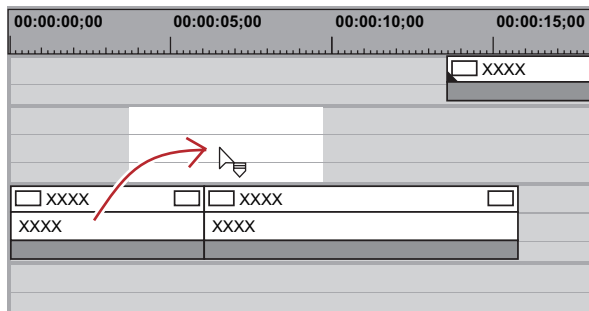
- Click a clip with [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down to add or remove the clip one at a time.
- Specify the range including the clip by dragging from the start point to the end point on the timeline.
- Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Select] → [Selected Track] or [All Tracks].
- Selecting all clips on the selected track: **[Ctrl] + [A]**
- Selecting all clips on timeline: **[Shift] + [A]**

Moving Clips

You can move clips by dragging and dropping. You can also move multiple clips at the same time.

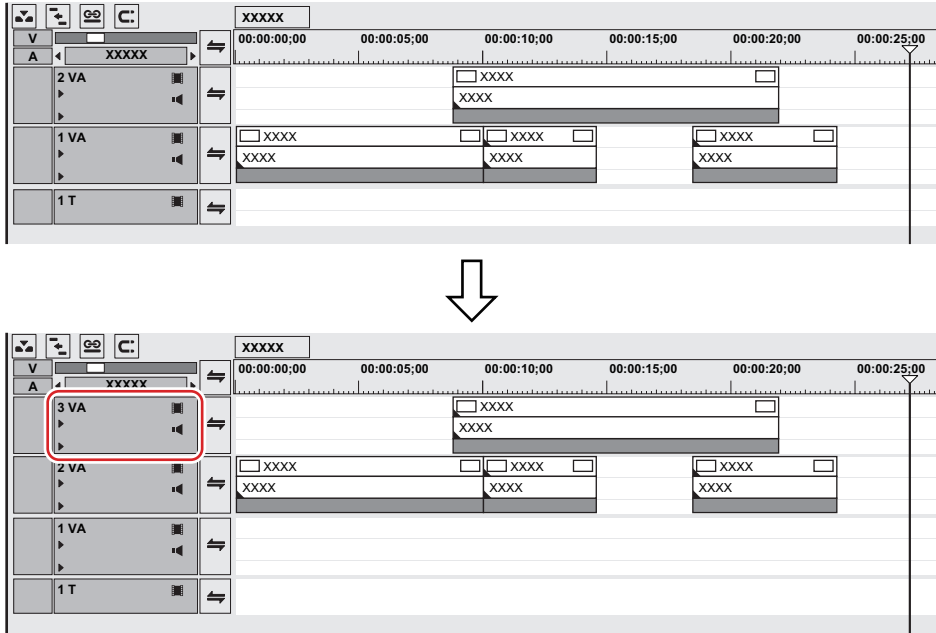
1) Select a clip, and drag and drop it at the destination.



- Clip operations at move and move results are dependent on the editing mode.
 - “Switching the Editing Mode” (▶ page 230)
- When you select clips over multiple tracks and move them to the area where the corresponding type of track does not exist, a track is automatically added.

Example:

When multiple clips on the 1VA track and 2VA track have been selected, and dragged and dropped to a track above



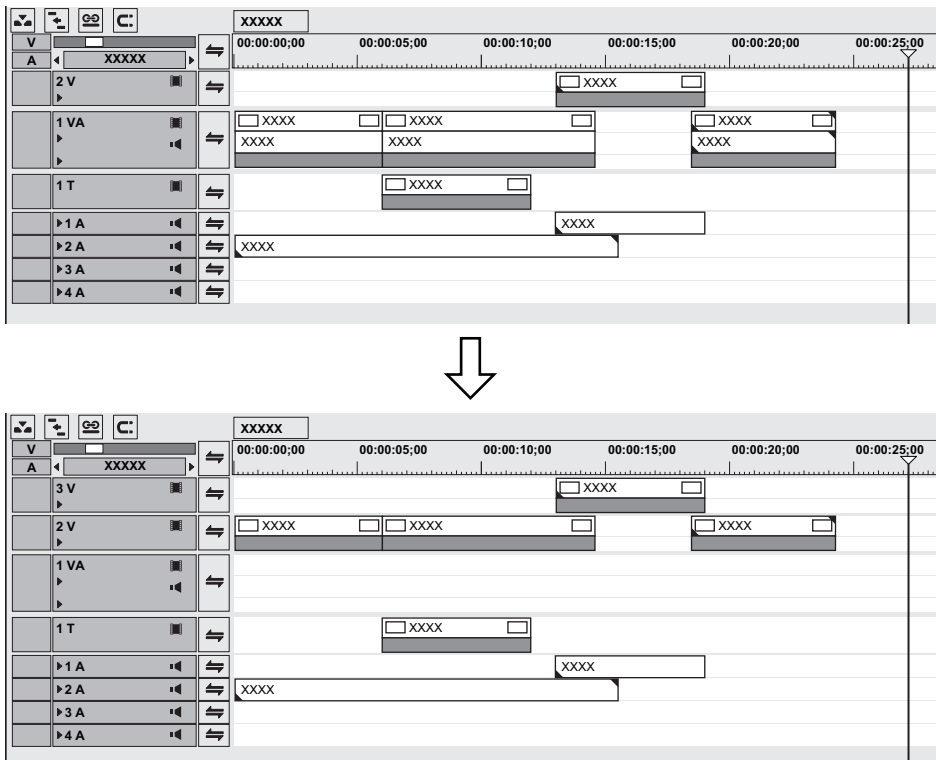
Alternative

- Right-drag the clip to the move destination, and click [Overwrite] or [Insert]. Clips can be moved in the overwrite mode or insert mode regardless of the editing mode.

Note

- When you have selected multiple clips placed on different types of tracks and dragged across tracks, only clips placed between tracks of the same type move.

When multiple clips on the 1VA track, 1T track, and 1A track have been selected and dragged and dropped to a track above, the screen is displayed as follows.



- When only one of two clips set with a clip transition or audio cross fades is moved, only the selected clip moves and the transition is released.

Moving a Selected Clip and Subsequent Clips

You can move a selected clip and the subsequent clips within the same track with each position maintained.

1) Select the starting clip of the clips to be moved, and drag it with [Shift] and [Alt] on the keyboard held down.

- The mouse cursor changes shape, and clips following the selected clip move at the same time.
- The clips of tracks set with sync-lock also are interlocked.

Searching for Clips on the Timeline in the Bin

You can specify conditions and search for clips in the bin which are placed on the timeline. The [Search results] folder is created in the folder view of the bin.

1) Select a clip to search from the timeline.

2) Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Search Bin] → a search condition.

- The [Search results] folder is created in the folder view of the bin and the clips that match the search conditions are displayed.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip, and click [Search Bin] → search condition.



- The [Search results] folder created once according to specified conditions starts searching clips that match the conditions each time it is opened and viewed. Clips newly registered to the bin also are targeted in the search.
- You can refine the search or change search conditions in the bin for clips in the [Search results] folder.

- When [Including Cursor (Recorder)] has been clicked in the search conditions, the name of the [Search results] folder is displayed by the source timecode.

Clip Operations

Handling Only the Video Part or Audio Part of Clips Separately



- Conditions for setting a link are as follows:
 - The clip is placed in the same track.
 - Part of the clip is overlapping.
 - The clip is referencing the same source.
- When the group/link mode is switched, the video part and audio part of all clips in the sequence can be temporarily handled separately. “Group/Link Mode” (► page 232)
- When the start points of the video and audio clips set with a link are out-of-position, the number of frames that the clips are out by is displayed at the top of the clip.



Unlinking Clips

The video and audio parts in a video clip on the VA track can be separated. By releasing the link, you can handle them as independent clips.

- 1) On the timeline, right-click the clip to unlink, and click [Link/Group] → [Unlink].

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Link/Group] → [Unlink].
- Unlinking: [Alt] + [Y]

Link Settings

Unlinked video clips and audio clips can be re-linked.

- 1) On the timeline, select the respective video and audio clips to be linked.

- 2) Right-click a clip, and click [Link/Group] → [Link].

- The link is set, and you can handle it as a single clip.

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Link/Group] → [Link].
- Setting link: [Y]

Handling Multiple Clips as a Single Clip



- When the group/link mode is switched, all groups in a sequence are temporarily ungrouped, and the video part and audio part of clips can be handled separately. “Group/Link Mode” (► page 232)

Setting Groups

Handle multiple clips as a single group. You can group the clips over different tracks.

- 1) On the timeline, select the multiple clips to be grouped.

- 2) Right-click a clip, and click [Link/Group] → [Set Group].

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Link/Group] → [Set Group].
- Setting group: **[G]**

Ungrouping

You can restore grouped clips to their original separate clips.

1) Right-click a clip in the group, and click [Link/Group] → [Ungroup].**Alternative**

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Link/Group] → [Ungroup].
- Ungrouping: **[Alt] + [G]**

Copying/Pasting Clips**Copying****1) Select a clip, and click [Copy] on the timeline.**

- You can continue to paste and replace clips.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Copy].
- Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Copy].
- Copying: **[Ctrl] + [C]**, **[Ctrl] + [Insert]**

Cutting

Cut clips. The cut clip is deleted from its current position.

1) Select a clip, and click [Cut (Follow Mode)] on the timeline.

- The editing result of a cut operation is dependent on the editing mode.
 - “Ripple Mode” (► page 231)
 - “Sync-lock (Synchronization)” (► page 230)
- You can continue to paste and replace clips.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip, and click [Cut] or [Ripple Cut].
- Select a clip, click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Cut] or [Ripple Cut].
- Cutting (mode-dependent): **[Ctrl] + [X]**
- Cutting: **[Shift] + [Delete]**
- Ripple cutting: **[Alt] + [X]**

Pasting

You can paste copied or cut clips to the timeline.

1) Select a clip, and copy or cut it.

- “Copying” (► page 247)
- “Cutting” (► page 247)

2) Select a track, and move the timeline cursor to the paste position.

3) Click [Paste to Current Location] of the timeline.



- The clip is placed with the position on the timeline cursor set as the In point.

Alternative

- Click the [Paste to Current Location] list button on the timeline, and click [Cursor].
- Right click on the track to paste to, and click [Paste]. At this time, the clip will be pasted to the right-clicked track regardless of the currently selected track.
- Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Paste] → [Cursor].
- Right click on any clip on the track to paste to, and click [Paste] → [Cursor]. At this time, the clip will be pasted to the position of the timeline cursor on the right-clicked track regardless of the currently selected track.
- Pasting: [Ctrl] + [V]



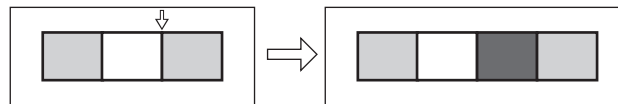
- A track is automatically added if there is no track at the paste destination.
- If a clip exists at the destination position, it is divided at the position of the timeline cursor and the pasted clip overwrites the existing clip or is inserted between the divided clips.

Pasting to the In and Out Points of Clips

You can insert another clip at (or in front of) the In point or at (or behind) the Out point of a specific clip.

Example:

When pasting another clip to the Out point of the white clip



1) Select a clip, and copy or cut it.

- “Copying” (▶ page 247)
- “Cutting” (▶ page 247)

2) Click the clip to be used as the reference for pasting.

3) Click the [Paste to Current Location] list button on the timeline.



4) Click [Clip In] or [Clip Out].

[Clip In]	Insert the clip at (or in front of) the In point of the selected clip.
[Clip Out]	Insert the clip at (or behind) the Out point of the selected clip.

Alternative

- Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Paste] → [Clip In] or [Clip Out].
- Right-click the clip to be used as the reference for pasting, and click [Paste] → [Clip In] or [Clip Out].

Replacing a Clip

You can copy or cut a clip and paste it onto another clip to replace.

- All of the mixers and filters applied to the clip also are replaced.

1) Select a clip, and copy or cut it.

- “Copying” (▶ page 247)
- “Cutting” (▶ page 247)

2) Select the clip to replace.

3) Click the [Paste to Current Location] list button on the timeline.



4) Click [All].

Alternative

- Right-drag a clip onto a clip to be replaced, and click [Paste] → [All].
- Right-click on a clip to be replaced, and click [Paste] → [All].
- Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Paste] → [All].
- Replacing a clip: **[Ctrl] + [R]**

Note

- When the duration differs from that of the clip to be replaced by a copied or cut clip, the clip will automatically be trimmed referenced to the In point of the copied or cut clip. The playback speed remains unchanged.

Partially Replacing a Clip

You can copy or cut a clip and paste its filter or mixer onto another clip to replace.

1) Select a clip, and copy or cut it.

- “Copying” (► page 247)
- “Cutting” (► page 247)

2) Select the clip to replace.

3) Click the [Paste to Current Location] list button on the timeline.



4) Click the replace item.

- Select an item to replace from [Filter], [Mixer], [Clip] and [Clip and Filter].

Alternative

- Right-drag a clip onto a clip to be replaced, and click [Paste] → the item to replace.
- Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Paste] → the item to replace.
- Right-click on the target clip to be replaced, and click [Paste] → the item to replace.
- Replacing the filter: **[Alt] + [R]**
- Replacing the mixer: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [R]**
- Replacing the clip: **[Shift] + [R]**
- Replacing the clip with filter: **[Shift] + [Alt] + [R]**

Pasting Attributes

You can select attributes of a clip (layout information, filter, etc.) to paste them onto another clip. For key frame, transition and filter, there are options for pasting.

1) Select a clip on the timeline, and copy or cut it.

2) Select a paste destination clip, and click [Select Attributes] on the timeline.

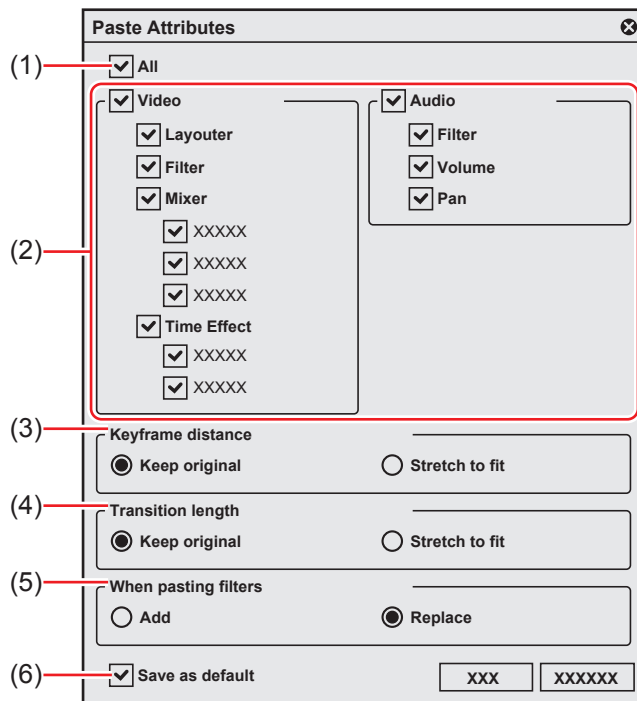
3) Configure the attributes to paste and pasting options for key frame and other items, and click [OK].

- The attributes of copied or cut clip will be pasted to the target clip.

 - [Clip and Attributes]: Pastes the clip and all the attributes. The pasting options for key frame, transition and filter will be applied in accordance with the settings in the [Paste Attributes] dialog box.
 - [Selected Attributes]: Pastes attributes of the default setting which has been saved as [Save as default] in the [Paste Attributes] dialog box.

[Paste Attributes] Dialog Box



(1)	[All]	Check this item to select all items for [Video] and [Audio].
(2)	Attributes to paste to the target	Select attributes for video or audio to paste to the target clip. Checking [Video] or [Audio] will select all the items for [Video] or [Audio].
(3)	[Keyframe distance]	Select the pasting option for key frame. [Keep original] The key frame is set on the same position as in the copy source clip. [Stretch to fit] The key frame is set after being adjusted according to the length of the target clip.
(4)	[Transition length]	Select the pasting option for transition. [Keep original] The transition is set on the same position as in the copy source clip. [Stretch to fit] The transition is set after being adjusted according to the length of the target clip.
(5)	[When pasting filters]*1	Select the pasting option for filter. [Add] The pasted filter is added as a new filter. [Replace] The pasted filter replaces that of the target clip.
(6)	[Save as default]	Check this item to save the current settings as defaults. The saved default values are applied when [Selected Attributes] is selected in pasting operation.

*1 A clip cannot have multiple [Stabilizer] settings. Therefore, if a clip already has a setting for [Stabilizer], the [Stabilizer] setting of another clip cannot be pasted by using [Add].

Note

- [Time Remap] will be pasted within the range of the clip used on the timeline.

Dividing Clips

Dividing Clips at the Timeline Cursor Position

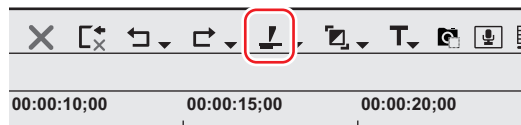
You can divide clips at the timeline cursor position. After dividing a clip, you can handle its divided segments as independent clips.

1) Select the clips to be divided.

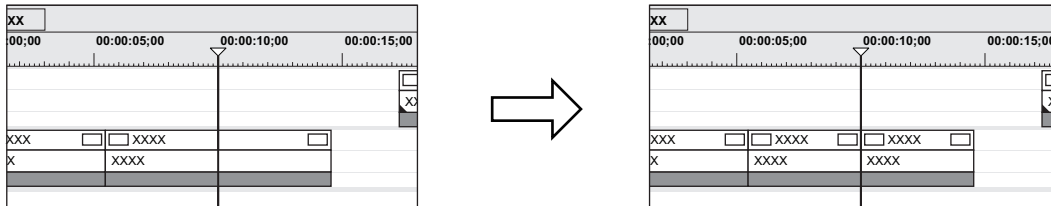
- You can select multiple clips.

2) Move the timeline cursor to the position where the clip is to be divided.

3) Click [Add Cut Point (Selected Tracks)] of the timeline.



- The clip is divided at the timeline cursor position.



Alternative

- Click the [Add Cut Point] list button, and click [Selected Tracks].
- Right-click the clip where the cut point is to be added, and click [Add Cut Point] → [Selected Tracks]. By this operation, the right-clicked clip is divided at the timeline cursor position regardless of the currently selected track.

- Adding cut point at current position (selected tracks): **[C]**



- When the currently selected clip is at the timeline cursor position, that clip is divided regardless of the selected tracks.
- By the following operation, you can divide the clips on all tracks at the timeline cursor position in a single operation.
 - Click the [Add Cut Point] list button, and click [All Tracks].
 - Right-click any clip, and click [Add Cut Point] → [All Tracks].
 - Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Add Cut Point] → [All Tracks].
 - Adding cut point (all tracks): **[Shift] + [C]**

Dividing Clips at the In and Out Points

You can set the In and Out points on the timeline to divide the clip at a desired position.

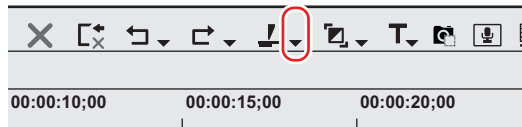

- Adding cut point at In/Out points (selected tracks): **[Alt] + [C]**

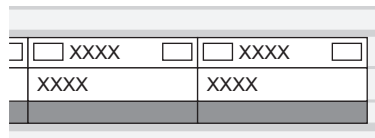


- When the currently selected clip is at the In or Out point, that clip is divided regardless of the selected tracks.
- By the following operation, you can divide the clips on all tracks at the In and Out points on the timeline in a single operation.
 - Click the [Add Cut Point] list button, and click [In/Out (All Tracks)].
 - Right-click any clip, and click [Add Cut Point] → [In/Out (All Tracks)].
 - Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Add Cut Point] → [In/Out (All Tracks)].
 - Adding cut point at In/Out points (all tracks): **[Shift] + [Alt] + [C]**

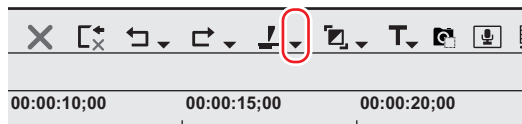
Combining Divided Clips

You can recombine divided clips.

1) Select 2 clips to be combined.

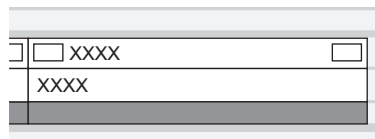


2) Click the [Add Cut Point (Selected Tracks)] list button on the timeline.



3) Click [Remove cut points].

- The 2 clips are combined, and can be handled as a single clip.

- Right-click a clip and click [Remove cut points].

- Deleting cut point: **[Ctrl] + [Delete]**



- Three or more clips can be combined with the same operation.

Note

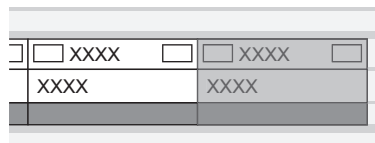
- [Remove cut points] is available only when neighboring clips are referencing the same source.
- When combining clips, if individual effects (e.g. video filter) or layouts have been applied to the clips before combining, the effect of clips placed to the leftmost side of the timeline are applied to clips after combining and other effects are deleted.
- The two clips before combining cannot be combined if their playback speed is different. Also, the settings of clips from the second clip from the left and onwards are discarded if a time remap has been set.
- When combining clips, the rubber band setting before combining is maintained. Note, however, that priority is given to the settings of subsequent clips when the rubber band points of the combined section are out-of-position.

Clip Enable/Disable

You can disable clips placed on the timeline. Disabled clips cannot be played back.

1) Right-click the clip to disable, and click [Enable/Disable].

- Disabled clips are displayed in gray regardless of their type.



Alternative

- Select the clip to disable, click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Enable/Disable].
- Enabling/disabling clips: **[0]**



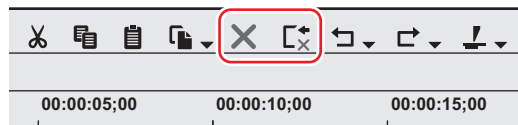
- You can enable disabled clips by the same operation.
- Disabled clips can be edited in the same way as enabled clips.

Deleting Clips

Deleting Clips/Ripples

Delete clips placed on the timeline.

1) Select a clip, and click [Delete] or [Ripple delete] on the timeline.

- Regardless of the on/off setting of the ripple mode, when [Delete] is clicked, the selected clip is deleted, and when [Ripple delete] is clicked, all clips behind the deleted clip move forward together.

- Right-click the clip to delete, and click [Delete] or [Ripple delete].
- Deleting clip (mode-dependent): **[Delete]**
- Ripple deleting clip: **[Alt] + [Delete]**

- When only the In point has been set, the range of the clip after the In point is deleted, and when only the Out point has been set, the range of the clip from the beginning of the timeline to the Out point is deleted.

Deleting/Ripple Deleting Only Video/Audio Clips

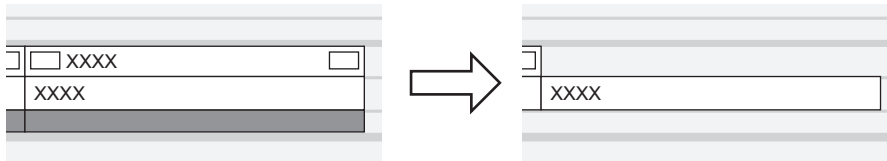

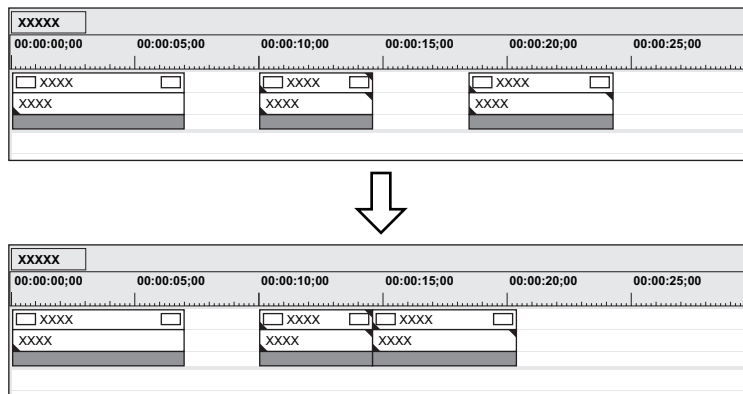

Deleting Gaps (Blanks)

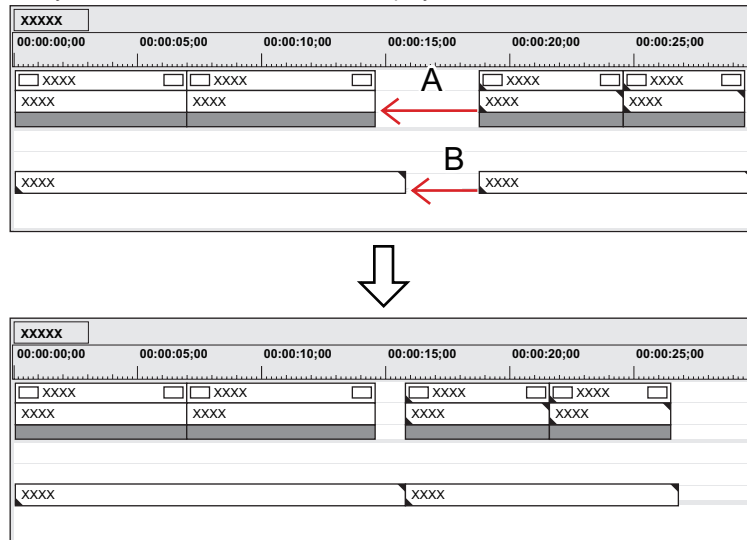

When deleting the gap of A with sync-lock set to on, the screen is displayed as follows.



Deleting the gap A is limited to the gap length of B.

Playback Speed Adjustment



- When [Speed] or [Time Remap] is set, menu items to be displayed when each item is set is checked.

Note

- When the playback speed of clips is changed, ancillary data will be deleted.

Changing the Speed of the Whole Clip

You can change the playback speed of clips.

1) Right-click a clip, and click [Time Effect] → [Speed].

- The [Speed] dialog box appears.
“[Speed] Dialog Box” (▶ page 257)

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Time Effect] → [Speed].
- Changing the speed of the whole clip: **[Alt] + [E]**

2) Set each item and click [OK].

- An orange line is displayed on clips whose speed has been changed.

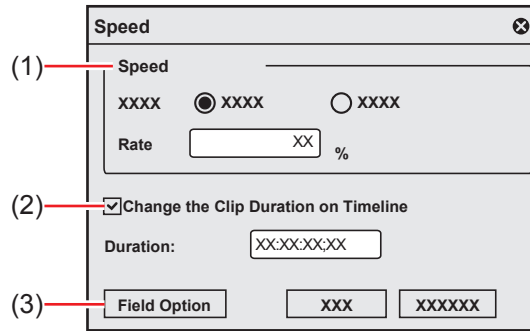


- The speed of multiple clips placed on separate clips can be changed in a single operation. A message is displayed if the speed change cannot be set depending on the combination of clips.

Partially Changing Playback Speed (Time Remap)

You can alter the speed of any part of a clip.

You can remap a particular frame of a clip to a different position of the timeline. The remaining frames are automatically interpolated, and as a result the speed of the previous/next frames is changed. The In point of a clip, the frame of the Out point and the overall length remain unchanged.

- When you right-click the [Time Remap] dialog box and click [Information] to uncheck, the thumbnail displayed at the top and end of the clip, and the timecode can be set to hidden.
- When you right-click the [Time Remap] dialog box and click [Timeline Time] to uncheck, the top frame of the clip can be changed to "00:00:00;00".
- When you right-click the [Time Remap] dialog box and click [Original Source Time] to uncheck, the timecode that takes the In point of the clip as "00:00:00;00" is displayed.
- Even clips with no key added are set with one key each at the beginning and end.
- As the default time remap setting, the speed of set keys onward is changed smoothly. If you want to maintain a fixed playback speed in a certain range, set the key to that range, right-click the key on the In point side, and click [Linear]. The key changes shape from diamond-shaped to square.



If you right-click a key set with linear change and click [Speed], a dialog box for entering the playback speed appears.

One Frame at a Time Playback (Freeze Frame)

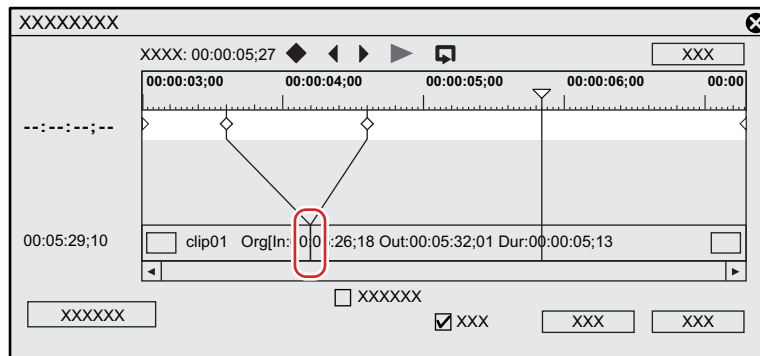
Stop and play back the In or Out points of the clip. Clips can be stopped for not just the length of the clip but also the first half or second half from a desired frame.

Note

- Freeze frame can be set to video clips on the timeline.
- The freeze frame setting is deleted when a clip set with a freeze frame is added from the timeline to the bin.



- Any desired range of clips can also be frozen by time remap. Add keys to determine the range to freeze, and move to the position to stop the 2 key frames on the clip side.



1) Right-click a clip, and click [Time Effect] → [Freeze Frame] → [Setup].

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Time Effect] → [Freeze Frame] → [Setup].

2) Check [Enable freeze frame] in the [Freeze Frame] dialog box.

3) Select the fix position, and click [OK].

- When the In point is selected, the frame of the In point is freeze-framed for the length of the clip, and when the Out point is selected, the frame of the Out point is freeze-framed for the length of the clip.



- When a clip set with freeze frame enabled is trimmed, operation changes as follows depending on the fix position.
 - When the In point side of a clip with a fixed In point is trimmed, the displayed frame also moves matched to the trimming. Operation is not affected when the Out point side has been trimmed.
 - When the Out point side of a clip with a fixed Out point is trimmed, the displayed frame also moves matched to the trimming. Operation is not affected when the In point side has been trimmed.

Freeze-framing the First Half or Second Half from a Desired Frame

1) Move the timeline cursor to the frame to freeze.

2) Right-click a clip, and click [Time Effect] → [Freeze Frame] → [Before Cursor] or [After Cursor].

- The selected clip is cut at the timeline cursor position, and freeze frame is set to clips before or after the cursor. When freeze frame has been set after a cursor, the fix position becomes the In point, and when freeze frame has been set before a cursor, the fix position becomes the Out point.

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Time Effect] → [Freeze Frame] → [Before Cursor] or [After Cursor].

Note

- Freeze frame cannot be set when the timeline cursor is located at a transition between clips.

Field Options

You can set processing options for reducing flicker, for example, when slow motion has been set.

1) Select a clip.

- Multiple clips can be selected and set in a single operation.

2) Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Time Effect] → [Field Option].

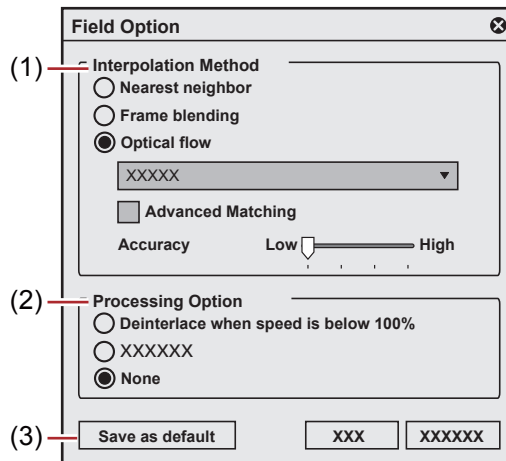

(1)	[Interpolation Method]	<p>[Nearest neighbor] The length of the clip is adjusted by skipping frames or continuously displaying the same frame.</p> <p>[Frame blending] Adjacent frames are composed and a new frame is automatically generated to interpolate between the frames.</p> <p>[Optical flow] The motion in adjacent frames are analyzed by pixels and a new frame is automatically generated so that the motion of the subject is played back smoothly. Click the list button to set the quality of [Optical flow]. Select [Custom] to set [Advanced Matching] and [Accuracy] separately.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • [Advanced Matching] Use [Advanced Matching] that analyzes detailed matching between images to recognize more detailed characteristics, which will separate the foreground and background sharply. - If real time playback is disabled after [Optical flow] has been applied, using the draft preview or frame skip playback is helpful.

- GPU acceleration is not supported.

High-Quality Slow Motion

By applying optical flow, an image interpolation technique, the video can be converted into a slow motion video with higher quality and smoother motion when the clip playback speed has been decreased due to setting change in [Speed] of [Time Effect].

■ Optical flow

Optical flow is a technique to generate new images to interpolate between images, by analyzing subtle motion between images and estimating spatially smooth motion. It enables to realize high-quality slow motion and smooth frame conversion.

Note

- For video like the following, high-quality slow motion effects may not be fully obtained.
 - Video with extremely high speed and long distance movement
 - Video in which subjects cross each other
 - Video that includes a building window, fence, or regular pattern like a horizontal striped T shirt
Enabling [Advanced Matching] for [Optical flow] may cause specific artifacts.
- After applying high-quality slow motion, play back the video to check if the subject is mixed with the background or the images are distorted.

1) Right-click a clip on the timeline, and click [Time Effect] → [Speed].

- The [Speed] dialog box appears.
“[Speed] Dialog Box” (▶ page 257)

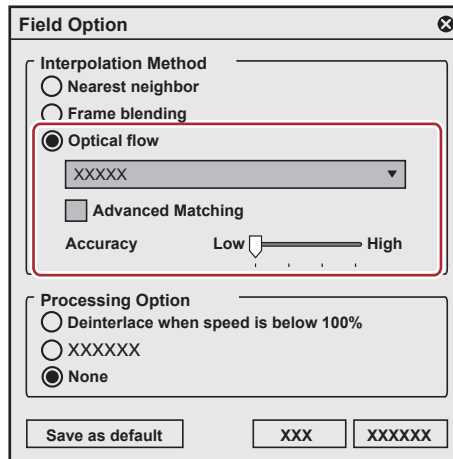
2) Set each item.

- To decrease the playback speed, change [Rate] in [Speed] to lower than 100%.
- Check [Change the Clip Duration on Timeline] to change the duration of clips on the timeline according to the speed (value of [Rate]) of the clip.

3) Click [Field Option].

- The [Field Option] dialog box appears.
“[Field Option] Dialog Box” (▶ page 261)

4) Select [Optical flow] for [Interpolation Method], and click the list button to set the quality.



- If [Optical flow] has been selected for [Interpolation Method], selecting [None] for [Processing Option] will make the playback smoother.

5) Click [OK].

6) Click [OK].

- An orange line is displayed on a clip whose speed has been changed.

- [Optical flow] can also be used for progressive/interlace (P/I) conversion or frame rate conversion. If a progressive source is placed on an interlace timeline with the same frame rate (for example, 29.97p source is placed on the 59.94i timeline), the video can be played back smoothly due to P/I conversion in [Optical flow].

Video Layout

Transforming/Rotating Video

The layouter can be used to divide the screen, and video images can be placed or rotated in each screen, or keys can be set to each screen and assigned functions.

You can also use the motion tracking feature to make the image on the other track to follow a moving subject or to adjust the image so that the moving subject always appear on the center of the angular field.

Motion Tracking ([Layouter])

You can use two types of motion tracking using [Layouter].

Use [Anchor Mode (this layer)] to adjust the image so that the moving subject always appears on the center of the screen.

Use [Chase Mode (lower layer)] to make the image on the other track to follow a moving subject.

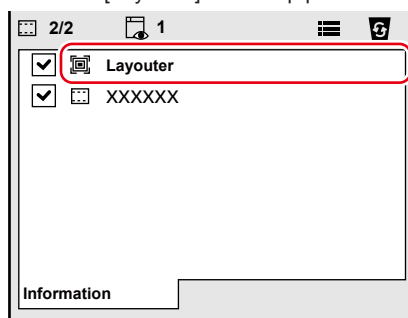
In addition to the position of the tracking target, the size and rotation will be analyzed, and the analysis result can be applied.

1) Place clips on tracks accordingly depending on the type of motion tracking.

- When the timeline is right-clicked and [Default] is clicked, the key frame is set to the right-clicked position on the layout currently set to [Default] in the preset (i.e. without any changes made to the layout).
- To delete a key frame, right-click the key frame and click [Delete].
- When the item name of a parameter is right-clicked and [Clear parameter of (item)] is clicked, all key frames for that item are deleted.
- Parameter items can be expanded, and copy, paste and other edit operations can be performed by right-clicking on the key frame.
- Parameter items can be expanded, and the method of interpolation can be changed by right-clicking the key frame. Select from [Hold] (fix layout up to next key frame), [Line] (change intuitively) and [Bezier] (change smoothly). The key changes shape when the interpolation method is changed.
- Parameter items can be expanded, and the parameters of the key frame can be edited by setting to chart display. The interpolation curve can also be edited by dragging handles when the interpolation method is [Bezier].



- All set keys can be selected by right-clicking the timeline and clicking [Select All].
- Key frames can be added to the position of the timeline cursor by double-clicking the preview.
- When [Shift] + [V] on the keyboard are pressed, a key frame is added to all parameters with a valid key frame setting at the timeline cursor position.
- When [V] on the keyboard is pressed, a key frame is added to the currently selected parameter at the timeline cursor position.

6) Click [OK].

- An orange line is displayed on clips set with the layout.

Trimming Clips

Trimming function allows fine adjustments of In and Out points of a clip placed on the timeline while viewing the video on a window. You can also move the boundary between clips and In and Out points of video/audio separately.

Trimming operation is performed by cut points. Clicking on a point near the In or Out point of a clip shows yellow and green lines. The yellow line appears at the currently selected point, and the green line appears on a point to be changed by the trimming operation.

There are three major methods of trimming. Dragging a cut point in the standard mode, switching to the trim mode and operating on the dedicated window that appears, and using shortcut keys.

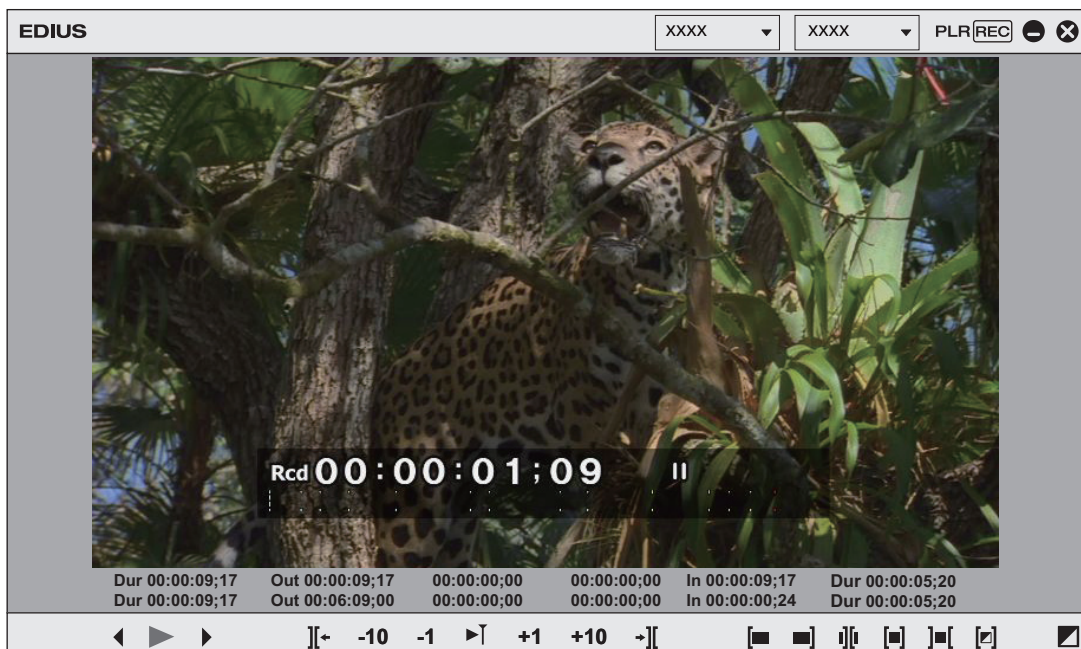
About the Trim Mode

You can switch to the trim mode to perform editing to fine-adjust video in 1 frame units or 10 frame units by button operation. Trimming is also possible in the standard mode by dragging the mouse.

Switching to the Trim Mode

1) Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Trimming Mode].

- The preview window switches from the standard mode to the trim mode.



- The current trimming type is displayed on the status bar of the timeline window.

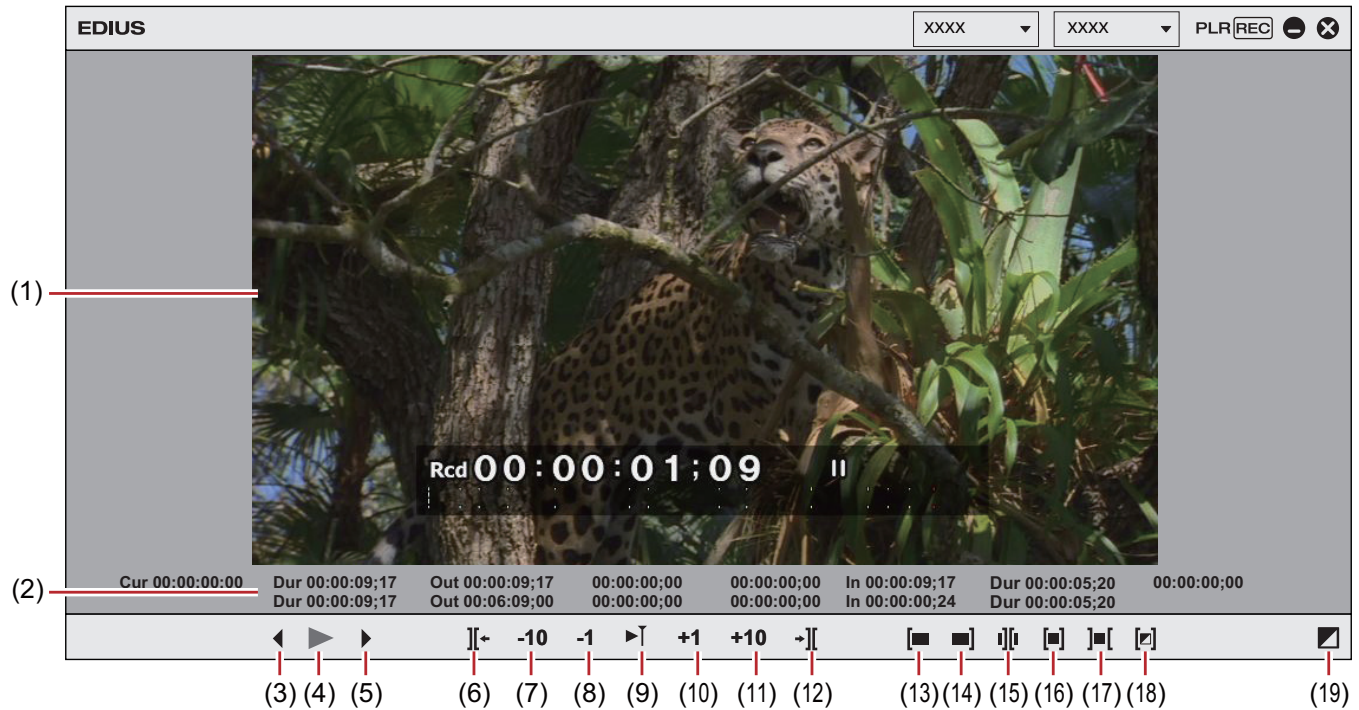

Buttons exclusively for trimming and the preview are displayed in this window. When the trim mode button is clicked, the cut point corresponding to the trim mode is automatically selected. Trimming can also be performed more accurately by entering numerical values to the timecode for trimming.

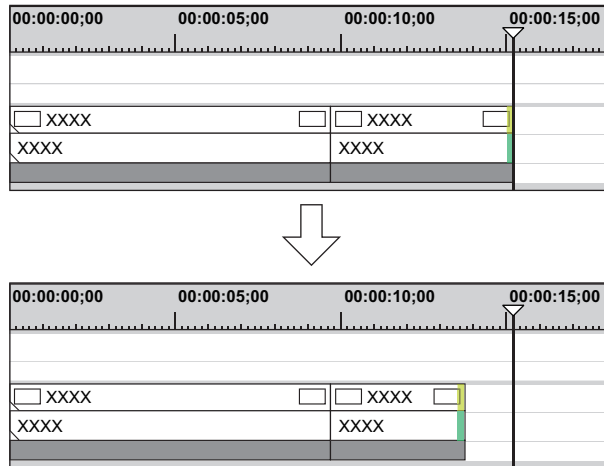

In the Overwrite Mode

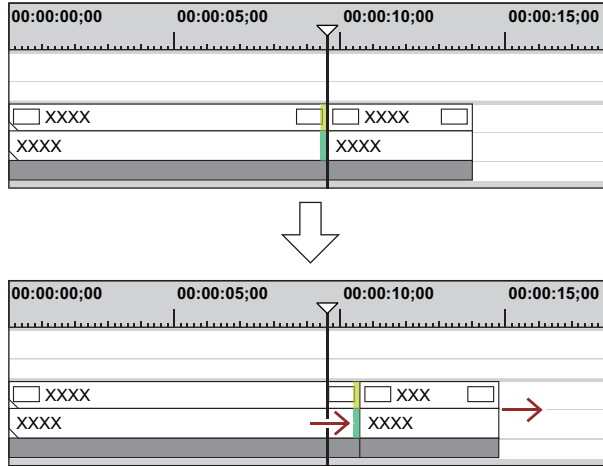
If you extend a clip, the subsequent clips shorten. If you extend the clip longer than the subsequent clips, all subsequent clips will be overwritten.



- Even if the ripple mode is off or the overwrite mode is set, neighboring clips can be fixed to prevent subsequent clips from being overwritten by mistake during trimming.

In the Insert Mode

If you extend a clip, the subsequent clips are shifted backward.

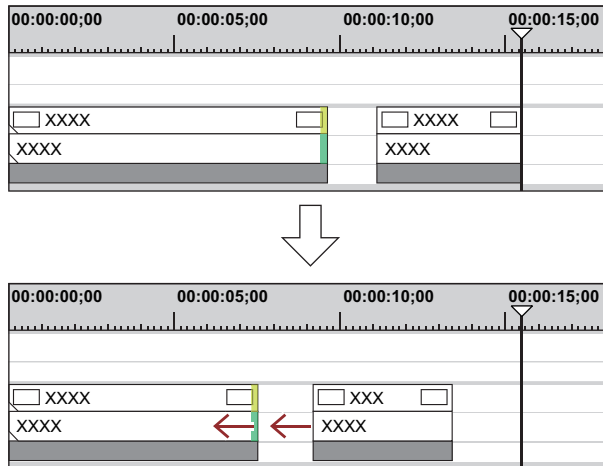

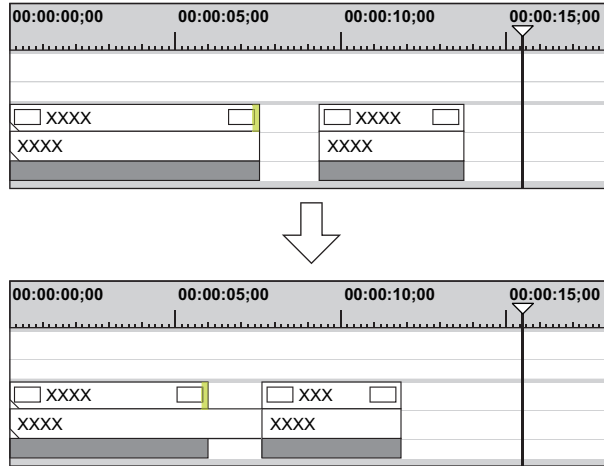
You can trim only the video section or audio section of video clips with audio.

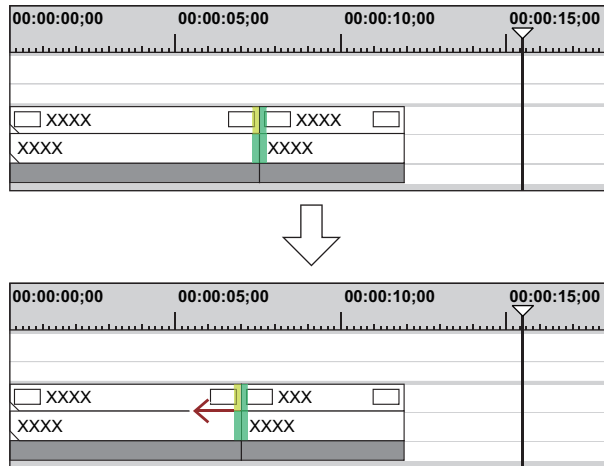

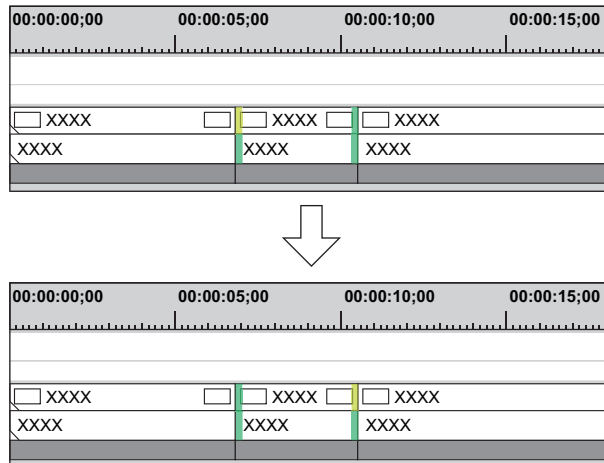

Slip Trim

You can change the area of the clip to use, without changing the length or position of the clip. The length or position of the neighboring clips remain unchanged.





- You cannot perform trimming if the trimming clip has no margin. When trimming clips with margins, trimming can be performed by the length of the margin of the clip.

Rolling Trim

Shift the start and end points of the previous and subsequent clips without changing the length of specific clips.



Adjust the range to be used while checking the video displayed on the preview window.



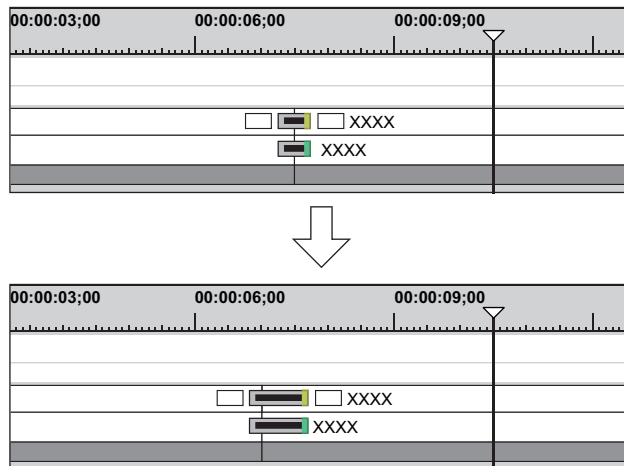
- You cannot perform trimming if the neighboring clip has no margin. When trimming clips with margins, trimming can be performed by the length of the margin of the clip.

Trimming Transitions/Audio Cross Fades

You can trim the length of transitions (clip transitions, track transitions)/audio cross fades in the same way as clips.

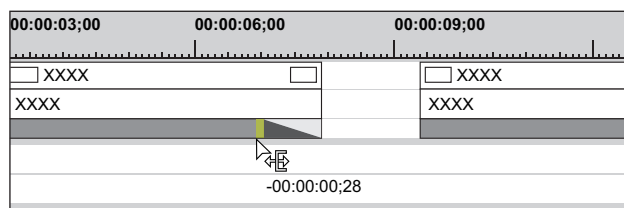

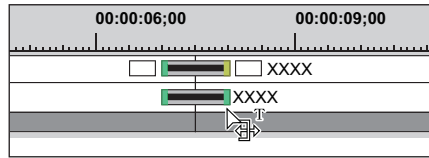

Trimming by Shortcut Keys

The In and Out point sides of the timeline cursor can be trimmed by shortcut keys.

You can perform trimming from the In point up the timeline cursor by [N] on the keyboard and from the timeline cursor up to the Out point by [M]. The trimming type changes according to the keyboard combination.



1) Select the clip to be trimmed.

Adding Clip Markers to a Clip Placed on Timeline

- If you use a keyboard shortcut to add a clip marker in the same color to the position of an existing clip marker, the existing clip marker will be deleted. When multiple clip markers have been set, all of the existing clip markers will be deleted.

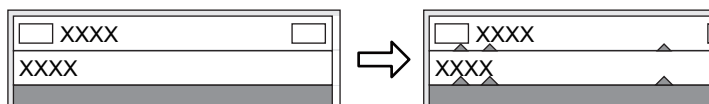

You can add a comment to clip markers that have been set.

1) Display a clip set with a clip marker on the Player.

2) Right-click on the clip marker on the position bar, and click [Edit Clip Marker].

- When multiple clip markers are set on the same position on the position bar, [Edit Clip Marker] is not available.

3) In the [Edit Marker] dialog box, enter a comment and click [OK].

- Entered comments are displayed on the Player when the slider is moved to the clip marker. When a clip marker with range has been set, the comment is displayed while the slider on the Player is in the In and Out point range of the clip marker.
Comments are displayed on the Player also during playback. However, comments displayed during playback are only those of clip markers with range.

Alternative

- Click the [Comments] field in the [Clip Marker] list.
- Right-click the clip marker list, and click [Edit Marker].
- Move the slider on the Player to the clip marker, click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Edit Marker]. Note that if multiple clip markers are set on the same position on the position bar, [Edit Marker] is not available.
- Comment carriage return: **[Ctrl] + [Enter]**



- You can also edit entered comments by the same operation.
- Additions, deletions and edits made to clip markers are automatically reflected on clips in the bin. To leave behind the information of a clip before it is edited, register that clip to the bin as a different clip in advance.

When you add, delete, and edit the clip marker with a clip on the timeline displayed on the Player, register it to the bin as another clip, if necessary.
“Registering Clips on the Player to the Bin” (► page 196)
- When a clip set with a clip marker has been placed on the timeline, the comment is displayed on the Recorder when the timeline cursor is moved to the position of the clip marker. When a clip marker with range has been set, the comment is displayed on the Recorder while the timeline cursor is between In and Out points of the clip marker.
Comments are displayed on the Player also during playback. However, comments displayed during playback are only those of clip markers with range.

Note

- When the focus is on the Recorder, comments cannot be entered to clip markers.

Changing Color of Clip Marker

The set color of clip markers can be changed.

1) Display a clip set with a clip marker on the Player.

- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Import Marker List].

- When the focus is on the Recorder, clip marker lists cannot be imported.
- The color of all clip markers imported in the CSV format is orange.
- XML format files cannot be imported to EDIUS version 9.2 and earlier.

- When the focus is on the Recorder, clip marker lists cannot be exported.
- Exporting [Color] information is not supported for CSV format files. All clip markers exported in CSV format will be orange clip markers.

Setting Marker to Timeline

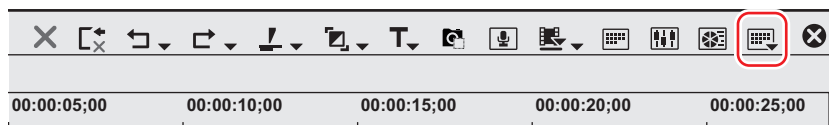


- When exported to DVD/BD, orange sequence markers become chapters and comments become chapter titles. Chapter titles can be edited at the time of export.

3) Click [Toggle Sequence Marker/Clip Marker] in the [Marker] palette.

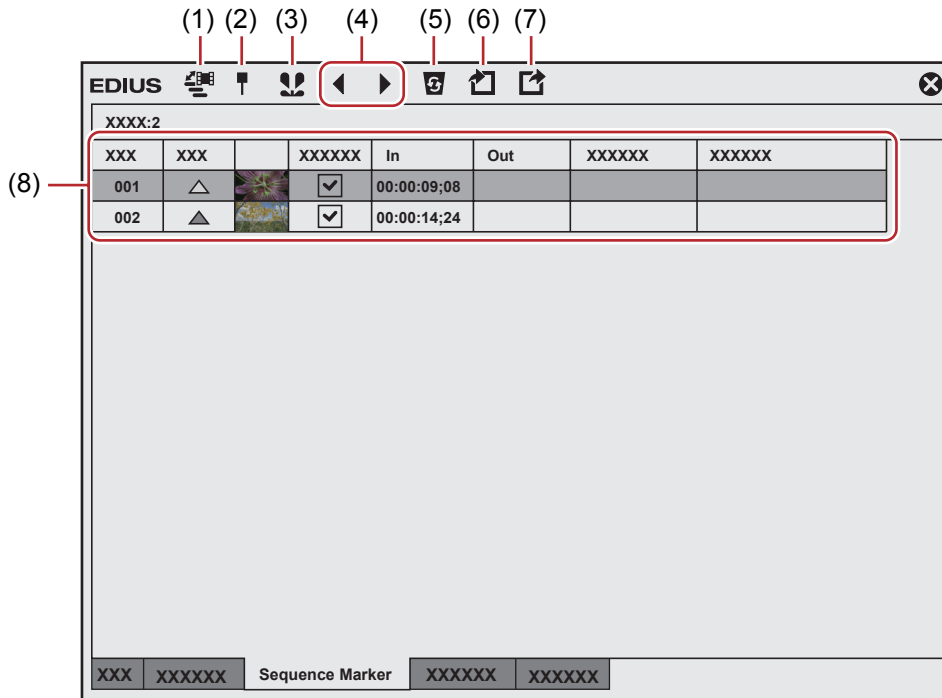

- You can also delete all sequence markers in a single operation by the following operation.

Using Sequence Markers

Entering Comments to Sequence Markers

You can add a comment to sequence markers that have been set.



- When exporting to DVD/BD, sequence marker comments become chapter titles. Chapter titles can be edited at export to DVD/BD.

1) Right-click a sequence marker on the time scale, and click [Edit Sequence marker].

- When multiple sequence markers are set on the same position on the time scale, [Edit Sequence marker] is not available.

2) In the [Edit Marker] dialog box, enter a comment and click [OK].

- Entered comments are displayed on the Recorder when the slider is moved to the sequence marker. When a sequence marker with range has been set, the comment is displayed while the timeline cursor of the Recorder is on a position between In and Out points of the sequence marker.

Comments are displayed on the Recorder also during playback. However, comments displayed during playback are only those of sequence markers with range.

Alternative

- Click the [Comment] field in the [Sequence Marker] list.
- Right-click the sequence marker list, and click [Edit Marker].
- Move the timeline cursor to the sequence marker on the time scale, click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Edit Marker]. Note that if multiple sequence markers are set on the position of the timeline cursor, [Edit Marker] is not available.
- Comment carriage return: [Ctrl] + [Enter]



- You can also edit entered comments by the same operation.
- By right-clicking on the time scale and clicking [Edit Sequence marker], you can add a sequence marker on the position of the timeline cursor and edit the comment.

Changing Color of Sequence Marker

The set color of sequence markers can be changed.

1) On the [Sequence Marker] list, click [Color] of a sequence marker to change the color and select a desired color.

- Selecting multiple sequence markers can change the color at once.



- The color of the sequence marker that can be set are [Orange], [Red], [Yellow], [Blue], [Pink], and [Purple].
- If you add the setting button of each color of sequence marker to the [Sequence Marker] list, you can set the sequence markers of specific color simply by clicking the button.

- When data is exported using the [F4V] exporter, the [Color] information of markers are not maintained.

Moving to Sequence Marker Positions

You can jump to the position of set sequence markers.

1) Click [Go to Previous Marker] or [Go to Next marker] in the [Sequence Marker] list.

- The timeline cursor moves to the front and back sequence markers.

Alternative

- In the sequence marker list, double-click on the [No.] field of the sequence marker on the position to move to.
- Right-click the sequence marker list, and click [Go to Previous Marker] or [Go to Next marker].
- Right-click the time scale, and click [Go to Previous Sequence Marker] or [Go To Next Sequence marker].The timeline cursor moves to the previous or next sequence marker.
- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Go to Previous Sequence Marker] or [Go to Next Sequence Marker].
- Double-click a sequence marker on the time scale.
- Moving to sequence marker positions: [Shift] + [Page up]/[Shift] + [Page down]

Importing Sequence Marker Lists (Import)

You can import sequence marker list files in XML or CSV format.

1) Click [Import Marker List] in the [Sequence Marker] list.

- “[Sequence Marker] List” (▶ page 295)

2) In the [Open] dialog box, select an XML or CSV file, and click [Open].

Alternative

- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Import Marker List].
- Right-click the time scale, and click [Import Sequence Marker List].
- Right-click the sequence marker list, and click [Import Marker List].

Note

- When the focus is on the Player, sequence marker lists cannot be imported.
- The color of all sequence markers imported in the CSV format is orange.
- XML format files cannot be imported to EDIUS version 9.2 and earlier.

Exporting Sequence Marker Lists (Export)

You can export sequence marker list in the [Sequence Marker] list to an XML or CSV file.

1) Click [Export Marker List] in the [Sequence Marker] list.

- “[Sequence Marker] List” (▶ page 295)

2) In the [Save As] dialog box, specify a file name and save destination.

3) Select the output format, and click [Save].

Alternative

- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Export Marker List].

- Right-click the time scale, and click [Export Sequence marker list].
- Right-click the sequence marker list, and click [Export Marker List].



- If the exported file is to be used on version 7.3 or earlier, save it in “Ver.2”.
- If it is to be used on version 7.4 or later, save it in “Ver.3” that supports exporting information of [Anchor].
- If it is to be used on version 9.3 or later, save it in “Ver.4” that supports exporting information of [Anchor] and [Color].

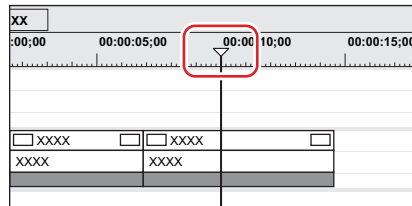

Playing Back by Scrubbing

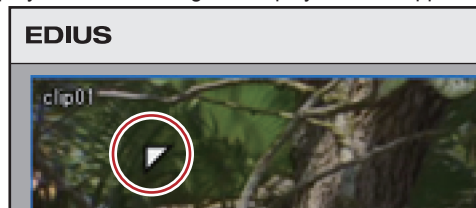
You can drag the timeline cursor forwards and backwards and move to the position to confirm on the timeline.

1) Drag the timeline cursor forwards and backwards.

- The timeline cursor moves, and its frame is displayed on the Recorder.



- When Recorder-related operations are being performed in the dual mode, a blue line is displayed around the Recorder.
- When the start frame of the timeline is displayed, a white triangle is displayed in the upper left corner.



Playing Back with Recorder Operation Buttons

You can play back or move clips in individual frame units by using the operation buttons on the Recorder.

“Playback with Player Operation Buttons” (▶ page 191)

“Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)

1) Click [Play] on the Recorder.

- Playback starts on the Recorder.

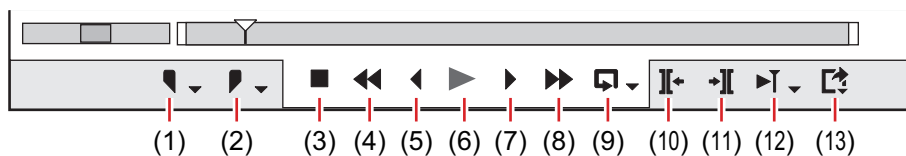
2) Click [Stop] on the Recorder.

- Playback stops.

Alternative

- Playing back Recorder: [Enter]

Recorder Operation Buttons



(1)	[Set In]	Set the In point to any position on the timeline. [I] “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (▶ page 237)
(2)	[Set Out]	Set the Out point to any position on the timeline. [O] “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (▶ page 237)

(3)	[Stop]	Stop playing back the timeline. [K], [Shift] + [J]
(4)	[Review]	Rewind the timeline. Each click switches the playback speed in the reverse direction between 4 times and 12 times. [J]^{*1}
(5)	[Previous Frame]	Each click rewinds the timeline one frame at a time in the reverse direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the same speed in the reverse direction. [←]
(6)	[Play]	Play the timeline in the forward direction. When this button is clicked during playback, playback pauses. Click again to restart playback. [Enter], [Space]
(7)	[Next Frame]	Each click advances the timeline one frame at a time in the forward direction. Keeping this button clicked plays back the source at the same speed in the forward direction. [→]
(8)	[Fast Forward]	Fast forward the timeline. Each click switches the playback speed in the forward direction between 4 times and 12 times. [L]^{*2}
(9)	[Loop]	Repeat playback between In and Out points of the timeline. If no In point has been set, playback is repeated from the beginning of the timeline, and if no Out point has been set, playback is repeated until the end of the timeline. The entire timeline can also be played back as a loop. [Ctrl] + [Space]
(10)	[Previous Edit Point]	Move the timeline cursor to the edit point (e.g. the border of clip, In and Out points of the timeline) at the left side of the timeline cursor position. [A], [Ctrl] + [←]
(11)	[Next Edit Point]	Move the timeline cursor to the edit point at the right side of the timeline cursor position. [S], [Ctrl] + [→]
(12)	[Play the Current Area]	Play back the area before and after the timeline cursor.
(13)	[Export]	Display output (import) related menus.

*1 Each press of [J] on the keyboard switches the rewind speed in 6 levels between 2 to 32 times. Press [L] to slow down the rewind speed. Press this key with the source paused to play back at the same speed in the reverse direction.

*2 Each press of [L] on the keyboard switches the fast-forward speed in 6 levels between 2 to 32 times. Press [J] to slow down the fast-forward speed. Press it while pausing to play back at the same speed in the forward direction.



- When playback processing is slow, try the following operations.
 - Use the draft preview or frame skip playback.
 - “Draft Preview” (▶ page 312)
 - “Frame Skip Playback” (▶ page 313)
 - Click [Play] with [Shift] on the keyboard held down. (Playback is performed after the data is temporarily stored in the playback buffer. The playback buffer can be changed by [Application] in [System Settings] → [Playback].)
 - “[Playback]” (▶ page 104)
 - Render clips or a part of the timeline.
 - “Rendering only Overload/Load Areas” (▶ page 309)
 - “Rendering Clips/Transitions” (▶ page 310)
- To move the timeline cursor to the start and end of the timeline, press [Home] and [End] on the keyboard, respectively.
- Moving 10 frames back: **[Shift] + [←]**
- Moving 10 frames forward: **[Shift] + [→]**

Playing Back with Shuttle/Slider

You can play back a clip by dragging the shuttle or slider on the Recorder.

“Control Area Settings” (▶ page 156)

1) Drag the shuttle/slider.

- A frame at the slider position is displayed on the Recorder.

Alternative

- Shuttle (fast forward): **[Ctrl] + [L]**
Each click of [Ctrl] + [L] on the keyboard switches the fast-forward speed in 12 levels between 1/16 to 32 times. Press [Ctrl] + [J] on the keyboard to slow down.
- Shuttle (rewind): **[Ctrl] + [J]**
Each click of [Ctrl] + [J] on the keyboard switches the rewind speed in 12 levels between 1/16 to 32 times. Press [Ctrl] + [L] on the keyboard to slow down.

Shuttle/Slider



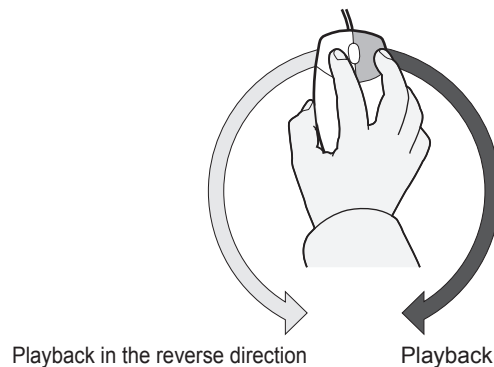
(1)	Shuttle	Drag the shuttle to the left and right to play back in the reverse and forward directions, respectively. Release dragging to return the shuttle to the center and pause playback. The playback speed can be selected in 21 levels both in the forward and reverse directions, from 1/20 to 16 times.
(2)	Sliders	Click any position on the position bar to move the slider and display the frame for that position. You can also drag the slider.
(3)	Position bar	Indicates the timeline on the Recorder.

Playing Back with Mouse (Mouse Gesture)

You can play back a clip by moving the mouse on the Recorder.

1) Position the mouse cursor on the Recorder, and move the mouse as if to draw a circle, with the right mouse button clicked.

- Draw the circle clockwise to playback in the forward direction, and counterclockwise in the reverse direction. The playback speed changes in proportion to the speed of the mouse action.



Alternative

- Place the mouse cursor on the Recorder, and rotate the mouse wheel.

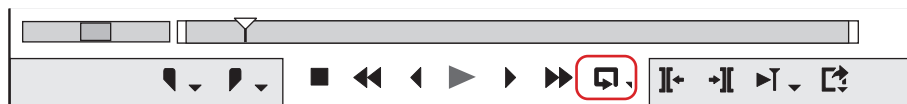
Playing Back between In and Out Points on the Timeline (Loop Playback)

Repeat playback between In and Out points of the timeline.

1) Setting the In and Out Points to the Timeline

- “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (▶ page 237)

2) Click [Loop] on the Recorder.



- Playback is repeated between In and Out points of the timeline.
- Playback starts from the current position of the timeline cursor.

Alternative

- Loop playback: [Ctrl] + [Space]

3) Click [Stop] on the Recorder.

- Playback stops.

Playing Back the Area around the Timeline Cursor

You can play back the area around the timeline cursor.

- 1) Move the timeline cursor to the point from which you want to start playing back.
- 2) Click [Play the Current Area] on the Recorder.



- You can repeatedly play back the area around the timeline cursor.

- 3) Click [Stop] on the Recorder.

- Playback stops.



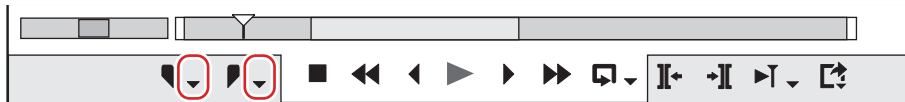
- You can also play back around the nearest cut point placed before the timeline cursor for the specified duration. Click the [Play the Current Area] list button, and click [Play around Cut Point (1 Sec)], [Play around Cut Point (2 Sec)] or [Play around Cut Point (3 Sec)].
- You can set the preliminary operation time (Preroll) at [Preview] in [User Settings] → [Playback].

Jumping to In and Out Points on the Timeline

You can jump to In and Out points on the timeline.

- 1) Click the [Set In] ([Set Out]) list button on the Recorder.



- 2) Click [Go to In Point] ([Go to Out Point]).

- “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (▶ page 237)

Alternative

- Click [Marker] on the menu bar, and click [Go to In Point] ([Go to Out Point]).
- Right-click the slider on the Recorder, and click [Go to In Point] ([Go to Out Point]).
- Right-click the time scale, and click [Go to In Point] ([Go to Out Point]).
- Right-click the timeline cursor, and click [Go to In Point] ([Go to Out Point]).
- Jumping to the In and Out points on the timeline: **[Q]/[W]**

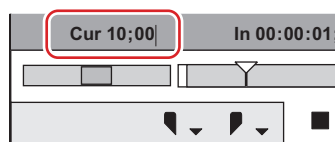
Entering the Timecode to Jump to

You can jump to a specified position on the timeline by entering the numerical values for the timecode at that position.

- 1) Click on the Recorder.
- 2) Enter the timecode with the numerical keypad on the keyboard.

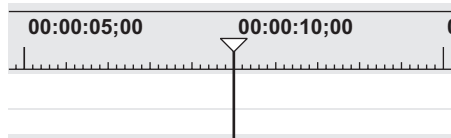

3) Press [Enter] on the keyboard.

- The timeline cursor moves.



- Enter “+” or “-” at the beginning of the number with the numerical keypad, and the timeline cursor will jump forward or backward by the entered number.

Match Frame

This function acquires the timecode of the frame displayed on the Player (or Recorder), and jumps to the position matching the timecode on the timeline (or Player). For example, you can use match frame when switching the video image of an interview to another video image of the same interview which was recorded from a different angle using 2 cameras, to smoothly switch the image cuts without any interruption in motion or sound. Match frame is available even for source video taken from equipment that can be controlled on a deck.

Jumping from Player to Timeline

After acquiring the timecode of the clip displayed on the Player, jump to the corresponding position on the timeline clip and display it on the Recorder.

The timeline cursor is jumped to the timeline position matching the timecode of the specified source.

1) Play back a clip on the Player, and display the frame to be jumped to.

2) Click [Match Frame (Player to Recorder)] on the Player.



- The timeline cursor moves, and the matching frame is displayed on the Recorder.

Alternative

- Jumping from Player to the timeline: **[Ctrl] + [F]**



- By default, [Match Frame (Player to Recorder)] is not displayed. Before performing the operation, set to display the buttons on the Player. **“Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)**
- Clips containing the timecode of the frame currently displayed on the Player can be searched in the bin by the following operation.
 - Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Search Bin] → [Including Cursor (Player)].
 - Searching bin (Player TC): **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [F]**

Jumping from the Timelines to Source Clip

Display the matching frame of the source clip at the timeline cursor position on the Player.

Match frame is possible on decks if the source is from a deck, or match frame is possible on files if the source is a file.

1) Select the track where the target clip is placed.

- **“Selecting Tracks” (▶ page 225)**

2) Move the timeline cursor to display the frame to be jumped to on the Recorder.

3) Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Match Frame] → [Display Source Clip].

- The matching frame is displayed on the Player.

Alternative

- Displaying source clip: **[Alt] + [F]**



- When the source currently displayed on the Player is a file, [Match Frame (Recorder to Player)] performs match frame on that file. When the source is from a deck, match frame is performed on the deck.
- When the source currently displayed on the Player is a file, [Match Frame (Recorder to Source)] displays the clip currently selecting match frame on the timeline, and performs match frame. When the source is from a deck, match frame is performed on the deck.
- You can search for clips with timecodes of the timeline clips in the bin by the following operation. The [Search results] folder is created in the folder view of the bin.
 - Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Search Bin] → [Including Cursor (Recorder)].
 - Searching clips at the timeline cursor position in the bin: **[Shift] + [F]****“Searching for Clips on the Timeline in the Bin” (▶ page 245)**
- The clip can be displayed on the Player by clicking and selecting the clip on the timeline and performing the following operation.
 - Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Show in Player].
 - Displaying selected clip on the Player: **[Shift] + [Y]**
- In scenes set with a transition, 2 clips overlap each other on the same track. To execute the match frame function on overlapping clips, you can set the clip to acquire the timecode in before or after the clip.
 - **“[Match Frame]” (▶ page 119)**

Synchronizing the Player and the Timeline (Gang Mode)

Switch to the gang mode to synchronize the cursor positions or In and Out points of the Player and the timeline.

Note

- Sources displayed in the deck mode cannot be synchronized.

Switching to the Gang Mode

1) Click [Set Gang Mode] on the Player.

- Each click switches the mode on and off.



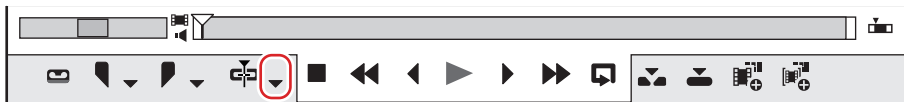
- By default, [Set Gang Mode] is not displayed. Before performing the operation, set to display the buttons on the Player.
 - **“Operation Button Settings” (▶ page 150)**

Synchronizing Cursor Positions

1) Move the slider on the Player to the position to be synchronized.

2) Move the timeline cursor to the position to be synchronized.

3) Click the [Set Gang Mode] list button on the Player.



4) Confirm that [Cursor] is checked.

5) Switch to the gang mode.

- **“Switching to the Gang Mode” (▶ page 306)**
- The cursors of the Player and the timeline are synchronized based on the current cursor position. The cursor positions to be synchronized can be changed by the following operation. After unchecking [Cursor] and moving the cursor of the Player or the timeline, check [Cursor] again.

Synchronizing the In and Out Points

- 1) Set the In (Out) point on the Player to the position to be synchronized.
- 2) Set the In (Out) point on the timeline to the position to be synchronized.
- 3) Click the [Set Gang Mode] list button on the Player.



- 4) Click [In] ([Out]) to check the item.

5) Switch to the gang mode.

- “Switching to the Gang Mode” (▶ page 306)
- The In (Out) points of the Player and the timeline are synchronized based on the current In (Out) point position. The In (Out) point positions to be synchronized can be changed by the following operation. After unchecking [In] ([Out]) and changing the In (Out) point of the Player or the timeline, check [In] ([Out]) again.

Smooth Playback

If multiple effects and titles has been added, real time processing may not catch up the timeline playback.

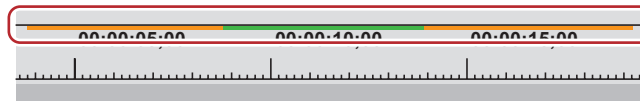
This real time processing is delayed due to the heavy data loaded on the playback operation. While playback is performed, the lines of the parts where rendering is required are displayed in red (overloaded) or in orange (loaded).

Performing rendering enables smoother playback.

Color Coding of Time Scale

Realtime processing sometimes cannot keep up when playing back a timeline. The line of the part judged as requiring rendering when playing back changes color.

The line colors indicate the following states.



Line color	Timeline state
No line	No clip exists.
Blue	A clip matching the project settings is placed.
Light blue	Playback is keeping up. (Rendering is sometimes required.)
Orange	Rendering option (load area)
Red	Rendering is required (overload area).
Pink	Rendering job has already been registered to the Render Service, or rendering is in process in the background.
Green	Already rendered

- Rendering is judged based on the remaining buffer set by [Application] in [System Settings] → [Render], and a red line is displayed for overload areas when the remaining buffer is less than the preset value.
 - “[Render]” (▶ page 105)
- When data such as CG animation has been placed on the timeline by one frame at a time as consecutive still images, rendering the range will not lighten the load of playback processing. In this case, use the [Render and Add to Timeline] item to replace with the exported clip.
 - “Exporting Video Clips from Timeline” (▶ page 310)
- Rendering is enabled even if the clip becomes out-of-position by a ripple delete, for example.
- In the following cases, the color of the line of the time scale returns to the state before the rendering process started.
 - The rendering job has been canceled by operation from GV Job Monitor.
 - The rendering process has failed.

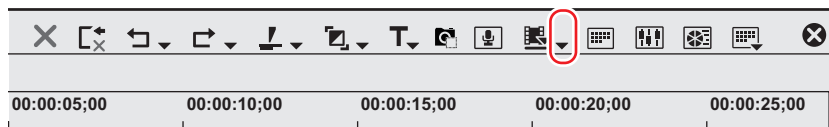
Note

- Tracks with mute set to video parts cannot be rendered.
- It is recommended to export the file using the exporter if you need to use rendered clips.
“Exporting in File Formats” (▶ page 444)
- Temporary files created at the time of rendering are usually saved in the “rendered” folder under the project folder temporarily. Make sure that there is enough disk space for the files before starting rendering.
“Manually Deleting Temporary Files” (▶ page 311)
- Files created by [Render and Add to Timeline] are saved in the “RenderAndPaste” folder under the project folder. Make sure that there is enough disk space for the files before starting rendering.
“Exporting Video Clips from Timeline” (▶ page 310)

Rendering Overload Areas of the Entire Sequence

Render all the areas that are judged as overload (red) in the entire sequence.

1) Click the [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] list button on the timeline.



2) Click [Render Sequence] → [Render Overload Area].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service, and the color of the line of the time scale changes to pink. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.
“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)
- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has been completed, the color of the line of the time scale changes to green.

Alternative

- Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render Sequence] → [Render Red Area].
- Rendering overload areas on the entire sequence: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [Q]**



- Overload (red) and load (orange) areas on the entire sequence can be rendered at a time by the following operation.
 - Click the [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] list button, and click [Render All] → [Render Loaded Area].
 - Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render Sequence] → [Render Orange Area].
 - Rendering (load areas) on the entire sequence: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [Alt] + [Q]**
- When In and Out points have been set on the timeline, only the range between the In and Out points can be rendered.
“Rendering Overload Areas between In and Out Points” (▶ page 309)
- After rendering process has started, if the project is edited in a way that the range to be rendered changes, the rendering job will be canceled.

Rendering Overload Areas in the Entire Project

Render all areas that are judged as overload (red) in the entire project that comprises multiple sequences.

1) Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render Entire Project] → [Render Red Area].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service, and the color of the line of the time scale changes to pink. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.
“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)
- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has been completed, the color of the line of the time scale changes to green.



- Overload (red) and load (yellow) areas in the entire project can be rendered at a time. Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render Entire Project] → [Render Orange Area].
- After rendering process has started, if the project is edited in a way that the range to be rendered changes, the rendering job will be canceled.

Rendering only Overload/Load Areas

Render only the areas that are judged as overload (red) or load (orange).

1) Right-click the line of overload (red) or load (orange) areas on the time scale, and click [Render].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service, and the color of the line of the time scale changes to pink. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has been completed, the color of the line of the time scale changes to green.



- After rendering process has started, if the project is edited in a way that the range to be rendered changes, the rendering job will be canceled.

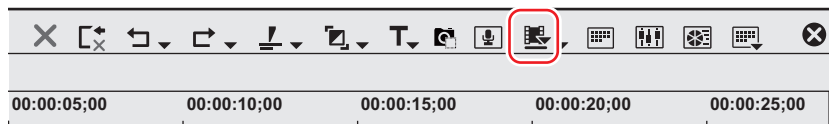
Rendering Overload Areas between In and Out Points

Render areas judged as overload (red) between In and Out points on the timeline.

1) Setting the In and Out Points to the Timeline

- “Setting In/Out Points and Placing Clips” (▶ page 240)

2) Click [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] on the timeline.



- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service, and the color of the line of the time scale changes to pink. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has been completed, the color of the line of the time scale changes to green.

Alternative

- Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render In/Out] → [Render Red Area].
- Click the [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] list button, and click [Render In/Out] → [Render Overload Area].
- Right-click the time scale, and click [Render In/Out] → [Render Overload Area].
- Rendering overload areas between In and Out points: **[Ctrl] + [Q]**



- All areas judged to be red, orange and light blue between In and Out points can be rendered by the following operation.
 - Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render In/Out] → [All].
 - Click the [Render In/Out] list button, and click [Render In/Out] → [All].
 - Right-click the time scale, and click [Render In/Out] → [All].
 - Rendering between In and Out points (all): **[Shift] + [Alt] + [Q]**
- Overload (red) and load (orange) areas between In and Out points can be rendered at a time by the following operation.
 - Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render In/Out] → [Render Orange Area].
 - Click the [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] list button, and click [Render In/Out] → [Render Loaded Area].
 - Right-click the time scale, and click [Render In/Out] → [Render Loaded Area].
 - Rendering between In and Out points (load area): **[Ctrl] + [Alt] + [Q]**
- After rendering process has started, if the project is edited in a way that the range to be rendered changes, the rendering job will be canceled.

Rendering Around the Timeline Cursor Position

Render only overload areas (red) or load areas (orange) around the timeline cursor position.

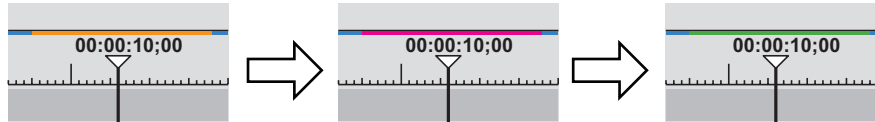
1) Move the timeline cursor to the area to be rendered.

2) Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render Cursor Area].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service, and the color of the line of the time scale changes to pink. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

- Areas of the same line color on the time scale are rendered around the timeline cursor position. When there is a transition in same-color lines, the rendered area becomes the area up to the In or Out point of the transition.
- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has been completed, the color of the line of the time scale changes to green.



- After rendering process has started, if the project is edited in a way that the range to be rendered changes, the rendering job will be canceled.

Rendering Clips/Transitions

Perform rendering in individual clip or transition units.

Note

- If you perform clip rendering on a clip with alpha effect, alpha information will no longer be applied.
- Keys, transparencies or transitions between tracks (effects set in the mixer area) cannot be rendered. In this case, take the alternate method to render a part of the timeline.

1) Right-click the clip to be rendered, and click [Render].

- To render a transition, right-click the transition and click [Render].
- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service, and pink lines appear on the clip. When a transition has been rendered, the lines at the center of the transition change to pink. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has been completed, the lines on the clip change to green. When a transition has been rendered, the lines at the center of the transition change to green.

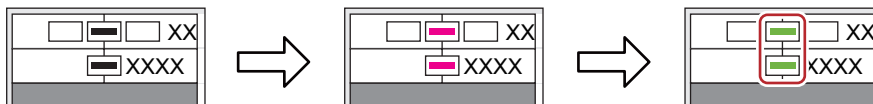

- Rendering clips/transitions: **[Shift] + [G]**



- If the clip or transition to be rendered is edited after rendering process has started, the rendering job may be canceled.

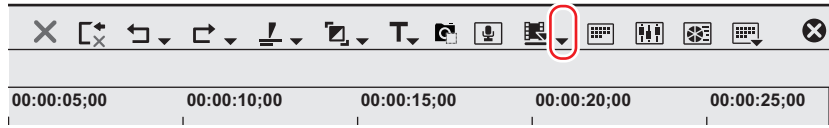
Exporting Video Clips from Timeline

Render between In and Out points on the timeline, and export only video clips as a file in AVI format. Exported clips are placed on the V/VA track.

1) Set the range of the clip to export from the timeline with the In and Out points.

- “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (▶ page 237)

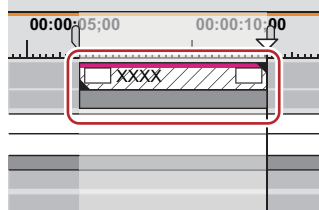
2) Click the [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] list button on the timeline.



3) Click [Render and Add to Timeline].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service.

An offline clip is placed on the V/VA track on the timeline, and a pink line appears on the clip. If there is no space to place a clip on the track, a new V track is added.



- Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- When the rendering process has completed, the offline clip changes into an online clip, and the pink line on the clip disappears.

Alternative

- Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Render and Add to Timeline].
- Right-click the time scale, and click [Render and Add to Timeline].
- Exporting video clips from the timeline: **[Shift] + [Q]**



- The exported clip is saved in the “RenderAndPaste” folder under the project folder.
- Once a rendering process has started, the rendering job will not be canceled even if the project is edited. To cancel a rendering job, use GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

Note

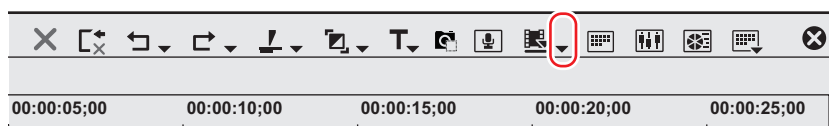
- Title track clips and the track areas set with the mute are exported as black clips.
- If the exported clip is placed on the timeline and any referenced file in the “RenderAndPaste” folder is edited, the clip will become an offline clip.
 “Restoring the Source Link” (▶ page 93)
- Files created by [Render and Add to Timeline] are saved in the “RenderAndPaste” folder under the project folder. Make sure that there is enough disk space for the files before starting rendering.
 In case there is a shortage of capacity of the “RenderAndPaste” folder, delete the files manually.
- To use exported clips in other projects, copy the files to another folder.

Manually Deleting Temporary Files

Manually delete temporary files that are created during rendering.

Temporary files for rendering are saved temporarily in the “rendered” folder created in the project folder. Temporary files that are not referenced by a project are automatically deleted when the project ends, however, it is recommended to manually delete them when the “rendered” folder increases in size.

1) Click the [Render In/Out (Render Overload Area)] list button on the timeline.



2) Select [Delete Render Files] and click [Files that are not Used] or [All Files].

Alternative

- Click [Render] on the menu bar, and click [Delete Temporary Render Files] → [Files Not Used] or [All Files].
- Deleting unused files: **[Alt] + [Q]**

3) Click [Yes].



- Set when to automatically delete invalid rendering files (i.e. files not referenced by a project) at [Application] in [System Settings] → [Render].
 “[Render]” (▶ page 105)
- A temporary file is created in the following cases:
 - When a clip has been exported from the timeline
 - When whole or part of the timeline has been rendered
 - When a clip has been rendered
- Files created by [Render and Add to Timeline] and saved in the “RenderAndPaste” folder will not be deleted even if [Delete Render Files] is executed. In case there is a shortage of capacity of the “RenderAndPaste” folder, delete the files manually.

Note

- The temporary files created in the “rendered” folder can be operated (e.g. renamed, deleted or copied). However, temporary files referenced from a project, such as [Render In/Out], cannot be operated.

Exporting Still Image Clips from the Timeline

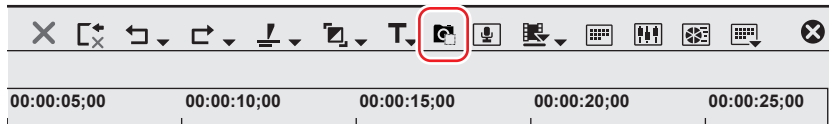
Video images in the selected preview window (Player/Recorder) can be exported as still image clips and registered to the bin.

Example:

To export the frame displayed on the Recorder as a still image

1) On the Recorder, display frames to be saved as still images.

2) Click [Create a Still Image (Save as)] on the timeline.



- The [Save As] dialog box appears.

3) Set a file name, save destination, and [Save as type], and then click [Save].

- The still image is saved in the specified folder, and the still image clip is registered to the bin.

Alternative

- Exporting still image clips from the timeline: **[Ctrl] + [T]**
- Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Create a Still Image]. The still image is saved in the same folder as the project, and the still image clip is registered to the bin.



- Still images are saved as side-by-side in the stereoscopic edit mode.
- Video from a deck also can be saved as still image clips.
- The aspect ratio of still images sometimes is output different from that of the original image depending on the frame size. To output correctly, set to correct the aspect ratio. The settings of still images to export can be changed by [Importer/Exporter] in [System Settings] → [Still Image].
 “[Still Image]” (▶ page 108)

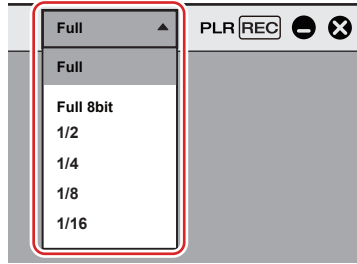
Draft Preview

Reducing image resolution or bit depth for preview improves the performance of real time playback. Although the preview image quality becomes lower, it reduces the load on PC and you can edit data comfortably.

Make use of this feature when you apply heavy-load effects such as [Mask] and [Layouter], or when you play the timeline where high-resolution clips such as 4K are placed.

1) Click [Preview Quality] on the menu bar, and select an item.

- The image quality for preview will be changed according to the selected item.



[Full]	Previews video without changing the resolution and bit depth.
[Full 8bit]	Previews video with the original resolution maintained but with the bit depth changed to 8-bit. This is displayed only for projects with video quantization bitrate of 10-bit.
[1/2]	Previews video in 1/2 of the original resolution.
[1/4]	Previews video in 1/4 of the original resolution.
[1/8]	Previews video in 1/8 of the original resolution.
[1/16]	Previews video in 1/16 of the original resolution.

- Click [Settings] on the menu bar, go through [User Settings] → [Preview] → [Playback], and add the check mark for [Show full quality when Paused], to enable preview in the original image quality when playback is paused.
- When proxy editing is started while [Preview Quality] is set to [Full] or [Full 8bit], the setting is automatically changed to [1/2]. When proxy editing is started while [Preview Quality] is set to lower than [1/2], the setting is maintained. After proxy editing is finished, [Full] is applied for [Preview Quality], regardless of the original setting.

Note

- Depending on the [Preview Quality] setting, the timecode or level meter in the status area may not be displayed.

■ **Playing Back Video with Effects Applied Smoothly**

When heavy-load effects such as [Mask] or [Layouter] are applied on a clip, real time processing may not catch up and the timeline may not be played back smoothly.

Draft preview can be used in such a case. Although the preview image quality becomes lower, it does not take time for converting resolution or bit depth, and the timeline can be played back quickly. If you need to check image details, adding the check mark for [Show full quality when Paused] can let you check the image in the original quality when playback is paused.

■ **Playing Back 4K Video Smoothly**

Draft preview is effective in playback of timeline where the data amount is large due to a case such as heavy usage of high quality 4K image clips.

For example, when [1/2] is selected for [Preview Quality], 4K (3840x2160) video is displayed in the image quality equivalent to Full HD (1920x1080). If you edit video on a notebook PC, selecting [1/4] and previewing in full screen can maintain an adequate image quality.

By using the draft preview, you can handle high-quality image sources regardless of the performance of your PC.

- Draft preview functions effectively in the following commonly used formats.
 Sony RAW, Cinema RAW, Cinema RAW Light, Avid DNxHD/Avid DNxHR, Apple ProRes, RED, Motion JPEG, JPEG, Grass Valley HQX

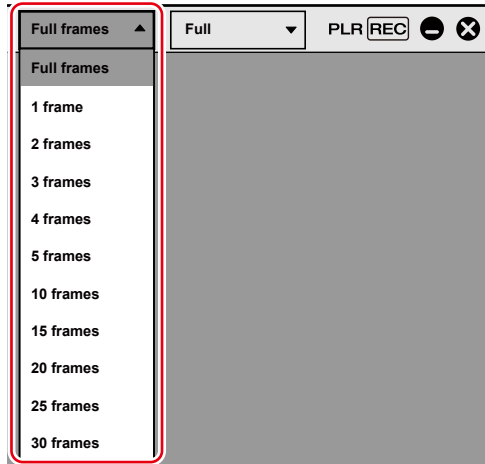
Frame Skip Playback

By thinning frames for preview, the performance of real time playback improves.

Make use of this feature when you apply heavy-load effects such as [Mask] and [Layouter], or when you play the timeline where RAW data clips are placed.


1) Click [Skipped Frames] on the menu bar, and select an item.

- The image quality for preview will be changed according to the selected item.



[Full frames]	Does not thin out frames for preview.
[1 frame] - [30 frames]*1	Thins out the specified number of frames for preview. By increasing the number of thinned-out frames, the load on the PC during playback will be made smaller.

*1 Select [1 frame] - [5 frames] to specify by 1-frame unit, or select [10 frames] - [30 frames] to specify by 5-frame unit.

-  [Skipped Frames] in the multicam mode can hold specific setting values which are different from those in the normal and any other modes.
- If [Skipped Frames] is set to an option other than [Full frames], the timecode, closed captions, and other information to be displayed on the preview window also appear reduced according to the number of thinned-out frames.
- If a clip on which [Motion Blur] is applied is played by frame skip playback, the motion in the thinned-out frames will not be used.

Sequences

Creating New Sequence

What Are Sequences?

A single timeline included in a project is called a “sequence”.

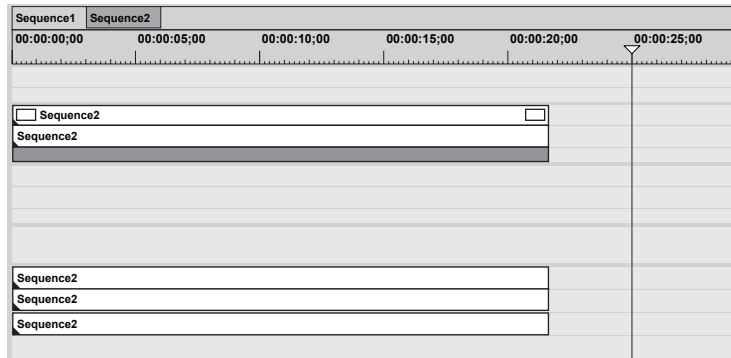
A single project can be comprised of multiple sequences, and a sequence can be selected and edited by clicking the sequence tab.

Sequences are registered as “TL (timeline) sequence clip” to the bin and they can be edited like clips.

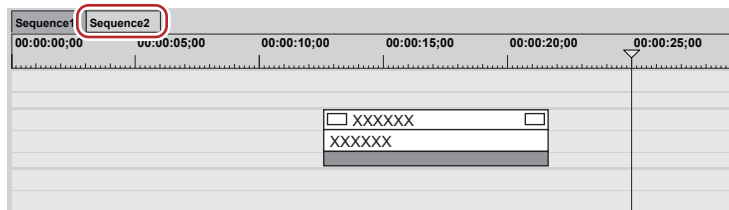
Nest sequence is the function for placing a certain sequence within other sequences in the same way as a clip for editing.

Example:

When “Sequence 2” is placed in the 1VA track of sequence 1



You can open and edit the clip in “Sequence 2”, which is placed in Sequence 1, in the timeline window.



- Right-click the sequence tab to display the menu for changing the sequence setting or closing the sequence. Right-click the sequence tab of the sequence to be set.

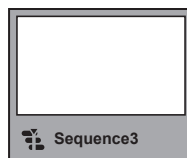
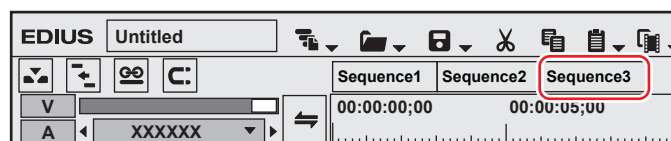
Creating New Sequences

Create a new sequence.

- 1) Click [Create New Sequence] of the timeline.



- A blank sequence is created in the timeline window, and a timeline sequence clip also is registered to the bin at the same time.



- To select a sequence, click the sequence tab.

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [New] → [Sequence].
- Right-click a blank area in the clip view of the bin, and click [New Sequence]. In this case, a blank timeline sequence clip is registered to the bin but not displayed in the timeline window.
“Opening the Sequence to Edit” (▶ page 316)
- Creating new sequence: [Shift] + [Ctrl] + [N]



- You can change sequence settings.
“Sequence Settings” (▶ page 71)
- You can sort the order of sequence tabs by dragging and dropping the tabs.
- You can rename sequences by right-double-clicking the sequence tab.

Editing Sequences

Opening the Sequence to Edit

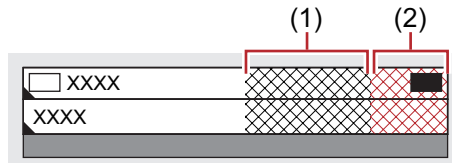
Open and edit timeline sequence clips in the timeline window.

1) Double-click a timeline sequence clip in the bin or on the timeline.

- The sequence tab is displayed in the timeline window. Click the sequence tab to select the sequence to edit.



- Edits are reflected in the timeline sequence at the place destination when the timeline sequence clip is edited. Not, however, that the length of the timeline sequence at the place destination remains unchanged. The display changes as follows when there is not enough clip length left after editing:



(1) is gray and no clips are present in the total length of the sequence.

(2) is gray and no clips are present extending over the total length of the sequence.

- The total length can be changed in the sequence settings.
“Sequence Settings” (▶ page 71)
- You can import timeline sequences created in other projects.
“Importing Sequence (Sequence Import)” (▶ page 78)

Alternative

- Right-click a timeline sequence clip in the bin, and click [Open Sequence].

Closing Sequences

1) Right-click the sequence tab, and click [Close This Sequence].

Alternative

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Close Sequence] → [Active Sequence].



- You can close all but one of currently displayed sequences by the following operation.
 - Right-click the sequence tab to leave behind, and click [Close All Other Sequences].
 - Click the sequence tab to leave behind, and click [View] → [Close Sequence] → [All Sequences except Active Sequence] on the menu bar.
- You cannot close all sequences displayed in the timeline window.

Effectively Editing Clips Using the Nest Sequence Function

Registering Clips on the Timeline to the Bin as Sequences

You can register clips between In and Out points placed on the timeline to the bin. You can also select a clip to register to the bin as a timeline sequence clip.

1) Setting the In and Out Points to the Timeline

- “Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (► page 237)
- Select a clip when registering a clip on the timeline to the bin as a timeline sequence clip.

2) Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Add Sequence to Bin] → [In/Out] or [Selected Clip].

- When [In/Out] is clicked, the range between In and Out points is registered to the bin as the timeline sequence clip, and when [Selected Clip] is clicked, the selected clip is registered.



- You can convert a video clip between In and Out points on the timeline to a sequence to place on a track. After setting the In and Out points to the timeline, click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Set Between In/Out as Sequence]. The clip between In and Out points is placed on the track as a sequence, and the timeline sequence clip is registered also to the bin at the same time. If there is no space to place a clip on the track, a new V track is added.
- Active sequences in the timeline window can be registered to the bin as timeline sequence clips by the following operation.
 - Right-click the sequence tab, and click [Add to Bin].
 - Click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Add Sequence to Bin] → [All].

Creating Blank Timeline Sequence Clips on Tracks

You can place a blank timeline sequence clip in advance at the sequence insert position.

1) Move the timeline cursor to the position to create the timeline sequence clip.

2) Right-click the track to create the sequence at, and click [New Sequence].

- A blank timeline sequence clip is placed on the track with the position of the timeline cursor set as the In point. It is also registered to the bin at the same time.

Duplicating Sequences

You can duplicate timeline sequence clips in the bin. Create a sequence with the same content but using a different name.

1) Right-click a timeline sequence clip in the bin, and click [Duplicate Sequence].

- Duplicated clips are named after the original clips and are appended with a sequential number.

Placing Sequences within Other Sequence (Nest Sequence)

You can place a timeline sequence clip within another timeline sequence.

1) Set the source channel mapping.

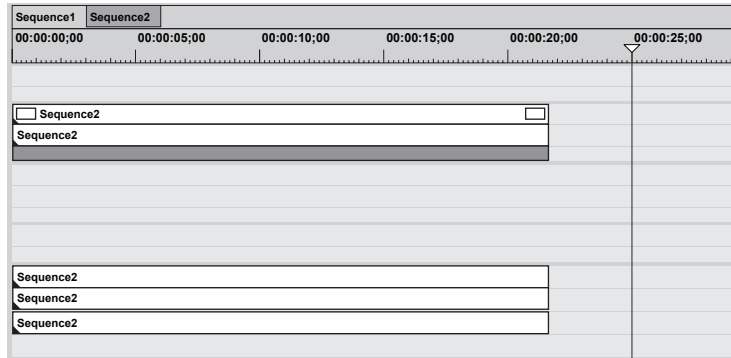
- “Setting Channel Mapping” (► page 235)

2) Move the timeline cursor to the position to place the clip.

3) Select a timeline sequence clip from the bin, and click [Add to Timeline].



- The timeline sequence clip (gray) in the bin is placed on the other sequence.



 **Alternative**

- Directly drag and drop a timeline sequence clip in the bin onto the timeline.
- Right-click on a timeline sequence clip in the bin, and click [Add to Timeline].
- Play back a timeline sequence clip on the Player, and click [Insert to Timeline] or [Overwrite to Timeline].



- Clip markers and sequence markers set to a timeline sequence clip will be displayed also in the destination sequence. The snap function is available in the same way as for normal clip markers or sequence markers. These markers can be edited also in the destination sequence, but the edited content will not be applied to the original sequence.
- The wave information (waveform representation of audio) of a timeline sequence clip is displayed also in the destination sequence.

Multicam Editing

In multicam editing, you can place clips including videos recorded by multiple cameras on the timeline along with the time axis and perform cut editing by switching scenes while playing back the clips simultaneously.

You can play back and edit videos of multiple clips up to 16 on the screen simultaneously.

After performing cut editing, you can also place only the selected clips on a single track.

- Multicam editing can be performed while in the multicam mode.

Setting the Sync Point to Place Clips

You can select a sync point as the reference point to be used when multiple clips are placed, and then place clips on the timeline.

A sync point can be selected from [Timecode], [Audio], [Clip Marker], [Clip In], etc.

When a synchronized clip is to be placed, you can select either to create a new sequence or to use the currently active sequence.

- To place a clip in the bin to the currently active sequence, click on the sequence tab of the sequence to be synchronized to activate it in advance.
- To execute [Audio (Around the Marker)] or [Clip Marker] for [Sync Point], set a clip marker on each clip in advance. To place a clip in the bin to the currently active sequence, set a sequence marker on the sequence to be synchronized in advance.

1) Select and right-click the multiple clips in the bin, and click [Multicam Sync].

- The [Multicam Sync] dialog box appears.
“[Multicam Sync] Dialog Box” (▶ page 320)
- When you place a clip in the bin to the currently active sequence, you can select only one clip in this step.

2) Select a reference sync point from the [Sync Point] list.

- When you select [Audio (Around the Marker)] or [Clip Marker], set [Marker].

3) Select [New Sequence] or [Active Sequence] for [Target Sequence] of [Output].

- Select a sequence on which the synchronized clips are to be placed.
 Selecting [New Sequence] will create a new sequence in accordance with the current project settings.
 Selecting [Active Sequence] will synchronize the currently active sequence with the clip selected in the bin. Clips will be added to the currently active sequence.
- When you select [New Sequence], set [Sequence Name] and [Audio Channel].

4) Click [OK].

- The clip will be placed on the timeline.
- If [Audio] or [Audio (Around the Marker)] has been selected for [Sync Point], clicking [OK] will start analysis of audio data. The progress of the analysis process will be displayed, and clips will be placed after completion of the analysis.
- The sequence on which the clips are placed differs depending on the setting of [Target Sequence].
- When [New Sequence] has been selected for [Target Sequence], multicam mode is set to the sequence.
 - Clips placed on the timeline are displayed in the multi-camera screen on the Recorder.
 The number of the multi-camera screens on the Recorder is determined automatically according to the number of clips selected in the bin.

 - The camera switch point is automatically set to the In and Out points of each clip. To change the camera switch point, overwrite it.

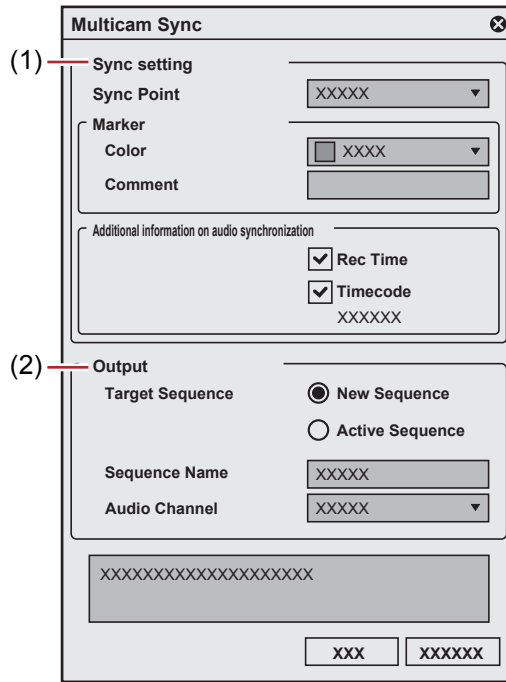


- The currently active sequence and the sequence clip selected in the bin can be synchronized.
 Note that the following sequence clips cannot be synchronized with the currently active sequence.
 - A sequence clip which is identical to the currently active sequence
 - A sequence clip which includes the currently active sequence

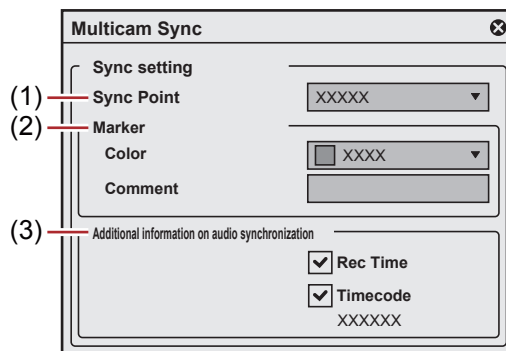
- When a clip is placed on the timeline by a drag and drop operation or by clicking [Add to Timeline] for a clip selected in the bin, the clip cannot be placed using the sync point as the reference point.
- Selecting [Active Sequence] for [Target Sequence] will synchronize the currently active sequence with the clip selected in the bin. When the clip selected in the bin is placed on the timeline, the positions of clips which have already been placed on the timeline are maintained. Therefore, the clip selected in the bin may be trimmed on the In point side, or the clip may not be placed.

Audio Sync

The audio sync function analyzes audio data such as video clip and audio clip, and automatically determines an optimal sync point to synchronize them.

There are two major methods of audio sync, [Audio] and [Audio (Around the Marker)].

[Audio] analyzes audio data of every entire clip.

[Audio (Around the Marker)] analyzes audio data of each clip in the range of 10 seconds before and after the clip marker set on each clip. By limiting the analysis area to the range around the marker, the time for analysis will be shortened significantly.

■ Preparation

To execute [Audio (Around the Marker)] in [Sync Point], set a clip marker on each clip in advance. The marker position functions as a reference point for the range of audio data analysis. An analysis is performed in the range of 10 seconds before and after the marker.



- If a clip in the bin is placed onto the currently active sequence, the clip marker of the clip selected in the bin and the sequence marker set on the sequence will be the reference points for analysis.

Example:

To set a clip marker to be the reference point for analysis

1) Set a clip marker on a clip to be used for multicam editing.

- Set a clip marker on a position of a characteristic sound that is commonly included in all the clips, such as the start of music.

2) Set [Color] and [Comments] for the clip marker of each clip.

- Set [Color] and [Comments] of the clip marker to be the reference point of analysis.
The clip marker with the exact same setting as that for [Marker] in the [Multicam Sync] dialog box will be analyzed.

- To place a clip in the bin onto the currently active sequence, set a sequence marker on the sequence to be synchronized in advance, and then set [Color] and [Comments].

Synchronization by Audio Sync Function

This section describes how to synchronize clips using the audio sync function.

- To place a clip in the bin to the currently active sequence, click on the sequence tab of the sequence to be synchronized to activate it in advance.
- To execute [Audio (Around the Marker)] in [Sync Point], set a clip marker on each clip in advance. To place a clip in the bin to the currently active sequence, set a sequence marker on the sequence to be synchronized in advance.

1) Select and right-click the multiple clips in the bin, and click [Multicam Sync].

- The [Multicam Sync] dialog box appears.
“[Multicam Sync] Dialog Box” (▶ page 320)
- When you place a clip in the bin to the currently active sequence, you can select only one clip in this step.

2) Select [Audio] or [Audio (Around the Marker)] from the [Sync Point] list.

- If you execute [Audio], proceed to step 4).

3) For [Marker], set [Color] and [Comment] of the marker to be the reference point for analysis.

- Set [Color] and [Comment] which exactly match those of the marker set for each clip in advance.

4) For [Additional information on audio synchronization], check the data to be used in analysis.

5) Select [New Sequence] or [Active Sequence] for [Target Sequence] of [Output].

- Select a sequence on which the synchronized clips are to be placed.
Selecting [New Sequence] will create a new sequence in accordance with the current project settings when the audio data analysis is completed.
Selecting [Active Sequence] will synchronize the output audio in the currently active sequence with the clips selected in the bin. Clips will be added to the currently active sequence.
- When you select [New Sequence], set [Sequence Name] and [Audio Channel].

6) Click [OK].

- The analysis of audio data will start. The progress of the analysis process will be displayed, and clips will be placed on the sequence when the analysis is completed.



- After [Audio (Around the Marker)] has been selected for [Sync Point], if a clip or sequence has no marker to be subject to synchronization, the entire clip or sequence will be analyzed.
- If the number of audio channels exceeds the maximum limit of output channels in the project settings, the excess of the audio channels will not be placed in the sequence.
If the number of audio channels in a clip exceeds the maximum limit that can be placed, a message will appear before the analysis of audio data starts. Click [Continue] to delete the audio channels that exceed the maximum limit for output, and then place the clip in the sequence.

■ **To automatically distinguish different scenes and separate sequence**

If [Audio] or [Audio (Around the Marker)] has been selected for [Sync Point], multiple sequences may be created, in such a case when multiple groups with different sync points are detected in audio data analysis.

For example, if a performance by a band is recorded in multi-camera recording by three cameras, in which four songs are performed and recording is stopped on each camera every time a song is finished.

When the recorded data is imported to EDIUS, 12 clips will be registered to the bin. If you select all the 12 clips in the bin and execute audio sync, automatic distinction of scenes will be performed based on the sync point information obtained from analysis.

After the analysis is completed, four sequences, each including three clips, will be created.



- Clips that have an identical reel name will not be analyzed for each other. Clips with an identical reel name are placed on the same track on the sequence.
- In case multiple sequences are created, the sequence names are given as follows.
The following are examples of three sequences created when [Sequence Name] of [Output] is set to "Multicam1" in the [Multicam Sync] dialog box.
 - The name of the first sequence: "Multicam1"
 - The name of the second sequence: "Multicam1(2)"
 - The name of the third sequence: "Multicam1(3)"

Switching to the Multicam Mode

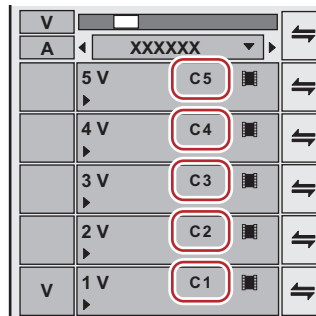
You can switch the mode of the currently active sequence to the multicam mode.

1) Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Multicam Mode].

- The preview window switches from the standard mode to the multicam mode.
- When the preview window is displayed in the dual mode, the left side is the divided screen corresponding to the number of cameras, and the right side is the master (selected camera).
- When the preview window is displayed in the single mode, the screen is the divided screen corresponding to the number of cameras. The screen can also be set to display only the master.

“Setting the Multicam Display” (▶ page 324)

- [Camera mapping] is displayed on the track panel of the timeline window.



Alternative

- Switching to the multicam mode: [F8]



- When the mode is switched to the multicam mode with clips placed on the timeline, the camera switch point is automatically set to the In and Out points of each clip. To change the camera switch point, overwrite it.
“Setting the Camera Switch Point during Playback” (▶ page 326)
- When the preview window is displayed in the single mode, the display can be switched between the selected camera only display and the divided screen. Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [View Multicam] → [Show Only the Selected Camera in Single Monitor Mode].
- The multicam mode can be switched to the standard mode by the following operation.
 - Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Normal Mode] or [Multicam Mode].
 - Press [F8] on the keyboard again.
 - Switching to standard mode: [F5]
- Operations on clips or tracks in the multicam mode are the same as in the standard mode, however, shortcut keys differ from those in the standard mode.

Note

- The multicam mode ends and the mode changes to the standard mode when the following operations are performed during multicam editing.
 - Switching to the Player during editing in the single mode
 - Displaying clips on the Player during editing in the dual mode
 - Opening the effect or layouter setting dialog box

Changing the Number of Screens

You can switch the number of multicamera screens on the Recorder.

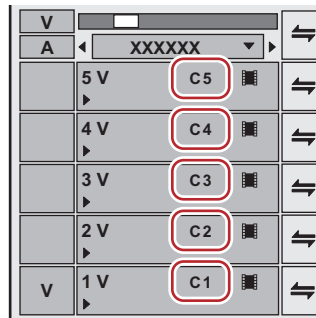
- 1) Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Number of Cameras] → an item.

Changing the Assigned Camera

You can change the camera assigned to each track.

When clips have been placed on the timeline in the multicam mode, cameras are assigned in the track number order of V/A tracks containing clips.

- 1) Click [Camera mapping] on the track panel of the V/A track.



- 2) Click the camera to assign to the selected track.

- Click [Unmap] to release the assignment set to the selected track.
- Click [Default] to initialize all camera assignments set to the tracks. Cameras will be reassigned in order of track numbers of the V track. Camera assignment to the A track will be released.



- [Camera mapping] is displayed only in the multicam mode.
- Tracks not assigned a camera are not displayed in the multicam mode.
- You can change camera assignments during editing.
- You can switch the display/hide setting for the track name at the upper left of each screen of the multicam mode. Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [View Multicam] → [Display Track Name] to uncheck the item.

Setting the Multicam Display

Set the preview display during editing in the multicam mode.

- 1) Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [View Multicam] → an item.

- On items are checked.

[Apply Video Filter]	Batch-switch the disabled (on)/enabled (off) setting of the video filter applied to clips. Temporarily disabling the video filter can reduce the load on the system during playback.
[Display Track Name]	Switch the show/hide setting for track names assigned to the divided screen.
[Display Only the Selected Camera on Full Screen Preview (Auto)]	When this item is on, only the video of the selected camera (master) is displayed in displays whose full screen view setting is set to [Auto]. When this item is off, the divided screen is displayed. “[Monitor]” (▶ page 122)
[Output the Selected Camera to External Monitor]	When this item is on, only the video of the selected camera (master) is displayed on the external monitor. When this item is off, the divided screen is displayed.

[Show Only the Selected Camera in Single Monitor Mode]	This item is enabled when the preview window is in the single mode. When this item is on, only the video of the selected camera (master) is displayed.

- If playback process cannot keep up with the playback speed in such a case as when there is a large number of camera assignment, frames can be thinned out for preview by using [Skipped Frames]. The multicam mode can hold specific setting values different from those of the normal and any other modes.

Setting the Camera Switch Point and Selecting the Camera

Set the camera switch point as the trigger to switch cameras, and select clips to use.

- Switch the mode to the multicam mode in advance.
“Switching to the Multicam Mode” (▶ page 323)

Setting Track to be Controlled with Camera Switch Point

You can set tracks to be controlled with the camera switch point in the multicam mode.

- Operations to add, move, and delete camera switch point as well as to switch the selected camera can be controlled with this function.

1) Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Multicam Switching] → an item.

[Cut Video]	Set the track to be controlled with the camera switch point to the V track only.
[Cut Audio]	Set the track to be controlled with the camera switch point to the A track only.
[Cut Video and Audio]	Set the track to be controlled with the camera switch point to both of the V and A tracks.

- The current mode is displayed on the status bar of the timeline.



- [Cut Video] is set by default.
- If you add the buttons of [Multicam Switching] to be displayed on the mode bar and timeline as operation buttons, you can switch the track to be controlled with the camera switch point simply by clicking a button.

- If you assign keyboard shortcut to each item of [Multicam Switching], you can easily change the track to be controlled with the camera switch point.

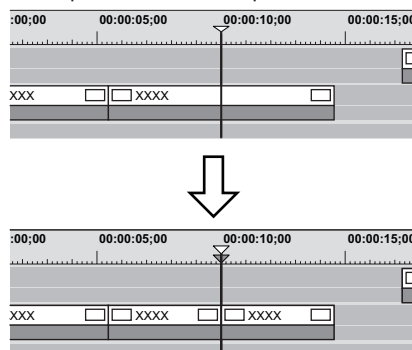
Set the camera switch point as the trigger to switch cameras.

- Before performing an operation, check the setting of [Multicam Switching]. In [Multicam Switching], you can specify the track(s) to be controlled with the camera switch point.

1) Move the timeline cursor to the position to set the camera switch point.

2) Right-click the time scale, and click [Add Cut Point/Clear Cut Point (Toggle)].

- The camera switch point is set at the timeline cursor position, and a cut point is added to the clip on the switch point.



- Repeat steps 1) and 2), to set the camera switch point. The enable/disable setting of clips to use can be set by switching the selected camera.

- Double-click the time scale at the position to set the camera switch point.
- Double-click the camera video of each track.
- Setting camera switch point: [0]

- The same operations can also be performed during playback.
- The track(s) to be switched when switching the camera will be determined according to the camera numbers specified on the V and A tracks.

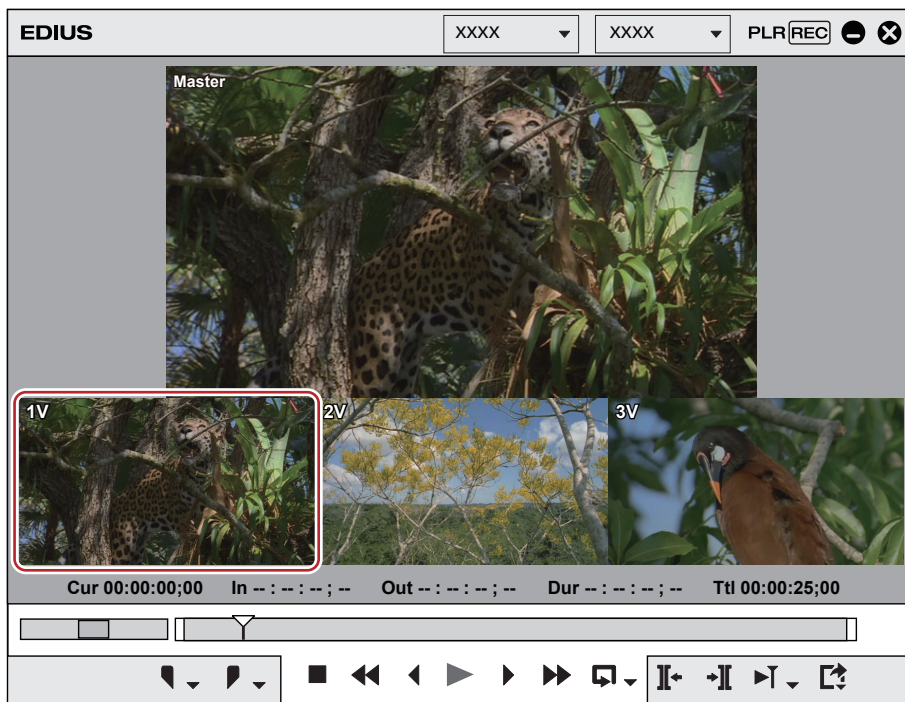
Setting the Camera Switch Point during Playback

You can set the camera switch point during playback. Playback operations are the same as in the standard mode. The following explains operations in the divided screen in the multicam mode. When display of only the selected camera in the single mode has been set, operate using the numerical keypad on the keyboard.

- Before performing an operation, check the setting of [Multicam Switching]. In [Multicam Switching], you can specify the track(s) to be controlled with the camera switch point.
“Setting Track to be Controlled with Camera Switch Point” (▶ page 325)

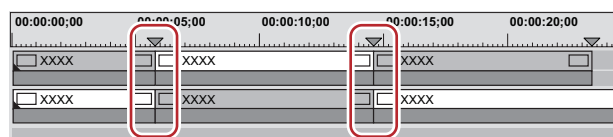
- 1) Move the timeline cursor to the position to start playback.
- 2) Click the camera video of the clip to be enabled first.



- 3) Click [Play] on the Recorder.

- 4) Click the camera video of the clip to be enabled at the video switching position.

- The camera switch point is set to the timeline cursor position. When playback stops, a cut point is added to the clip on the camera switch point.





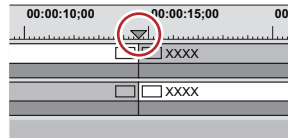
- Any camera switch point which is placed between the first up to the playback stop point is deleted.
- When setting the camera switch point during playback, you can set not to delete the camera switch points that playback has passed through. Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Overwrite Cut Point] to uncheck the item.

Moving Camera Switch Points

You can delete camera switch points.

- Before performing an operation, check the setting of [Multicam Switching]. In [Multicam Switching], you can specify the track(s) to be controlled with the camera switch point.
“Setting Track to be Controlled with Camera Switch Point” (▶ page 325)

1) Drag the camera switch point.



- During dragging, the images of the previous and next frames of the camera switch point are displayed on the camera of the respective track on the Recorder.

Alternative

- Click the clip boundary, and perform a slide trim.

- Place the mouse cursor on the Recorder with [Shift] on the keyboard held down, and rotate the mouse wheel. The master at the position of the camera switch point being moved and the video of each track are displayed on the Recorder. Check the video, and release [Shift] at the position to place the camera switch point to place the point at the move destination.



- If you have moved through other camera switch points, the camera switch points in between are deleted.
- Move the camera switch point set to the Out point of a clip to trim the clip.

Deleting Camera Switch Points

You can delete camera switch points.

- Before performing an operation, check the setting of [Multicam Switching]. In [Multicam Switching], you can specify the track(s) to be controlled with the camera switch point.
“Setting Track to be Controlled with Camera Switch Point” (▶ page 325)

1) Move the timeline cursor to a camera switch point to delete.

2) Right-click the time scale, and click [Add Cut Point/Clear Cut Point (Toggle)].

- The camera switch point is deleted, and clips are merged. The enable/disable settings of clips when a camera switch point is deleted are dependent on the previous clip.
 The camera switch point cannot be deleted when the camera switch point set to the In and Out points of a clip which has no margin.

Alternative

- Right-click the camera switch point to delete, and click [Add Cut Point/Clear Cut Point (Toggle)].
- Double-click the camera switch point.



- To delete all camera switch points on the time scale, right-click the time scale, and click [Delete All Cut Points].
- To delete camera switch points between the In and Out points on the timeline, right-click the time scale, and click [Delete Cut Points between In/Out].

Switching the Selected Camera

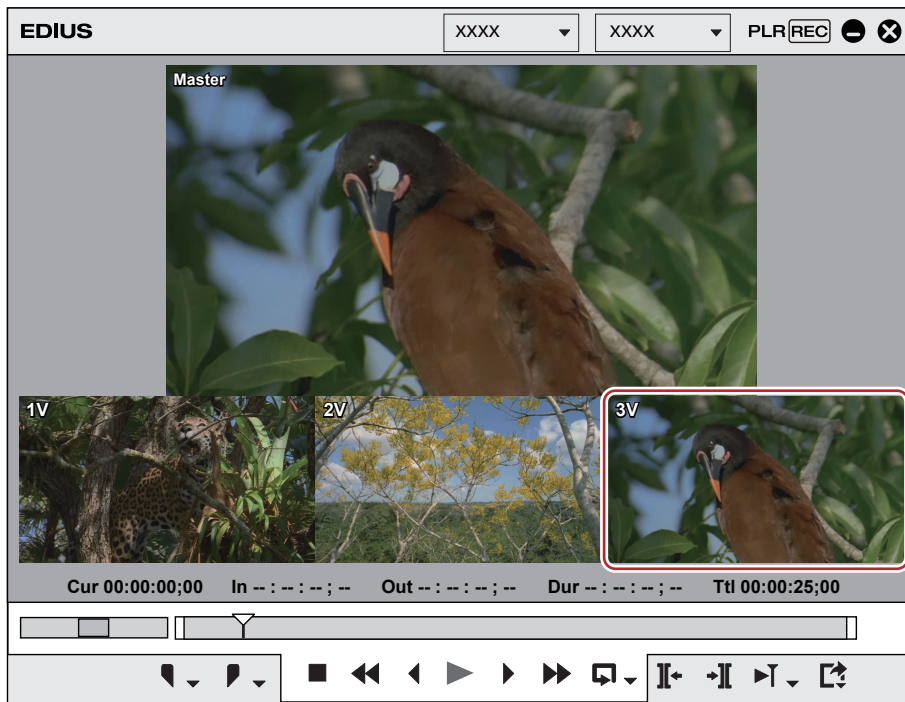
You can change the clips to acquire after setting the camera switch points.

The following explains operations in the divided screen in the multicam mode. When display of only the selected camera in the single mode has been set, operate using the numerical keypad on the keyboard.

- Before performing an operation, check the setting of [Multicam Switching]. In [Multicam Switching], you can specify the track(s) to be controlled with the camera switch point.

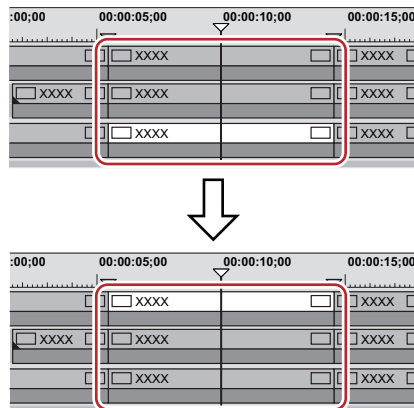
- 1) Move the timeline cursor on the clip to switch the selected camera while the timeline is stopped.
- 2) Click the camera video to set as the selected camera from among the camera videos of each track.



- The clips of the selected camera are enabled, and others are disabled.

When switching the selected camera of the clip at the timeline cursor position from [C1] to [C3]



- When the timeline cursor is moved over the clip to switch the selected camera, and the camera video of each track currently displayed on the Recorder is double-clicked, the camera switch point can be set and the selected camera can be switched at the same time.

- Before performing an operation, check the setting of [Multicam Switching]. In [Multicam Switching], you can specify the track(s) to be controlled with the camera switch point.
 “Setting Track to be Controlled with Camera Switch Point” (▶ page 325)

- 1) Move the timeline cursor to the point to switch the camera.
- 2) Press the numeric keypad corresponding to the camera to switch to with [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down.

Switching the Selected Camera Simultaneously with Setting of the Camera Switch Point during Playback

- 1) Play back the timeline, and press the numeric keypad corresponding to the camera selected at the time of switching.
- The camera switch point is set to the timeline cursor, and the camera video is switched.

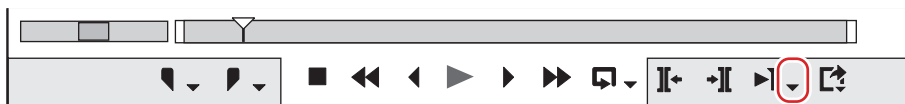

- You can repeatedly play back around the camera switch point.



- You can set the preliminary operation time (Preroll) at [Preview] in [User Settings] → [Playback].
“[Playback]” (▶ page 121)
- You cannot set the camera switch point while playing around a camera switch point. Set the camera switch point by regular playback operation.

Copying Only the Selected Clips to Track

Group together the clips of the selected camera and copy them to one track.

Extract enabled clips from the track where the camera is assigned, and copy them to the specified track.

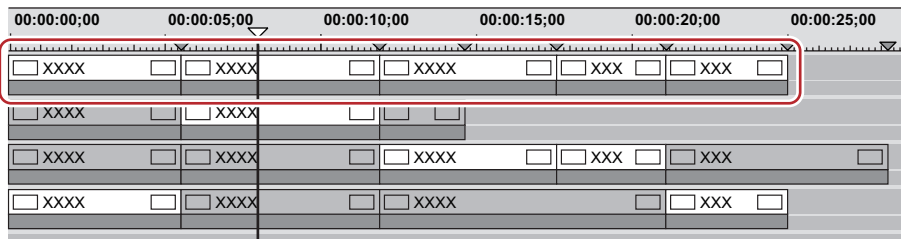

- Selected clips are copied to the specified track. When other clips are already placed on the specified part, select whether to overwrite clips.



- If multiple enabled clips are placed between the camera switch points, priority is given to the camera point with the larger number.

Proxy Editing

Editing Using Proxy Files

In this mode, proxy data that has been optimized for editing, for example, by lowering image quality from the original high-resolution data is used. You can proceed with editing more effortlessly since the load placed on the CPU during editing can be lightened.

When only the proxy or source including the proxy has been checked out for checkout field editing, the project automatically opens in the proxy mode.

- From [System Settings] → [Application] → [Proxy], you can set the size of proxy files to be created at the time of checkout.

Switching to the Proxy Mode

1) Click [Mode] on the menu bar, and click [Proxy Mode].

- When the proxy mode is set to on, a check mark appears on the menu item, and “proxy mode” is displayed on the status bar of the timeline.
- By default, when the mode is switched to the proxy mode, a proxy will be created for every clip used on the current project in the background. A proxy is named “clip name including extension.proxy.mov”, and is saved in the same directory as the source file. Proxies are created using the Render Service.
Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.
“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)
- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- The setting to prevent a proxy from being automatically generated can be changed by [Application] in [User Settings] → [Proxy Mode].
“[Proxy Mode]” (▶ page 119)
- In the proxy mode, clips reference the proxy. When the proxy has been moved to a different directory, the clip becomes an offline clip.



- The default proxy mode setting is off.
- If the proxy cannot be saved to the same directory as the source file when the proxy is generated, it will be saved to the “Transferred” folder under the project folder.
- When the mode is switched to the proxy mode, clips that already have a proxy use that proxy and a new proxy is not generated.
- The proxy mode can be simply switched to by displaying the [Proxy Mode] operation button on the timeline or mode bar.

Creating Proxy Files

Create a proxy from clips (high-resolution) in the bin or on the timeline.

Note

- Proxies of the following clips cannot be created:
 - Clips other than video clips
 - Still image clips
 - Title clips
 - Caption clips
 - Clips already containing a proxy
 - Clips with alpha channel
 - Partially transferred clips



- A proxy file can be set to be automatically generated at capture. Set [Proxy File] to [Hires and Proxy files] at [Input H/W, Format Settings] in the device preset used for capture.

1) Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Create Proxy] → an item.

2) Click [Yes].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service.

Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.

“GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)

- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.
- A proxy is named “clip name including extension.proxy.mov”, and is saved in the same directory as the source file. Clips are set to reference proxies.



- A proxy of any clip currently registered to the bin can be generated. Right-click the clip in the bin window, and click [Create Proxy]. The progress of generation of the proxy is displayed in the thumbnail of the proxy.
- If the proxy cannot be saved to the same directory as the source file when the proxy is generated, it will be saved to the “Transferred” folder under the project folder.

Editing Using Camera Proxy Files

In EDIUS, original proxy files recorded in the P2 or XDCAM camera can be used. You can also utilize functions such as “Proxy originated editing” that allows to use an untransferred clip or temporary editing clip (proxy source) while editing and replace it with the actual editing clip (high-resolution source) before final export.



- Formats that allow switching between high-resolution and proxy editing sources are as follows.
 - Sony: XDCAM, XAVC, XAVC S
 - Panasonic: P2
- Formats that can be used in proxy originated editing are as follows.
 - Sony: XDCAM, XAVC, XAVC S
 - Panasonic: P2, sub-recording format by Panasonic cameras
 - Canon: XF-AVC, Cinema RAW Light

Editing Flow by Switching Between High-resolution and Proxy Sources

1) From the source browser, import sources (such as P2 or XDCAM) containing a proxy file.

- High-resolution/Proxy is displayed in the area of High-resolution/Proxy of the bin, because sources have a property of a high-resolution and proxy.

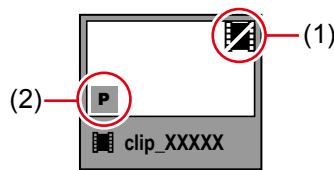

3) Right-click on a proxy source clip to import, and click [Add and Transfer to Bin].

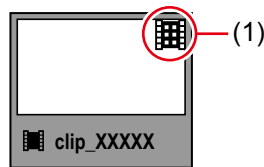

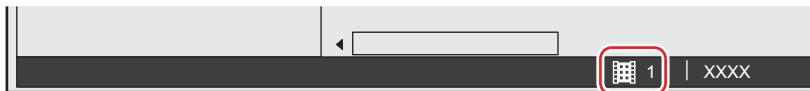

4) Click [OK].

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box closes and the untransferred clips or temporary editing clips are replaced with the actual editing clips.

■ Replacing Using the Source Browser

1) Connect media that contain the actual editing clips to the PC.

2) In the folder view of the source browser, click the medium to view, and then click on the drive or reference folder.

- The operation differs depending on the medium.
 “Importing Source Browser File by Copying” (▶ page 181)
- Sources on the medium are displayed in the clip view.

3) When the message is displayed indicating that the actual editing clip corresponded to the untransferred clip or the temporary editing clip is found, click [Yes].

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box appears with [Restoration Method] and [Restore file] preconfigured.

4) Click [OK].

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box closes and the untransferred clips or temporary editing clips are replaced with the actual editing clips.

■ Replacing While Exporting (For Untransferred Clips)

The procedure for untransferred clips imported from the source browser is as follows.

1) Click [Export] on the Recorder.

2) Click [Print to File].

- The [Print to File] dialog box appears.
“[Print to File] Dialog Box” (► page 447)

3) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

4) Configure export details and confirm the file name, saving destination, etc.

- A message appears to indicate that temporary editing clips are used.

5) Click [Yes].

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box appears.

6) Click [OK].

- The [Disc Request - Background Job] dialog box appears.

7) Connect media that contain the actual editing clips to the PC.

- Data transfer to the project folder is started in the background.
- Repeat step 7) as necessary.
When all untransferred clips have been replaced with the actual editing clips, the export operation starts automatically.

■ Replacing While Exporting (For Temporary Editing Clips)

The procedure for temporary editing clips imported from the [Open] dialog box is as follows.

1) Click [Export] on the Recorder.

2) Click [Print to File].

- The [Print to File] dialog box appears.
“[Print to File] Dialog Box” (► page 447)

3) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

4) Configure export details and confirm the file name, saving destination, etc.

- A message appears to indicate that temporary editing clips are used.

5) Click [Yes].

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box appears.

6) Select a clip from [Clip list], and select [Relink (select file)] from the [Restoration Method] list.

7) In the [Open] dialog box, select the actual editing clip file, and click [Open].

8) Repeat steps 6) to 7) as necessary to specify the actual editing clips to be restored.

9) Click [OK].

- The [Restore and Transfer Clips] dialog box closes and the temporary editing clips are replaced with the actual editing clips. The export operation starts automatically.

3D Editing

About the Stereoscopic Edit Mode

In the stereoscopic edit mode, stereoscopic processed video can be output to the monitor, and stereoscopic clips can be edited and exported to file by the exporter for stereoscopic editing.



- Stereoscopic clips that can be edited by EDIUS are as follows:
 - 3DA1 (Panasonic)
 - MVC (Sony, Panasonic, JVC)
 - 3D P2 (Panasonic)
 - 3D clips taken by a 3D conversion lens, for example

Notes on Stereoscopic Editing

Inadequate 3D video may affect the health of viewers, so take care of output results.

According to 3D Consortium “3DC Safety Guidelines”, it is recommended to avoid the situation where the disparity on the display exceeds the distance between the right and left eyes (50 mm for children).

In Hollywood 3D movies, the comfortable range of disparity should be shorter than approximately 2% of the screen horizontal width.

For details of safe and comfortable 3D contents creation, see 3D Consortium “3DC Safety Guidelines” (English).

- When the stereoscopic edit mode has been switched to the standard mode, only the L side video of stereoscopic clips is output to the monitor.

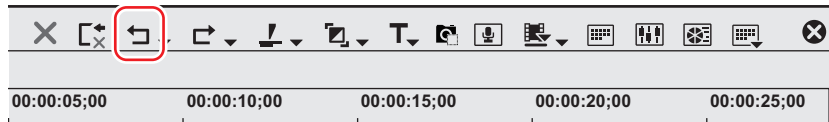
- When the stereoscopic edit mode has been switched to the standard mode, only the L side of the effects applied to the stereoscopic clip are applied. Effects applied to only the R side are invalid.

Undoing Operations/Redoing Undone Operations

Undoing Operations (Undo)

You can undo the performed operations, or return to the previous status.

1) Click [Undo] of the timeline.



- Executed operations are undone, and the timeline cursor and the In and Out points return to their original positions.

Alternative

- Undoing operations: **[Ctrl] + [Z]**



- Click the [Undo] list button to display a history of operations executed so far, and select the operation to undo. This history is saved for each individual sequence.
- Though the number of undos is basically unlimited, the history will be deleted starting with the oldest record if the system runs out of memory.

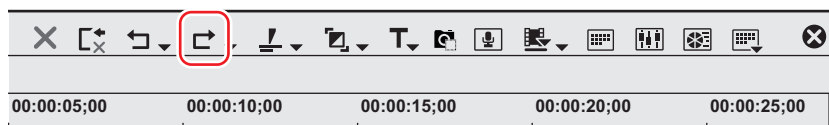
Note

- Operations and settings in the bin window cannot be undone.

Redoing Canceled Operations (Redo)

You can redo canceled operations that have been executed by undo.

1) Click [Redo] of the timeline.



- Executed operations are undone, and the timeline cursor and In and Out points are repositioned.

Alternative

- Redoing canceled operation: **[Ctrl] + [Y]**, **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [Z]**



- Click the [Redo] list button to display a history of operations undone so far, and select an operation to redo. This history is saved for each individual sequence.

Checking Color

Checking Color Data

Even a video finely displayed on a PC monitor may cause problems like highlight/shadow detail loss when actually displayed on a TV monitor. Although the best solution is to edit the video while checking an environment where the final video is screened or confirming the screening rules, in many cases, editing must be performed without such environment and rules. In such cases, use the vector scope, waveform or histogram to check the brightness and colors of the image displayed in the preview window, and perform the editing process.

[Videoscope]

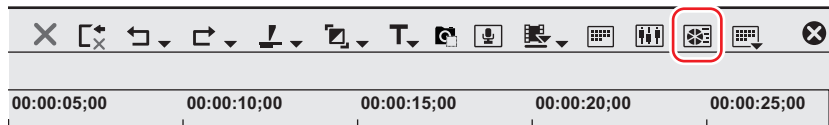
Vector scope, waveform and histogram can be used to monitor the brightness and colors, allowing fine adjustment of detailed parts that cannot be seen by eyes.

Example:

To check recorder image

1) Move the timeline cursor to display the image to check the color data on Recorder.

2) Click [Toggle Videoscope Display] of the timeline.



- The [Videoscope] dialog box appears.
“[Videoscope] Dialog Box” (► page 340)

Alternative

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Videoscope].

Note

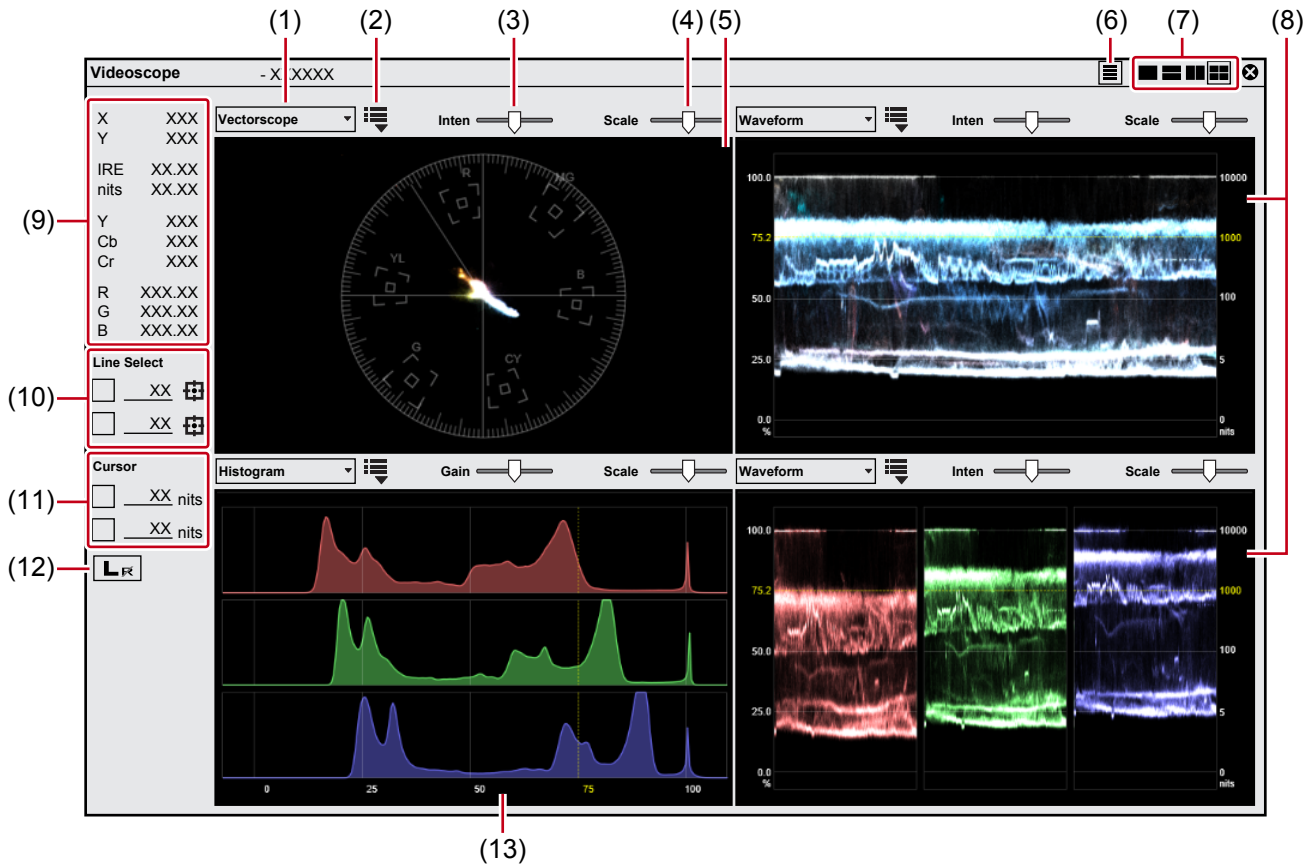
- Displaying vector scope/waveform/histogram increases the CPU loading. Display them only when required.


[Videoscope] Dialog Box

The following screenshot is an example of the [Videoscope] dialog box divided into four windows.

- The conventional analog-based design was changed into a digital-based design.


- The conventional [Line] function of [Vector Scope/Waveform] was discontinued.

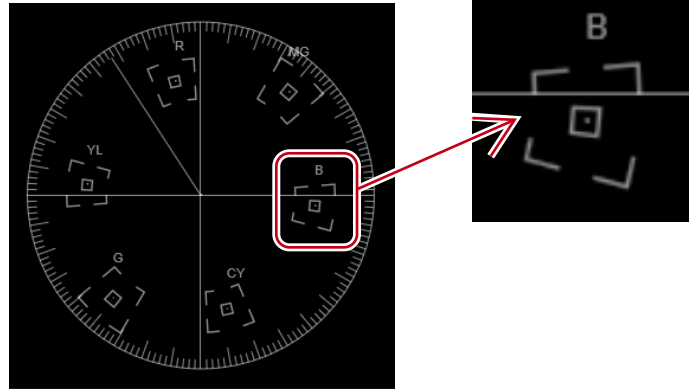


(1)	Videoscope switching	Switch the view between vector scope/waveform/histogram.
(2)	View mode	Set the display color and zoom ratio of the vector scope, waveform mode (Y/YCbCr/RGB), and display color (Y only). <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Not available for histogram.
(3)	[Inten]/[Gain]	Adjust the luminance of the vector scope/waveform, and the gain of histogram.
(4)	[Scale]	Adjust the brightness of the scale.
(5)	Vector scope	Display the color distribution of the image displayed on the preview window. The circle represents the color circle, and the distance from the center represents the saturation. A reference line for skin color adjustment will appear between the yellow and red lines.
(6)	Showing/hiding sidebar	Switch show/hide of the sidebar that has information area or other items including [Line Select].
(7)	Display view	Switch the display view between vector scope/waveform/histogram.
(8)	Waveform	Display chroma and luminance levels of the image on the preview window.

(11)	[Cursor]	Add a line with desired luminance level to the waveform and histogram. Select the check box and directly enter the luminance level (unit: nits). A yellow dashed line appears.
(12)	L/R switch	In the stereoscopic edit mode, this is displayed when the video of both the L and R sides are displayed in the preview window. The vector scope/waveform/histogram only on the L or R side is displayed.
(13)	Histogram	Show the brightness distribution of the image displayed on the preview window by RGB. The horizontal axis indicates brightness, and the vertical axis indicates the number of pixels by color brightness.

For 75% color bar, if the dot indicating color distribution is largely away from the center of  with [Zoom 100%] display mode setting, the setting may not be appropriate. Check the setting.



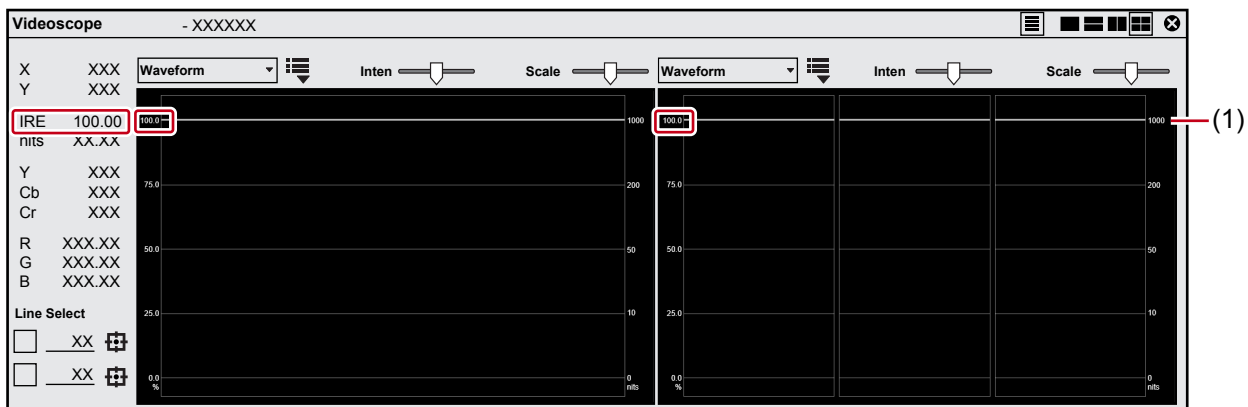

- The graduation on the left of the scale (%) indicates the value of IRE. The graduation on the right of the scale (nits) indicates the value of luminance level.

When you place a white color matte clip created in the safe color range on the timeline and measure it in the [Videoscope] dialog box, IRE100 appears. (The position of (1))

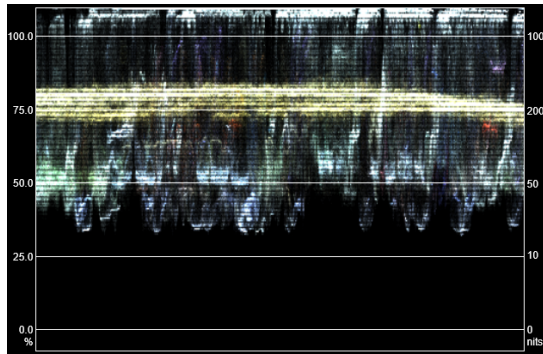

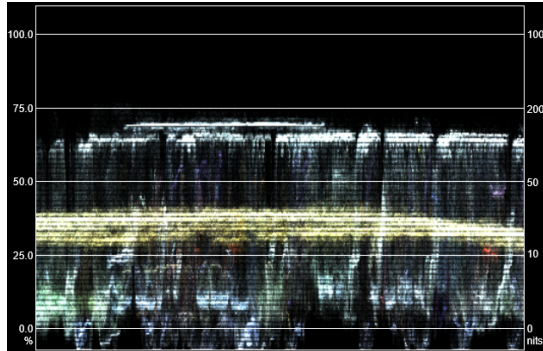

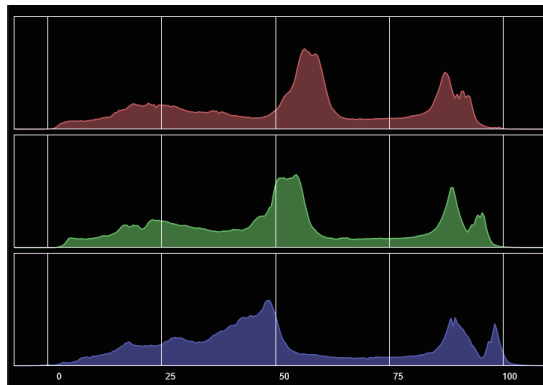

Measure and check if the brightness distribution is appropriate using the histogram

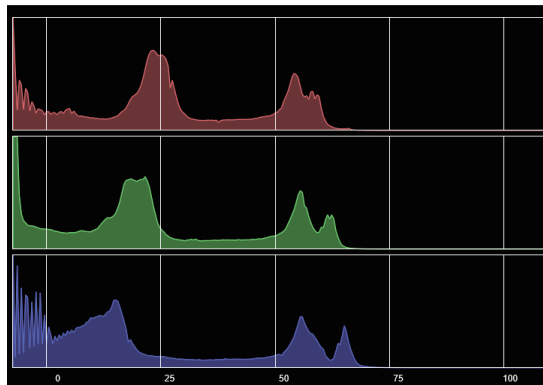
- The graduation under the scale indicates the value of IRE.

GV Job Monitor

In EDIUS, processes such as file export are registered to the Render Service as rendering jobs. Rendering jobs registered to the Render Service are processed in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. By using the Render Service, you can continue other editing work on EDIUS while rendering jobs are being processed.

On GV Job Monitor, you can check the progress or status of those rendering processes, or you can cancel rendering jobs.

The following processes are registered to the Render Service as rendering jobs.

- Export of file
- Batch export
- File conversion
- Partial rendering
- Clip rendering
- Generation of wave information (waveform representation of audio)
- Creation of proxy files



- GV Job Monitor starts up at the same time when EDIUS is started up, and resides in the notification area on the task bar.
- The priority of rendering process is determined by the order of registration to the Render Service or the stage of [Priority]. If multiple rendering jobs have the same stage of [Priority], the one registered to the Render Service earlier will be prioritized. However, the following rendering jobs will be prioritized regardless of the order of registration to the Render Service or the stage of [Priority]. When the following rendering jobs are registered to the Render Service, processes of other rendering jobs will be paused.
 - File conversion
 - Partial rendering
 - Clip rendering
 - Generation of wave information (waveform representation of audio)
 - Creation of proxy files

Note

- When a heavy-load editing work is performed on EDIUS, rendering jobs may be paused temporarily.

■ GV Job Monitor Icon Indication

The GV Job Monitor icon is constantly displayed on the status bar of the timeline window.



- Double-clicking the icon will display GV Job Monitor ([Job] palette).
- The icon color turns to purple while a file is being exported or a batch export rendering job is being processed in the current project. When the process has been completed, the icon color returns to its original state.

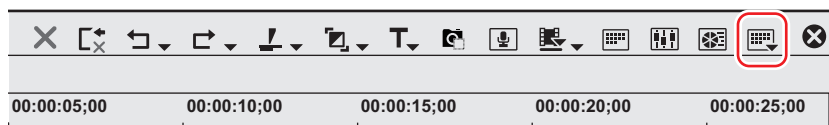

- If you show/hide the [Job] palette display, all of the bin window, source browser window, and palette tabs associated to the [Job] palette will show/hide their display accordingly. To toggle the show/hide setting individually, release the association of the window and the palette.

- Even after the [Job] palette is hidden, GV Job Monitor will reside in the notification area on the task bar.

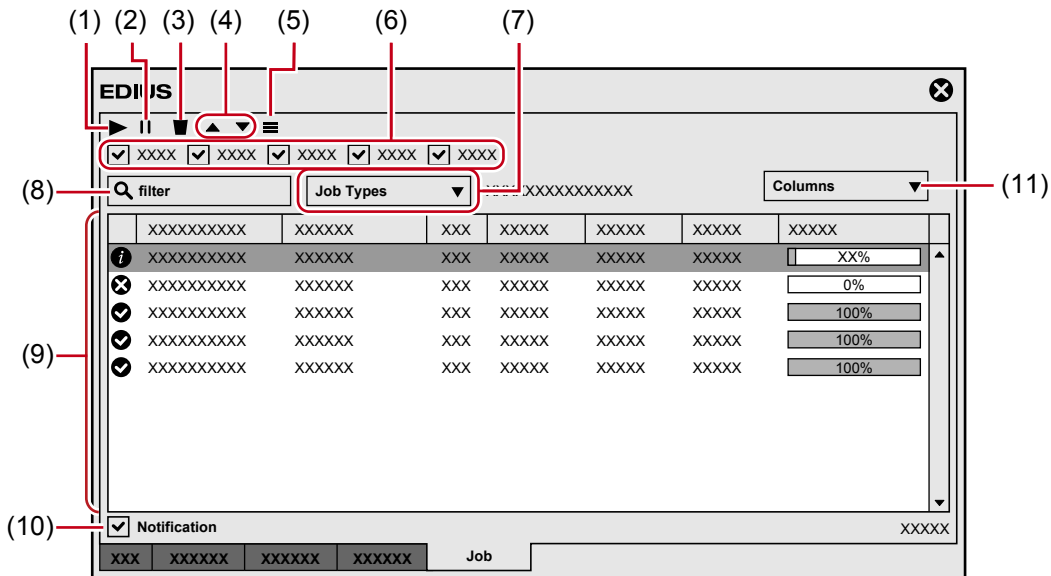

[Job] Palette

On the [Job] palette, you can check the progress of the processed rendering job, or you can cancel a rendering process.



(1)	[Resume]	Resume the job selected on the job list.
(2)	[Pause]	Pause the job selected on the job list.
(3)	[Cancel]	Cancel the job selected on the job list.
(4)	[Up]/[Down]	Change the [Priority] of the job selected on the job list. For [Priority], three stages of [High], [Normal] and [Low] can be set.

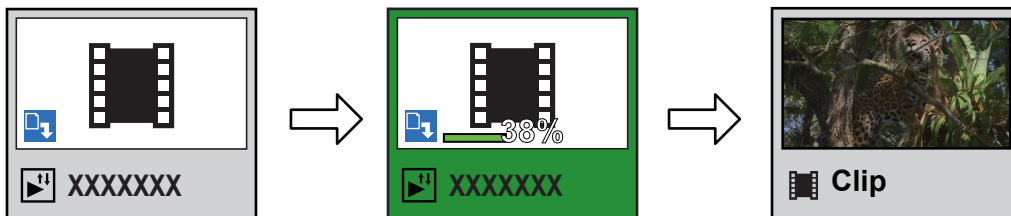

Rendering Clip Display

When you check [Add to Bin] in the [Print to File] dialog box and then export a file or convert a clip to the file, a rendering clip is registered to the bin, at the same time it is registered to the Render Service.

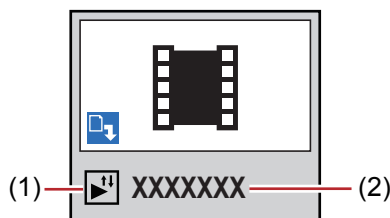

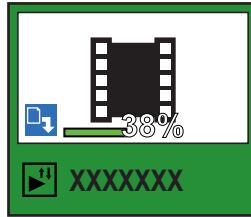

The [Effect] palette lists the effects you can use.

Showing/Hiding [Effect] Palette

You can show or hide the [Effect] palette.

1) Click [Toggle Palette Display] of the timeline.



2) Click [Effect].

- The [Effect] palette appears.

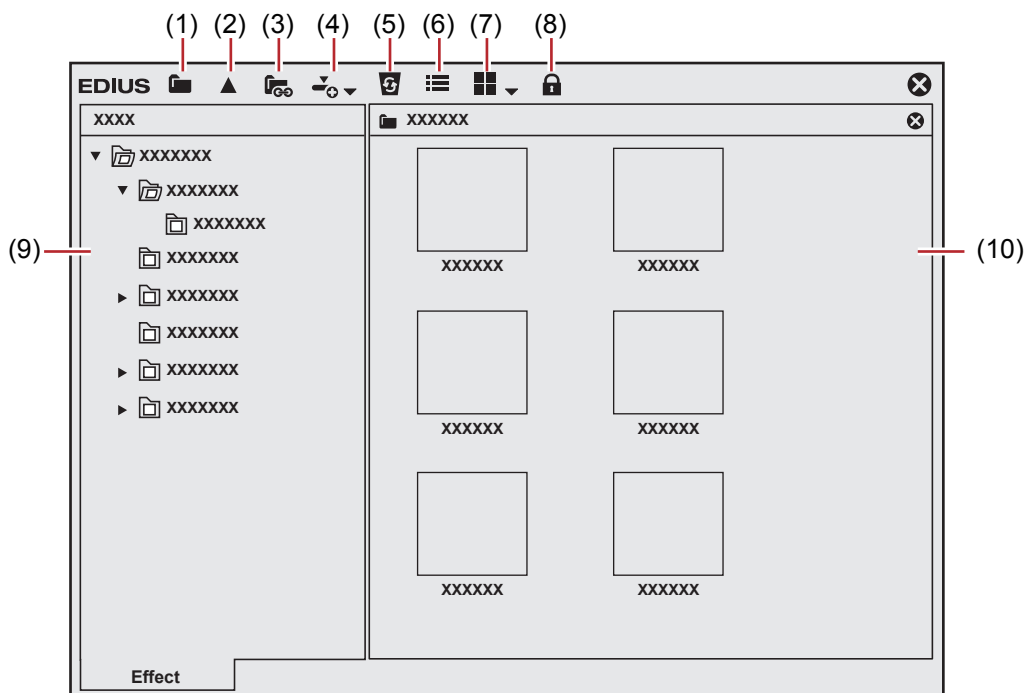

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Palette] → [Effect].

Showing/Hiding Effect View

You can show or hide the effect view.

1) Click [Hide Effect View] in the [Effect] palette.

- The effect view is hidden.

Effect Types

There are 4 available effects.

Plug-in Base Effect

Base effects initially stored which cannot be deleted from the [Effect] palette. Plug-in base effects include video filter, audio filter, transition, audio cross fade, title mixer, and key.

System Preset Effect

These are initially stored and customized plug-in base effects. You cannot delete them from the [Effect] palette. “S” is displayed on their icons.



User Preset Effect

Effects registered by the user. These effects can be customized (by adjusting the parameters, combining multiple effects, or renaming) and saved. “U” is displayed on their icons.

Default Effect

Effects used in the default setting. You can set these effects only for transition, audio cross fade, and title mixer.

Properties of Effects

You can check the effect with animation. You can also change the property of user preset effects.

1) Select an effect and click [Property] in the [Effect] palette.



- The [Property] dialog box appears.

Alternative

- Right-click the effect and click [Property].



- You can check the transitions in animation by selecting an effect in the effect view.
- You can change the property of user preset effects. You can only edit the user preset effects. (Application of effects to the L or R sides cannot be changed.)

How to Apply Effects

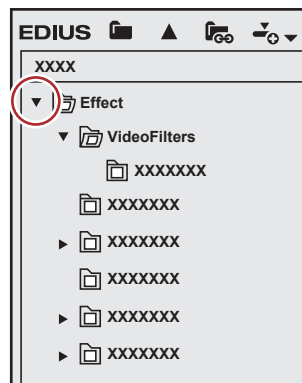
Simply drag and drop an effect on the [Effect] palette to the clip on the timeline to apply the effect. The following procedure explains how to apply video filter as an example. Transitions and keyers can be applied in the same way.

Example:

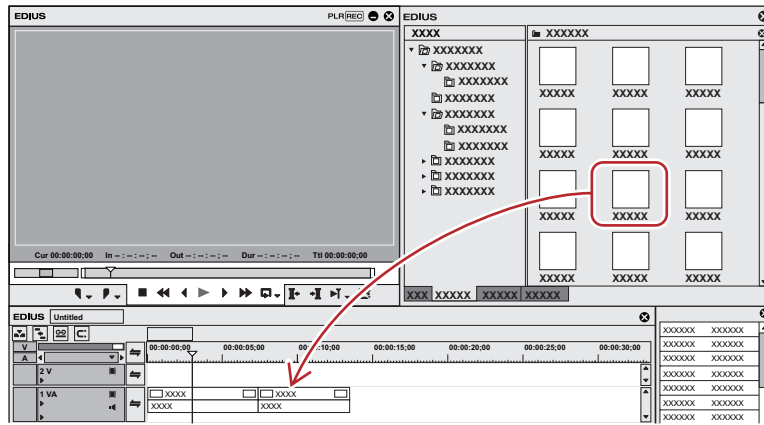
To select from [VideoFilters]

1) Click the [Effect] tab and display the [Effect] palette.

2) In the folder view of the [Effect] palette, click the [Effect] tree, and click [VideoFilters].



3) Drag and drop the effect to be applied onto a clip (video part) on the timeline.



Clips with video filter applied are displayed with an orange line.

Note

- Drag and drop the video filter to the video part of a clip on the V/VA track, and drag and drop the transition to the part where a clip shifts to another or the mixer part of In/Out point of a clip.
- Drag and drop the audio filter to the audio part of a clip on the A/VA track, and drag and drop the audio cross fade to the audio part where a clip shifts to another.
- Drag and drop the title mixer to the mixer part of the In/Out point of a clip on the T track.
- Drag and drop the keyer to the mixer part of a clip on the V/VA track.

Alternative

- Right-click on an effect in the [Effect] palette, and click [Add to Timeline].
- While the effect view is displayed, select a clip or mixer part on the timeline, select an effect in the [Effect] palette, and click [Add to Timeline] in the effect view. For some effects, you can click the [Add to Timeline] list button to specify [In], [Out], and [Both].
- Select a clip or mixer on the timeline, and drag an effect from the [Effect] palette and drop it onto the [Information] palette. Some effects cannot be applied.



- When applying a clip transition or audio cross fade, you can specify the position to apply, including [In], [Out] and [Both], as well as [From], [Center] and [To] for each effect.
- Click the list button of [View] in the [Effect] palette to select the display method of the effect view.



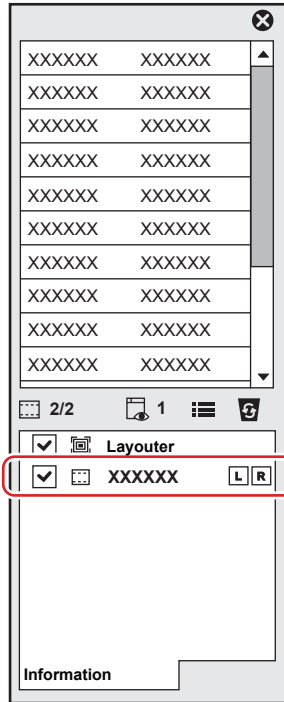

How to Adjust Effects

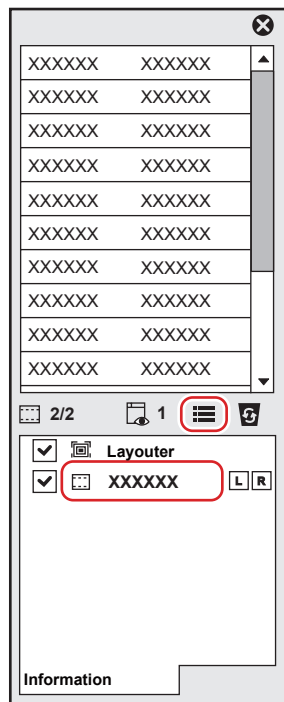
Adjust effects applied on clips on the timeline from the [Information] palette.

1) Click the part of a clip where effects are applied on the timeline.

- The applied effects are displayed in the effect list on the [Information] palette.



2) Click on the name of the effect to be adjusted on the [Information] palette, and click [Open Setup Dialog].



- The dialog box for effect detailed settings appears.

Alternative

- Double-click on an effect name in the [Information] palette.



- Unchecking the check box at the left of the effect name temporarily disables the applied effect.

3) Adjust or set each item.

Setting Effects

Adjusting Color/Brightness (Color Correction)

You can adjust the color tone to match the previous/next video, or adjust the brightness by correcting color cast, highlight detail loss, and shadow detail loss. The following filters are provided for color correction.

■ [3-Way Color Correction]

Correct colors for shadow (black), intermediate (gray), and highlight (white).

“Adjusting 3-Way Color Correction” (► page 357)

■ [YUV Curve]

Adjust luminance (Y), blue color difference (U), and red color difference (V) on the chart. You can make a fine adjustment to balance the shadow and highlight.

Keys can be added for the YUV curve but interpolation animation between keys is not available.

“Adjusting the YUV Curve” (► page 358)

■ [Color Balance]

Adjust chroma, luminance, contrast, and color tone with the slider.

“Adjusting Color Balance” (► page 360)

■ [Color Wheel]

Move the pointer to adjust the color density, or rotate the wheel to adjust the color tone.

“Adjusting Color Wheel” (► page 361)

■ [Monotone]

Make the video monotone.

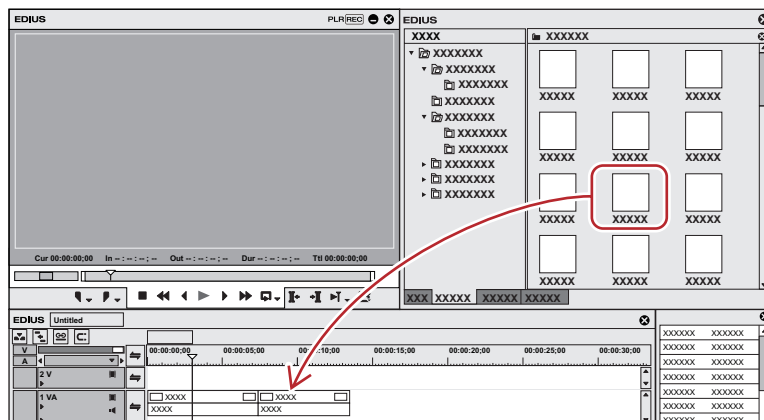
“Adjusting Monotone” (► page 362)

■ [Primary Color Correction]

Adjust the brightness and color by applying color grading on a clip shot in the Log format.

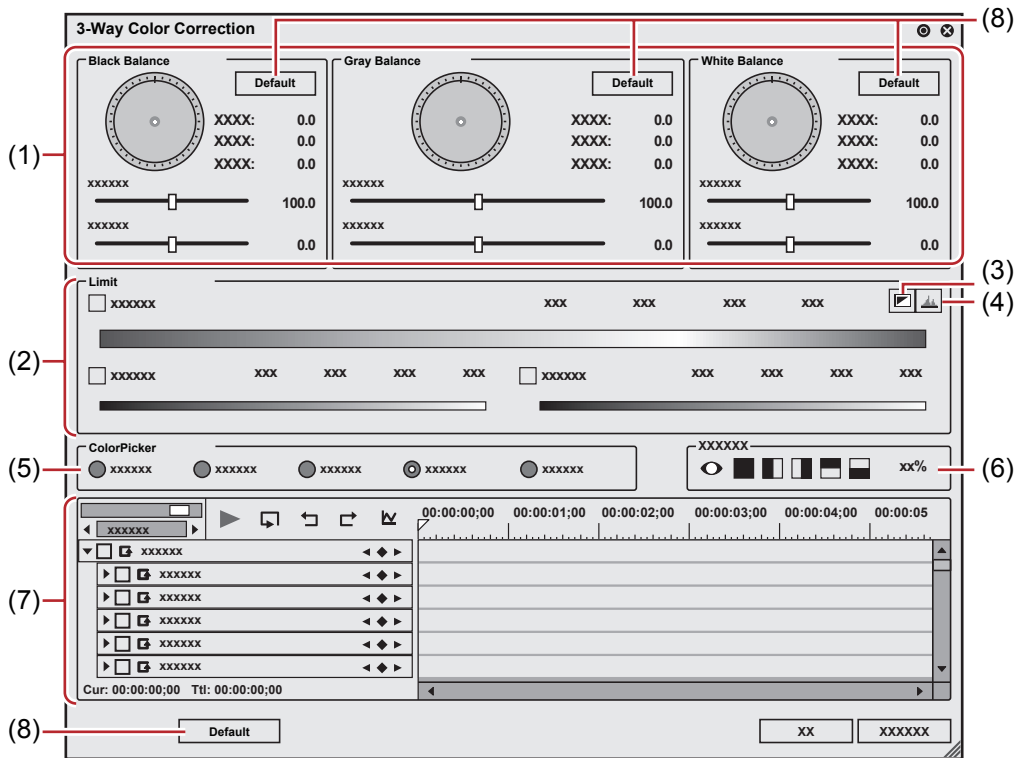

Note

- Colors appear differently depending on the monitor. Therefore, when exact color adjustment is necessary, output the video to the monitor on which the final video is screened.
- If the completed video is broadcasted on TV, adjust the colors within the range of the regulations.
- If you check [Safe Color] in [Color Balance] or [Color Wheel] of color correction, the upper or lower limit of brightness and color can be adjusted within a certain range.

Adjusting Colors Entirely

1) Display the [Information] palette, and double-click [3-Way Color Correction].

- The [3-Way Color Correction] dialog box appears.
“[3-Way Color Correction] Dialog Box” (▶ page 357)

2) Click the color to correct from Color Picker.

- When you click [Black], an adjustment is made so that the color obtained in the color picker should be black. Similarly, an adjustment is made so that it should be gray or white when you select [Gray] or [White], respectively.
- If you click [Auto], the color is determined based on the brightness of the obtained color. For example, the color is adjusted for white when a bright color is obtained.

3) Click the part to correct in Recorder.

- The color is automatically corrected. You can also adjust the color by using the color wheel point, or the sliders of saturation and contrast.

Example:

When correcting a color-casted white table

Click [White] in Color Picker, and click a point on the table in the image.

Correcting Only One Part

You can define the range to apply the correction, when adjusting the color tone of skin.

1) Display the [Information] palette, and double-click [3-Way Color Correction].

2) Click [Color range] in Color Picker.

3) Click the part to correct in Recorder.

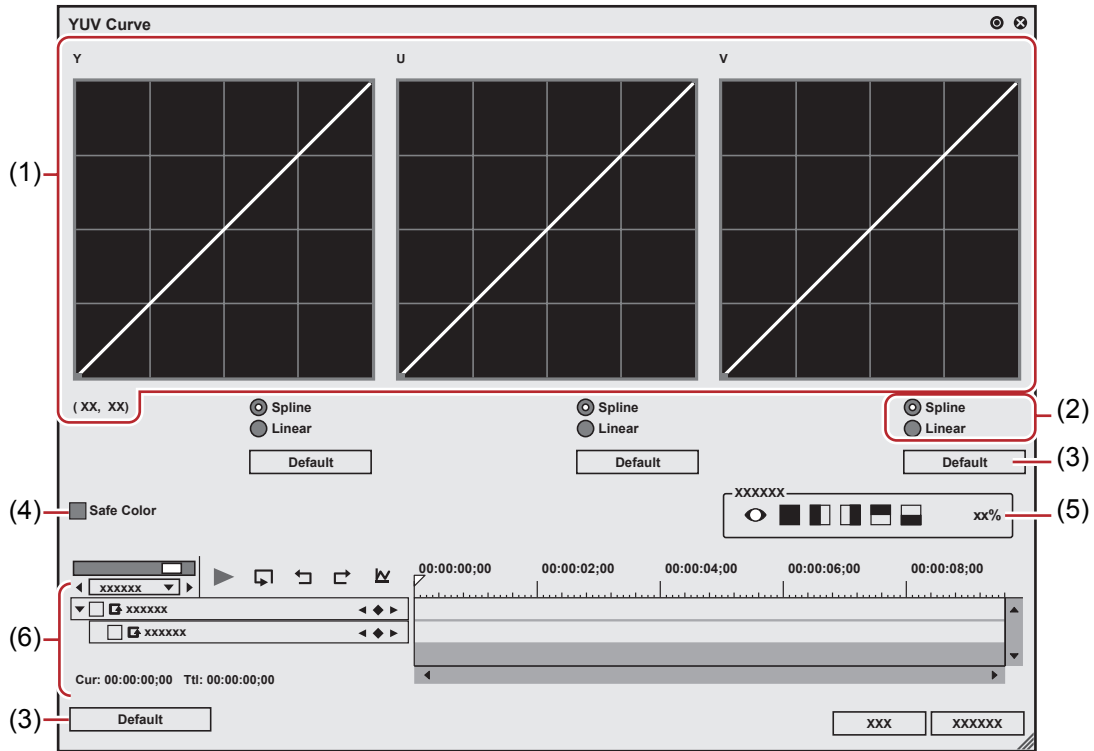

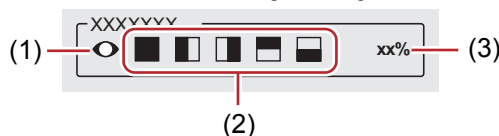

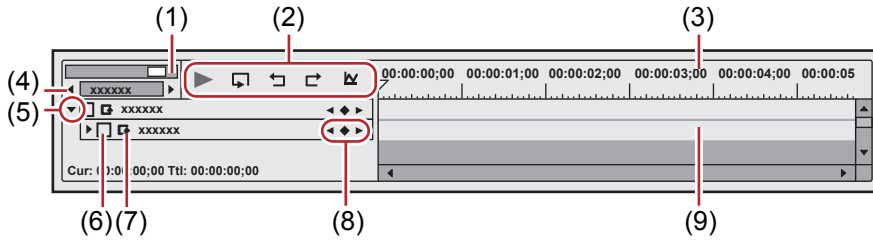



■ Key frame setting

You can change the parameters of color correction along the time axis, and play it to check the result.



(1)	Time scale slider	Drag the slider to the left and right to adjust the time scale display unit. Move the slider to the left to reduce the display unit, or to the right to increase it. The right end is [Fit].
(2)	Playback/Tool buttons	<p>▶ : Play back the timeline on the Recorder. ◻ : Repeatedly play back the clip currently being edited. ↶ : Undo an operation. [Ctrl] + [Z] ↷ : Redo the undone operation. [Ctrl] + [Y] ▭ : Switch the changes of each parameter to the chart view. In the chart view, the timeline is represented by a chart display of the selected key. The parameters can be edited by moving the keys up and down. The numerical values and gradations of the Y axis can be changed by entering numerical values.</p> 
(3)	Time scale for key frame	Display a scale with the unit selected in the time scale setting on the timeline. - When [Shift] + [V] on the keyboard are pressed, a key frame is added to all parameters with a valid key frame setting at the timeline cursor position.

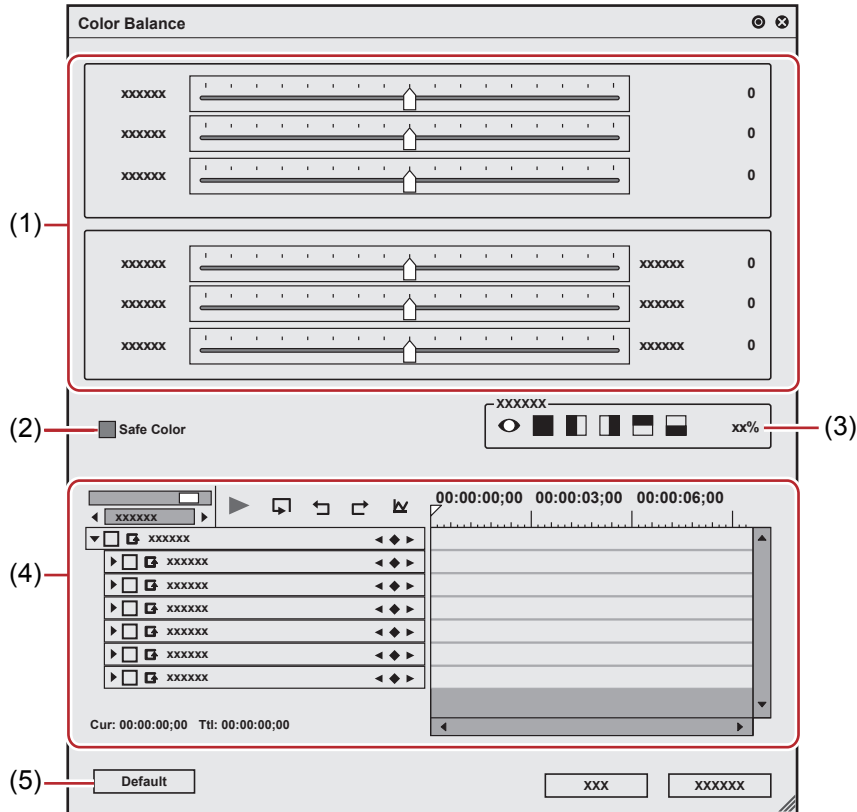

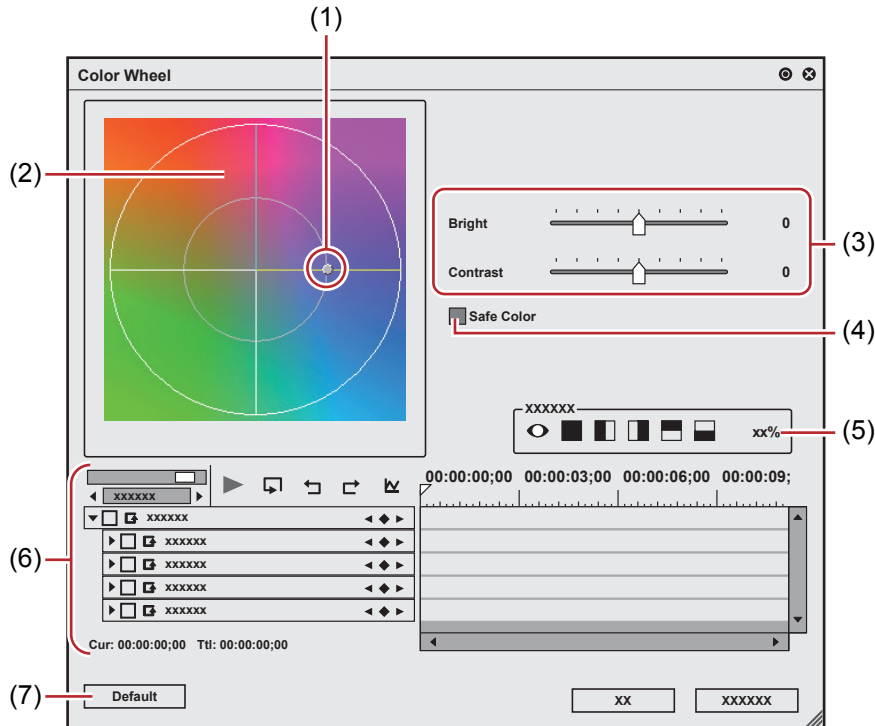

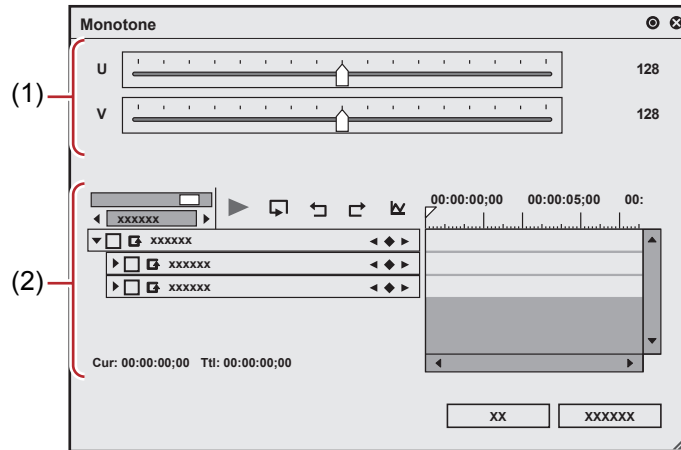

Adjusting Primary Color Correction

You can adjust the brightness and color by applying color grading on a clip shot in the Log format.

[Primary Color Correction] has predefined color space profiles that support Log formats for each of the camera manufacturers.

When a clip is recognized by its metadata as a Log file, [Primary Color Correction] filter will automatically select an optimal color space and adjust the brightness and colors.

You can also select the color space manually.

Alternatively, you can register LUT files (*.cube) to [Primary Color Correction] and apply to clips.

You can obtain preferred brightness and colors by fine adjusting the parameters.

- Some Log formats may not be supported.
- Some LUT files may not be supported.

What is Log?

Log is a shooting format that can maintain wide dynamic range.

For videos shot in the Log format, color grading is essential. By performing color grading on a shot video with lower contrast, wider color tone range can be realized to reproduce realistic images that are closer to what it actually looks like.

Even under conditions where highlight/shadow detail loss is likely to occur, shooting in the Log format will help in correcting the details later without deteriorating the image quality.

What is LUT?

LUT (Look Up Table) is a standard profile for color space conversion. You can apply it to adjust the brightness and color on video shot in the Log format.

Adjusting with [Primary Color Correction]

Example:

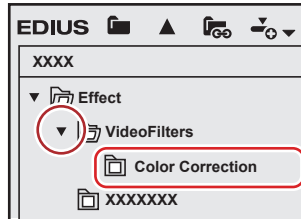
To adjust the brightness and colors of a source shot in the Log format (S-Log source)

Preparation

- Create a project (QFHD 3840x2160 29.97p, 10-bit).
- Import the S-Log source file in the source browser, register it to the bin, and place the clip on the timeline.

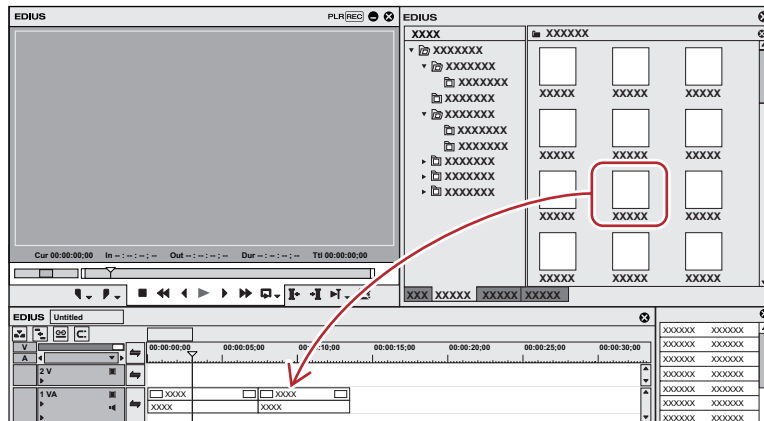

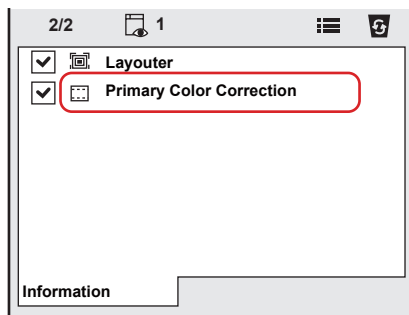

- When a clip is recognized as a Log file, an optimal color space will be applied automatically to adjust the brightness and color. You can view the result of the applied color space in the preview window.
- If a color space has not been applied automatically, you can open the [Primary Color Correction] dialog box to apply a color space manually. To apply a color space manually or finely adjust the brightness and colors, proceed to step 4).

4) Display the [Information] palette, and double-click [Primary Color Correction].



- The [Primary Color Correction] dialog box appears.
 “[Primary Color Correction] Dialog Box” (▶ page 365)

5) Click the list button of [Source] in [Color Space] and select a color space that is optimal for the source shot in the Log format.

- If the color space was selected automatically, this operation is not necessary.

6) While viewing the video in the preview window, make fine adjustment to the parameters.

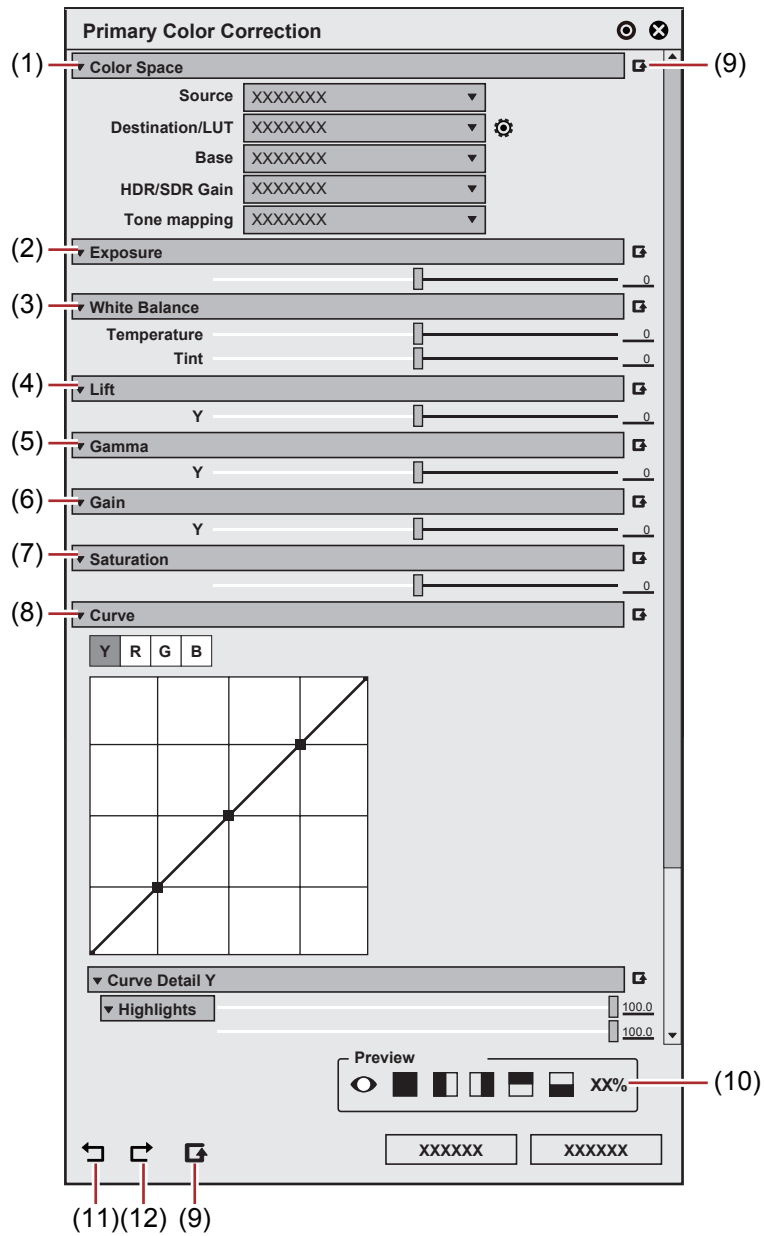
7) Click [OK].

- The [Primary Color Correction] dialog box is closed.



- If real time playback is disabled after [Primary Color Correction] has been applied, using the draft preview or frame skip playback is helpful.

Example When [Primary Color Correction] is Applied

■ Reproducing Clouds Where Highlight Detail Loss Has Occurred

For landscape shooting, “highlight detail loss” may cause the blue sky to appear in all white or the clouds and distant mountains to be merged with each other.

Standard shooting format has limited dynamic range compared to that of the Log format. With an improper exposure setting, highlight detail loss occurs, causing the color tones exceeding the upper limit of the dynamic range to be lost and all replaced by white.

Thus, video shot in the standard format may not be able to reproduce the realistic image quality of material texture, etc. even if applying post-shooting color corrections, because the light condition is adjusted and recorded at the time of shooting.

The Log format has wider dynamic range and enables recording of the range for the tone of light that could normally be recorded as white in the standard shooting. By performing color grading on a Log source, the color tone of areas where highlight details have been lost can be reproduced and video with realistic details like film images can be obtained.

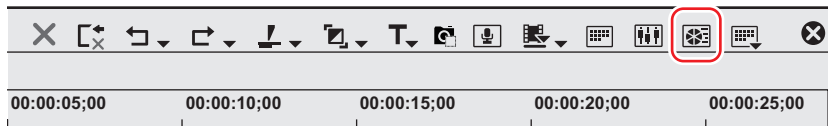

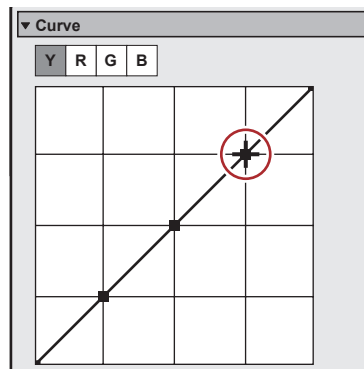

■ Adjusting the Brightness of a Person Where Shadow Detail Loss Has Occurred Due to Backlight

When shot with sunset or light in the background, the image of a person in the video may be dark because of the backlight, resulting in “shadow detail loss”. In the same way as “highlight detail loss”, post-shooting color correction of such a video may not be possible as intended.

If the source is shot in the Log format, the color tone of areas where shadow details have been lost can be reproduced by performing color grading.

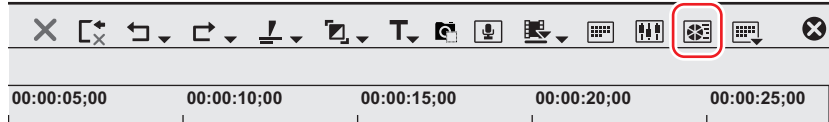

- The results may differ between when the color space is converted with [Primary Color Correction] and when an equivalent LUT file provided by a camera manufacturer is applied, because camera manufacturers make their own adjustments in the file. - The entire LUT data imported from a file is not saved in an effect preset. Therefore, the LUT cannot be referred to (when LUT is not registered or saved in the project file), a proper operation will not be performed, which makes clips on the timeline to appear checkered in red and black.

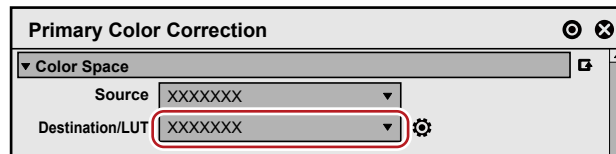

Audio Filter

You can make such adjustment to audio part as reducing noise or emphasizing human voice.

Correct the camera shake by image processing.

If Automatic Tracking Has Been Disrupted

Tracking may be disrupted in the middle when an obstacle blocks the subject being tracked or when the motion is too fast. You can also track in the reverse direction using [Track Reverse].

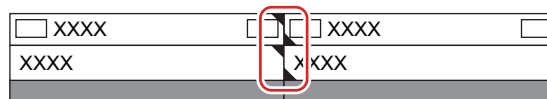

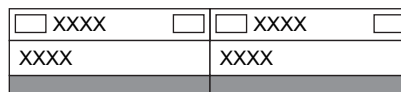
Margin of Clip

The margin of the clip is the video outside the range between In and Out points. Black triangular mark at both ends of the clip means the top (end) of each clip.

In the extend mode, to add transition/audio cross fade between two clips, both clips need margins. If there is no margin, switch to the fix mode or create margins by trimming or other operations.

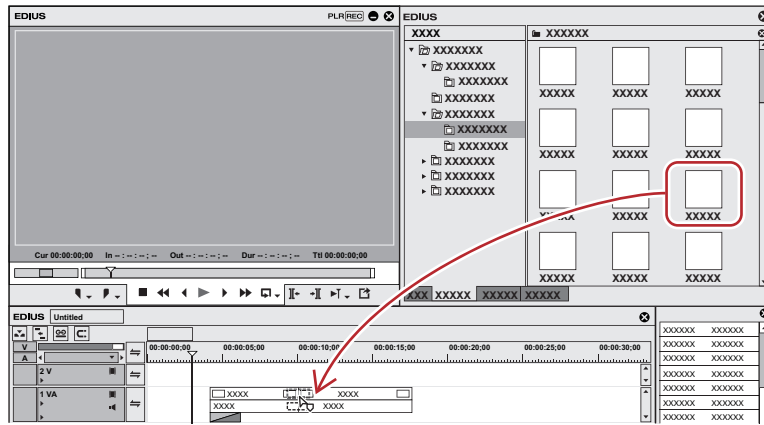

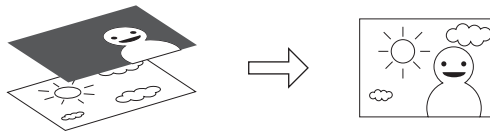
Alpha Channel

You can add a clip with transparency information as an alpha channel (data area with transparency information) of another clip. The effect makes the image to look like being masked, and you can overlay the image onto the image to be the background.

(2)	This is the image to be added to the "Fill" as the alpha channel. It is called "Key".

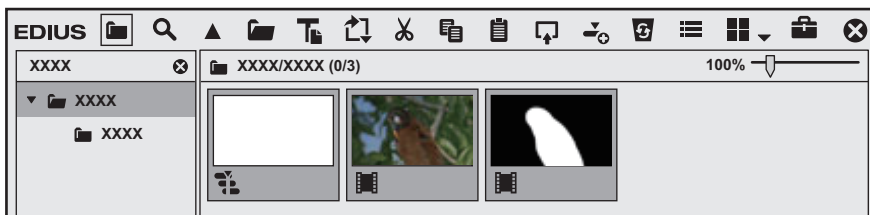

- When you set the transition or audio cross fade, green line (cut point) is displayed. This is the border for the transition before setting. If you delete the transition or audio cross fade, the Out point of the front clip and the In point of the back clip move back to the cut point.



Applying the Adjusted Effect to Another Clip

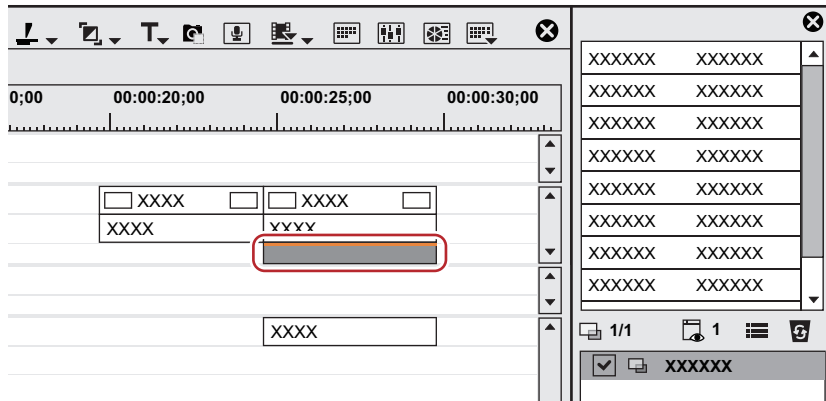
You can copy effects applied to a particular clip, or replace them with other effects from other clips.

Copying Effects

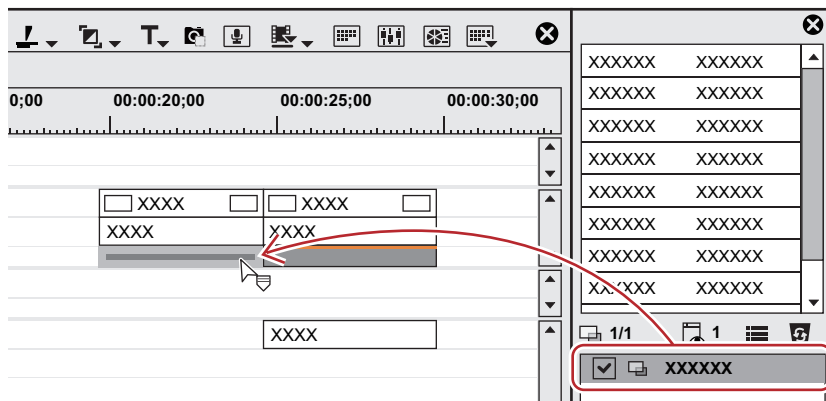
You can copy adjusted effects applied to a clip, and then apply it to other clips with their original settings.

1) Click the area with effects applied on the timeline.

- “Checking/Adjusting Effects” (▶ page 395)



2) Drag and drop the effect in the effect list in the [Information] palette to the copy destination.



Copying Transition

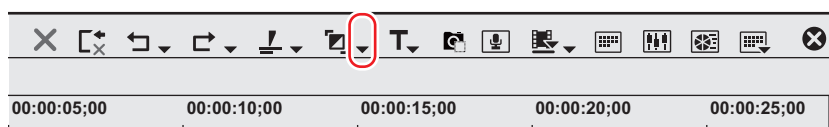
1) Click a transition specified on the timeline, and click [Copy] of the timeline.



2) Select the clip on which to paste the transition.

- If you want to paste a transition to the point of the timeline cursor, click the track on which the clip is placed and move the timeline cursor to the position to paste the transition.

3) Click the [Set Default Transition] list button.



4) Click the clip paste method.

Alternative

- Drag and drop an effect applied to the clip onto the timeline to other clips.

Replacing Effects

Copy an adjusted filter or mixer applied to a clip, and use it to replace a filter or mixer on other clips.

- You can also specify the attributes and detailed settings of a filter or mixer and replace them.
 “Pasting Attributes” (► page 249)

1) Click a clip with a filter or mixer applied, and click [Copy].



2) Select a paste destination clip.

3) Click the [Paste to Current Location] list button on the timeline.



4) Click [Filter] or [Mixer].



- You can also copy the mixer area/clip transition and use it to replace the selected mixer area/clip transition of the paste destination clip.

Alternative

- Select a clip to paste, click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Paste] → [Filter]/[Mixer].
- Right-drag a clip on which a filter or mixer is applied onto a clip to paste, and click [Paste] → [Filter]/[Mixer].
- Drag a mixer with effects to copy and drop it onto the destination mixer.

Preset

Registering Presets

You can register customized effects to [Effect].

Registering Effects to [Effect] Palette

You can adjust an existing effect to create an original effect (user preset effect) and register it to the [Effect] palette. You can also register multiple effects as one effect.

1) Click the area applied with an effect to be registered.

2) Click the folder to register the effect in the [Effect] palette.

- You can also create a new folder.
“Creating Folder in [Effect] Palette” (▶ page 401)

3) Right-click the effect name to register in the [Information] palette, and click [Save as Current User Preset].

- The effect is registered in the folder in the [Effect] palette. “U” appears on the icon of the registered effects.
“User Preset Effect” (▶ page 352)

4) Enter a name.

Alternative

- From the effect list in the [Information] palette, drag and drop the effect name onto a folder in the [Effect] palette.



- You can register multiple effects simultaneously. Select multiple effects and right-click them. Click [Save as Current User Preset] to register the selected multiple effects as one effect, or click [Save as Separate User Preset] to register them as separate effects.

Deleting Effects from [Effect] Palette

Delete the user preset effect.

1) Select the user preset effect to delete in the [Effect] palette, and click [Delete].

- If you want to delete a folder including the effect, select the folder and click [Delete].



2) Click [Yes].

Alternative

- Right-click the user preset effect to delete in the [Effect] palette, and click [Delete].
- Select a user preset effect to delete and press [Delete] key of the keyboard.

Note

- You cannot delete the plug-in base effects and system preset effects.
- If the selected folder includes effects other than the user preset effects, only the user preset effects are deleted.
- If the selected folder includes folders registered as a folder shortcut, a confirmation dialog box appears. Click [OK] to delete the folder.

Customizing [Effect] Palette

You can rename effects and folders, or change the folder structure.

Creating Folder in [Effect] Palette

You can create a new folder in the [Effect] palette.

1) Right-click a folder in the [Effect] palette and click [Create New Folder].

- A new folder is created under the selected folder.

2) Enter a name.

Renaming Effects

You can change the name of an effect or a folder.

1) Right-click an effect or a folder and click [Change Name].

Alternative

- Click the name of the effect or folder.
- Right-click an effect and click [Properties]. Change the name in the [Properties] dialog box and click [OK].

2) Enter a name.



- You cannot rename the plug-in base effects and system preset effects.

Folder Structure of [Effect] Palette

You can sort effects or folders, or change the folder structure. Or you can lock them not to move by mistake.

Fixing Folder Structure

1) Click [lock] in the [Effect] palette.



- Each click on [lock] switches the lock on and off.

Note

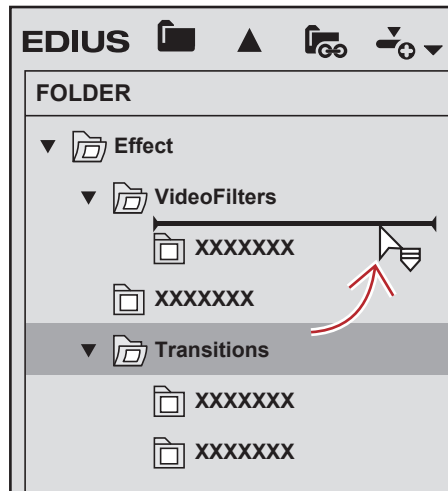
- When you select [Back to default], the settings return to the default even after [lock] is enabled.
“Initializing [Effect] Palette” (► page 402)

Changing Folder Structure



- Before making an operation, click [lock] to disable the lock.

- 1) Drag and drop an effect or folder to the destination.



Folder Shortcuts

You can quickly open the frequently used folders by assigning them to folder shortcut.

Setting with Effect View

- 1) Select a folder to set as a shortcut.
- 2) Click [Folder Link] in the [Effect] palette.



- 3) Click [Add Link].

- The selected folder is added to the list.



- You can assign up to 8 folders to a folder shortcut.

Deleting Folder Shortcuts

- 1) Click [Folder Link] in the [Effect] palette.



- 2) Click [Arrange].

- The [Arrange] dialog box appears.

- 3) Select a shortcut to delete and click [Delete].

- Click [Close] to finish the operation.

Initializing [Effect] Palette

You can reset the [Effect] palette to the default.

- 1) Right-click the [Effect] palette, and click [Back to default].

2) Click [OK].

 **Note**

- When you select [Back to default], the settings return to the default even after [lock] is enabled.

Import/Export

You can export the effect you created and import to other EDIUS, or import effects created by EDIUS.

Exporting Effects (Export)

You can export and save user preset effects. The extension of the saved file is “.tpd”.

1) Right-click the effect or folder to export in the [Effect] palette, and click [Export].

- The [Save As] dialog box appears.

2) Set a file name and save destination, and click [Save].

Importing Effects (Import)

You can read the effect file with the extension “.tpd” as user preset effect.

1) Right-click the folder to import the user preset effect in the [Effect] palette, and click [Import].

2) Select a file, and click [Open].

- A new folder is created in the selected folder, and the imported effect is registered to the folder.



- Effects for audio can also be imported by registering the VST plug-in.
“VST Plug-in Registration” (▶ page 116)

Chapter 9

Title

This chapter explains how to use the Quick Titler software for creating a title and manipulating a title clip with EDIUS.

Quick Titler

Starting up and Exiting Quick Titler

Creating a New Title

Quick Titler starts up automatically when you create a title clip with EDIUS. If started up from the timeline, the created title is placed on the timeline, and if started up from the bin, the title is registered in the bin.

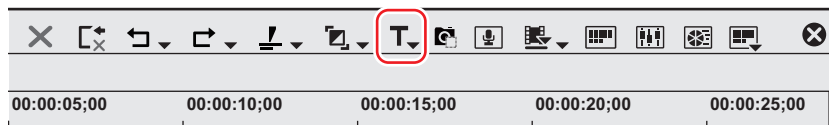


- The existing titler can be changed from [Application] in [User Settings] → [Other].
“[Other]” (▶ page 120)
- You can also start up Quick Titler independently by double-clicking QuickTitler.exe. However, it cannot be started up on the PC without EDIUS license.
- To check the version information for Quick Titler, click [Version Info], or click [Help] on the Quick Titler menu bar → [Quick Titler Version Information].

Creating a Title Clip on the Timeline

1) Move the timeline cursor to the position in which to create a title clip.

2) Click [Create Title] of the timeline.



3) Select a track to create a title.

- Quick Titler will start up.
- The created title clip is placed on the timeline, and also simultaneously registered in the bin.
- If In and Out points have not been set on the timeline, when a title is created and saved, the title clip is placed on the selected track at the position of the timeline cursor. The default duration can be set from [Source] in [User Settings] on EDIUS → [Duration].
“[Duration]” (▶ page 124)
- If In and Out points have been set on the timeline, the title clip is placed between In and Out points on the selected track when a title is created and saved. Even if In and Out points have been set, you can also configure the settings in order to place the title clip with a default duration.
“[Duration]” (▶ page 124)

Alternative

- Right-click the track on which to place the title clip, and click [New Clip] → [QuickTitler].
- Starting up Quick Titler: [T]

Note

- If the video source channel has been deleted, you cannot select [Create Title in Video Channel Track].
“Connecting/Disconnecting the Source Channel” (▶ page 235)

Registering a Title Clip in the Bin without Placing on the Timeline

1) Click [Add Title] in the bin.



- Quick Titler will start up.

Alternative

- Click [Clip] on the EDIUS menu bar, and click [Create Clip] → [QuickTitler].

- Right-click a blank area in the clip view of the bin window, and click [Add Title].
- Right-click a blank area in the clip view of the bin window, and click [New Clip] → [QuickTitler].

Exiting Quick Titler

This section explains how to exit Quick Titler.



- Quick Titler exits when you save the title clip currently being edited.

1) Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Close].

Alternative

- Click [×] in the Quick Titler window.

2) Click [Yes].

- Click [No] if you do not want to save the title clip. Click [Cancel] to cancel the operation.

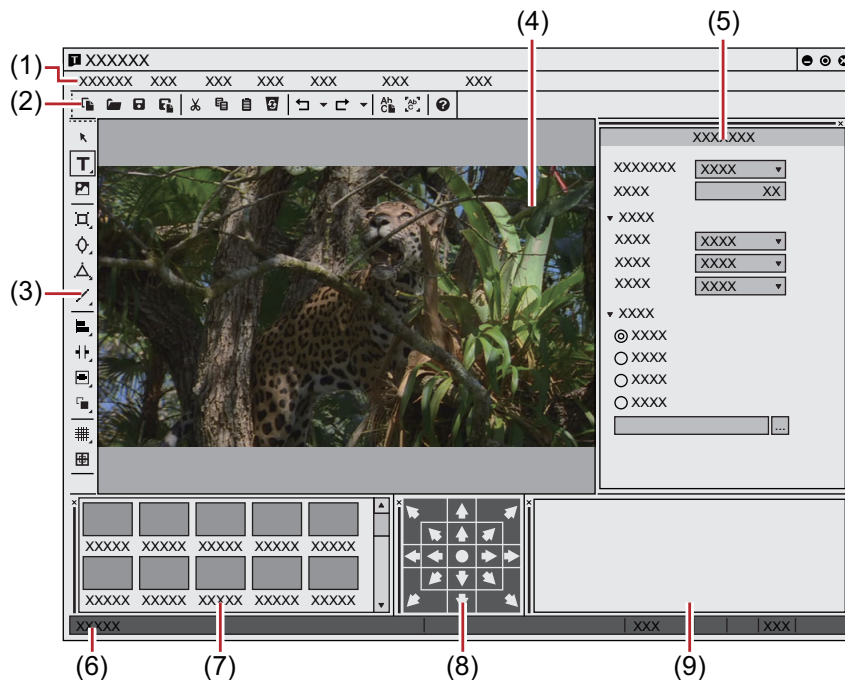
About the Quick Titler Screen Configuration

About the Screen

The following explains the Quick Titler screen.

The Quick Titler screen mainly consists of a screen for the creation/editing of objects, a properties panel for setting the color and effects, and a style list that displays preset styles.

Quick Titler Screen



(1)	Quick Titler menu bar	Perform general operations for Quick Titler.
(2)	File tool bar	Operation buttons for new file creation/saving, copying/deleting, style registration and preview.
(3)	Object tool bar	Operation buttons for selection, text entry and creation/alignment of objects.
(4)	Object creating screen	Edit a title.
(5)	Title object property bar	Set the properties of a selected text object. [Background Properties], [Text Properties],[Image Properties],[Object Properties] will be displayed respectively.
(6)	Status bar	Displays a simple description of an operation button or menu, keyboard status and text object location.
(7)	Title object style bar	Displays a list of the styles that can be applied to a currently selected text object.

(8)	Layout bar	Align a text object to the center/title safe area/overscan area. Not displayed at the start-up for the first time. “Showing/Hiding Bars” (▶ page 407)
(9)	Text entry bar	Enter text. Not displayed at the start-up for the first time. Text can also be entered directly in the object creating screen. “Showing/Hiding Bars” (▶ page 407)



- Click [Preview Mode] or press [Ctrl] + [Shift] + [F3] on the keyboard to switch between the high resolution and low resolution of the preview.



- Press [F5] on the keyboard to switch focus between the object creating screen, title object property bar and title object style bar.
- If Quick Titler is started up independently, [Video settings] in [Background Properties] will be enabled. Set the video format, frame size and aspect ratio of the title to be created.

Showing/Hiding Bars

You can switch the show/hide setting for the title object property bar and title object style bar, etc.

1) Click [View] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click a bar to hide/show.

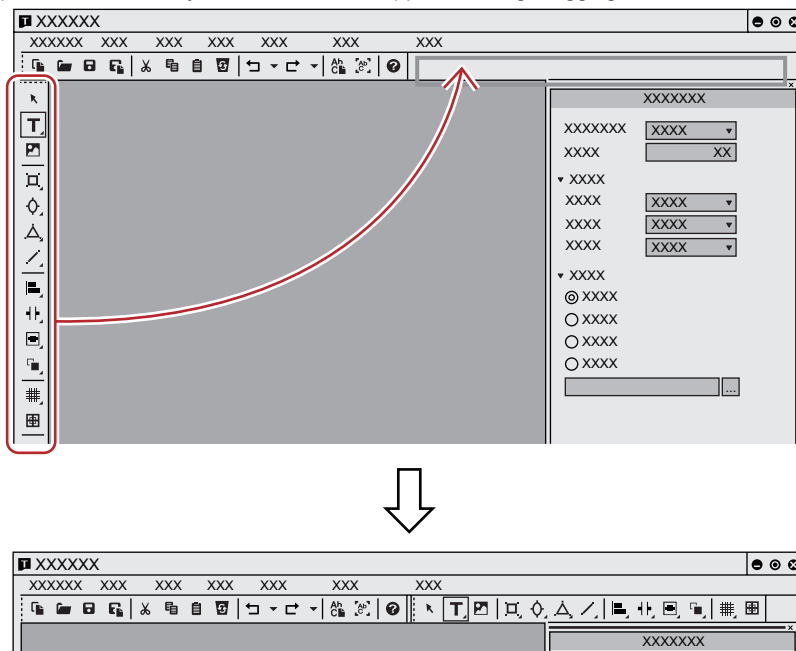
- When a bar is checked it will be shown, and if unchecked, it will be hidden.

Moving Bars

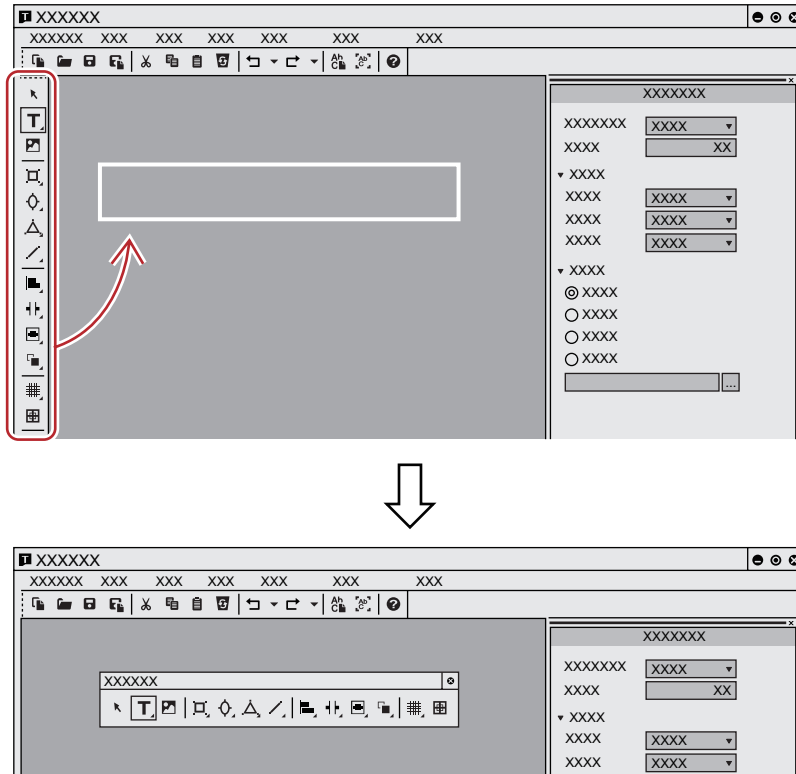
You can place the title object property bar and title object style bar where you want.

1) Drag a bar to move and drop it in its destination.

- Bars will be moved into a position indicated by a white frame that appears during dragging.



- If dropped into a position indicated with a thick white frame, the bar will float as a new window.



Creating/Saving Title Clip

Creating a New Title Clip

When Quick Titler is started up from an EDIUS timeline, a new title clip is created automatically. This section describes how to create a new title clip during Quick Titler editing or after start-up.

- 1) Click [File] on the file tool bar.



Alternative

- Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [New].
- Creating a new title clip: **[Ctrl] + [N]**

Opening a Title Clip

You can open and edit an existing title clip.

- 1) Click [Open] on the file tool bar.



- 2) Select a file, and click [Open].

Alternative

- Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Open].
- Opening a title clip: **[Ctrl] + [O]**



- When you click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, up to 4 of the most recently edited title clips are displayed. Click the file name to open the file.
- When you double-click a title clip on the EDIUS timeline or in the bin, a titler starts up and the file is opened.

Exporting a Still Image

You can export a title you have created, including the background, as a still image.

1) Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Export].

- The [Save As] dialog box appears.

2) Select the save destination, file name and file format, and click [Save].

Overwrite Saving

You can overwrite save a title clip during editing.

Note

- When using multiples of the same title clip on a timeline, editing one of the title clips will update the content of all the title clips. If you want to edit only one title clip out of multiple same title clips, save it in another name.

1) Click [Save] on the file tool bar.



- Save the title clip and exit Quick Titler.

Alternative

- Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Save].
- Overwrite saving: **[Ctrl] + [S]**



- When [Save] is clicked, the file is saved in the "title" folder present in the folder where the project file is saved. The file name will be "Year, month and day saved-4-digit sequential number.etl".
- If you start up Quick Titler independently to edit a title and click [Save], the file will be saved in another name.

Saving in Another Name

You can save a title clip being edited with a given name.

1) Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Save As].

- The [Save As] dialog box appears.

2) Enter a file name, select a file format from the [Save as type] list, and then click [Save].

- Save the title clip and exit Quick Titler.
- For the file format, *.etl or *.etl2 can be selected.
If *.etl2 is set as the file format, the same rendering result can be obtained for titles that have been created with different DPI.
If you want to prioritize the compatibility with titles created in Version 8.5 and earlier, set it to the conventional file format (*.etl).



- If you double-click a title clip on the timeline to start up Quick Titler and then save in another name, only the title clip opened with the double-click will be updated, while a new title clip will be registered in the bin.

Automatic Saving in Another Name

You can automatically save the title clip being edited with a given name.

Note

- When Quick Titler has been started up independently, you cannot save automatically with another name.

1) Click [Auto save as] on the file tool bar.

- The title clip will be saved with the file name “Year, month and day saved-4-digit sequential number.etl”.

Alternative

- Click [File] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Auto save as].
- Automatic saving in another name: **[Ctrl] + [Shift] + [S]**

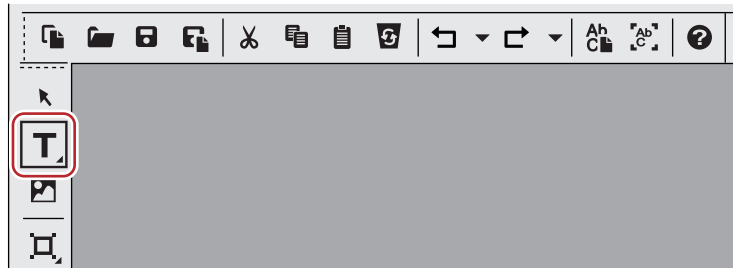


- If you double-click a title clip on the timeline to start up Quick Titler and then save in another name, only the title clip opened with the double-click will be updated, while a new title clip will be registered in the bin.

Creating Text Object

Entering Text

This section explains how to enter text.

1) Click [Horizontal Text] on the object tool bar.

- If you click and hold down [Horizontal Text], you can select [Vertical Text].

2) Click on the object creating screen.

- The text cursor appears on the object creating screen.

3) Enter text using the keyboard.

- You can also display a text input bar to edit text.
“Showing/Hiding Bars” (► page 407)

Alternative

- Click [Insert] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Text] → [Horizontal] or [Vertical].
- Right-click with nothing selected, and click [Insert] → [Text] → [Horizontal] or [Vertical].
- Right-click a text box and click [Edit text].



- You can input text by importing text files.
“Importing External Files” (► page 413)

Formatting Settings

You can change the text format such as the font or text size.

Settings such as font or text decoration can be changed under [Font] on the text properties bar. Text format settings can be applied at the character or level or at the line level.

1) Select the text string or text box to be formatted.



- Kerning, Font, Default size, Bold, Italic and Underline can be applied at the character level. To apply to specific characters, drag along the desired character string to select it. When no specific character string is selected, format settings can be applied to an entire selected text box. You can change leading at the line level. To apply leading to a specific line, place the cursor in the desired line. To set leading for an entire text, select the text box.

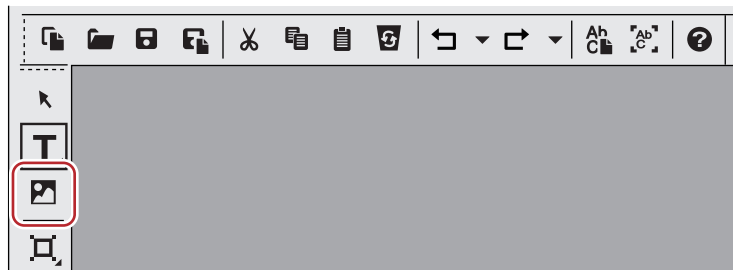
2) Set the text format using text properties.

[X], [Y]	Specify the position of a text box.
[Width]/[Height]	Specify the size of a text box. The character size will also be increased/decreased to fit in a text box. Check [Fix aspect ratio] to fix the aspect ratio.
[Kerning]	Enter a value. Set a value in the range of -300% to 300%.
[Leading]	Enter a value. Considering that a leading value of "0" is 100%, set a value in the range of -300% to 300%.
[Font]	Select the font.
[Size]	Select the character size.
[Horizontal], [Vertical]	Select between horizontal or vertical.
[Bold]/[Italic]/[Underline]	Click a button to apply a Bold, Italic or Underline effect to text strings.
[Left Tab]/[Center]/[Right Tab]	Specify the alignment of a text string. For vertical text, [Top], [Center] or [Bottom] can be selected.

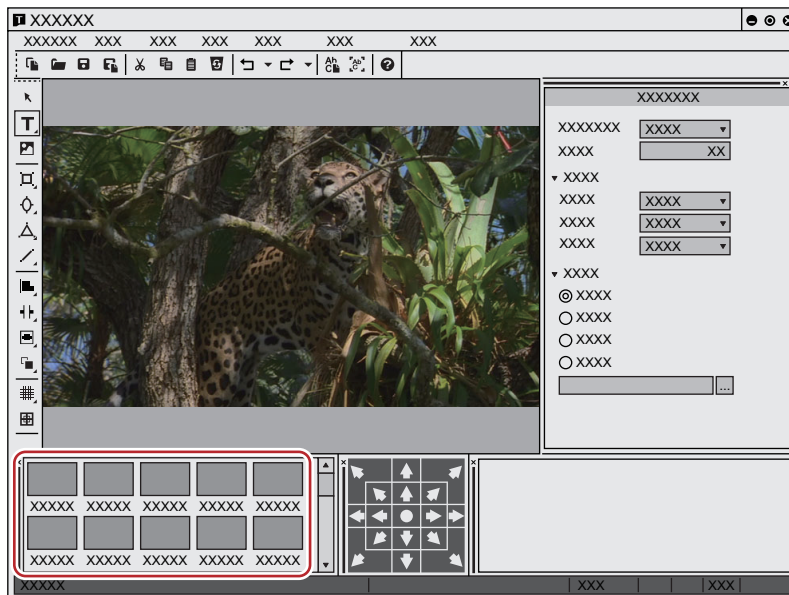
Creating Images

You can select and place your desired image from those provided on the title object style bar.

1) Click [Image] on the object tool bar.



- Style chips are displayed on the title object style bar.



2) Click the style chip you want to create.

3) Click or drag the object creating screen.

- An image will be placed in the selected style.
- Drag the image to the desired size.

Alternative

- Click [Insert] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Image].
- Right-click with nothing selected, and click [Insert] → [Image].



- To place any still image, after step 3), click [...] of the [File] tree on the image properties bar and select a file.

Creating Graphics

You can create your desired graphics.

1) Click [Rectangle], [Ellipse] or [IsoscelesTriangle] on the object tool bar.

- Clicking and holding a button of a shape will let you select a rounded rectangle, circle or right-angled triangle.



2) Click or drag the object creating screen.

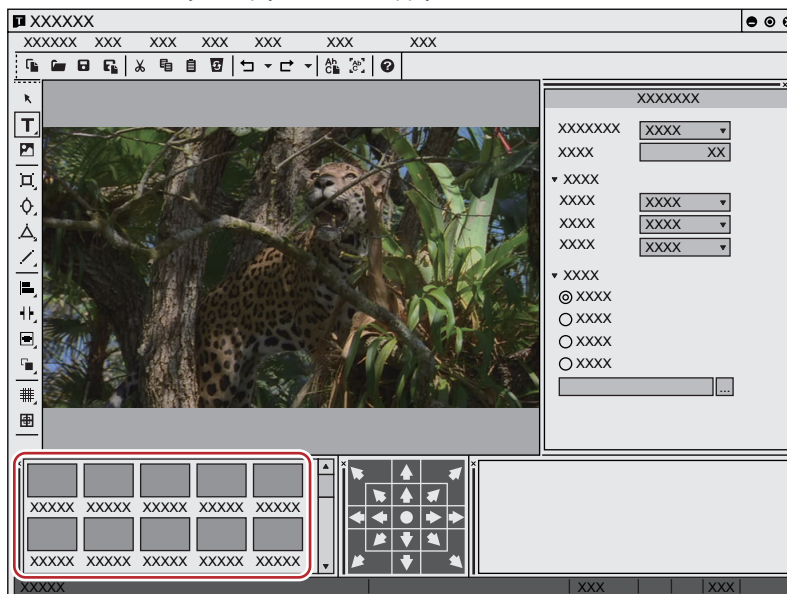
- The shape will be placed.
- Drag the shape to the size you want the shape to be.

Alternative

- Click [Insert] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click the type of shape to be created.
- Right-click with nothing selected, and click [Insert] → shape type.

3) Set the style.

- Use the object properties bar to set the style such as color or border.
 “Applying Effects to Text Object” (▶ page 420)
- In the title object style bar, double-click the style chip you want to apply.



Creating Lines

You can create straight or polygonal lines.

1) Click [Line] on the object tool bar.

- If you click and hold down [Line], you can select [Continuous line].



2) Click or drag the object creating screen.

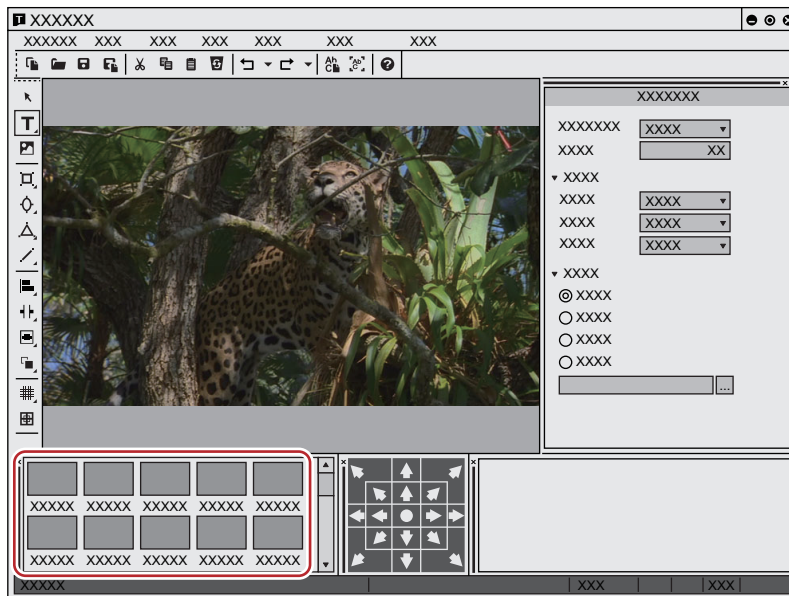
- The line will be placed.
- Drag on the screen to the length you want the line to be.
- If [Continuous line] was selected, click the start point → click the corner points → double-click the final point on the line.

Alternative

- Click [Insert] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Line] → [Line] or [Continuous line].

3) Set the style.

- Click the [Style] tree on the object properties bar, and then select a line type and shape of start/end point from the list.
- You can also select other settings like color or border.
- **“Applying Effects to Text Object” (▶ page 420)**
- In the title object style bar, double-click the style chip you want to apply.



Importing External Files

You can import text files or image files by dropping them on the object creating screen.



- The following file formats can be imported.
 - Text file: TXT
 - Image file: BMP, GIF, JPEG, PNG, TIFF, TARGA, PSD, EMF

1) Drag and drop the file you want to import from your desktop or a folder onto the object creating screen.

- For image files, clicking [Original size] under [Transform] on the image properties bar resizes the image to its original size.

Alternative

- For images, create an image, and then select the image files by clicking [...] of the [File] tree on the properties bar.
- For text, put the cursor in a text box, click [Insert] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and then click [Text] → [File]. Select a text file in the [Open] dialog box.

Text Object Operations

Copying

You can copy a text object.

1) Select a text object, and click [Copy] on the file tool bar.

- You can then paste it.

Alternative

- Right-click a text object and click [Copy].
- Click [Edit] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Copy].
- Copying: [Ctrl] + [C]

Cutting

You can cut a text object.

1) Select a text object, and click [Cut] on the file tool bar.

- You can then paste it.

Alternative

- Right-click a text object and click [Cut].
- Click [Edit] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Cut].
- Cutting: [Ctrl] + [X]

Pasting

You can paste a copied or cut text object.

1) Copy or cut a text object.

- “Copying” (► page 414)
- “Cutting” (► page 414)

2) Click [Paste] on the file tool bar.

- A copied or cut text object will be pasted in the same position as the original text object.

Alternative

- Right-click a text or object and click [Paste].
- Click [Edit] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Paste].
- Pasting: [Ctrl] + [V]



- A copied or cut text object can be pasted onto another title clip.
- When you have dragged along a text to select it then copy or cut it, the text can then be pasted at the cursor position when in text editing mode. The text can only be pasted when in text editing mode.
- When a text box is selected then copied or cut, it cannot be pasted when in text editing mode.

Deleting

You can delete a text object.

- 1) Select a text object, and click [Delete] on the file tool bar.



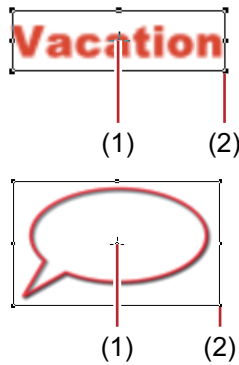
Alternative

- Right-click a text object and click [Delete].
- Click [Edit] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Delete].
- Deleting: [Delete]

Resizing a Text Object

You can resize a text object.

You can adjust a text object size by dragging the edge of the object frame.



(1)	Center point handle
(2)	Operation handle

- 1) Place the mouse cursor over an operation handle.
- 2) When the mouse cursor changes shape, start to drag.



Changing by Entering Values

You can specify size from the [Transform] tree on the properties bar.

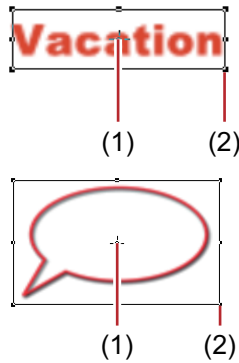
- 1) Select a text object and enter values for [Width] and [Height].

- Check [Fix aspect ratio] to fix the aspect ratio.
- For images, click [Original size] to return an image to its original size.

Rotating a Text Object

You can rotate a text object.

To rotate a text object, drag a corner of the object frame.



(1)	Center point handle
(2)	Operation handle

1) While holding down the [Ctrl] key, place the mouse cursor over an operation handle.

- If you move the mouse cursor over a center point handle, the mouse cursor shape changes, and you can drag to move the axis of rotation. To return the rotation axis to the center point, click the background to deselect the selected text object.

2) When the mouse cursor changes shape, start to drag.



- Rotating while holding down the [Shift] key rotates the text object in 15-degree increments. Rotating while holding down the [Alt] key rotates the text object around the center of opposite corners.

Undoing Operations/Redoing Undone Operations

You can undo a performed operation or redo an undone operation. Up to 10 undos and 10 redos are recorded. You can select to undo/redo an operation from the list of recorded operations.

1) Click [Undo] or [Redo] on the file tool bar.



Alternative

- Undoing operation: [Ctrl] + [Z]
- Redoing undone operation: [Ctrl] + [Y]



- Clicking the [Undo] or [Redo] list button displays a list of 10 operations performed. You can select how many operations to undo or redo.

Adjusting Position of Text Object



- EDIUS can be used to configure the layout of a title clip.
 “Layout Settings” (► page 429)

Moving a Text Object

You can move a text object.

- 1) Click a text object and, after the mouse cursor changes shape, drag it.



Changing by Entering Values

You can specify the position from [Transform] on the properties bar.

- 1) Select a text object and enter values for [X] and [Y].

Aligning a Text Object

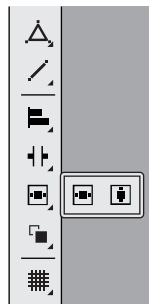
You can align text objects.

Alignment to the Vertical/Horizontal Center

- 1) Select the text objects to be aligned.

- Multiple text objects can be selected with the selection tool by clicking them while holding down the [Ctrl] key on the keyboard.

- 2) Click [Center (vertically)] or [Center (horizontally)] on the object tool bar.



Alternative

- Click [Layout] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Center in screen] → [Vertical] or [Horizontal].
- Right-click a text object, and click [Layout] → [Center in screen] → [Vertical] or [Horizontal].

Alignment to a Reference Text Object

- 1) Select the text objects to be aligned.

- Multiple text objects can be selected with the selection tool by clicking them while holding down the [Ctrl] key on the keyboard.

- 2) Right-click the text object, click [Next Object] and then select a text object to be used as a reference for alignment.

- The text object with an operation handle displayed at its border is the selected text object (active object).
- You can switch the active object by clicking [Next Object].

3) Click [Left Tab] on the object tool bar.

- If you click and hold down [Left Tab], you can select between [Right Tab], [Top], [Bottom], [Center (vertically)] and [Center (horizontally)].



Alternative

- Click [Layout] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Align] → an item.
- Right-click a text object, and click [Layout] → [Align] → an item.



- When multiple text objects are selected, you can apply Align Left, Align Right, Align Top, Align Bottom, Align Center (vertically), and Align Center (horizontally).

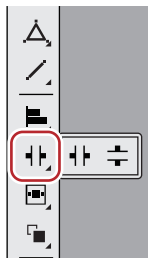
Uniform Horizontal/Vertical Alignment

1) Select the text objects to be aligned.

- Multiple text objects can be selected with the selection tool by clicking them while holding down the [Ctrl] key on the keyboard.

2) Click [Align at top and bottom] on the object tool bar.

- If you click and hold down [Align at top and bottom], you can select [Align at right and left].



Alternative

- Click [Layout] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Same space] → an item.
- Right-click a text object, and click [Layout] → [Same space] → an item.



- Align vertically and align horizontally can be applied when 3 or more text objects are selected.

Layout Settings

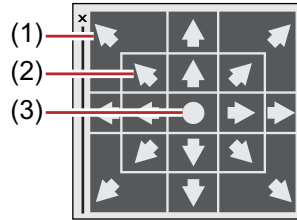
You can align text and objects to fit the center, title safe area or overscan area.

1) Show the layout bar.

- “Showing/Hiding Bars” (► page 407)

2) Select a text object and then click where to place it using the layout bar.

- Multiple text objects can be selected with the selection tool by clicking them while holding down the [Ctrl] key on the keyboard.



(1)	Overscan
(2)	Title safe area
(3)	Center

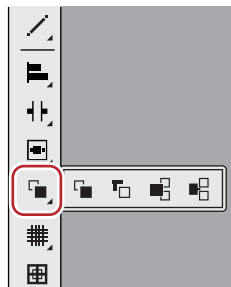
Switching the Order of Text Objects

You can switch the order of text and objects.

1) Select the text and objects you want to switch the order of.

2) Click [Front] on the object tool bar.

- If you click and hold down [Front], you can select [Back], [Move to Top] or [Move to Bottom].



Alternative

- Click [Layout] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Order] → an item.
- Right-click a text object, and click [Layout] → [Order] → an item.

Showing/Hiding Grid and Safe Area

You can display a grid or safe area on the object creating screen to use as a guide when moving text objects.

1) Click [Line Grid] or [Title Safe Area] on the object tool bar.

- If you click and hold down [Line Grid], you can select [Dot Grid].



Alternative

- Click [View] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Grid] → [Dot Grid] or [Line Grid].
- Click [View] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Title Safe Area].



- If Quick Titler starts up from EDIUS, the 4:3 title safe area will also be displayed when [4:3] for the 16:9 screen guide line is set to be displayed through [Preview] in [User Settings] → [Overlay].

Displaying a Background

You can import EDIUS Recorder images or any still images to be the background of the object creating screen to use as a guide when positioning text objects.

Clicking the background will display the background properties.

- 1) Click the [Background] tree on the background properties bar, and then select an item to be displayed as background.



- If you have selected [Still Image], click [...] and select a still image in the [Select Background File] dialog box.
- Even if a background is set as the background in the background properties of QuickTitler, the background is not used in the title clip. The background set in the background properties is available as the background for the edit screen. To output an edited title with a background, export a still image.

Applying Effects to Text Object



- EDIUS can be used to apply effects such as fade-in/fade-out.

- You can apply effects using the properties bar. A text, image or shape properties bar will be displayed depending on whether text, an image or shape is selected. The text properties bar is used here for demonstration purposes. Your screen may differ depending on what you have selected.

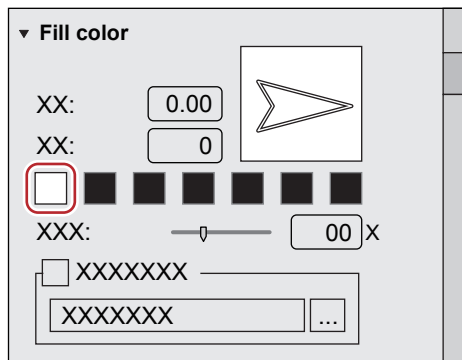
Color Settings

You can set the color of text and shapes. You can also apply a gradation effect.

Note

- You cannot change the color for images.

- 1) Select the text or shape in which to change the color.
- 2) Click the [Fill color] tree on the properties bar.
- 3) Click the color palette.

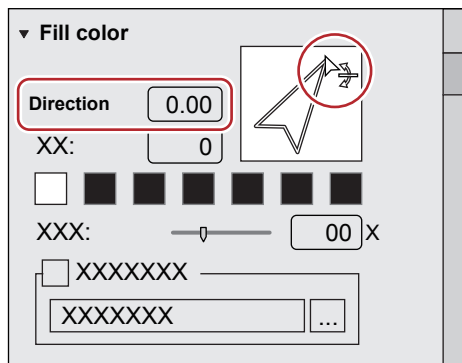

Gradation Settings

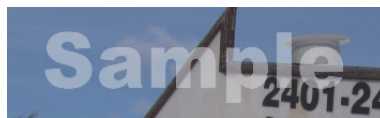

- 2) Click the [Fill color] tree on the properties bar.
- 3) Enter the number of colors used for the gradation in [Color].
 - Up to 7 colors can be used.
- 4) Click the color palette.
 - The [Color Select] dialog box appears.
 - “[Color Select] Dialog Box” (► page 203)
- 5) Specify a color.
- 6) Repeat steps 4) and 5) for the number of specified colors.
- 7) Adjust the color gradation by entering a value in [Direction] or by dragging the arrow figure.



Transparency Settings

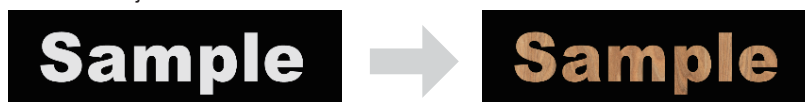
You can adjust the transparency of a text object in order to see the background behind it.



- 1) Select the text object of which to adjust transparency.
- 2) Click the [Fill color] tree on the properties bar.
- 3) Move the [Transparency] slider to adjust transparency.

Pasting Texture

You can paste a texture file onto a text object.



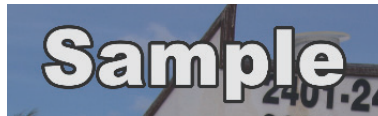
- 1) Select a text object in which to paste texture.
- 2) Click the [Fill color] tree on the properties bar.
 - To paste the texture on the edge (border), click the [Edge] tree (for objects, click the [Border / Line Shape] tree).
- 3) Check [Texture File], and click [...].
- 4) Select the image file to be pasted, and click [Open].



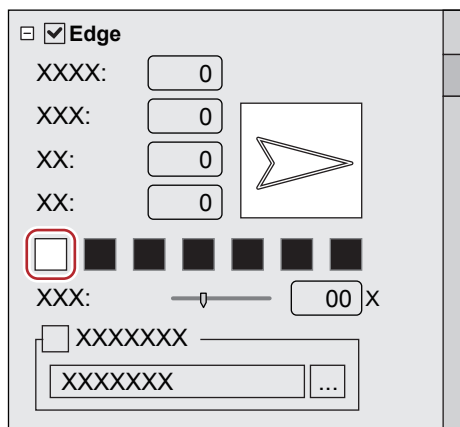

Edge (Border) Settings

You can set the color of or paste a texture to text and object borders.



- 1) Select a text object on which to apply an edge (border).
- 2) Click the [Edge] tree on the properties bar, and check it.
 - [Borders] is displayed on the image properties bar, [Border / Line Shape] is displayed on the object properties bar.
- 3) Click the color palette.



- The [Color Select] dialog box appears.
 “[Color Select] Dialog Box” (► page 203)

- 4) Specify a color.
- 5) Enter a value in [Hard width] to specify a width for the edge (border).
- 6) Enter a value in [Soft width] to specify the blur for the edge (border).



- You can also set gradation, paste a texture or adjust transparency.

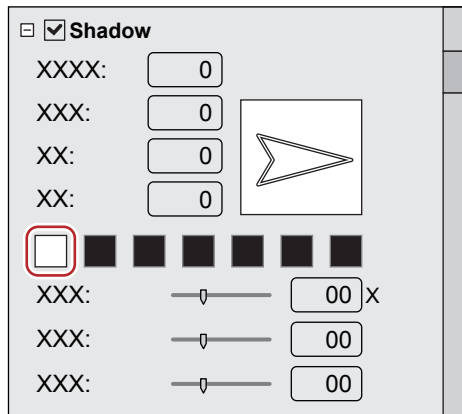

Shadow Settings

You can apply shadow to text objects.



- 1) Select a text object on which to apply shadow.
- 2) Click the [Shadow] tree on the properties bar, and check it.
- 3) Click the color palette.



- The [Color Select] dialog box appears.
“[Color Select] Dialog Box” (► page 203)

- 4) Specify a color.
- 5) Enter a value in [Hard width] to specify a width for the shadow.
- 6) Enter a value in [Soft width] to specify the blur for the shadow.
- 7) Move the [Horizontal] and [Vertical] sliders to adjust the position of the shadow.
- 8) Move the [Transparency] slider to adjust the shadow transparency.



- A gradation effect can be applied to a shadow.

Emboss Settings

An emboss effect can be applied to text objects.



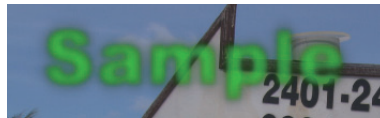
Note

- You cannot apply an emboss effect to images.

- 1) Select a text or shape where emboss is applied.
- 2) Click the [Emboss] tree on the properties bar, and check it.
- 3) Click [Inside] or [Outside].
 - For shapes, [Inside] and [Outside] are displayed.
- 4) Enter values for [Angle] and [Edge Height] to specify the degree of emboss.
- 5) Set the light source position.

Blur Settings

You can apply a blur effect to text object borders.



- 1) Select a text object on which to apply blur.
- 2) Click the [Blur] tree on the properties bar, and check it.
- 3) Move the sliders to adjust the blur.
 - Move the slider or enter a value for following properties; [Text / Edge] to apply the blur to a text string and the edge, [Edge] to apply to the edge only, and [Shadow] to apply to the shadow only.
 - [Image / Border], [Border] and [Shadow] are displayed on the image properties bar.
 - [Shape / Border], [Border] and [Shadow] are displayed in the object properties bar.

Roll/Crawl Settings

You can set an action that moves a text object horizontally/vertically. Clicking the background will display the background properties.

- 1) When the background properties bar is displayed, select an action from the [Title type] list.

[Title type]	Select an action for the text. Roll moves vertically and crawl moves horizontally.
[Number of pages]	Displays the number of pages that the text object moves across, where 1 page represents the range of the display area. A vertical scroll bar appears for 2 or more pages. A white dotted line is shown at page breaks, though it is not shown in the actual video.



- Roll/crawl settings such as the start point or end point are performed from the timeline in EDIUS. “Detailed Title Settings” (► page 427)
- The roll/crawl speed depends on the number of pages and the length of the title clip. Shorten the length of the title clip for a quick roll/crawl. Extend the length of the title clip for a slow roll/crawl. Set the title clip length on the timeline in EDIUS.

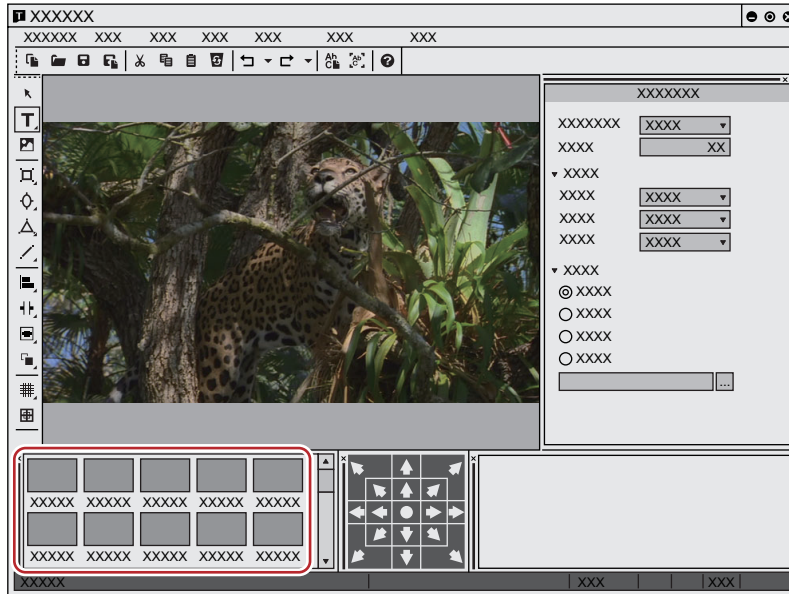
Registering Edited Effect

Applying a Style

Effects can be applied to the title simply by applying registered style chips.

- 1) Select the text object on which to apply a style.

2) Double-click the style chip on the title object style bar you want to apply.



Alternative

- Select the style chip to be applied, click [Style] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and then click [Apply Style].
- Select the style chip to be applied, right-click the text object and then click [Style] → [Apply Style].

Registering a Style

You can register the effect applied to a text object as a style chip.

1) Select the text object on which effects have been applied.

2) Click [New Style] on the file tool bar.



Alternative

- Click [Style] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Save As New Style].
- Right-click a text object on which effects have been applied, and click [Style] → [Save As New Style].
- Right-click the title object style bar and click [Save As New Style].

3) Enter a file name and click [OK].



- If the style name exists, the style cannot be registered. Register with a different name.

Changing the Style Name

You can change the name of a created style chip.

1) Select the style chip to have its name changed.

2) Click [Style] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Change Style Name].

Alternative

- Right-click the registered style chip, and click [Change Style Name].

3) Enter a new name.



- You can only change the names of registered style chips.

Deleting a Style

You can delete a created style chip.

1) Select a style chip to be deleted.

2) Click [Style] on the Quick Titler menu bar, and click [Delete Style].



Alternative

- Right-click the registered style chip, and click [Delete Style].



- You can only delete registered style chips.

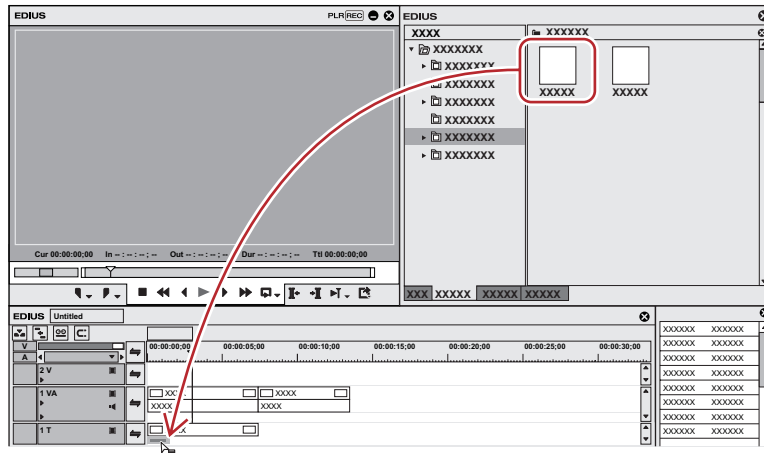
Setting Effects

Applying a Title Mixer

You can apply various effects for showing or hiding the title.

Effects available to be applied to a title clip are saved in the title mixer of the [Effect] palette.

- 1) Select a particular effect from title mixers in the [Effect] palette.
- 2) Drag the effect to the mixer area below a title clip that is placed on the timeline.



- Move the timeline cursor over the title clip to confirm the effects applied.

Alternative

- Select the mixer area of a title clip. Right-click the desired title mixer on the [Effect] palette, click [Add to Timeline], and then click the position in which to add it from [In], [Out], and [Both].
- Select the mixer area of a title clip, and then drag and drop the desired title mixer from the [Effect] palette onto the effect list of the [Information] palette.



- When placing a title clip, the default title mixer is set automatically. You can change the automatic setting of the title mixer from [Source] in [User Settings] → [Duration].

Detailed Title Settings

You can set whether to resize a title clip to fit the project frame size. Also, if a roll/crawl movement is applied for a title clip, you can set whether to start from outside the screen or inside the screen.

1) Right-click the title clip, and click [Title detail setting].

- The [Title detail setting] dialog box appears.

[Title detail setting] Dialog Box

<p>[Resize title]</p>	<p>Select whether to resize a title clip to fit the screen.</p> <p>[Auto] Displays the title clip at the same size as the frame size according to project settings. The title clip will resize to fit the project setting even if, after a title clip has been placed on the timeline, the frame size is then changed in the project setting.</p> <p>[Don't resize(Title size)] Displays the title clip at the same size as the frame size when the title was created. The title clip will not resize to fit the project setting if the frame size in the project setting is changed after a title clip has been placed on the timeline.</p>
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[Roll/Crawl setting]

[Start]

Select from the list where to start movement of a text object.

[Outside] starts movement of a text object from off the screen.

[Inside] starts movement of a text object from within a screen as the text object resides inside the 1st page of the screen.

With [Position] you enter the position where a roll/crawl starts in the entry field on the right.

[End]

Select from the list where to end movement of a text object.

[Outside] continues roll/crawl until all text objects have left the screen.

[Inside] ends roll/crawl at the last page of the text object at the time point displayed in the screen.

With [Position] you enter the position where the last page of the text objects completes its roll/crawl in the entry field on the right.

[In]

Enter the number of frames a text object is held for until it starts to move.

[Out]

Enter the number of frames a text object is held for after roll/crawl.



- Roll/crawl settings can only be changed if roll/crawl is applied to the text in a title clip. Roll/crawl settings cannot be changed if the title type is [Still Image]. For details on title types, see “Roll/Crawl Settings”.

Layout Settings

You can adjust the title position as displayed on the screen from the title clip placed on the timeline.

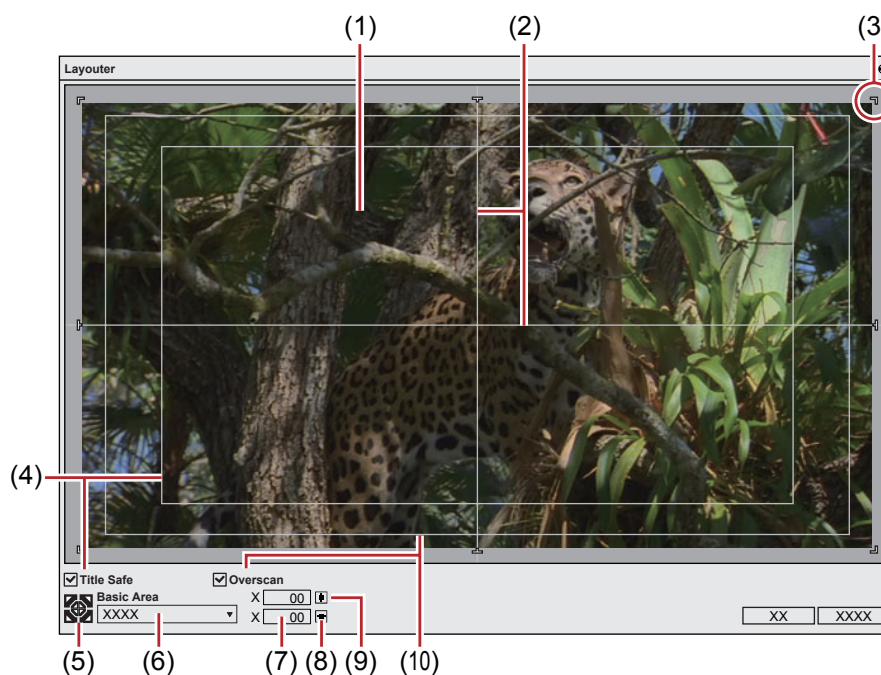
1) Right-click the title clip, and click [Layouter].

- The [Layouter] dialog box appears.

2) Set the title layout, and click [OK].

- The layout is saved.

(5)	Position fit	Fit the title frame to the center or to the corner of the area selected with [Basic Area].
(6)	[Basic Area]	Select the area to be fitted to with the fit position buttons from the list.
(7)	Position entry fields	Enter X, Y values to specify the position.
(8)	Horizontal fit	Fit the title to the horizontal center.
(9)	Vertical fit	Fit the title to the vertical center.
(10)	[Overscan]	Check this item to display the overscan area.

Chapter 10

Audio

This chapter explains how to adjust the volume on a clip/track and how to add narration, etc.

Volume/Pan Adjustment

You can add background music and sound effect, adjust parts of the audio volume, and perform other audio editing. In addition to the audio clips placed on the A tracks, the volume of the audio part of clips placed on the VA tracks can be adjusted.

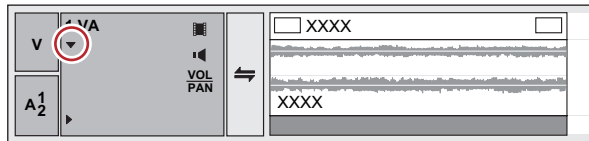
Adjusting the Volume and Pan of a Clip

Adding a Rubber Band Point

Two rubber bands are displayed on audio clips placed on the timeline; a volume rubber band (orange line) used to adjust volume and a pan rubber band (blue line) used to change the L/R stereo balance. Rubber band points can be added to adjust the shape of the rubber band.

1) Click the expand button for the audio on the track panel.

- The track expands and the rubber band and the waveform are displayed. For stereo audio, a waveform is displayed in each channel.



Alternative

- Expanded display of audio: **[Alt] + [S]**

2) Click [Volume/Pan].

- Clicking it switches between Volume, Pan and Lock.
“Volume/Pan Rubber Band” (▶ page 431)

3) Click on a rubber band in the position where you want to apply a change.

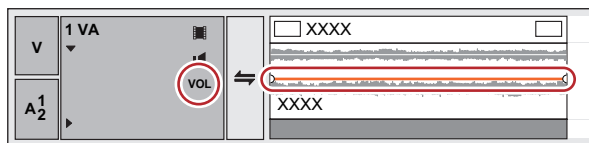
- A point is added that is used to adjust the volume or pan.

Alternative

- Right-click a rubber band in the position you want to add a point, then click [Add/Delete].

Volume/Pan Rubber Band

■ Volume rubber band (orange line)



■ Pan rubber band (blue line)



Adjusting the Rubber Band

You can adjust the volume and pan of a clip. You can also adjust the volume and the pan along to the time axis by adjusting the shape of the relevant rubber band.

Adjusting Using a Point

1) Display the volume rubber band or the pan rubber band, and add a rubber band point.

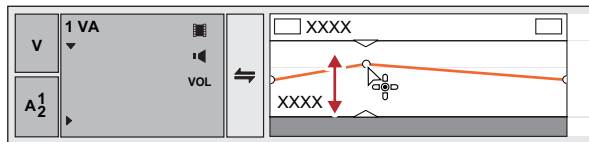
- “Adding a Rubber Band Point” (► page 431)

2) Drag the point vertically or horizontally.

- Fine adjustments can be made by dragging the point with [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down.
- You can adjust the whole rubber band by dragging the point with [Alt] on the keyboard held down.

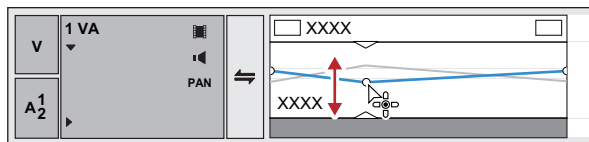
■ For volume points

Drag a point upwards to increase the volume, and downwards to decrease the volume.



■ For pan points

Drag a point upwards or downwards to adjust the L/R balance of the stereo. Drag the point upward to spread the sound to the left side, and downward to spread the sound to the right side.



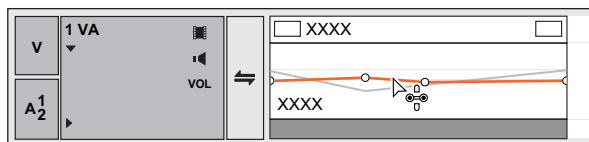
Adjusting between 2 Points

1) Display the volume rubber band or the pan rubber band, and add a rubber band point.

- “Adding a Rubber Band Point” (► page 431)

2) Drag the rubber band between 2 points up or down with [Shift] on the keyboard held down.

- The pointer shape will change to shift the rubber band up or down between the 2 points.
- Fine adjustments can be made by dragging with [Shift] + [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down.



Also, by dragging with [Alt] on the keyboard held down, you can automatically add a new point between the 2 other points and move it in parallel. You can set how many frames within 2 points at either end an automatically added point is placed using [Source] in [User Settings] → [Duration].

“[Duration]” (► page 124)

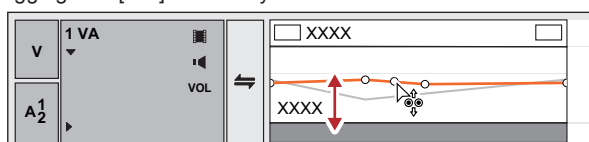
Adjusting a Whole Rubber Band

1) Display the volume rubber band or the pan rubber band.

- “Adding a Rubber Band Point” (► page 431)

2) Drag a rubber band or rubber band point up or down with [Shift] + [Alt] on the keyboard held down.

- The pointer shape will change and the whole rubber band can be adjusted.
- All other other points will move proportionately according to the amount the selected rubber band or point is varied.
- Fine adjustments can be made by dragging with [Ctrl] on the keyboard held down.



Adjusting by Entering Values

You can adjust a rubber band by entering values.

1) Display the volume rubber band or the pan rubber band.

- “Adding a Rubber Band Point” (► page 431)

2) Right-click a rubber band point, and click a method by which to adjust.

[Go]	Adjust the volume or timecode of a selected point.
[Move two aligning points]	Move the rubber band that is between a selected point and the next point to the right of the selected point horizontally and in proportion according to the amount the selected point is varied. “Adjusting the Rubber Band” (► page 431)
[Add points and move]	Add 2 new points between the selected point and the next point to the right, and move the rubber band between the 2 added points horizontally and in proportion according to the amount the 2 added points are varied. “Adjusting the Rubber Band” (► page 431)
[Move All]	Move other points in proportion according to the amount the selected point is varied.
[Move All On Scale]	Adjust the volume of all points proportionally. [Shift] + [Alt] + [Y]

- The value input dialog box appears.

3) Enter values.

- “Entry of Values” (► page 45)

4) Click [OK].

Setting the Pan Rubber Band to the Center

The sound level can be adjusted to make L/R equal.

1) Display the pan rubber band.

- “Adding a Rubber Band Point” (► page 431)

2) Right-click the pan rubber band, and click [Center].

- All rubber band points are deleted and the rubber band is centered.
- Clicking [L] or [R] will delete all rubber band points and adjust the rubber band to L or R.

Initializing/Deleting Rubber Band Points

You can delete or initialize a specific rubber band.

Deleting All Rubber Band Points in a Clip

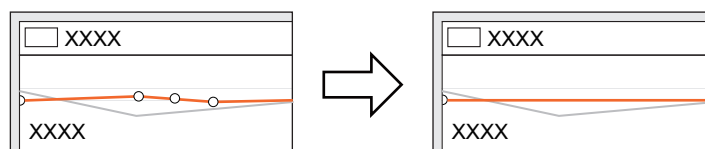
1) Display the volume rubber band or the pan rubber band.

2) Right-click the rubber band, and click [Delete All].

- All points are deleted and the entire rubber band is initialized.

Example:

For [Volume]



Alternative

- Right-click a clip, and click [Delete Parts] → [Audio Rubber Band] → [Volume] or [Pan].
- Select a clip, click [Edit] on the menu bar, and click [Delete Parts] → [Audio Rubber Band] → [Volume] or [Pan].
- Deleting a volume rubber band: **[Shift] + [Alt] + [H]**
- Deleting a pan rubber band: **[Ctrl] + [Alt] + [H]**



- The following procedures initialize only the position of a rubber band, leaving rubber band points in place on the rubber band.
 - Right-click a rubber band, and click [Initialize All].
 - Initializing rubber band: **[Shift] + [Ctrl] + [U]** (Perform procedure after selecting the desired rubber band.)

Deleting a Selected Rubber Band Point

1) Display the volume rubber band or the pan rubber band.

- “Adding a Rubber Band Point” (▶ page 431)

2) Right-click a rubber band point, and click [Add/Delete].

Alternative

- Select a rubber band point and press [Delete] on the keyboard.

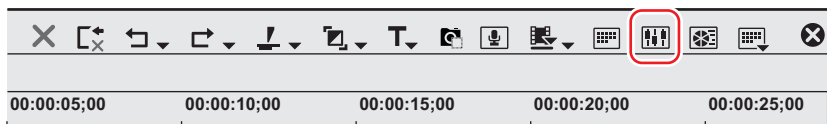
Audio Mixer

Adjusting with the Audio Mixer

By using the audio mixer, you can adjust the volume and pan of the track or clip on the timeline, or the clip being played on the preview window while playing it back. The level meter display can be switched between peak meter and VU meter. When the fader is operated with learning, after a point is added to the rubber band the point can be edited. “Adjusting the Rubber Band” (▶ page 431)

Volume Adjustment

1) Click [Toggle Audio Mixer Display] of the timeline.



- The [Audio Mixer] dialog box appears. The meter displayed (peak meter or VU meter) is the meter used in the [Audio Mixer] dialog box the last time it was closed. “[Audio Mixer] Dialog Box” (▶ page 435)

Alternative

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Audio Mixer].

2) Click [Settings], and click [Peak meter] or [VU meter].

- Display the peak meter to adjust momentary sounds and other sounds difficult for humans to hear, and display the VU meter to adjust sounds as they are heard by humans.

3) Click the operation setting for the track for which the volume is to be adjusted, and select an item.

- To adjust the volume of an entire track click the master operation setting and click [Master].
- To adjust the volume on individual tracks click the operation setting for each track and select what is to be adjusted ([TrackNo] or [Clip]).
- To adjust using the learning function, select the learning mode from [Latch], [Touch] and [Write].

4) Move the timeline cursor to the position to start playing, and click [Play] in the [Audio Mixer] dialog box.

5) Drag the fader to adjust volume.

- When operating in learning mode points are added to the rubber band of a clip. To redo an adjustment, either overwrite in [Write] mode or delete an entire rubber band.

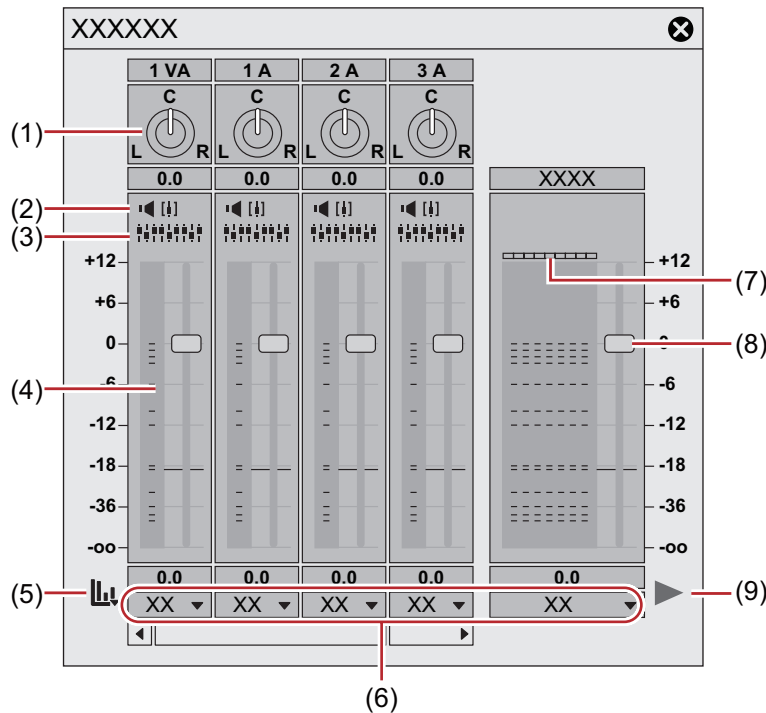

- Volume adjustment (1 dB increments): [↑]/[↓]
- Volume adjustment (0.1 dB increments): [Shift] + [↑] / [Shift] + [↓]



- An optional fader controller can be used to operate the fader. See the manual included with the product for instructions on use.

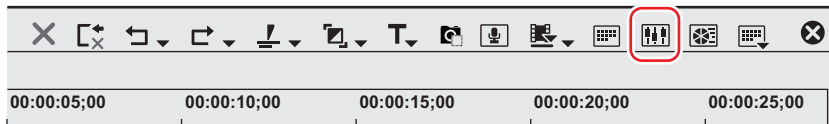


(1)	Pan control	Control the pan.
(2)	[Mute]/[Solo]	Toggle mute on a track. “Playing/Muting a Specific Track Only” (► page 437)

(4)	Level meter	Displays a level meter.
(5)	[Settings]	<p>[Peak meter] Check momentary changes in the audio signal visually. The gradation is displayed as a full scale.</p> <p>[VU meter] Displays the average volume of an audio signal. The audio signal can be checked in a display that shows what is close to what is heard by the human ear. The gradation is displayed as an audio reference scale.</p> <p>[Keep operation setting] Even if playback is stopped during learning, learning mode (operation setting) is maintained and the operation setting does not return to off. Pan Adjustment

1) Click [Toggle Audio Mixer Display] of the timeline.



- The [Audio Mixer] dialog box appears.
“[Audio Mixer] Dialog Box” (▶ page 435)

Alternative

- Click [View] on the menu bar, and click [Audio Mixer].

2) Click the operation setting for the track for which the pan is to be adjusted, and select [Track] or [Clip].

- Click [Track] to adjust pan on each track and click [Clip] to adjust pan for each clip at the timeline cursor position.

3) Move the mouse cursor over the pan control and drag when the mouse cursor changes shape.



- Dragging up or to the right adjusts to the right side, and dragging down or to the left adjusts to the left side.

Alternative

- Pan adjustment (1 dB increments): [←]/[→]
- Pan adjustment (0.1 dB increments): [Shift] + [←] / [Shift] + [→]



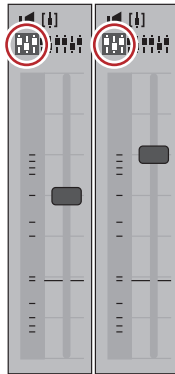
- When you right-click the [Audio Mixer] dialog box of an individual track and click [Reset], the volume and pan settings, connection settings, mute/solo settings and operation mode of the track are reset. To reset the settings of all tracks, right-click the [Audio Mixer] dialog box and click [Reset All].
- Performing [Reset] or [Reset All] does not reset the volume or pan settings for clips.
- The [Audio Mixer] dialog box size can be adjusted. Move the cursor to the left or right edge of the [Audio Mixer] dialog box and when the cursor shape changes, drag to adjust the size. After adjusting the size, the [Audio Mixer] dialog box will display at the same size upon reopening.

Adjusting while Maintaining Volume Difference

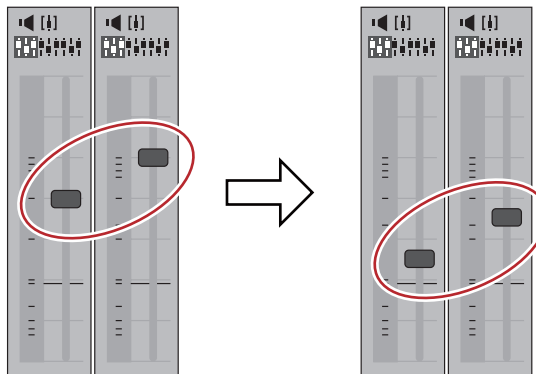
The controllers for fader and pan adjustment can be linked across multiple tracks. Three link patterns can be set: [Gang1] (yellow), [Gang2] (red) and [Gang3] (blue).

1) Click [Gang] on each track to be adjusted simultaneously in the [Audio Mixer] dialog box.

- The fader color changes according to the color of each [Gang].



2) Adjust single fader (controller) from among the linked faders (controllers).



- Tracks with faders in the same color are adjusted while maintaining the differences between each volume.



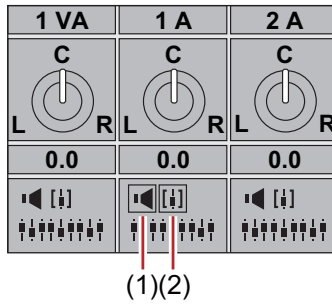
- Before operating the fader (controller), from among the linked tracks, set [Operation] for the tracks you want to link to other than [Off].

Playing/Muting a Specific Track Only

Audio playback can be restricted to a specific track. Specific tracks can also be muted.

1) In the [Audio Mixer] dialog box, click [Mute] or [Solo] for the track (or tracks) to be played.

- Clicking [Mute] will mute selected tracks. Click [Solo] to play back audio of the selected track only.



(1)	Mute
(2)	Solo

Normalization

Normalizing Audio Level of Multiple Clips (Normalization)

You can set a reference audio level for multiple desired clips and adjust the audio levels together. When normalize is applied to multiple clips, the gain value is adjusted to adjust each clip to a proper audio level.

“Checking and Changing the Gain Value of Clips” (► page 438)



- Normalize cannot be applied to the following clips.
 - Timeline sequence clips
 - Clips being edited with a time difference
 - Proxy clips
- During normalization processing, how much time is used as a sample from which to calculate an output value can be set. You can change the setting from [Source] in [User Settings] → [Automatic Correction].
 “[Automatic Correction]” (► page 124)

1) Select the clips to be normalized.

2) Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Normalize].

- The [Normalize] dialog box appears.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Normalize].

3) Enter the audio level to be used as reference, and click [OK].

- The initial level setting will be the [Audio reference level] in the project setting.
- When normalize is applied, an orange line will be displayed in the area below the audio part of the clip.

Checking and Changing the Gain Value of Clips

The gain value of clips can be checked and changed.

1) Select the clip for which the gain value will be confirmed or changed.

2) Click [Clip] on the menu bar, and click [Properties].

- The [Properties] dialog box appears.

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Properties].

3) Click the [Audio] tab.

- The gain value of the clip is displayed next to [Gain].

4) Enter a gain value, and click [OK].



- The normalize gain value can also be confirmed in the detailed display of the bin and the [Information] palette.
- When a clip on which the gain value has been changed on the timeline is registered in the bin, the changed gain value will be maintained.
- The change in gain will not be updated if, for example, you display the clip on the Player and remap it to the timeline from the Player after changing the gain value of each clip on the timeline as the followings.
 - (1) For an audio 1ch and video 2ch clip, map the V channel and A1 channel to the 1VA track, and A2 channel to the 1A track.
 - (2) Change the gain of the 1VA track clip to 5 dB, and the gain of the 1A track clip to 10 dB.
 - (3) Display the clip of the 1VA track on the Player with double-click.
 - (4) Place the clip on the Player again with the same mapping setting (mapping the V channel and A1 channel to the 1VA track, and A2 channel to the 1A track).
 At this time, the gain value of the clip placed in the 1VA track is 5 dB, but the change in the gain value of the clip placed in the 1A track is not reflected, and it becomes 0 dB.

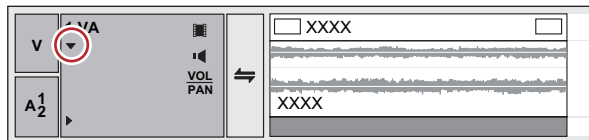
Partially Adjusting Volume

Showing Waveforms

To conceal noise, etc., operate while viewing the waveform.

1) Click the expand button for the audio on the track panel.

- The track is expanded and the audio rubber band and the waveform are displayed. For stereo audio, a waveform is displayed in each channel. You can detect noise, etc. by reviewing the waveform range and the sound actually being played back.



- The waveform display can be changed from [Application] in [User Settings] → [Timeline].

Reducing Momentary Noise (V-mute Function)

Fade in or fade out before and after a single central point to conceal noise, etc.

1) Select the track where the clip to be V-muted is placed.

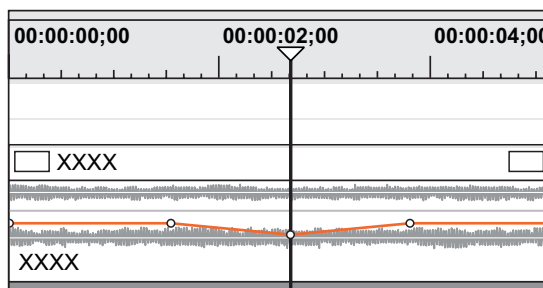
- “Selecting Tracks” (▶ page 225)

2) Move the timeline cursor to a position where the volume is zero.

- Confirm the shape of the waveform display, and adjust the position of the timeline cursor.

3) Right-click the clip on which V-mute is to be applied, and click [V-Mute].

- The volume at the position of the timeline cursor becomes zero, and four points are added on the volume rubber band with the timeline cursor at their center.



Alternative

- V-mute settings: **[Shift] + [V]**



- After setting V-mute, drag a point on the volume rubber band left and right for fine adjustment of mute duration.

Adding and Editing Audio

Adding Narration and Sound Effects

Addition of Speech with Voice Over

Voice over is a function for adding narration or sound effects while previewing a timeline clip. You can add audio (sound effect) while previewing a scene.

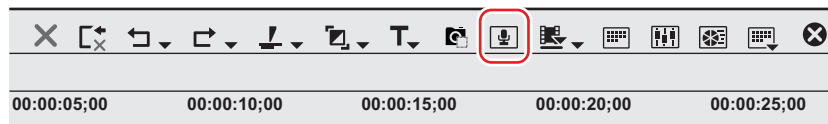

- For microphones or other voice entry devices the device preset must be set in advance.

1) Map the audio channel and set an In point at the position in which to place the audio.

2) Click [Toggle Voice Over Display] of the timeline.

3) Select a preset from the [Device Preset] list.

- The device preset must be set in advance. The preset cannot be selected if only one preset is registered.

4) Adjust the volume of the source data with the [Volume] slider.

- Adjust the level meter visually so that the volume does not exceed 0 dB.

5) Select [Track] from the [Output] list.

[Bin]	Add the audio clip only to the bin.
[Track]	Add the audio clip both to the A track specified in step 1) and to the bin.

6) Enter a file name, and click [...] to specify the save destination.

7) Click [Start].

- The white circle in the upper left of the Recorder blinks to start the count down. The white circle turns red when recording starts. If there is an audio clip on the export destination track, the audio on the track will mute at the same time as audio recording begins.



- The time taken between clicking [Start] and the start of recording changes according to the time set in [Application] in [System Settings] → [Margin] in [Capture], and [Preview] in [User Settings] → [Preroll Time] in [Playback].

8) Click [End].

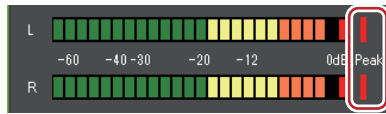
- Clip playback and audio data creation are stopped and a dialog box appears to confirm whether to add the created file.

9) Click [Yes].

- The audio clip is placed and data saved.



- The white line on the right side of the level meter changes to red when the volume exceeds 0 dB. Clicking the line returns it to its original setting.



- If playback of the timeline does not stop in time, recording is also stopped.

Playback with Shifted Audio

Offset of Audio

The timing of video and audio playback can be adjusted by sample increments.

1) Select a clip, and click [Clip] on the menu bar → [Audio Offset].

- Multiple clips can also be selected.
- The [Audio Offset] dialog box appears.
 “[Audio Offset] Dialog Box” (▶ page 442)

Alternative

- Right-click a clip and click [Audio Offset].

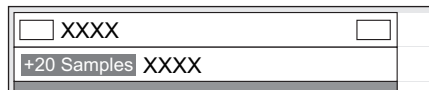
Note

- Audio offset cannot be applied if multiple clips of differing sampling rate are selected.

2) Select the direction of movement and enter the offset.

3) Click [OK].

- When offset has been applied to a clip, the offset value is displayed in blue at the start of the clip.



- Waveforms will also update with the applied audio offset.



- If the link between video and audio is not in sync, the number of frames they are out of sync will be displayed with priority.

[Audio Offset] Dialog Box

[Direction]	Select whether to delay the audio compared to video, or advance the audio compared to video.
[Offset]	Enter a value by which to delay or advance. Values can be entered by sample increments or seconds.

Chapter 11

Export

This chapter explains methods of exporting projects on which editing is complete. You can export projects in a variety of file formats, as well as to disc media such as DVD or BD.

Exporting in File Formats

Points to Be Checked before Exporting a File

This section describes the settings to confirm before export, and matters to know in advance when exporting a file with an exporter.

Marker Settings

To export only one part of an edited video, make sure to specify the export range using [Set In] and [Set Out] on the Recorder.

To add a chapter, make sure that an orange sequence marker is set to the desired position in advance.

Export Formats

When exporting a file with an exporter, you can export using the same setting as in the project settings, or export with a format that differs from the project settings.

[GOP Structure]	Select the GOP structure.
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[Picture Count]	Set the GOP length.

[Multi Slice]	Check this item to divide 1 frame into 4 parts. If the decoder supports multi-slicing, the decoding may be made quicker.
[Entropy Coding Mode]	Select the H.264 encoding mode.
[Adjust bitrate by pixels per sec]	Check this item to adjust the bitrate in accordance with the number of pixels per second.
[Bit Depth]	Video quantization bitrate is fixed at [8].
[Chroma Format]	Pixel format of YUV is fixed at [4:2:0].

■ [Metadata] tab

[Export sequence marker as cue point]	Check this item to export sequence markers as cue points for Flash. Select the name of the type of cue point.
[Metadata]	Export is possible with metadata appended. Select an item from the [Name] list, and enter metadata at [Value].
[Import]	Import XMP format (*.xmp) metadata. This is reflected in the [Metadata] setting.
[Export]	Export the settings made at [Metadata] in XMP format.

AVCHD Format

AVCHD streams can be easily exported to an SD memory card or memory stick. A file can be exported to any desired save destination. If exporting to removable media, make sure to connect the SD memory card or memory stick to the PC before export.



- If you want to edit a menu, etc. use Disc Burner to write the project to DVD or BD.
“Exporting to Disc” (▶ page 473)

Note

- If you try to export a file to the internal hard disk or internal memory of an AVCHD video camera or a removable disk to play it back on the AVCHD video camera, export or playback may not be available on some cameras.
- You cannot write AVCHD streams from EDIUS directly to a DVD-R or BD.

1) Click [AVCHD] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (▶ page 446)

2) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

- To write to removable media, click [AVCHD Writer] or [AVCHD 3D Writer], and proceed to step 3).
- To export to an AVCHD format file without writing to removable media, click [AVCHD] or [AVCHD 3D], and proceed to step 5).

Note

- Depending on the type of save destination, a warning message may be displayed saying that data will become unrecognizable. Be sure to create a backup before export, as required.

3) Select [Drive] in [Destination].

- The SD memory card or memory stick connected to the PC will be recognized as an external drive.



- You can select [Folder] and click [Select] to export an AVCHD stream to a specific location on the PC.

4) Select [SD Memory Card] or [Memory Stick / HDD Camera] in [Format].

- Select according to the media being used.

5) Configure each item in the [Basic Settings] tab and [Extended Settings] tab.

- For the setting items, see the descriptions given for the [Basic Settings] tab/[Extended Settings] tab in “BD Format”.
“BD Format” (▶ page 454)

6) Click [OK].

- For [AVCHD] or [AVCHD 3D], set a file name and save destination, and click [Save].



- If a stream file size exceeds 2 GB, the file will be split up and exported.

Exporting in 3DA1 Format

Projects can be exported in the 3DA1 format to an SD/SDHC memory card. A file can be exported to any desired save destination. If exporting to an SD/SDHC memory card, make sure to connect the memory card to the PC before export.

1) Click [AVCHD] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (▶ page 446)

2) Click [AVCHD (Dual Card 3D) Writer], and click [Export].

3) Set the export destination for the L side and the R side in [Destination 1] and [Destination 2] respectively.

- To export to a camera, select [Drive], and set the export destination from the list.
- To export to the hard disk on the PC, select [Folder], and click [Select] to set the export destination.

4) Configure each item in the [Basic Settings] tab and [Extended Settings] tab.

- For the setting items, see the descriptions given for the [Basic Settings] tab/[Extended Settings] tab in “BD Format”. “BD Format” (▶ page 454)

5) Click [OK].

XDCAM EX Format

Projects can be exported to an SxS memory card or an SDHC memory card in the XDCAM EX format. Connect a device to the PC, and check the power is turned on. Files can also be exported to the PC hard disk. You can also export in the XDCAM EX 3D format.

Note

- Be sure to format the SxS memory card with the XDCAM EX device or a device that supports XDCAM EX 3D in advance.

1) Click [XDCAM] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (▶ page 446)

2) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

- Select either [XDCAM EX], [XDCAM EX DV] or [XDCAM EX 3D] as the exporter.

3) Set the export destination, quality, metadata, etc., and click [OK].

- The setting items will differ depending on the exporter.

Example:

If [XDCAM EX] has been selected.

[Destination]	Select whether to export to an SxS memory card, to export to an SDHC memory card, or to save to a local folder. A file is exported in a folder structure. If [Sony - SxS Memory Card] or [JVC - SDHC Memory Card] is selected, select a card from the list. If [Automatically select the next card when card is full.] is checked, when free space runs out on the SxS memory card selected as the export destination, an SxS memory card with free space will be selected automatically and exported to. 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[Segment Encode]	Check this item to export a clip of a raw source without re-encoding. This increases the output speed.

[Mode]	Select an image quality mode (SP or HQ).
[Quality/Speed]	Select quality from the list. The higher the quality, the more time it takes to be encoded.
Metadata	Add metadata such as title and comments to clips to be exported.



- If [XDCAM EX 3D] has been selected as the exporter, the operations are subject to the following restrictions.
 - If [Sony - SxS Memory Card] has been selected for [Destination], only memory cards in two slots on the L side can be recognized on the PC due to the specifications of Sony memory camcorder. Insert memory cards into the slots on the L side. After exporting, reinsert the cards into the slots on the R side.
 - If the free space runs out on the export destination drive during an export operation, the [Select Memory Card Drive] dialog box appears. However, when [Destination] is [Folder] or when batch export is being performed, this dialog box does not appear.
 - If [Folder] is selected for [Destination], the export destination for L and R cannot be set to the same location.
 - When exporting has been performed by splitting up the export onto multiple SxS memory cards, the place exported to will be registered in the bin as sequence clips. However, if one of the SxS memory cards is not attached during registration, it will not be registered in the bin.

- If data is to be exported by the AVC-Intra or AVC-Ultra codec and [Color Space] is set to [BT.2020/BT.2100 HLG] or [BT.2020/BT.2100 PQ] in [Project Settings], HDR metadata will be added at the time of export.

Note

- Make sure that the P2 device drivers are already installed.
- Audio will be exported in 16-bit format audio, even if the project preset is set to 24-bit format audio.

1) Click [P2] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (▶ page 446)

2) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

- Select from [P2 Clip], [HD P2 Clip], [HD P2 3D Clip] or [AVCUltra P2 Clip] for the exporter. Exporters that do not support the project settings will not be displayed.

3) Set the export destination, user clip name, codec, etc., and click [OK].

- The setting items will differ depending on the exporter.



- Metadata, such as the created by and capture information, can be imported from another P2 clip. Click [Load Metadata] and select the XML file to be imported.
- If there is no more free space in the export destination or if the clip consists of files with a size exceeding 4 GB in total, the clip will be split up and exported.
 If [Automatically select the next card when card is full.] is checked, when the clip is split, a P2 card drive that has free space will be selected automatically and exported to. If it is unchecked, when the clip is split, a dialog box will appear to select the export destination.
- If exporting at 720p, the export frames must be even frames. If a confirmation message appears, select a processing method.
- If a DVCPRO HD export format and the settings content for an EDIUS project preset differ, the export data will be stretched before export so that the frame rate and the field order correspond to each other.

XDCAM Format

With the XDCAM exporter, you can output a project as an MXF file, and upload it to an XDCAM device. MXF files can also be exported to the PC hard disk.



- Files can also be exported to the XDCAM Memory drive (SxS memory card formatted with an XDCAM device).

Note

- Be sure to format the SxS memory card with an XDCAM device in advance.
- Files cannot be exported to an SxS memory card formatted in the XDCAM EX format.
- Proxy files will not be exported.

1) Click [XDCAM] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (▶ page 446)

2) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

- Select from [XDCAM DV], [XDCAM HD], [XDCAM HD 422], [XDCAM HD 720P] or [XDCAM MPEG IMX] for the project image size.
- Exporters that do not support the project settings will not be displayed.

3) Set the export destination, clip name, etc., and click [OK].

- The setting items will differ depending on the exporter.

Example:

If [XDCAM HD] has been selected.

[Destination]	Select whether to export to an XDCAM drive or to a desired PC folder. A file is exported in a folder structure. If [XDCAM Drive] was selected, select a Drive from the list. If [Folder] was selected, click [Select] and specify a save destination.
[Clip Name]	Set the file name to be exported. [Auto (C****)] If it is checked, a file name will be set automatically. To set a preferred file name, remove the check from [Auto (C****)] and enter a name in [Clip Name]. (“Clip Naming” must be set as “Free” on the XDCAM drive.)

[Audio Format]	Select the audio format to export.



- If a clip is exported that does not include high-resolution or proxy data, a dialog box will appear to set the processing before export. Select a processing method and click [OK].
- If [XDCAM MPEG IMX] was selected, 3 lines (black) will be added above and below the 720x480 video to be exported as Even (Top Field First).
Also, 720x576 (Odd) video will be shifted by 1 line to be exported as Even (Top Field First).

XAVC S Format

You can export a project to an XQD memory card in the XAVC S format.

Connect a device to the PC, and check that the power is turned on.

Files can also be exported to the PC hard disk.



- If [Color Space] is set to [BT.2020/BT.2100 HLG] or [BT.2020/BT.2100 PQ] in [Project Settings], HDR metadata will be added at the time of export.

 **Note**

- Be sure to format the XQD memory card with an XAVC S device in advance.

1) Click [XAVC] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

2) Click [XAVC S], and click [Export].

3) Set the export destination, clip name, etc., and click [OK].

XAVC Format

- If [Color Space] is set to [BT.2020/BT.2100 HLG] or [BT.2020/BT.2100 PQ] in [Project Settings], HDR metadata will be added at the time of export.

- Be sure to format the SxS memory card with an XDCAM device in advance.
- Files cannot be exported to an SxS memory card formatted in the XDCAM EX format.

1) Click [XAVC] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (▶ page 446)

2) Click [XAVC], and click [Export].

3) Set the export destination, clip name, etc., and click [OK].

[Destination]	Select whether to export to an XDCAM drive or to a desired PC folder. A file is exported in a folder structure. If [XDCAM Drive] was selected, select a drive from the list. If [Folder] was selected, click [Select] and specify a save destination.
[Clip Name]	Set the file name to be exported. [Auto (C****)] If it is checked, a file name will be set automatically. To set a preferred file name, remove the check from [Auto (C****)] and enter a name in [Clip Name]. (“Clip Naming” must be set as “Free” on the XDCAM drive.)
[Format]	Select the format to export.

Exporting Closed Caption

Exporting a Project Containing Closed Caption Data

You can export a project that contains closed caption to a file.

A sidecar file (closed caption file) can be exported besides an output file, or closed caption data can be embedded into the output file.

- Closed caption data on upper tracks will be prioritized in export.

1) Select an exporter in the category tree in the [Print to File] dialog box.

2) Select the export method from the list on the left of [Captions].

- If [Sidecar File] or [Embed in File] has been selected for [Captions], changing [Frame Rate] in the [Print to File] (Detailed Settings) dialog box will disable export of closed caption.
- If one of the exporters in the category [AVCHD] has been selected, [Sidecar File] cannot be selected for [Captions]. Also, if files are to be exported to an XDCAM device using the [XDCAM] exporter, [Sidecar File] cannot be selected.
- The [Remove Ancillary data] setting in the [Print to File] (Detailed Settings) dialog box does not affect the export of closed captions.
- Some combination of input and output formats may cause change of data format or defects in output file.
- Closed caption data are not re-encoded. The input data will be output as they are.
- MCC Version 2 can be imported. However, the option parameters will not be evaluated.
- The 608 ancillary data packets (DID=61h and SDID=02h) are not supported.

Exporting Closed Caption File Alone

You can export the closed caption of a project alone to a file.

1) Click [Captions] in the [Print to File] dialog box category tree.

- “Exporting with Exporter” (► page 446)

2) Select an exporter, and click [Export].

3) Set a file name and saving destination, and click [Save].

Exporting Stereoscopic Project

Projects created in the stereoscopic edit mode can be exported to file.

Exporting L/R to a File

Export the data of the L and R sides of the project to a file.

1) Select an exporter in the category tree in the [Print to File] dialog box.

2) Select one of [L/R Dual Stream], [Left only], [Right only], [Side by Side], [Top and Bottom], [Line Interleave], [Blend], [Anaglyph], or [Difference] from the [Stereoscopic] list.

- [L/R Dual Stream] exports the video of the L and R sides to a single dual stream-compatible file.
 - [Left only]/[Right only] exports video of the L or R side only to a single file.
 - [Side by Side]/[Top and Bottom]/[Line Interleave]/[Blend]/[Anaglyph]/[Difference] combine and export the video of the L and R sides to a single file.
- “Stereoscopic Processing Type” (► page 157)

3) Click [Export].

4) Set the export contents, and click [Save] or [OK].

- The export contents differ depending on the exporter. See the explanation for the respective exporter.

Exporting L/R to Separate Files

You can output the video of the L and R sides separately to two different files.

1) Select an exporter in the category tree in the [Print to File] dialog box.

2) Select [Separate Left and Right] from the [Stereoscopic] list.

3) Click [Export].

- The export settings screen appears.

4) Set a file name and export destination for the L and R sides.

5) Set the export details in the dialog box in step 4).

- The export details differ depending on the exporter. See the explanation for the respective exporter.

6) Click [Save] or [OK].

[File Name L]/[File Name R]	Click [Browse], and specify save destination. The files for the L and R sides are saved to the same folder.
[Suffix]	Set the suffix of the file name for the L and R sides.

■ L/R Export Destination Common Settings

[Destination L]/[Destination R]	Click [Browse], and specify each export destination for the files for the L and R sides.
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Registering Exporter Configuration as Default Exporter

Click [Export] on the Recorder and select [Print to File (Default Exporter)] or [Add to Batch Export (Default Exporter)] to register a default exporter that can be selected by simple operation. The exporter settings can also be registered in combination with the conversion settings used to export in a format that differs from the project settings. Four exporters can be registered.

Creating Default Exporter

Register exporter configuration as a default exporter.

- The exporter is registered as a default exporter.

- When you click [Current default] in the category tree, all user-registered default presets are displayed in the exporter/preset list.

Deleting Default Exporter

Registered default exporters can be deleted.

3) Enter an exporter preset name in [Preset name], and configure the export details.

- You can enter your preferred description in [Description]. It will be displayed at the exporter/preset list in the [Print to File] dialog box.

4) Click [OK].

- The created preset is registered in the exporter/preset list.



- When you click [My presets] in the category tree, all user-registered exporter presets are displayed in the exporter/preset list.
- To change the settings of an already-created exporter preset, select the exporter preset to be changed, click [Save preset] and change the settings.

Deleting Exporter Presets

You can delete the exporter presets that you have created.

After setting the In and Out points of a range to be exported, you can also click [Export] on the Recorder and select [Add to Batch Export (Default Exporter)] → a default exporter to use.
The file name and save destination are automatically set as follows. (When no default exporter is set or when [Export] is disabled, [Add to Batch Export (Default Exporter)] cannot be selected.)
 - File name: Exp MonthDay_000 (3-digit sequential number) + extension
 - Save destination: Project folder
 “[Print to File] Dialog Box” (► page 447)
- After setting the In and Out points of a range to be exported, if you right-click the time scale and click [Add to Batch Export (Project format)], the specified range is added to the batch list with the format specified in [Render format] of the [Project Settings] (Detailed Settings) dialog box. In this case, the file name and destination are set automatically as shown below: [Add to Batch Export (Project format)] cannot be selected when [Export] is disabled.
 - File name: Exp MonthDay_000 (3-digit sequential number) + extension

- Save destination: Project folder
- “[Project Settings] (Detailed Settings) Dialog Box” (▶ page 62)
- The content of the batch list can be changed in the [Batch Export] dialog box.

Exporting Multiple Ranges Together (Batch Export)

You can export multiple ranges registered in the batch list together.

1) Click [Export] on the Recorder.



2) Click [Batch Export].

- The [Batch Export] dialog box appears.
- “[Batch Export] Dialog Box” (▶ page 471)

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Export] → [Batch Export].

3) Check the item to be exported, and click [Export].

- The rendering job will be registered to the Render Service. When registration to the Render Service has been completed, the checkbox in the [Batch Export] dialog box will be unchecked. An indication appears on the PC screen to notify that rendering will be started. Registered rendering jobs are processed in the background in a sequential order of the predetermined priority. The progress of the rendering process can be checked on GV Job Monitor.
- “GV Job Monitor” (▶ page 344)
- If [Add to Bin] has been checked in the [Batch Export] dialog box, the rendering clip will be registered to the bin. The color and indication of a rendering clip changes according to the rendering process status.
- “Rendering Clip Display” (▶ page 347)
- The color of the GV Job Monitor icon on the status bar turns to purple while a batch export rendering job is being processed. When the rendering process has been finished, an indication appears on the PC screen to notify that rendering has been finished. The color of the icon on the status bar returns to its original state.
- “GV Job Monitor Icon Indication” (▶ page 344)
- Even if the project file is closed before the rendering process is completed, the process of the rendering job will be continued.

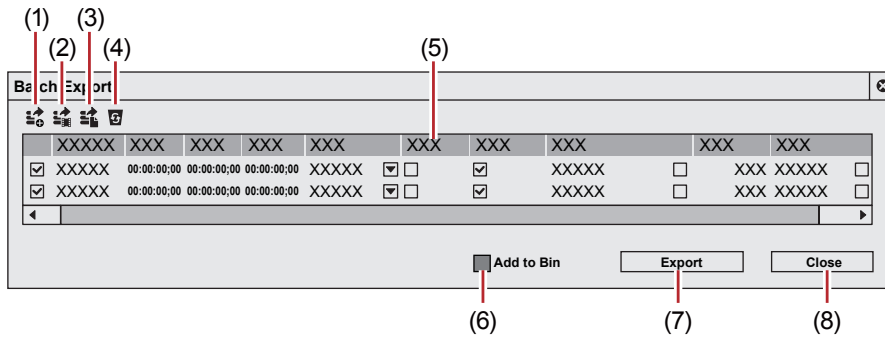


- After setting the In and Out points of a range to be exported, you can register a new range for export by right-clicking on the export list and clicking [New].
- If you right-click the export list and click [Select All], you can select all ranges registered for export. Check one of multiple selected items to check all the selected items.
- If you right-click an item on the export list and click [Change Exporter], you can change the exporter. You can change the exporter for multiple selected items. However, if those items include an exporter for which the file name cannot be set, such as the P2 exporter, changes will be applied to all selected exporters excluding that exporter.
- Clicking [OK] on the notification of start/finish of file export will display GV Job Monitor ([Job] palette). Clicking [Close] will close the notification.
- The notification for start/finish of file export will be indicated in accordance with the setting of the [Notification] check box in GV Job Monitor, as well as the Windows configuration.

Note

- If you delete a sequence registered in the batch list from both the timeline and bin, the batch list will become disabled and will be displayed in red.
- If you change the sequence settings or project settings of a sequence registered in the batch list, the changes will also be applied in the batch list. If changes are made that mean an exporter can no longer be used, the exporter is displayed in red in the batch list and its export cannot be performed.

[Batch Export] Dialog Box

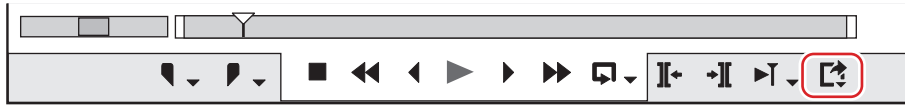

This setting may not be available depending on the selected exporter. [Exporter] Click on the icon to the right of the exporter name column to display the [Print to File] dialog box. “[Print to File] Dialog Box” (▶ page 447) [File Size] Displays the file size. If the total size of the file to be exported exceeds the free space in the export destination, a warning dialog box may appear and the export cannot be performed. The displayed file size is only a guide. The size of the file to be exported will change dependent on the video content and the selected exporter. [File Name] Click on the icon to the right of the file name column to change the file name, export destination and export content.
(6)	[Add to Bin]	Check this item to register the exported files to the bin. When the batch export rendering job is registered to the Render Service, a rendering clip will be registered to the bin. The color and indication of a rendering clip changes according to the rendering process status. “Rendering Clip Display” (▶ page 347)
(7)	[Export]/[Cancel]	Start an export. The button changes to [Cancel] during export, and click it to cancel the export.
(8)	[Close]	Close the [Batch Export] dialog box.

Deleting Registered Ranges from the Batch List

You can delete ranges registered in the batch list.

1) Click [Export] on the Recorder.



2) Click [Batch Export].

- The [Batch Export] dialog box appears.
“[Batch Export] Dialog Box” (► page 471)

3) Select an item to delete and click [Delete Batch Export item].



- If you remove the check from export range items in the [Batch Export] dialog box, you can exclude those items from the export without deleting the items.

Exporting to Disc

Exporting to DVD/BD

You can export a project as a disc image file to be written to DVD/BD.

Regardless of the details of the project settings, you can start up Disc Burner and write the project to DVD or BD. Even projects in progressive formats (such as 60p) can be written to DVD/BD by changing the export format on Disc Burner.

Note

- If format conversion is performed at export, the image quality will be affected.

Exporting to Disc

You can write a project to a DVD/BD. You can create title and chapter menus, as well as set the background of the menu screen and buttons displayed on the screen.

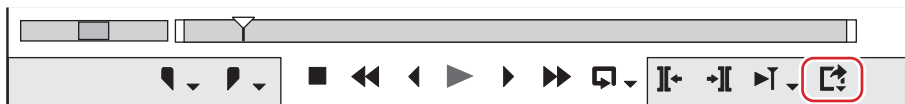


- To export only one part of an edited video, make sure to specify the export range using a [Set In] and [Set Out] on the Recorder.
“Setting the In and Out Points on the Timeline” (► page 237)
- To add a chapter, make sure that an orange sequence marker is set to the desired position in advance.
“Setting Sequence Markers” (► page 295)

Note

- When exporting to disc, you will need sufficient free space on the HDD.
- You will also need a drive that supports writing to DVD/BD.
- If packet writing software of another company is installed/running on your PC, you cannot export to DVD/BD from EDIUS.

1) Click [Export] on the Recorder.



2) Click [Burn to disc].

- Disc Burner starts up.

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Export] → [Burn to disc].
- Exporting to DVD/BD: [Shift] + [F11]



- Clicking [Return] ends the settings, and returns to EDIUS. If you return to EDIUS and save the project, the settings of “Exporting to Disc” will also be saved.

3) Click the [Basic] tab, and set the disc type or codec.

4) Click the [Movie] tab, and set the movie to be exported to disc.

8) Click [Create Disc].

- Start writing to disc.
- When you perform format conversion at export, in the confirmation dialog box that appears, click [Yes].

[Basic] Tab

[Disc]	Select the type of disc to be exported to from the list. [Format] Select the format to export. To export in the same format as the original project settings, select the format with the indication [(No conversion)]. The formats that can be selected are as follows. [Codec]	When exporting to BD, select the codec.
[Menu]	Select [Use Menu] to create a disc with a menu screen.

Note

- If the project setting is the NTSC standard such as 59.94i, the export format for the PAL standard such as 50i cannot be selected. Likewise, if the project setting is the PAL standard, the export format for the NTSC standard cannot be selected.

[Movie] Tab

[Disc Information]	Displays the number and file size of the titles to be added and the available disc space.
[Media]	Select the type of disc to be exported to from the list.
[Movie]	Displays the added titles. [Settings] Displays the settings dialog box used to change the bitrate. “[Title setting] dialog box” (▶ page 474) [Delete] Remove titles from the list. Does not delete the original file. [Up]/[Down] Change the order of titles.
[Add File]	Click this button to display the [Add Title] dialog box. Select a file, and click [Open].
[Add Sequence]	Click this button to display the [Select Sequence] dialog box. Check the sequence to be added and click [OK].

[Automatic]	Uncheck this item to set the format and bitrate for video and audio.

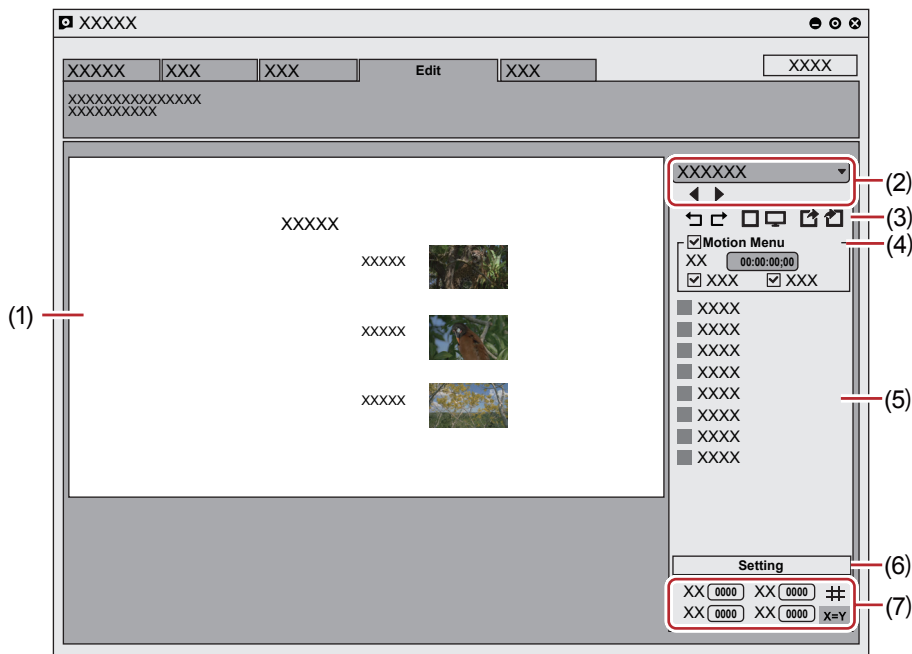

Style list	Select a design for the menu screen from the list. The styles are classified in each tab according to type.

- Click [Help] on the menu bar, and click [Download DVD Menu Style] to download the setup file in the msi format. Double-click the setup file to add a style to the style list in the [Style] tab of Disc Burner.
- If you have update from the version EDIUS 8 or earlier, a message prompting download of the setup file may appear to add a style. Follow the on-screen instructions to add a style.

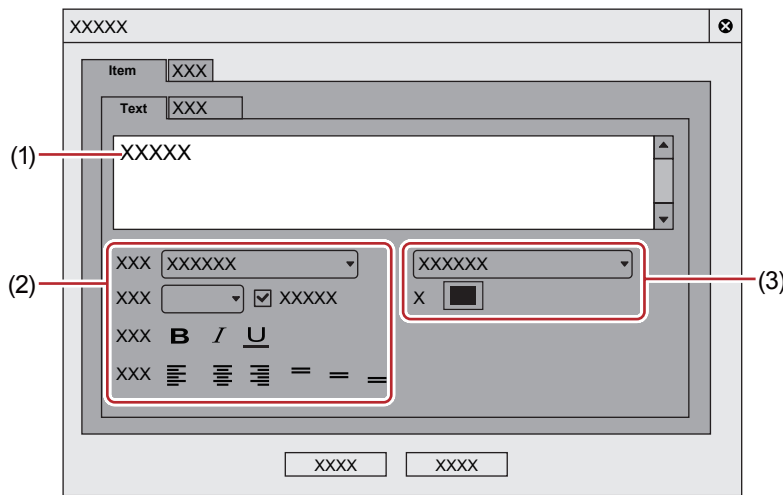

Writing a Disc Image File to a Disc

You can write disc image files to disc.

You can write saved disc image files to disc. Make sure that the disc image file is saved to a preferred folder.

- Click [Tools] in the bin window, and click [Disc Burner].

2) Select the folder where the disc image file is saved, and click [OK].

3) Configure the export settings.

[Image Folder]	Select the folder in which the disc image file is saved. If outputting to DVD, be sure to specify a folder that contains a "VIDEO_TS" folder and "AUDIO_TS" folder. If outputting to BD, make sure to specify a folder that contains a "BDMV" folder and "CERTIFICATE" folder.
[Verify Disc After Creating]	Check this item to verify that data can be read correctly after having been written to media.
[Number of Drives]	Simultaneously write to a specified number of multiple drives. The settings tab for each drive is displayed in the drive information.



- To create multiple discs with the same content, after 1 disc is created change the disc and continue the disc creation.

4) Click [Create Disc].

- Start writing to disc.

Exporting to Tape

To export a project to tape, hardware that supports tape output is required. In this section, an example using Grass Valley hardware (STORM 3G) is described.

Exporting to VTR

You can output data to VTR devices.

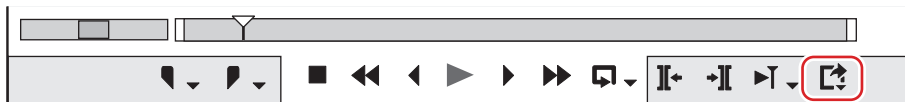
Note

- You need to register the export destination VTR device as a device preset in advance.
“Registering Device Presets” (▶ page 133)
- Output cannot be performed if the output format of the registered device preset for the VTR device differs from the format of the current project setting.

1) Connect STORM 3G to a VTR device using an SDI cable and RS-422 cable.

- Configure the VTR device in advance so that it can be controlled remotely with RS-422.

2) Click [Export] on the Recorder.



3) Click [Print to Tape] or [Print to Tape (Display Timecode)].

Alternative

- Click [File] on the menu bar, and click [Export] → [Print to Tape] or [Print to Tape (Display Timecode)].
- Exporting to tape: [F12]



- In an environment where the hardware that supports tape output cannot be used, [Print to Tape] and [Print to Tape (Display Timecode)] will not be displayed.
- If the message [There is no output preset to match the project settings.] is displayed, reconfigure the formats of the project setting and the device preset.

4) Select a device preset, and click [Next].

- The device presets that can perform export with the current project settings will be displayed.

5) Cue up to the position to start writing on tape.



- To specify the position to start writing on tape, check [Rec In] and enter the timecode. If you click [Cue Up], the tape will cue up to the position of the entered timecode.

6) Click [Next].

7) Confirm the details, and click [Export].

- Timeline playback and export start.
- The [Print To Tape] dialog box disappears when the export finishes.



- Click [Cancel] to abort the export.
- If In and Out points have been set on the timeline, that range will be exported.

Exporting Stereoscopic Projects to Tape

To export projects created in the stereoscopic edit mode to tape, you must first register the corresponding device preset. Set the export method in the [Output H/W, Format Settings] screen for device presets.

“[Output H/W, Format Settings] Screen” (▶ page 137)

Combining L/R and Exporting to Tape

Combine and export the video of the L and R sides of the project to tape.

Select the following items in the [Settings - Stereoscopic Setting] dialog box for device preset.

- [L Only]
- [R Only]
- [Side by Side]
- [Top and Bottom]
- [Line Interleave]
- [Blend]
- [Anaglyph]
- [Difference]
- [Split Grid]

The operation procedure is the same as regular export to tape.

“Exporting to VTR” (▶ page 478)

Exporting L/R to Separate Tape

Export the video of the L and R sides of the project to separate tape.

Select [Yes] in [Stereoscopic Separate L/R Clips] for device presets.

1) Perform steps 1) to 7) in “Exporting to VTR”.

- “Exporting to VTR” (▶ page 478)
- After step 7), the message [Insert L tape] will be displayed.

2) Insert the tape for the L side into the camera, and click [OK].

- Export of L side data is started.
- When export ends, the message [Insert R tape] is displayed.

3) Insert the tape for the R side into the camera, and click [OK].

- Export of R side data is started.
- The [Print To Tape] dialog box disappears when the export finishes.



- Click [Cancel] to abort the export.
- If In and Out points have been set on the timeline, that range will be exported.

Serial Number Management

Starting up GV License Manager

GV License Manager is used for serial number management.

Note

- To use GV License Manager, it must be executed in the environment where EDIUS is installed. The following description are examples for Windows 10.
The operation may differ depending on the type or version of OS on your PC.

1) Click the Windows logo at the lower left of the start screen to display the start menu, and click [Grass Valley] → [GV License Manager].

- The GV License Manager starts up and the [License List] dialog box appears.
“[License List] Dialog Box” (▶ page 481)

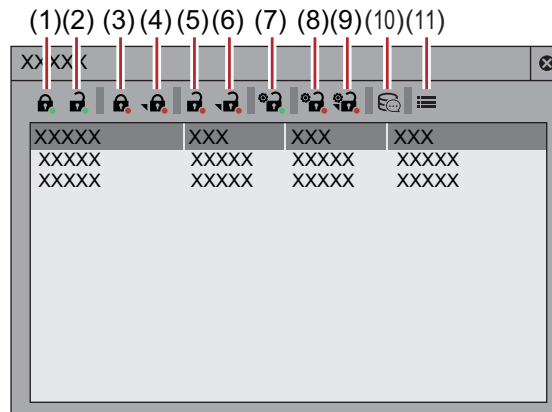

- Right-click the GV License Manager icon in the notification area on the task bar, and click [License List].

(11)	[Settings]	Click this button for various settings. “[Settings] Dialog Box” (► page 482)

[Settings] Dialog Box

[Use floating license server]	Check this item to use EDIUS with a floating license. Enter [Server address] and [Port number].
[Use proxy server]	Check this item to use proxy server for network communication with the activation server.
[Show License Expiration Warning]	Set the timing to display a warning message for license expiration. If you check [Warning of the subscription license is not displayed], the warning message to notify subscription license expiration will not be displayed.
[Administrator Password]	Restrict license activation/deactivation operations to the administrator. Check this item and enter the administrator password.

- Part of the serial number can be displayed in the [License List] dialog box.
In the [License List] dialog box, right-click the product to confirm the serial number, and then click [Confirm part of serial number].
- To display the [Settings] dialog box, you can also right-click the GV License Manager icon in the notification area on the task bar, and click [Settings].

Moving License in Online Environment

The following explains how to move licenses between EDIUS terminals in the online environment.

- 1) Start up GV License Manager on the move source EDIUS terminal.**
 - “Starting up GV License Manager” (► page 481)
- 2) Select products to deactivate licenses in the [License List] dialog box.**
- 3) Click [Online deactivation], and click [Yes].**
 - Access the activation server automatically and deactivate the licenses.
- 4) Start up EDIUS on the move destination EDIUS terminal.**
- 5) Enter the serial number, and click [Register].**
 - The license authentication is performed.
- 6) A message appears, and click [OK].**

Note

- eID activation is not necessary when unregistering the serial number.
- To register the serial number to a new PC on which EDIUS is to be used, online activation of eID is required.

Transferring License in Online Environment

Move licenses between offline EDIUS terminals via another PC in the online environment.

- To transfer a license in the offline environment, a storage device such as USB memory device is necessary.
This section describes the procedure to transfer a license using a USB memory device.

Note

- To register the serial number to a new PC on which EDIUS is to be used, online activation of eID is required.

Unregistering License (Offline Activation)

Deactivate your license on the EDIUS terminal in the offline environment.

- 1) **Connect a USB memory device to the PC where EDIUS is installed.**
- 2) **Start up GV License Manager.**
 - “Starting up GV License Manager” (▶ page 481)
- 3) **Click [Offline Deactivation Create ID File].**
- 4) **Select the USB memory device as the export destination in the [Destination for ID File] dialog box, and click [Select Folder].**
- 5) **A confirmation message appears, then click [OK].**
- 6) **Disconnect the USB memory device, and connect it to a PC that is connected to the Internet.**
- 7) **Open the USB memory device on the explorer and double-click GVDeactivation.exe.**
- 8) **A message [Do you wish to deactivate the license?] appears, then click [Yes].**
- 9) **A confirmation message appears, then click [OK].**
 - Disconnect the USB memory device.

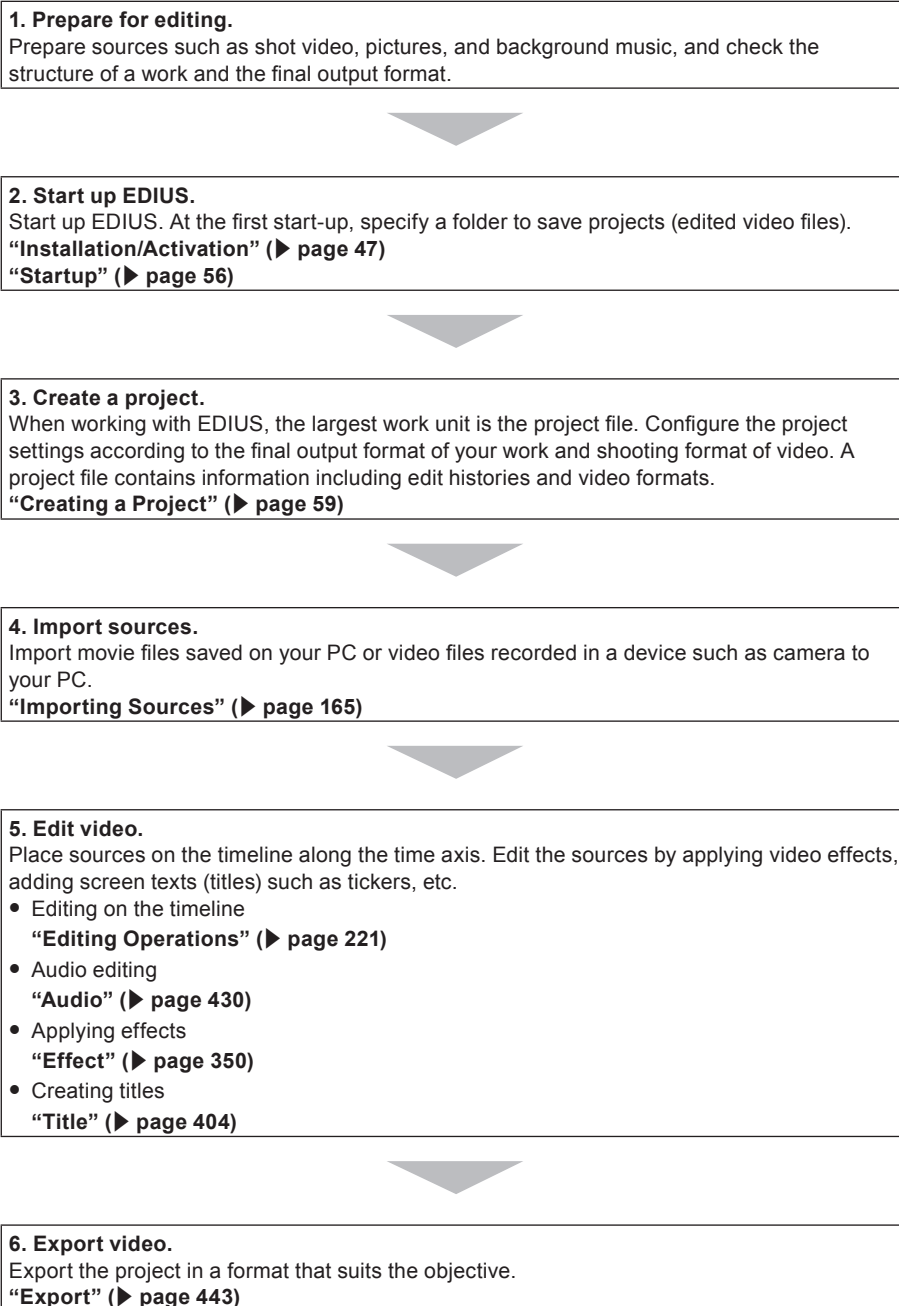

Video Signal Level Restriction

■ IRE range

Video signal level is indicated by IRE with the normal range from 0% to 100%. However, even a small deviation from the normal range will cause the video signal clipped due to inexistence of the supported code, which sometimes causes troubles in actual operations. Therefore, signal allocation is being performed in the range that includes marginal parts called “super white” and “sub black”, and thus, IRE range is approximately -7% to $+109\%$.

■ Automatic adjustment using [Safe Color]

To restrict the IRE range to 0% - 100% at final output after editing and other works have been completed, [Color Balance] in [Color Correction] can be used.

Checking [Safe Color] in the [Color Balance] dialog box restricts each signal of YCbCr so that its IRE range is to be within the range 0% - 100%.

“Adjusting Color Balance” (▶ page 360)

After automatic adjustment by [Safe Color] has been performed, some part may not be within the 0% - 100% range in the RGB waveform of [Videoscope]. This occurs after conversion of YCbCr signals restricted within 0% - 100% range into RGB signals, in which some parts are out of the 0% - 100% range of RGB signal.



- Unless a codec that outputs RGB signals, such as uncompressed RGB, is used as the output format, output will be performed in YCbCr signals which has the range 0% - 100%.

■ Restricting IRE range of RGB signals

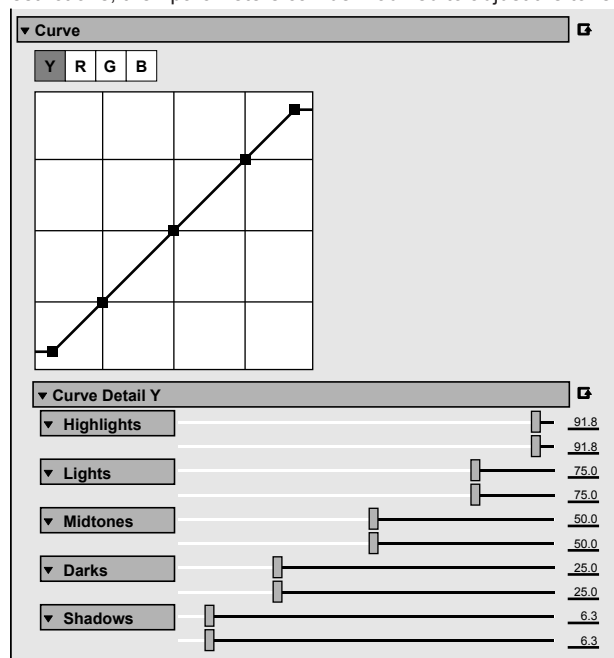
If you need to maintain the 0% - 100% range also when data of RGB signals is displayed, adjustment can be performed using primary color correction.

Use [Curve] in the primary color correction and set as in the figure below, to make RGB signals within the 0% - 100% range.

- If RGB signals are restricted within the range 0% - 100%, YCbCr signals will also be within the range 0% - 100%, which does not require adjustment by [Safe Color] of [Color Balance].
- The setting values for [Highlights] and [Shadows] correspond to IRE 100% and 0% respectively. Since [Lights], [Midtones], and [Darks] are not affected by the signal level restrictions, their parameters can be modified to adjust the tone.

- Hovering the mouse cursor over an effect in the [Effect] palette displays a simple description of the effect.

[VideoFilters]

Besides the following effects, frequently used effects, such as video filter for old movies, are registered as system presets.

[Color Correction]

Includes video filters for color adjustment, such as 3-Way color correction and YUV curve.

“Adjusting Color/Brightness (Color Correction)” (► page 356)

[Anti Flicker]

Reduces screen flicker. Effective for images with little motion.

[Emboss]

Makes a three-dimensional monotone image like a lithograph. You can set the direction and depth of the shadow.

[Old Movie/Film]

Makes an image look like an old film.

[Chrominance]

Specifies a color as the key color, and apply a specific filter to the inside, edge or outside.

[Sharpness]

Sharpens the outline of objects and makes an image look as if it is a higher resolution.

[Stabilizer]

Correct the camera shake by image processing.

[Strobe/Freeze]

Creates an effect like a strobe light flashing.

[Soft Focus]

Applies an effect like a mist that softens the video.

[Select channel]

Switches the output of a clip with alpha channel to key output or fill output.

“Alpha Channel” (► page 389)

[Tunnel Vision]

Makes an image look like it is in a tunnel. It is effective when used in combination with [Loop Slide].

[Video Noise]

Adds noise.

[Blur]

Makes an image look blurred.

[Blend Filters]

Blends two video filters in any respective proportion. The blend ratio can be set to change along the time axis by setting a key frame.

[Mask]

Applies a video filter to the inside or outside of a given range. Using the pass, the application range can be rectangular, elliptical, or any shape.

You can also use motion tracking. It automatically tracks specific parts of a subject in motion and apply an effect.

“**Motion Tracking ([Mask])**” (► page 375)

[Matrix]

Applies a preferred set matrix to every pixel, to blur or sharpen an image. It is effective when exporting images in MPEG format that have a lot of movement.

[Mirror]

Reverses an image.

[Median]

Balances an image to be smooth to decrease the noise component. Increasing the threshold value gives a paintbrush effect.

[Mosaic]

Applies a mosaic to an image. It is effective when used on parts of an image in combination with [Mask].

[Motion Blur]

Applies the [Blur] effect to moving objects only. This effect can be applied when the whole image moves on the screen such as during a pan or tilt movement.

[Raster Wipe]

Transforms an image to become wavelike.

[Loop Slide]

Slides an image as if it is connected above, below, left or right.

[Block Color]

Displays an image in monochrome. It is effective when used on parts of an image in combination with [Mask].

[Pencil Sketch]

Makes an image look like its outline was traced with a pencil.

[Stereoscopic Adjuster]

Adjusts the stereoscopic image.

[Smooth Blur]

Applies an effect where the focal point seems blurred while suppressing discoloration.

[Combine Filters]

Sets up to 5 filters simultaneously. You can also set multiple filters without using [Combine Filters], though the synergistic effect of multiple filters may not appear if you do not use [Combine Filters].(For example, when applying multiple filters in an area specified using a [Mask] or [Chrominance] filter.)

[Gaussian Blur]

Applies a defocusing effect in higher quality than [Blur] and [Smooth Blur].

[Transform]

Sets cropping, zoom-in/out, movement, rotation, etc. of the image.

[AudioFilters]

Besides the following effects, frequently used effects, such as enhancement for high-pitched sound/low-pitched sound and audio filter for echo, are registered as system presets.

[Graphic Equalizer]

Sets the frequency properties by adjusting the master fader or the fader of each frequency range.

[Delay]

Creates an echo-like effect by repeating the same sound at different levels or with a time difference.

[Tone Controller]

Sets the intensity of low pitch sound and high pitch sound.

[High-pass Filter]

Cuts the frequency region below a set frequency.

[Parametric Equalizer]

Emphasizes or de-emphasizes sound of a certain frequency.

[Panpot Balance]

Maps the audio signal input from channels on the left and right to the left, right or center. The input level and the output balance can also be set for the left and right channels.

[Pitch Shifter]

Adjusts the audio pitch.

[Low-pass Filter]

Cuts the frequency region above a set frequency.

[Transitions]



- Click a transition in the [Effect] palette and select an animation to display the animation and confirm its movement.

[2D]

Planar movement transitions. You can also call upon and apply a preset from the settings dialog box of each transition.

[Clock]

Transitions the video with a movement like the hands on a clock.

[Circle]

Transitions the video with an expanding circle.

[Stripes]

Transitions the video in striped parts.

[Stretch]

Transitions while expanding video B.

[Slide]

Transitions by inserting video B from a specified direction.

[Dissolve]

Gradually transitions from video A to video B. This is set as the default transition in the initial settings.

[Blind Slide]

Transitions by inserting video B in stripes from the left and right sides (top and bottom sides).

[Blind Wipe]

Video B is revealed in stripes that slide in from left and right sides (top and bottom sides).

[Block]

Video B is revealed in blocks that snake around video A.

[Blind Push]

Video A is slid out and video B slides into the screen in stripes that move towards the left and right sides.

[PushStretch]

Transitions in a way where video B appears to push video A off the screen.

[Box]

Transitions the video with an expanding rectangle.

[Border Wipe]

Transitions by sliding video B in from a specific direction.

[3D]

Three-dimensional movement transitions. You can also call upon and apply a preset from the settings dialog box of each transition.

[3D Dissolve]

In addition to a normal dissolve, you can set the light, shadow, movement, etc.

[Cube Spin]

A cube with video A and video B displayed on its sides rotates to transition from video A to video B.

[Single Door]

Transitions the video with a door opening movement.

[Sphere]

Video A becomes a sphere and flies away.

[Double Door]

Transitions the video as if a double door opens.

[Two Pages]

Transitions to video B by peeling away video A as if on 2 sheets of paper.

[Peel Away]

Peels away video A as if on 1 sheet of paper.

[Peel Over]

Transitions to video B by peeling away video A as if on 1 sheet of paper with video B on its reverse.

[Four Pages]

Transitions to video B by peeling away video A as if on 4 sheets of paper.

[Fly Away]

Video A flies away to reveal video B.

[Flip Over]

Transitions the video by flipping it over.

[Blinds]

Turns over video A in stripes as if a set of blinds to reveal video B on the reverse.

[Page Peel]

Transitions by peeling over the video.

[GPU]

High quality and complex transitions that use the GPU (Graphics Processing Unit) can be set. A large number of presets are included in the [GPU] effect folder. If you want to set parameters to create a new transition, they can be set and applied from the [Advanced] folder.

The settings dialog box of each transition contains [Design] settings to adjust the direction of movement, angle of incidence of light and the like, and [Time] settings to specify a key frame and adjust movement along the time axis. These settings can be used to apply complex movement and effects.

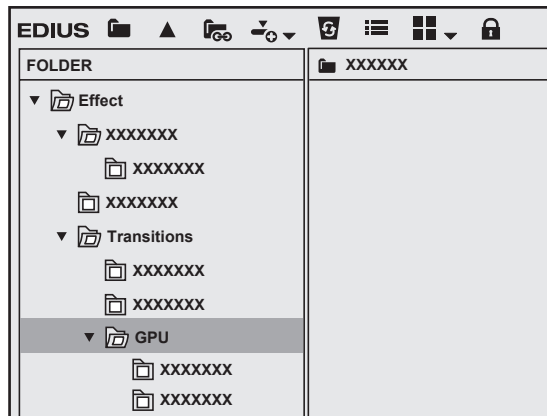
You can set the antialiasing and image quality when GPUfx is applied, from [Effect] in [System Settings] → [GPUfx].

If [GPU] is not displayed in the [Effect] palette, or if the transitions do not move, confirm the system environment and the error information from [Effect] in [System Settings] → [GPUfx].

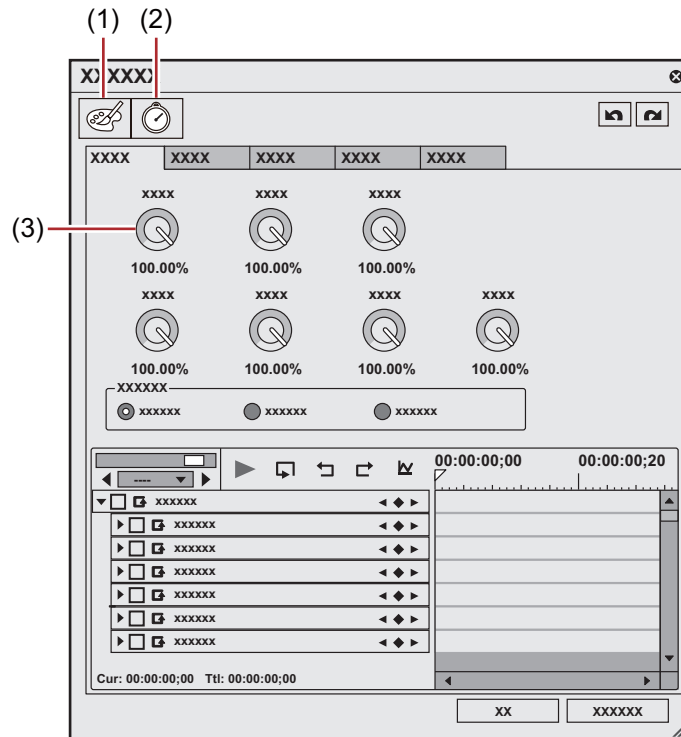
1) Click the transition to which GPUfx has been applied.

2) Select [Explosion] in the [Information] palette, and click [Open Setup Dialog].

- The [Explosion] dialog box appears.

3) Set each item.



(1)	[Design]	Display a setting screen to adjust the motion or lighting. Use [Divide] to change the fragment size, use [Spread] to change the spread of fragments, and perform other operations. Also set key frames to change the motion of video along the time axis.
(2)	[Time]	Display the setting screen to set the key frame and apply changes to the motion along the time axis.
(3)	Controller	Drag up and down to adjust.

4) Click [OK].

[Accordion]

Transitions by folding the video like an accordion.

[Album]

Transitions the video as if folding over a stiff page in a book.

[Extend]

Transitions the video by stretching it.

[Explosion]

Transitions by applying an effect where it looks as if the video has exploded.

[Cube Tube]

Transitions the video by rotating it on a three-dimensional cube.

The effect cannot be checked with default settings. Make sure to change the parameters after applying the effect.

[Clapper Board]

Transitions the video with a movement like a clapper board.

[Sphere]

Transitions the video while turning the video into a sphere.

[Tube]

Transitions the video while turning the video into a pipe shape.

[Twist]

Transitions the video by twisting it.

[Two Pages]

Transitions by peeling the video in 2 directions.

[Transform]

Transitions the video with a variety of freeform transformations.

The effect cannot be checked with default settings. Make sure to change the parameters after applying the effect.

[Door]

Transitions the video with a door opening movement.

[Peel]

Transitions the video by peeling it.

[Folder]

Transitions the video by folding it.

[Four Pages]

Transitions by peeling the video in 4 directions.

[FlyingAway]

Transitions the video by flying it away.

[FlyingIn]

Transitions the video by flying it in.

[Flip Over]

Transitions the video by flipping it over.

[Blind Wave]

Transitions the video by splitting it into tiles/stripes and turning it over.

[Ripple]

Transitions the video while applying a wave-like effect.

[Rotation]

Transitions the video while rotating it.

[Advanced]

Applies a basic movement and configure the settings as you wish.

[SMPTE]

Applies SMPTE standard transitions.

[Alpha]

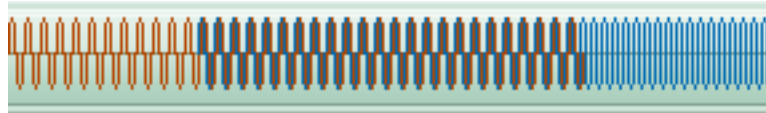
[Alpha Custom Map]

A transition that is like dissolve, except you can apply unevenness to the dissolve or change the direction, rotation, speed, etc.

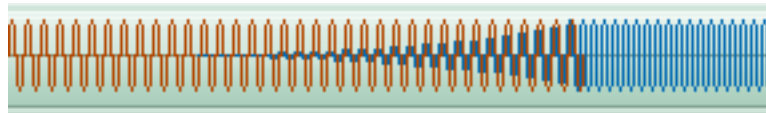

[TitleMixers]

Applies changes to how a title appears or disappears. Different effects can be applied to the In side and the Out side. Parameters can only be changed for [Soft Slide] and [Soft Wipe].

[Slide A]

The title enters the screen from outside the screen, and exists the screen in the selected direction.

[Slide B]

The title slides within a rectangle in the selected direction. The rectangle includes all text frames and other objects placed when creating the title.

[Soft Slide]

The title enters the screen from outside the screen in the selected direction, sliding up to a rectangular range. The borders are blurred during In and Out.

[Soft Wipe]

The title appears during a wipe in the selected direction. The wipe borders are blurred.

[Fade Slide A]

Slide A is moved while dissolving.

[Fade Slide B]

Slide B is moved while dissolving.

[Laser]

The title appears as if projected by a laser. The opposite movement is performed during Out.

[Wipe]

The title appears during a wipe in the selected direction.

[Wipe Vertical]

The title appears during a wipe in a vertical direction.

[Wipe Horizontal]

The title appears during a wipe in a horizontal direction.

[Fade]

The same as the dissolve effect. This is set as the default title mixer in the initial settings.

[Blur]

The title dissolves while becoming blurred.





[Keyers]

Blends multiple videos on top of one another.

[Blend]

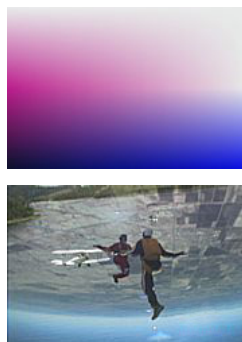
Blends 2 videos on top of each other. Video A is the 1VA video and video B is 2VA, where video B is blended on top of video A. The above images are examples of blending the blue gradation as video A (background) and the red gradation as video B (foreground). The following images are examples of blending the skydiving image as video A (background) and the image of the airplane flying above a lake as video B (foreground).

[Overlay]

The blending creates a darker area where the background is dark due to a multiplying effect, and a brighter area where the background is light due to a screening effect.



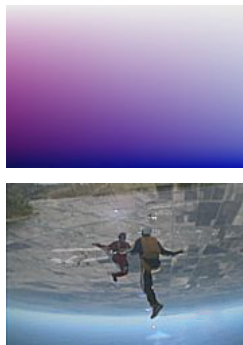
[Screen]

Since the pixels are negated, multiplied then negated again, the image becomes brighter.



[Soft Light]

Applies a multiplication and screening effect, making the background darker where the foreground is dark, and the background lighter where the foreground is light.



[Hard Light]

Blending of where the foreground is dark makes the image darker due to a multiplying effect, and blending of where the foreground is light makes the image lighter due to a screening effect.



[Vivid Light]

Blending of where the foreground is light lowers the contrast and makes the image lighter, and blending of where the foreground is dark increases the contrast and makes the image darker.



[Pin Light]

Replaces parts that are light in the foreground with a darker part, and replaces parts that are dark in the foreground with lighter parts.



[Linear Light]

Increases the brightness of parts that are bright in the foreground, and lowers the brightness of parts that are dark in the foreground.



[Multiply]

Multiplies the colors and so makes the image darker.



[Addition]

Adds the colors and so makes the image brighter.



[Difference]

Displays colors that have been converted into an absolute value from the difference between the background and foreground.



[Lighter]

Compares the background and foreground, and displays the brighter color.



[Darker]

Compares the background and foreground, and displays the darker color.



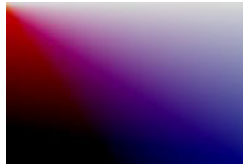
[Subtract]

Subtracts the foreground from the background so parts of the foreground that are bright become dark.



[Color Burn]

Leaves the background color as it is and darkens parts that are superimposed.



[Color Dodge]

Leaves the background color as it is and brightens parts that are superimposed.



[Exclusion]

Displays colors that have been converted to an exclusive OR for the background and foreground.



[Chromakey]

Displays the lower video through a specific color.

[Track Matte]

Produces an alpha channel according to the luminance of the lower image, which is multiplied to the alpha channel of the clip to which track matte is applied.

[Luminancekey]

Displays the lower video through a specific brightness.
